Strong Liberal Constituency Almost Falls Into Hands of Conservatives --- Wallace at Midnight Claims Victory By 1 Majority.

WOODBRIDGE, Dec. 23.-This peaceful village went to bed to-night in the firm belief that its family physician had been elected member of the house of commons for Centre York. A few anxious ones sat up long enough .n Capt. Tom Wallace's store to hear the welcome news that Capt. Tom had pulled out with a majority of one. The doubt about the result arose from belated returns from two divisions of Markham Township. In No. 9 the early figures gave McLean 51, whereas it is now stated that he had but 32, while in No. 5 Wallace is said to have 26, not

The result, however, as generally accepted to-night, gives McLean a majority of 19, a pretty contrast to Arch

Campbell's 124.
Capt. Wallace made substantial gains all along the line, except in Richmond Hill, which converted a Conservative majority of 36 into a Liberal majority of 16, and in Woodbridge. The turn-dver in Richmond Hill is accounted for by the fact that Pugsley, who was the Conservative candidate in 1904, lives there. In Woodbridge, where both the candidates of to-day reside Wallace randidates of to-day reside, Wallace and 29 majority, a loss of two from the

When the Returns Came In.

Both candidates received the returns here, the Liberals gathering in Temperance Hall, whither Dr. McLean went when the figures indicated his victory; but he had no idea the run was so close. The Purpleville majority of 18 for Wallace was put in the Liberal column, and Chairman D. Norton announced the triumph of the doctor by a margin of 57. The cheering when the news was announced was vigorous, and McLean wedged his way to the platform. Mr. Norton said he would have been pleased for the majority had been greater, but notwithstanding the efforts of three leaders of the Conservative party—Bor-Anyway, and Centre York had not given

Dr. McLean modestly acknowledged the homage of his supporters. They had a short, sharp and decisive campaign, and he thanked them from the bottom of his heart. "You did not do it for me alone," said the doctor, "but because you were satisfied we have a good government." He had been only three weeks in the field and did not do any mud-slinging or indulge in any personmud-slinging or indulge in any person-alities. He promised to ascertain the needs of Centre York and to support legislation in the interests of the elec-

Capt. Wallace was disappointed, but not discouraged. His supporters, he said, had made a splendid fight against great odds, and they had done remark-ship well in reducing the majority to 19.

Redmond and O'Brien Agree on Principles for Pledge-Bound Party.

DUBLIN, Dec. 23.-The series of conferences which have been held with a view to bringing about the reconcillaniember of parliament for Cork, and the parliamentary party, of which John E. Redmond is chairman, resulted today in an agreement on certain propoday in an agreement on certain propositions. In an official report of the meeting, which was given out, both Mr. Redmond and Mr. O'Brien say they see no reason why the Nationalists should not unite in a pledge-bound party on the following principles:

(1) No man or party has authority to circumscribe the inalienable right of Ireland to the largest measure of national self-government it may be in her power to attain.

her power to attain,

(2) Pending the attainment of an Irish parliament and a responsible Irish minister, with full control of all purely Irish affairs, which, in our belief, can alone be accepted in full satisfaction of the national demands, it is the duty of the Nationalists, while striving incessantly for home rule, to devote themselves earnestly to working for themselves earnestly to working for every measure of amelioration which it may be possible to obtain for her people from either of the English parties, and, as especially urgent matters, for a university settlement acceptable to the Catholics of Ireland, for the complete abolition of landlordism and for financial redress.

Mr. Redmond would not agree to the immediate calling of a national convention, saying that a convention would be held after the government bills had been introduced, probably about Easter.



United States Officers Who Presumed on Their Authority Have Charges Laid Against Them.

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 23.-There was an information laid this afternoon in the attorney-general's department against Geo. Foulke, an officer of the secret service department of the U.S. treasury, on the charge of kidnapping Isaac Casson and Albert Tolton, two citizens of Emerson. The alleged crime was committed on Dec. 3 at 9 p.m.

The two men were driving east along International-avenue, Emerson, which is very close to the boundary line between the United States and Canada. ### LIQUOR CASES FAILED COUNCIL'S LAST SESSION

# GO HUNGRY TO SCHOOL

A Pitiable State of Affairs Revealed in the Great City of

Hitherto the Children's Canteen Society has been able to cope with the task in a fairly satisfactory way by means of subscriptions from private sources, but the call on its funds is this year so great that it will be unhave established. able to supply many of the children.
In the first week of December, according to official statistics, from 245 out of the 285 primary schools, no fewer than 11,947 children attended school in the statistics of their official households. most cases without breakfast, and in all cases without the prospect of obtaining a midday meal at home. Of taining a midday meal at home. Of those 4498 receive a simple daily meal from the 14 canteens belonging to the above mentioned society, the other 7449 being totally unprovided for.

Strikes and Climatic Conditions Responsible for So Many Idle Men, Says Secretary Merrick.

James G. Merrick, secretary of The Employers' Association, issues the fol-

"The condition of the unemployed of the city has been the subject of cousiderable concern and of a great deal of exaggeration and of a great deal of exaggeration and mis-statement of facts as to the number legitimately out of employment and causes of the snort-age of work.

age of work.

"Several months ago the Trades & Labor Congress commissioned one of their number, named Trotter, to gather statistics with regard to the number of men out of employment, with the purpose of having him go to England to discourage the emigration to Canada of skilled mechanics. This movement was dictated from a selfish union labor standarding. A human of registration standpoint. A bureau of registration was opened in Toronto early in the fall, and great capital was attempted to be made out of the unemployed situation. At that time there were three strikes in operation, originally comprising about 1325 men—machinists, plumbers and electrical workers. This number has been greatly augmented by work-men induced to join the strikers' ranks. It is safe to say that there would be nearly 2000 men who had voluntarily abstained from work who can in no way be considered as legitimately unemployed. These strikes are still in operation, and the union pickets are still walking around outside the shops and have probably registered as unem-ployed. The number of men voluntar-ily out of work has been increased by the recent decrease in industrial opera-tions in these trades

tions in these trades.

Victims of the Season. "The closing of the building season has since that time thrown out of work a very large proportion of the building trades workmen, who cannot be considered as legitimately unemployed, as they are paid wages far in excess of those earned in factories, with the avowed purpose of compensating them for certain periods of idle time when they cannot follow their own trade. The same condition applies to those who are engaged in navigation and other out-door employments which depend for a continuance of employment on climatic conditions. In all of these trades and occupations there are usually employed under favorable conditions about 9000 hands, who are more or less affected by climatic conditions. The same condition applies also to agricultural and general field work, and to trades such as brickmakers, etc., who cannot follow their occupations in cold

weather "The city is usually an attraction for agricultural and other workmen who ficek to Toronto as soon as the labor in which they have been engaged during the summer and fall has ceased, and they are attracted in larger numbers by the fact that the city, as soon as the unemployed cry is raised, provides relief work at \$2 a day to all who may desire such

desire such employment.

Manufacturers Not to Blame. "The manufacturers, of course, have been made the subject of attack for a been made the subject of attack for a condition of affairs for—which they are in no way responsible. Until a couple of months ago there had been a continual shortage of all classes of skilled workmen to man the industrial establishments of this city, and of the country at large. The depression that has lately occurred as a result of the stringency in the United States could not have been foreseen. The consequent lack of employment owing to the conservatism of the buving public has created a condition of affairs and a curtailment in manufacturing which the public at large are in a sense responsible for, and with regard to which the manufacturers, and some of the unemployed, are equally the victims.




