### TWO VERSIONS GIVEN OF INDIAN HOSTILITIES

One Story Says Preparations Are Being Made for Fight; Another Minimizes Affair.

VICTORIA, B.C., Nov. 8.—(Special.)—A special despatch from Hazelton, B.C., says that the trial of the seven Indian ringleaders in the Skeena River district was opened to-day and adjourned pending the arrival of witnesses from the Klappan Valley.

The natives are sending out runners to the mountains to gather in the fighting men, and meetings are being held in all villages.

The Indians are said to muster fully five hundred bow-brokers and fully armed men.

Serious trouble is anticipated. Settlers are sending in their families to Hazelton for protection. An armed guard has been placed on the jail to prevent the escape or rescue of the prisoners.

Several trenches were dug to-day in which guards are posted.

The people of Hazelton are fearful for the safety of ranchers scattered thru the country, who may be pounced upon and killed in revenge for Saturday's attack by police.

An Anglo-Indian missionary was so hounded by Indians that he was forced to make preparations to move out, but before this was accomplished, his house was set afire, and what was not burned was stolen by natives.

### BARRED WINDOWS CAUSE EIGHT TO PERISH IN FIRE

Unable to Escape From Flames That Spread Rapidly Thru a New York Comb Factory

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Iron barred windows prevented the escape of eight workers from death by fire in Robert Morrison & Son's comb factory on Columbus-street, in Brooklyn to-day.

These eight, while the tugged and tore at the barred windows, were burned to death, and five others were probably fatally injured in the panic.

William Morrison, sole owner of the plant, also lost his life in the flames while trying to reach the safe in his cellar. He was found by firemen among the injured.

There were only forty employees in the factory when the fire broke out, and the spread of flames in the inflammable comb material was instantaneous. Many jumped from the third floor windows and were injured.

### WEIRD PROOF OF DOCTRINE

Christian Scientist Leaps Under Car as a Test.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 8.—J. C. Wilson, formerly of Boston, Mass., a disciple of Mrs. Eddy's Christian Science doctrine, threw himself in front of a trolley car to prove his faith, and the fact that he is still alive convinces him that the strange test has justified his belief. He suffered concussion of the brain and was a mass of bruises when he recovered consciousness to-day in the hospital. He declared that he was not suffering any pain and said he hoped to be well enough soon to give further demonstration of his faith in the doctrine. He says he contracted tuberculosis and was cured by Christian Science in Denver. Wilson was born 29 years ago in Sherman, Texas.

### Government Salaries Illegally Paid.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—The first volume of the auditor-general's report is ready for parliament. ### APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO MEET COMMISSION

Council Again Defer Signing Power Contract, Altho Minor Concessions Are Offered.

HAMILTON, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The city council this evening decided to send a letter, on Monday, to Adam Beck stating that while the commission would not alter the contract, as submitted, it would agree to the clauses drawn up by the city manager, and that the charges for the various municipalities were to be ratable according to the distance from the Falls, and that Hamilton was to be free to buy all its power, with the exception of the 1000 horsepower ordered, on the open market. The letter stated that the commission was willing to agree to these two points, and that all that was apparently between the city and the commission was the wording of the clauses. Ald. Hopkins remarked that 12 aldermen and the mayor had been elected by the commission without asking for any concessions. They had met at the first of the year, and the mayor had advised them to go slowly, but promised he would bring them to the signing of the contract with the commission, but instead of that, he had led the city to believe that the commission had not only deserted the hydro-electric supporters, but had joined the forces of the Cataract. He deserved a jolly good licking for that.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The loss to the Big Four Railway by defections of C. L. Warriner, local treasurer of the road at Cincinnati, will ultimately amount to about \$600,000, according to a statement issued in New York by Albert H. Harris, vice-president of the N. Y. C. line, including the Big Four.

### CATHEDRAL FOR PORT ARTHUR

Congregation of St. Andrew's Catholic Church Have Adopted Plans.

PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—The congregation of St. Andrew's R. C. Church have decided to adopt the plans of G. E. Tanquary of Quebec for a new cathedral on the corner of Arthur and Algoma-streets, subject to the approval of Bishop Scholard. The plans call for a building in Gothic style, with two slender spires at the west end, each 150 feet high; length of church 152 feet, width 77 feet, height from floor to roof 88 feet, to be constructed of white cut stone and to cost from \$55,000 to \$100,000.

JOSEPH RUSSELL, M.P. IS FOR DREADNOUGHTS

Independent Conservatives Gather, and Hold Out Olive Branch To Regulars.

Joseph Russell, M.P., is for Dreadnoughts, not for a "tin pot" Canadian navy.

The champion of the Independent Conservative movement in East Toronto, made his position clear at the association's annual meeting in O'Neill's Hall last night.

Mr. Russell, who was greeted enthusiastically, said he wished to place himself on record as believing that what the independent should have done at the last session was to offer one or two Dreadnoughts to the British admiralty.

It would be pleased to see a Dreadnought or first-class cruiser representing each of the nine provinces presenting to the British Government by Canada.

Mr. Russell feared that if a Canadian navy were started, it would soon develop to the size of the United States navy, despite the disparity in population.

The election of officers was a tranquil affair. H. F. Bortwick was defeated for re-election by W. B. Reid.

Other officers elected were: First Vice President, George G. W. Worsell; Second Vice President, David Hillon; Third Vice President, George Corney (acc); Fourth Vice President, Joseph Price (acc); Secretary, G. W. Worsell (acc); Treasurer, E. Gardner (acc); Executive, Geo. Gilmore, Wm. Worsell, Geo. Worsell Sr., T. C. Scott, Walter Dickson, John Ward, S. Henkes and W. Joseph.

W. H. Radcliffe, an active Russell worker in the last election, said he would like to see a solid Conservative party in East Toronto, and that if the other side did the square thing the branch should be spanned.

George Gilmore declared that the best evidence of the effectiveness of the movement was the fact that their opponents had adopted their constitution.

William Worsell avowed a belief that any overture should come from the other party.

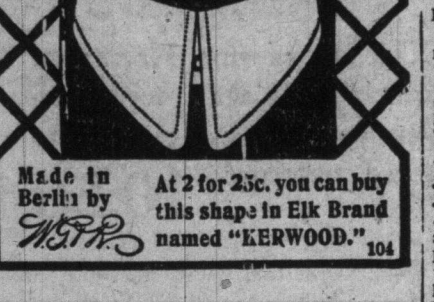

SUCCESSFUL ADVERTISING

By O. H. L. Wernicke. (Reprinted from New York Commercial)

This column has a distinct educational value to business men because it gives them ideas on advertising that they can utilize. Our business men readers, as well as advertising agencies, are invited to express their views on the merit, value, growth and future of advertising. By such interchange of views great good is felt, will come to all participants.

President Macy Co., Grand Rapids, Mich. Business is advertising and advertising is business. Commerce is publicity every transaction, every attempt to buy or sell, every offer, every solicitation for publicity and is good, bad or indifferent according to circumstances and conditions.

Publicity may be divided into three classes: favorable, neutral and harmful. The first and last of these classes each of its kind may vary widely in degree and effect.

There is in the minds of most of the people a notion that advertising means the expenditure of money for space in newspapers or other publications, billboards, signs, circulars, or novelties and the like. This view is entirely erroneous and the root of more waste and failure, and is hurting the advertising side as well as the space-buying side of the advertising game.

How Advertisers are Injured. The sellers of advertising space and advertising agencies are holding their hands so manipulated the spot that many of the conditions precedent to a successful plan of paid space advertising are being overlooked, overlooked or ignored.

