ST. DAVID.

DAVID whom the Welch own as their Tetulary Saint, was Bishop of the See bearing his name, for many years. He was the great ornament of the age in which he lived, and was famed for the force and energy of his eloquence ; but his example was more powerful than his eloquence. He founded many Monasteries ; and was the Spiritual Father of many Saints, both British and Irish. He lived to a very advanced age, and died about the year 544. WHO WOULD NOT BE A FARMER ?—In that glad season, when the earth is all around bursting into life and beauty, and nature is keeping holiday—when winter is over, and vegetation is waking again from its deathlike sleep—when the birds sing their matin song from every bush, and man himself wakes to new life amid the activity around, *who would not be a Farmer ?* For him, and almost for him alone, bloom the fair flowers in nature's field—for him the feathered songster pours her sweetest note, and for him the face of creation wears a constant smile. Not so with the inhabitants of cities, or with the professional man or the man of business, any where. These are shut out from the blessed influence of nature. Their business is with men—restless, ambitious,

ous, and often times dishonest men—they themselves are all engaged in the eager scramble for wealth and distinction, sometimes caring little whom they thrust down with their unhallowed tread, so they may mount upon the wreck, and they lose the salutary lesson of benevolence which may be learned from the ways of Providence in the outward world. They must maintain a constant struggle with temptation, or yield to its power. Accustomed to so much of *evil*, they are sometimes almost tempted to deny the existence of *good*. But the farmer pursues the “even tenor of his way,” undisturbed by the passions of men. His dealings are with nature, and he may, if he will not shut his heart against it, learn true wisdom from its teachings. In the springing grass, the opening flower, and the ripening harvest—in sunshine and in shower—he may see a token of God’s love and goodness, and in the quiet of his own home, he may almost forget the existence of *evil*. Thus widely different are the conditions of the two classes spoken of. Yet we sometimes find farmers discontented with their lot, and eager to join with their fellows in the feverish excitement of trade and speculation. And very often we see young men impatient to leave their paternal acres, and to seek, as they vainly think, some more honorable or genteel mode of earning a living. They had rather show a lily-white hand to a lady, as they measure off a yard of tape, than exhibit a manly, muscular frame, with a hand which does not shrink from contact with implements of husbandry. It has, indeed, become one of the greatest errors of our time, that young men are deserting the true nobility of the country, for the sake of wearing a more delicate complexion, or living, as they vainly hope, more at their ease. Hence it is that all trades and professions are overstocked, that we have more lawyers than clients, more doctors than patients and more parsons than parishes. We hear men complain of hard times, mechanics cannot find situations, yet the country is actually suffering, and very severely too, for a want of proper attention to farming, and why is it? Because many a man who should have followed the plough, has become too proud for that, and in his aspiration to be a gentleman has undertaken to wield a pen or administer cataplasms and boluses. To this state of things, too, is to be attributed to some extent, the present scarcity and high prices of provisions. The production has been allowed to fall below the consumption, and this great producing country, with its spare population, has presented the strange anomaly of importing bread-stuffs from the thick settled countries of Europe. It is all wrong. Young men should be taught to regard the employment of their fathers as one of the most honorable in the world.

Your farmer is the independent man. What cares he for hard times, or high prices? Banks may fail—merchants' notes may be protested, and their drafts dishonored, but "Seedtime and Harvest," that old and stable firm, shall never "fail"—drafts upon them are answered at sight, and the bank of nature, where the farmer makes his deposits, is "good as gold," and always

VENTILATION.—The dwellings of the wealthier classes are not exempt from the same visitations, arising from the same causes. Though there is a freer circulation of air, and a more equal temperature in their vast apartments, still in their parties and entertainments the want of ventilation is severely felt. There seems to be a dread of admitting any external air into a suite of rooms crowded with company; and when a sense of suffocation actually forces some panting guest to open a window, an outcry is raised as loud as if the baneful blast of the simoom from the African desert, were about to invade this sanctuary of British beauty and fashion. No heed is taken of the consequences of breathing heated air; no account is rendered of the death-chill likely to fall upon the young and lovely, when from the impure they plunge into the pure atmospheric fluid; no consequence is dreaded from the pale and haggard phantom that hovers over each scene of festive enjoyment, and hurls its ice-bolt of destruction at the fairest of our daughters: reckless do mothers expose those tender building flowers to the pestilential blast, until consumption has fixed its deadly pangs upon the fair bosom of her who yesterday shone as the brightest ornament of an admiring circle, and to day sinks into a premature grave.

