





His engagement calls for his first appearance in the ring on Aug. 20, and he expected to be in Sydney only about a week prior to that time. Because of that he had a gym, rigged up on the P. & O. steamer, on which he made the trip, and punched the bag daily, in addition to doing some boxing. From the latter statement it is assumed either that he has with him a trainer or that some English boxer is a passenger and is working with him. coaxed into an expensive undertaking

Billy Neall, who was with Burns in England, is not on this trip. He probably will never make another of the sort. Recently he was forced to go into a sanitarium in California, and it is said that his death from tuberculosis is a matter of weeks only. Neall was here early in the summer and made many friends. One interesting bit of news in the letter to Mr. McIntosh is the statement by Burns that he will be in Vancouver in November. He became well known in British Columbia before he won his title, and has an offer of a good purse for a bout there about Christmas, possibly a little sooner. It is a chance to get another piece of change, and he is not going to overlook it.



loss on its mining side, but Fernie has been completely obliterated, only 23 houses and three business houses being left.
On both banks of the Elk River are a large number of saw mills, all of which, with one exception, have been swept out of existence, and probably a large number of men have lost their lives in the woods. The bodies recovered so far number 16 and there will be more, but in the woods only.

The loss of the Crow's Nest Pass Co., owning mines at Coal Creek and Fernie and Michel, will be \$200,000. The C.P.R. will lose \$200,000. The Great Northern Railway will lose about \$250,000 and the lumber companies not less than a million. The loss of timber to the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. will not be less than a million. The loss to the City of Fernie will be not less than two million.

There is no rain in sight and the fire continues slowly up the mountainsice, but nothing but a very high wind would do much damage, as the valley along its lower portions is swept clean of everything combustible.

Relief in the form of money, supplies and bedding has come in with great freedom and everyone is now under canvas in Fernie.

There are about three thousand wonth of the work of the fire. One old lady they tried to save refused to be assisted. 'I am 80 years of age,' she said, 'there are three children behind there, get them first.'

"Her advice was taken and she evidentally perished, as she was not seen again by her would-be rescuers.

It does not swing whole communities, but for some reason or other it manages to get hold of scme one here and some one there just at the right moment, and the scheme becomes tied up.

There are many reasons why annexation to Toronto would be of benefit. The City of Toronto is adding to its population at a rapid rate. Yet the area is restricted. In several years, tho the growth in population has been large, only a few small areas have been annexed. Avenue-road and Roredale sections are the two notable annexation schemes carried out in the past ten years; the residents are satisfied with the change; they have received numerous benefits from city-hood; yet-before they were brought in the same influences that are at work to-day were used to prevent the consummation of the desires of the great majority of their people.

(1)—The sanitary reason: Public health will be protected by sewers and an adequate water supply. The use

Burking the Scheme.

The next move is to secure the consent of a majority of the ratepayers of the section described. A petition signed by the requisite number of ratepayers will have to be circulated, but it is manifest that the promoters of the annexation movement will be at a disadvantage. Meantime, opponents of annexation are at work. The World does not know who they represent, but they are very active.

Before the law was changed the city council could pass a bylaw and the outside municipality had no recourse. Then the people of North Rosedale wanted annexation, and the city council protested against territory being included within the bounds of the city without the consent of the council.

The act of 1905 provided for the anaexation of territory on petition of the property holders, and the present act was passed in the following year requiring the consent of both parties.





Pervur and Moore, went to the farm and ordered the whole herd to be disposed of at orce. The larger hogs were shot at once and the bodies collected for burial in lime. The smaller ones were despatched in other ways.
