Is the Rule on Street Cars Which the Board of Control Will Now Attempt to Enforce.

MR. KEATING JOLLIES THE BOARD,

But the Question of Overcrowding Will Now Be Taken Up in Dead Earnest.

The Board of Control, to their credit, he it said, swam on the popular wave yesterday, and dealt with the street car overcrowding question in a manner unqualified and uncompromising. They have declared for one passenger, one seat, and have directed, as a result of their deliberations, that the City Engineer be instructed to report to this board the number of cars required for each street car route throughout the city, and the intervals at which such cars should run in order to provide proper accommodation for the citizens desiring to use the cars.

The Engineer's Order. To get at this, the Engineer is to station men at central street railway corners to count the passengers at congested hours, and to regulate the traffic in accordance with the report.

The report is to be in such a shape that after next Council meeting the company will have been ordered to put on more cars. Keating Manager and Keating Engineer.

Manager Keating, by letter from the Mayor, tried to steer the Controllers from the straight and narrow way. He wrote as follows:

I see by the newspapers that attention is again being devoted to the City Hall case, and I desire to draw your attention to the fact that this company is as much opposed to the practice as any of the riders can be.

You may remember that some two or three years ago the City Council passed a resolution limiting the number of passengers to be carried inside of closed cars to 50 per cent, above their seating capacity, and in open cars to their seating capacity. When I had the honor to hold the position of City Engineer, I frequently advocated the advisability of adopting some measures for enforcing this regulation, and suggested that the services of the police should be called into requisition in assisting the officials of the Railway Company in the enforcement of this law.

On the 4th of January, 1898, a joint report was made by the City Engineer and myself upon the subject of preventing overcrowding on the platforms of the cars, in which it was also suggested that the services of the police would be required.

I can assure you that the company would be pleased if any reasonable and effective method could be devised which would have the effect of preventing the overcrowding of cars, but you must be aware that if instructions were given to our officials to eject passengers when they are overcrowded, it would lead to very serious troubles and breaches of the peace, unless the passengers were convinced that passengers had the support of the city authorities in preventing overcrowding.

I should be glad to meet you and discuss this matter with you at any time you may appoint, but I cannot do so unless you are to be served by the frequent attacks made upon this company for allowing a state of affairs to exist which they have not the power to prevent.

It has frequently been suggested that by putting on extra cars overcrowding would be stopped. This, however, is not the case, as I have frequently stated. It is not possible to put on extra cars when an extra car immediately following the overcrowded car is not half full. You will, therefore, see that this course would not remedy the trouble, as the practice of a great many people is to crowd on to the first car which comes along, and nothing will stop them, unless they are obliged by some means to keep off.

The Board Saw the Game. But the board, though pleased to see Mr. Keating's clever complacency, saw his point. The Mayor, it is true, ventured the suggestion that "the public are to blame," but Mr. Keating said so, and so did his other colleagues.

The Controller compared Toronto with Broadway, New York, and the most congested thoroughfare, where there was no overcrowding, because the people could see other cars coming, and did not rush for the first one.

"Yes," acquiesced Aid. Lynd, "if the people knew another car was coming in the minute they would wait for it rather than be crowded."

Aid. Lynd is who was first initiated here the final motion urging that the Engineer find out what accommodation was necessary, and order the company to put it on. In this way, if they refuse, it would establish a legal case for the city to act upon.

"Unlike the Mayor, who wanted to get on past refusals, he would 'let the dead past bury its dead.' Entirely new evidence of the company's dereliction was determined upon.

DEATH OF MR. HOMER DIXON

An Aged Citizen Who Was Greatly Honored Passed Away Yesterday Morning.

Interesting Family History—Sketch of the Career of the Deceased—His Varied Interests.

A large circle of friends and many citizens will learn with regret of the death of Mr. Benjamin Homer Dixon, which occurred at his residence, 14 Walmer-road, yesterday morning. For two years he had been in failing health, and the end was not unexpected. Deceased was born at Amsterdam, Holland, March 10, 1819, and thus had nearly completed four score years. He had been a resident of Toronto for more than forty years, and no one was more highly respected in the varied circles in which he moved. For many years Mr. Dixon resided at "The Homewood," on Wellesley-crescent, at the termination of Homewood-house, which was noted as the first brick residence in that portion of the city.

