Concession to Poles. Following the policy of trying to im-prove the condition of the Poles, Em-peror Nicholas has sanctioned an im-portant law, permitting them to pur-chase land in the kingdom of Poland. They were deprived of this right after the insurrection of 1863, the land tenure of Poles being limited to land acquired by direct inheritance. The inability to buy land has been ever since one of the chief grievances of the Poles.
