St. Petersburg, March 17.—
No pause in the Japanese advance is possible for some time. The Russians are losing heavily in the rearguard action, and the Japanese columns are reported to be pushing northward as fast as possible to complete the envelopment of the Russian forces. Gen. Linevitch, however, will have a considerable accession of fresh troops in a day or two, the fourth European corps being now at Harbin and departing southward.

Military officials here declare there are now 268,000 men at Gen. Linevitch's disposal in Manchuria, and it is supposed this force will be sufficient to cause the Japan.

A cable from Barbados reports a further advance in the market for new molasses, the yield being estimated at a low figure. Turpentine is General collections are just fairly good. In the money market funds are abundant, with call loans quoted at 4½ to 4½ per cent.

Wholesale trade in Toronto this week has been moderately active. The orders for drygoods have been fairly numerous, and dealers report a larger trade than a year ago. Prices of staples continue to rule steady. General stocks of merchandise in warchouses are large, as the trade are expecting a heavy turnover the next month. In groceries there has been a moderate trade with little change in prices. Canned goods are firm, with stocks getting low. Hardware and metals are selling fairly well at firm prices. Leathers are firmer, with some improvement in business. Grain supplies are light, with corn, oats and buckwheat firmer, while wheat and rye are lower. A more liberal supply of butter is coming forward, with easier prices, and the egg market is lower. Dressed hogs are higher on small receipts, and products are firm. Money on call is unchanged at 4½ per cent. and prime commercial paper is discounted at 6 to 6½ per cent. In the district for this week four failures were reported—one a woolen mill firm in Algoma district, with rather heavy disbilities. It is Estimated That the Structures for the West Will Cost \$1,800,000.

fontreal, March 17.—(Special.) — The nadian Northern Railway are buildng five very extensive bridges of stee and masonry at the different crossings of the Saskatchewan River, in the two new provinces of Alberta and Saskat chewan. It is estimated that the total cost of these five fine structures be close on to \$1,500,000, and that they will rank with the best railway bridges ned to the heavy rolling load of the Dominion government specifica-tion of 1901, chap. 1, consisting of two lidated locomotives and tenders consolidated locomotives and tenders coupled together, and each weighing with full load of coal and water 311, 900 pounds, or 155 1-2 net tons, followed by a train load of 4500 pounds per lineal foot. They are of the Pratt truss type of single intersection, pin connected, with built riveted top chords and eye-bar lower chord, except the two end panel lengths, which are built of stiff members.

members.
On the main line, the first crossing is that of the South Saskatchewan River, 278 miles west of Grandview, or 485 miles from Winnipeg, about 15 miles above Saskatoon. The total length of the bridge work on this crossing is 1580 feet, consisting of 400 feet of timber trestle work on the east approach and 100 feet on the west, with six deck steel spans, 180 feet between pler centres, resting on concrete piers on pile foundations, surrounded by caissons, the distance from rail base to low water being 85 feet.

The next crossing in order going westerly is the first crossing of the North Saskatchewan River, 514 miles west of Winnipeg, near the point called the "elbow," on this river. The total length of this bridgework is 2540 feet, consisting of 60 feet of timber trestle work on the east approach and 1200 feet on the west. There are eight steel spans, of which two are "thru" and six deck spans, all at 160 feet between pier, centres, also resting on concrete piers similar in character to the first described, the distance from rall base to low the distance from rail base to low
