WILD MEN RIDES THE GOVERNMENT

Council, Like Unruly Schoolboys, Chatter, Thump Desks and Laugh

To "Neds" Disgrat and Dismay—He Appeals in Vain to the Mayor to Take His Chair, But Has to Sit It Out—T. Ralls Allowed and Bicycle Regulations Pass, But the Broad Bylaw Talked Out—Reports Scarcely Amended.

The sombre mantle of civic business was hung heavy on what was practically the first day of the council meeting yesterday. It did not take the audience long to throw it off. The meeting gave every promise of being a hot one, but, of course, no matter what the occasion, the members of the council, as a rule, are not given to making a scene.

The reports were approached in record time, as early as 8.30 o'clock. Ald. Hallam was invited to the chair by the Mayor, and before long his remarks were being carried on, desks were thumped and grated, and at one time Ald. Gowanlock departed his feet on top of Ald. Bowman's desk, and refused to remove them in spite of the burly chairman's threatening gestures. The latter several times left his chair disheveled and disgraced.

This sort of thing, together with numerous attacks, always defeated, on the Board of Control recommendations, struck out the meeting until 7 o'clock. About this time the members were furnished with a circular, which was read by the Mayor. The circular was in relation to the proposed bylaw, the Mayor's report, and the proposed amendments to the bylaw, and broke the quorum half an hour later.

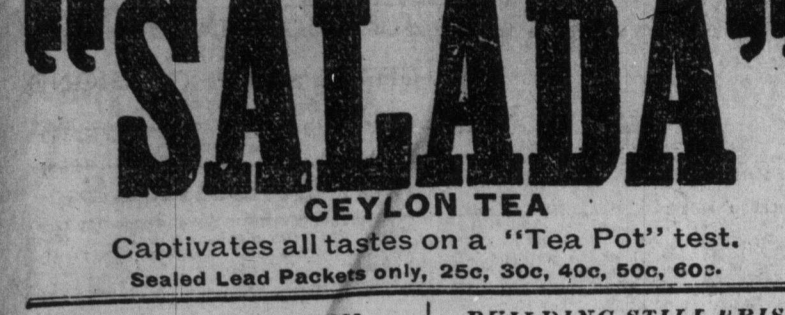

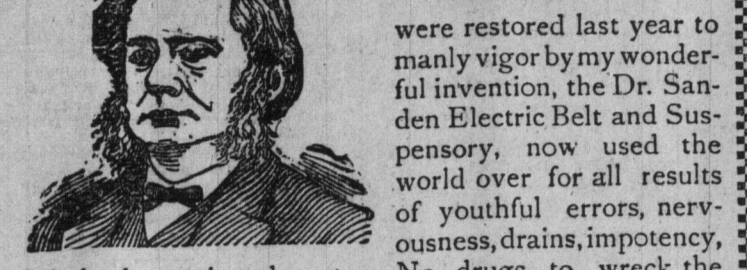

Chicago Stronger on Reported Over-Estimation of Crop.

Liverpool Market Lower, and Continental Markets Little Changed. Big Decrease in Visible Supply and Quantity Afloat for Europe-Gossip.

Monday Evening, June 27. The Chicago wheat market firmed up to some extent on the news that the over-estimation of the crop was not as great as first reported. The market maintained its strength throughout the session and closed at a net profit for the day. July, September and December deliveries all showing a gain of 1/8 cent per bushel since Saturday's close. Cash wheat advanced a little, selling down 1/4 cent.
