SHOW NEW YORK POOLROOM AS GUARDED FROM POLICE

But Even Seven Inch Doors, Underground Passages and Electrical Devices Couldn't Spoil Raid.

New York, May 14.—One of the most strongly fortified and more elaborately fitted up poolrooms that have discovered in this city, the police say, was raided yesterday.

It was in a four-story house in West Third-street, between Greene and Wood-streets, Acting Captain Bourke of the Marine corps, station, under the direction, by telephone, of Police Commissioner McAdoo, and aided by plain clothes men and twenty-five uniformed men, made the raid.

Capt. Bourke, when all was ready, walked along in front of the house with a messenger boy as a blind. When he reached the entrance, in front of which the sidewalk consists of glass and iron lights, he had an idea.

The captain and plain clothes men found themselves in a small room, the door of which was closed. They forced the door, which was made of iron bars, and entered the poolroom.

Before they had gone ten feet they encountered a man in a dark, heavy coat, four inches thick, who broke thru them in a small room fitted up with a telephone, electric switchboard, containing nearly a hundred switches.

These switches, which were operated by means of a hand crank, were connected with a series of electric lights, and were used for signaling the pool players.

Capt. Bourke and his followers next met a door fully seven inches thick. But they were on the inside, and all they had to do was to push the door open.

There was a large room in the middle of which was a stove with a fire in it. Capt. Bourke ordered the men to search the room, and they found a large quantity of money and other valuables.

Leaving these two men in the custody of other policemen who had followed them to the poolroom, the captain and his followers went upstairs, after opening many doors.

On the ground floor, the captain placed a charge of melinite in an iron barrel inclosed in a wooden case, and then he and his followers went to the poolroom.

There were every thing that several of the pool players had hidden away in the poolroom, and they were all taken away.

There were nearly 300 of these when the captain and his followers entered the poolroom.

Capt. Bourke said that the usual apparatus for passing money to the cashier in a poolroom is a small box, which is hung to the wall by a chain.

In this case, the box was hidden in a small room, which was reached by a passage through the wall.