Successful advertising depends primarily upon the merits of the proposition and the capacity of the management, but the measure of this success may often be colored and distorted by paid-space publicity. To illustrate this point more fully I will quote the correspondence which recently passed between the house I represent and one of its customers:

Dear Sir: Feeling that you are one of the foremost manufacturers of furniture and the most progressive we take the liberty of asking you to advertise in one of our advertising school from whom one of our salesmen can take a course to write ads.

Our Furniture Co., Mr. Wernicke's Reply. Gentlemen—I do not know of any school that teaches advertising that I could recommend to you. There are quite a number of such institutions which advise the advertiser to name students, but I have not investigated any of them.

As writing in my opinion cannot be bought like the A. B. C. multiplication table, but there are certain principles to be observed which doubt might teach and no doubt a course of study would prove beneficial to any student who desires to become more proficient in writing advertising copy.

Advertising is not confined to the mere filling of spaces with type. That is only one phase of publicity and should be the least to be considered. Everything that a house does which is favorably regarded by its patrons and attracts new customers is advertising. A good location, an attractive front, a nice show window, interesting information, courteous treatment, prompt service, accurate fulfilment, display cards on goods with interesting facts and possibly prices, neat delivery vans, well-dressed clerks with pleasant and interesting manners, all these are goods that are to sell and a thousand other things are all good advertising in its broadest sense.

Before a house begins to spend money in newspapers it should see that every other element which can make the house more prominent has been attended to. The largest items of advertising do not cost much and are the things which go to make up "the satisfied customer."

Use Plenty of Fresh Paint. Plenty of fresh paint inside and outside your store, clean floors and windows, good clean and attractive and splendid advertisements, and the next best thing is a reputation for truthfulness and integrity, which inspires confidence.

All these are assets which do not require to be marked down to command a market. They are always in demand at par.

There are two fundamental rules which underlie all forms of profitable publicity. The first is that the advertiser is to be interested. If you will keep these rules in mind, your advertising will never be flat or without value. Various expedients may be employed to attract, but nothing interests unless it is truthful and conveys useful information.

Plain everyday language, such as you employ when you talk to a customer, printed in plain sensible type where it will be seen, is always strong advertising. Do not strain after effects, but be natural. Call your groceries by that name; don't say "Toothsome Vianna."

If you will devote six months to a systematic search of your shortcomings and correct them so that yours will be the most up-to-date store in your city, you could find no better advertising copy than a plain statement of these things in detail. You must have consumers, and to hold them you must make yourselves as good as you are. COSTLY THEFT

Messenger's Delinquency Incurs \$10,000 Loss.

It developed in police court yesterday that the theft of \$375 from the G.N.W. by Geo. Waring, a messenger boy, may cost the company \$10,000. At least the tearing up of a cable message that was entrusted to him and pocketing the charges resulted in a loss of \$10,000 to a large wholesale house, who were ordering a consignment of goods from England, the price of which has advanced to that extent since then.

Warring was sent to jail for 60 days on this charge, and for the theft of a coat, order of \$15.25 from Boutery & Walker, Bay-street tailors, in May, 1908.

Mrs. Georgina Davies was committed for trial, charged with shoplifting in Eaton's and Simpson's, and remanded for a week or another similar charge. Her husband will have her examined as to her sanity.

Albert Riches, chauffeur of C. R. Wilmore, was remanded on bail of \$500 on a charge of stealing his employer's automobile and smashing it to the extent of \$250.

George Hutton was remanded for sentence for "forgetting" to return a \$12.25 railway ticket to an employment agent.

George Mann resented being called a rascal, protesting he was worth \$10,000 and earned \$1 a day. The jail surgeon will try and discover in which part of his head the fortune lies.

Ernest Robinson, C.P.R. messenger, was remanded for theft of a bike from another messenger.

LYNCHING WAS IN SIGHT

Stanstead, Que., Citizens Eager to Strip Up Two Brutes.

