The Times thinks that the American troops can hardly be in condition to undertake great advances at present, owing to the hot climate and consequent strain on their health.

American troops are now within four miles of Santiago. Lieut. Hobson is occupying comfortable quarters in the barracks at Santiago and is being supplied with good food. He is allowed wine, but, in consequence of the blockade, is deprived of many comforts. He expresses himself, however, as well satisfied with his treatment.

The brig Amaipa was captured near Key West while flying the Honduras flag. The Vicksburg made the capture and brought her in. It is said she used the Honduras registry as a blind and that really she is owned by Spaniards. The exportation of tobacco from Cuba will continue freely under neutral flags for neutral ports. Sugar will only be exported on the same conditions as before, that is, when the vessel has beforehand imported eatables or coal. General Shafter expected to remove his headquarters from Baiquiri to Juragua Sunday evening. He is pushing forward on Santiago.

The American transports have not yet arrived at Manila. The Austrian corvette Frumdsberg has arrived at Singapore on her way to Manila. It is said she has 500 torpedces, intended for the Spanish fleet.

It seems that the wreck of the Merrimac does not effectually blockade the harbor. It is said the Merrimac was not properly sunk, but that Hobson and his men took the vessel too far into the harbor before sinking her.