We are ready to admit that a gust of cold, fresh air, however pure, suddenly let into a highly heated apartment, crowded with respiring guests, whose natural temperature has been raised, and the pores of whose skins are opened, by the exercise and excitement of dancing, would prove highly dangerous; but we do say that a constant streamlet of fresh air ought to flow through the apartment, and pervade all its recesses. The dread of a draught of air is one of those mistakes which cannot too soon be explained away and rectified. Every crowded room is dangerous if no such draught exist; but it ought, as we have just before observed, to be a flowing streamlet almost imperceptible to the sense, and to be judiciously increased or diminished according to the number of occupants in the apartment. But if the latter be heated to suffocation by an overflow of guests and by dancing, and a window is opened to relieve the oppression caused by the rarified and fetid atmosphere, that which rushes in is no longer a streamlet, but a torrent of fresh air which prevents the equilibrium of temperature from being established, falls like the death-charged dew of the West Indies upon the panting fair one, and the joys and festivities of wealth and fashion terminate in mortal disease.

The consequences which we have just stated are applicable equally to the hovel and to the palace; only in the former, festivity hath no share in producing the evil, and typhus fever vies with consumption in giving it the greatest possible extension.

The great object in ventilation is to have the apartment swept by a stream of pure air, which may be increased at will, so as to preserve unchanged any temperature that may be found comfortable, and to get rid of those unwholesome exhalations which, when they are taken into the lungs, disturb the functions of life, and ultimately produce disease and premature dissolution.

TO MAKE RED Currant JELLY, WITHOUT BOILING.—The superiority of red currant jelly, when made without heat, to that which is prepared in the old way, being known to few persons, we are induced to communicate to our readers our own experience of the method by which they can obtain it.

Pick from the stalks, and strain, either white or red currants, into a basin or pan (having first weighed the pan,) then weigh the juice. Take an equal

quantity of the finest loaf sugar ; either roll, or break it very small, add it to the juice, and with a silver, or a bone spoon (not iron,) stir the mass till the sugar be dissolved : it will not require more time than a quarter of an hour to effect this, nor need it be constantly stirred. Put the syrup into jelly glasses, or small jelly pots ; leave it uncovered till the next morning, when it will be found to be "set," and fit to be tied over. We have frequently laid papers on the top, merely to keep out the dust, and found the jelly remain above a year as good as when the jars were tied down with brandied paper in the usual manner,

The advantages of the plan are obvious,—economy of time and fire, and retaining the pure flavour of the fruit : all risk is obviated, from burning, over boiling, loss of colour, and waste of materials ; and though last, not least, an escape, during the process, from exposure to the fierce heat of a stove or fire, superadded to that of the dog days.

SCARLET GOLIAH RHUBARB, FOR PUDDINGS, TARTS AND JAM—Those who have partaken only of the old-fashioned rhubarb, (*Rheum Rhabonticum*) have but a faint, nay, almost an erroneous idea of the delicate flavour, and tender consistency of the *Scarlet Goliah*. We have known many persons, whom we could with difficulty persuade to taste our favourite esculent, in consequence of their utter dislike to the flavour of the coarse, hard, rank rhubarb to which they have been accustomed : but who, after having conquered their repugnance to encounter the *Scarlet Goliah*, have expressed themselves entirely pleased with it.

So much is this production a favourite, that even when fruits present themselves in succession, any other tart than rhubarb is seldom made, from April to September. Large and coarse and hard as the stalks appear, they are never peeled, but merely washed, and cut up ; and possess so unique a tenderness, that they are sufficiently cooked as soon as they boil : therefore they are more quickly ready to come out of the oven, than any other kind of raw fruit pie, as the paste only needs attention ; the fruit is certain to be thoroughly cooked. Jam is made in the usual manner.

TOOTH POWDER.—If they are already in a bad state, they must be scaled. Till this has been done, no powder or brushing in the world will give them a good appearance.

