MOTHER MUST BE ARRESTED TO SAVE THE LITTLE CHILD'S LIFE

Mrs. Lydia Stock Becomes Insane, Over Nursing Her Sick Infant, and Chases Out Three Doctors—How She Attacked Dr. Sheard. In order to save the life of her only child, the police were last night compelled to take steps towards placing Mrs. Lydia Stock, a dressmaker, who lives at 47 Nelson-street, under arrest on a charge of insanity. The case, which is an unusually sad one, was brought to the notice of the Medical Department of the Health Officer Sheard. The child has been ill for some time with lung trouble, and the strain occasioned by staying up at nights and watching at the bedside has, it is said, driven the affectionate mother out of her mind. The woman, when the child first took sick, called in Dr. Badger, and he was constantly in attendance till a few days ago, when Mrs. Stock exhibited signs of mental weakness. On making his daily visit, the physician found her nursing the sick child in her arms. She refused to allow him to see the patient, and he quietly withdrew. Dr. Fisher of Spadina-avenue was then sent for by the woman, and after he had been in attendance for a few days he suspected that Mrs. Stock was not in her right mind and was not carrying out his advice. He also withdrew and Dr. Pepler of John and Adelaide-streets was next asked to take charge of the case. When he made his first visit, and finding the condition of things, he pleaded with the woman to allow the child to be taken to the Sick Children's Hospital. The unfortunate mother would not listen to him from the house. Dr. Pepler then communicated with a view to having the sick child removed from the house against the wishes of the mother, and, as a result, Dr. Sheard immediately interested himself in the case, and arranged with Dr. Pepler to visit the woman at her home. When the woman learned the reason for her visit, she flew into a rage, and, as a result, she hit the head of Dr. Sheard. The woman then threatened to use an ax on the physician, and she avoided further trouble by leaving the house. Dr. Sheard concluded that the woman placed under arrest, and the woman was taken to the hospital, and then the ambulance will be sent to the house to take the child to the hospital.

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THE MINE EXPLOSION AT SCOFIELD, UTAH, WAS MORE DISASTROUS THAN FIRST REPORTED.

Many Dead Laid Out in Rows. Of Some 400 Men Working in the Mines One-Half Have Been Suffocated. Salt Lake, Utah, May 2.—Two hundred or more lives were lost in the explosion in mine No. 4 of the Pleasant Valley Coal Company yesterday at Scofield, Utah. One hundred and thirty-seven bodies have already been recovered. The work of rescue is still progressing, although there is no hope that any of the men who are unaccounted for escaped death. The scene of the disaster is just outside this place, on the line of the Rio Grande Western Railroad. The quarters of the mine, as situated by the winter of the mine, is attributed to some of the blowing up of a number of kegs of dynamite.

Diamond Jubilee's Two Thousand Guineas Stakes at Newmarket.

LONG SHOTS IN MONEY AT AQUEDUCT

Fair Trials at Woodbine-Hendrie's Horses Arrive-Kentucky Derby To-Day.

London, May 2.—The Two Thousand Guineas stakes, run at Newmarket to-day, was won by the Prince of Wales's Diamond Jubilee, Bona Rosa and Sidus finished second and third, respectively, in the field of ten.

R. W. Walden's Griffitha View Holla, ridden by Martin, led to the front upon when Diamond Jubilee drew clear, followed by Sidus, and making the remainder of the running, won easily by four lengths.

The betting was 110 to 1 against Diamond Jubilee, 50 to 1 against Bona Rosa, and 100 to 1 against Sidus. L. Ruff rode Bona Rosa.

This is the first time the Prince of Wales has won the Two Thousand Guineas. The classic races with the exception of the Oaks.