STANSTEAD, Que., Nov. 8.—William Wilson and Leroy Butten, arrested on suspicion of having assaulted the 7-year-old daughter of A. H. Tiffin, were nearly lynched when they were being taken from court after having pleaded not guilty. A mob of over 400 farmers, with a rope and weapons of every description, attacked the constables, and, had it not been for the help rendered by United States officials at Island Pond, just across the boundary, there would certainly have been a hanging. Later Butten confessed that he and Wilson committed the assault.

QUEEN HELENA NO SUFFRAGETTE

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Queen Helena of Italy has resolutely declined to receive a body of Italian women wishing to interest her in their agitation, saying: "Politics inspires in me nothing but dislike, since woman has only one mission on earth—love. Women seeking to associate themselves with politics cannot be good mothers or daughters."

Crown Sells Cobalt Securities Are Dull But Good Undertone is Shown

Mining Issues Remain Decidedly Firm Despite Lack of Outside Speculation—Break in Nevada Copper.

World Office, Monday Evening, Nov. 8. A good undertone was exhibited by the majority of the Cobalt stocks today and the fluctuations were narrow, they were in the main toward higher levels.

The market at no time displayed much activity, but offerings were few, while a good buying demand was in evidence throughout the session. The lower priced securities dealt in were firmer, with higher prices realized in spots. Peterson Lake was more active than for some time and advanced nearly two points to 24 cents on better buying, while Silver Bar was from around 17 1/2, despite considerable liquidation around that figure.

The Rose continued quiet, with sales ranging between \$4.90 and \$5. Good investment orders are reported around current levels, and local brokers look for a rally in these shares on any increased speculative demand. Ophir was given better support than of late, and sold up to \$12 1/2. Crown Reserve also showed signs of strength on news that a ten per cent. extra bonus had been declared at the meeting held in Montreal. The shares advanced 22 points to \$430.

Considerable interest was taken in the Nevada copper stocks today. The market was held by local speculators, and when the early quotations were reported from New York there was a scramble to liquidate from nervous holders. Ely Central, which has been very prominent of late, advancing last week to \$4, broke to about \$2, for no other reason apparently than that supporting interests withdrew from the market. One shipment from Cobalt during the week ending Saturday last, totaled 322 tons, against 555 the week previous. The list of shipping mines fell off from eight to five, while La Rose continued the heaviest consignor, with a little over 170 tons, or well over one-half of the total.

Sugar is \$15 a sack; butter 45 cents a pound; Toronto newspapers, six days' old 15 cents a copy; magazines 25 cents a copy; flour 47 per hundredweight; bacon 35 cents a pound. These high prices have prevailed all summer because of transportation costs made by the Government to the country all but impossible. No evidence of good faith could be more convincing than that thousands of scores of companies have stood without wavering to their task, never doubting the outcome even when it was costing them to do the thing.

But the handiwork of excessive cost is vanishing almost at the very hour this article is being prepared. The new government road is the factor in the change. There will be no rush to Gowganda for the mere pleasure of riding over this road. Indeed, it is scarcely passable yet to Lost Lake. By comparison with the road as it stands today is a joy forever. It makes it possible to get freight into Gowganda during the open season better than winter roads are available, and that was an impossibility before. Within two weeks the freight rates to Gowganda should be cut two-thirds. The freight and not the invoice price of the goods has been responsible for the enormous cost of everything. Mr. Mathews, who is in charge of the amount of mail handled at the postoffice at Elk City and Gowganda, would surprise anyone who is not aware that the place are the centres to which men scattered over hundreds of territory come for news from the loved ones at home. For several days the mails for Gowganda have been delivered to Long Pointe Lake, 12 miles east of Gowganda. From this point men pack the mail on their backs over the road, which is now being stumped and prepared for the graders. Four big sacks of mail were brought this morning. As no second-class matter is being carried, the mail is being carried in boxes, and the boxes were filled to the top with letters. There must have been thousands of them, and the postal staff were engaged for hours in sorting them. This was no easy task as the postoffice is located in a little building scarcely larger than a packing case.