Deceased was of Scotch descent, the family name being Dickson; but his grandfather, Thomas Dickson, altered the spelling to Dixon, before he removed to the Netherlands, in 1788. There he invested in real estate, which, when the French revolution broke out, became untenantable. When the French invaded the country he was imprisoned, and he died in 1824, aged 85. His only son, Thomas Dixon, was born in 1781. During the first French Revolution he was confined to the guillotine, and twice imprisoned. In 1810, he visited the United States, and in 1818, married, in Boston, Mary, the daughter of Benjamin F. Homer. He returned to Holland, where he was made Knight of the Order of the Netherlands Lion of Honor. He afterwards returned to Toronto, where he died in 1840. The younger of his sons, Fitz Engine, married the daughter of Hon. George M. Dillia, Viscount Dillia, of the United States. A daughter married the late William H. Boulton, M.P., of the Grand Trunk, and, secondly, Prof. Goodwin Smith of this city.

Thirty-Three Years Consul-General. The deceased Mr. Dixon was created a Knight of the Netherlands Lion in 1838, and appointed Consul-General of the Netherlands for Canada in 1840. In 1842, on account of declining health and advancing years, on which occasion, in recognition of his services, he received from the Queen Dowager Regent of the Netherlands the honorary title of Consul-General of the Netherlands.

Mr. Dixon was three times married: first, in 1818, to Miss Kate McCall Macnamoy, daughter of the Chief Justice; secondly, in 1824, to Miss Elizabeth, daughter of the late Mr. Dixon, married for the second time in 1808. Miss Frances Caroline Howard, daughter of the late Mr. W. B. Howard, by whom he had a family of three sons and three daughters. One daughter, Elizabeth, married the late Mr. G. K. Kirkpatrick, ex-Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. One daughter, Elizabeth, died about three months ago. The second wife of Mr. Dixon died in September, 1824, and two years later, he was married to Miss Elizabeth, daughter of the late Mr. George Carleton, banker of York, England. By this marriage there was one daughter.

A Devout Evangelical. The deceased was a member of the Church of England, of most pronounced evangelical views. For many years he was a communicant at St. Peter's Church. In the days of the bitter controversy between the High and Low Church parties in Toronto, Mr. Dixon took a very decided stand for the latter. He was secretary of the Church Association for a number of years. He has published, in addition to other works, "The Bible and its History," "Sermons and Meditations and Errors, with Reference to Paganism." This work, which was very highly praised, was published in 1857. Mr. Dixon was a constant writer on religious topics, being the author of several treatises against the "Liturgy of the Book of Common Prayer," and the "Romanizing tendency of High Churchism."

Mr. Dixon was a director of the Evangelical Churchman Publishing Company, and president of the Dever Park Sanitarium. He was a liberal supporter of many institutions, charities, and societies, and in his removal the poor have lost a good friend, genial and cheerful to the last. He has passed in a good old age, and his field of activity in which, at the call of duty, he had found delight for so many years.

At the request of the family the funeral will be strictly private.

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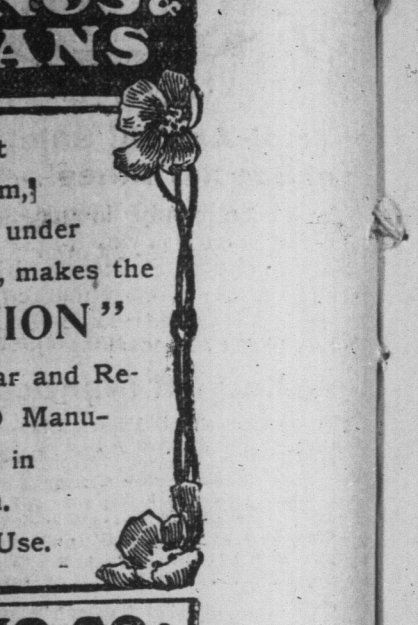