The receipte is as follows.—Finely powdered iris root and charcoal, of each half an ounce ; cuttlefish bone, two drachms ; powdered myrrh, one drachm. Mix, and triturate in a mortar to an impalpable powder—passing it, if necessary, through fine sieve. It may be flavoured, if desired, by adding a few drops of otto of roses, or of any other essential oil, to the mixed powders, before triturating them together.

In the above, the charcoal corrects any pruridity ; the cuttlefish bone being alkaline, acts on and removes any acid ; the myrrh strengthens, and acts as an astringement to the gums ; the iris root gives a violet flavour to the breath ; and the essential oil contributes to render the use of it grateful.

ALL plants, except those of very slow growth, which have stood in pots during the summer months, will by this time, have become partly root-bound, by filling the pot with their roots ; and unless they are looked after in time, will put on a sickly appearance, their leaves growing yellow, the young branches shooting weakly, and the flower-buds, if any, shrivelling and falling off without expanding. The remedy for all those evils is repotting in fresh earth, which ought to be done, if possible, before the middle of September, for room plants or those which cannot be protected during winter except in a cold frame or a greenhouse. Where artificial heat is at command, the season is less important. If the shifting be delayed, later, at least for most sorts of room-plants, they will not have time before the setting in of cold weather to establish their roots in the fresh earth.

In the management of shifting, it is for the most part proper to remove the plants from smaller to larger pots, with the balls of earth about the roots, either altogether or at least some of the old earth on the outside of the ball, trimming away only the fibers which are matted and dry, but taking care not to disturb the principal root near the centre. In this way a great portion of the excretions matter which the smaller radicles have thrown out into the exterior of the soil will be got rid of, which, if not removed at intervals, acts as a poison to the plant,—a recent discovery of great importance to be attended to in every species of plant cultivation.

Jupiter is a Morning Star till June, then an Evening Star till November, when it approaches too near the Sun for observation; Saturn, a Morning Star till June, then an Evening Star till October, he then approaches the Sun.

On the *Right Hand Page*—1st, the Days of the Month; 2d, the Days of the Week; 3d, the Situation of the Planets, Holidays, Sundays and Weather; 4th, Moon's Rising; 5th, the Moon's Southing; 6th, the Moon's Setting; 7th, the Moon's Place; 8th, High Water at Halifax.

N.B. All calculations are in Mean Time, except the Sun's Rising and Setting, which are given in Apparent Time.

Double the time of the Sun's Setting, and the Day's Length is found; and double the time of the Sun's Rising, and the length of the Night is obtained.

The following Signals, hoisted at the East or West YARD ARM, denote the quarter in which the respective vessels first appear:

One Ball close, for a square rigged vessel— one ball half hoisted, 2—two balls close, for 3—two balls separated, for 4—a pendant of any colour, for 5—a pendant under a ball, 6—a pendant over a ball half hoisted, 7—a pendant under two balls close, 8—a pendant between two balls separated, 9—a flag of any color, 10 or more square rigged vessels.

When the vessels approach so as to be clearly distinguished, their several Classes are indicated by the annexed Colours, hoisted at the MAST HEAD.

An Union, a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.—Union with a red pendant over it, a Two-Decker.—Union with a blue pendant over it, a Frigate.—Union with a white pendant over it, a Sloop of War.—Union with a white and red pendant over it, a Small Armed Vessel.—A Red Flag, centre a white square, a Packet.—Blue Pendant, a Merchant Ship.—Red Pendant, a Merchant Brig.—White Pendant, a topsail Schooner or Sloop.—Blue and White Flag, horizontally divided, a Neutral Fleet.—White and Blue Pendant, a Neutral Man-of-War.—Blue Flag, Neutral Merchant Ship.—Red, White, and Blue Flag, an Enemy's Fleet.—Red Flag, an Enemy's Merchantman.—Union Jack over Neutral or Enemy's Signals, vessel is detained, or a Prize.—White Pendant with two Blue Crosses, a Transport, or Troop Ship.—White Flag over any signal, Vessel bears a Flag of Truce.—Red and Blue Flag, crossed White, Boston Mail Boat.—White and Red Pendant, Bermuda Mail Boat.—White and Blue Pendant, Vessel has an English Mail.—Ball at the Mast Head, Vessel is on Shore in Distress. Guns are also fired when immediate assistance is required.


