Poison for the Water.

Poison for the Water. London, Sept. 20.—The correspondent of The Daily Mail at Peltermaritzburg. Natal, telegraphs that the military authorities there have received warning from Johan-nesburg that the Boers have purchased con-siderable quantities of cyanide of potassium, for the purpose of poisoning the streams in the Transvaal likely to be used by British troops. Other special despatches report various details of preparations for war on both sides. Boer troops now control both the Beira and Newcastle railways, as they enter Transvaal jeritory.







A DREYFUSARD DEAD.

M. Auguste Scheurer-Kestner, the former vice-president of the French Senate and great champion of the cause of Dreyfus, was born Feb. 11, 1833, at Mulhouse, Alsace, from which place the Dreyfus family also halled. He was president of the Chemicai Society of Paris, and was a prominent member of other societies. He was politi-cal director of The Republique Francaise from 1879 to 1884, and was a Republican in politics. He took a great interest in the improvement of the working classes, and in 1865 founded a co-operative society for their benefit. His republican ideas in 1867 caused him to be sentenced to four months' impris-onment and to 2000 frances fine. He was elected to the Mational Assembly in 1871, and in 1875 he was first elected to the Sen-ate, of which he afterwards became one of the secretaries, and eventually one of the vice-presidents. He was defeated for re-election as vice-president Jan. 13, 1898. He has written extensively on chemistry.
