CONVICT SHOT BY SOLDIERS.

Burlington, Vt., May 8.—While making a break for liberty from the guard line Patrick Ryne, a convict at Fort Ethan Allen, was shot and instantly killed tonight by Private Thomas J. O'Connell, of the Fifteenth Cavalry. Three other men, including convicts Hoots and Butler, and Private Strom, of B troop, Eleventh Cavalry, who was on duty as a sentry over the two convicts, made their escape, but were later recaptured and taken back to the fort. Ryne at the time of enlistment gave his place of residence as New York City. He was put in the guard house for being drunk and disorderly, and about two months ago endeavored to escape by jumping through a window. He was arrested as a deserter, and was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment. The shooting occurred at about five o'clock while a squad of convicts were at work on the target range, about a mile from the fort.

THE UNEMPLOYED IN CANADA AND CAUSES OF THE TROUBLE

By H. A. Kennedy of London, England, Who Visited Canada in December Last.

The conditions of the present winter, however, are quite abnormal. Let us see why.

On a recent visit to Canada I made it my business to look into the industrial situation in the chief industrial centres.

Here, however, a word of caution is necessary. It will probably surprise some readers to learn that building, agriculture, railway construction and what labor is not altogether suspended during the Canadian winter.

Another but minor cause of depression in the manufacturing industry is to be found in the agricultural mishaps of last year in the West.

It is perhaps well enough known, though we have to be occasionally reminded of elementary facts, that the course of nature there must be slack as well as busy seasons in many occupations.



Boston, Mass., May 8.—Announcement was made today by representatives of the Aero Club of America, that if the fund of \$25,000, which it is intended should be raised for the development of flying machines heavier than air, should be completed by July 1, it would be possible to arrange for international contests during the forthcoming season.

Bacon and Other Meats and Butter Higher Than They Should Be. (Toronto World.) Toronto housewives are convinced that there is something radically wrong in the prices of meats, and more particularly the prices of hog products.

Another peculiar phase of the Canadian bacon and ham market is that though Canadian packers have prided themselves for many years on the highest reputation in the British market, there are actually English exporters who are obtaining for them even higher prices than their own.

The very high prices of hog products are also in the attracting attention of the Toronto householder. With bacon at 20c a pound, the best cuts of beef at from 15c to 18c a pound and butter at 25c a pound, the cost of living in this city is as great as that in any other city in the North American continent, and they would like to know the why and wherefore of this invidious distinction.

YALE-HARVARD TRACK MEET

Captains and Managers Have Made Arrangements. Crimson May Lose Captain Dodge.

Boston, May 8.—Capt. Dry and manager Townsend of the Yale track team met Capt. Dodge and manager Emerson yesterday at lunch at Touraine and arranged the details of the Yale-Harvard track meet. The officials were selected, and the minor arrangements completed.

The Harvard track team is practicing hard for the meet with Dartmouth, which will be the first chance the team has had to meet opponents in an outside meet since it returned from vacation, and it will be its last opportunity before the meet with Yale.

On the whole, the men are doing as well as was to be hoped for. Capt. Dodge is in poor shape. His old tendon trouble has returned, and it would be no surprise were he unable to run Saturday. If his weakness in his leg continues, Harvard may lose several points in the Yale meet.

The Harvard track team has decided to change a part of its insignia. In the future, instead of the white jerseys with the crimson stripe that has denoted the Harvard track teams for years, the members will wear crimson jerseys with white letters. Many will regret the change, as the Harvard track uniform was considered the prettiest in the country. The change is defended on the grounds of comfort, the red jerseys being warmer, it is said.

HORSEMEN GET THE HOOK

Expelled From National Trotting Association for Ringing at Montreal.

New York, May 7.—W. S. Quenier, B. F. Hall, Wm. Hyland and Ross Rich, all of Watertown, N. Y., on Tuesday were expelled from the National Trotting Association after a hearing before the board of review of that organization. The horse Direct Wood, owned by these four men, and F. Hurley and N. Cray of Potsdam, N. Y., also were expelled. Charges against Hurley and Cray were dismissed.

The six men were brought up before the board charged with having raced Direct Wood, who has a mark of 2:07 1/2, under the name of Dick Pointer, supposed Greenbay gelding, in ice races at Montreal. Quenier admitted when examined that the horse had been falsely entered.

"You see," said Quenier, when testifying before the board, "we found that a whole lot of people were taking horses over to the ice races and entering them under other names, and in other classes, and we just thought we would get in on it."

Dr. E. N. Darling, of Putnam, Conn., said the mare Lady Nelson, also was expelled by the board. It was charged that Lady Nelson had been in races in Connecticut and Massachusetts under the name of Molly O, as a green horse. Charges against John E. Kingsley of Penfret, Conn., who drove the mare, were dismissed. Kingsley was also exonerated on a charge of driving a horse owned by Dr. H. Davenport of Potomac, which was falsely entered at Starbridge, Mass. Mr. Davenport withdrew the horse after the first race, notifying the association that he had learned he had been imposed upon. Both Davenport and the horse Billy Wilkes were suspended until the 26th of the race and a recording fee of \$50 for the change in the horse's name are paid.

AMERICAN FUNDS FOR OLYMPIC SHORT.

Up to date, he reports, only \$11,000 has been subscribed, which is far short of the \$50,000 which the American committee estimates will be necessary to send a strong team abroad. Of this amount the colleges, including Yale, Dartmouth, Penna., Chicago, and Michigan, have subscribed \$12,000, and various athletic clubs about \$3,200. Individual subscribers include Andrew Carnegie, S. B. Guggenheim and A. G. Spalding, who gave \$500 each.

FOOTBALL FOR OLYMPIC DOUTERFUL.

Ottawa, May 8.—"I think that as far as Canadians are concerned in the Olympic games, they will have to pin their faith to the rowing, tennis, lawn bowls, athletic and lacrosse teams," said a member of the Olympic committee Wednesday.

"The athletic, rowing, tennis, bowling and lacrosse contingents are the only ones that are certain to be sent across the water. The committee has yet to deal with the proposition to send football, Rugby and Association and boxing teams to England. Association football, as played by the Christian amateur teams in England is far superior to any played in Canada, and although there has been a great deal of wrangling as to which soccer team should be chosen, it would not be at all surprising if the committee were to decide not to send the kickers at all. As for Rugby, Canada has a better chance of being represented, but a definite decision has also to be reached on this point."

Tennis and lawn bowlers are also certain to go, and Captain Foulkes, of Ottawa, who is managing the tennis end of the work, has already received a number of entries from well known Canadian players.

CANADA SHOULD SEND GOOD TEAM OF MARATHON COMPETITORS.

Toronto, May 8.—How many Marathon runners will Canada send to England? Mr. Stark, president of the C. A. A. U., says at least three or four. Mr. Jas. E. Merrick, vice-president of the C. A. A. U., says: "Three anyway. The president, however, sized the situation to a nicety when he said: 'The Marathon I regard as our chance for fame at the Olympic. We have a golden chance to win a better chance in this than in any other event, and I would like to see every man eight or ten if necessary sent over so that we might make a tip-top showing. It would be glorious if Canada could run one, two, three in this big event. If the committee has the money I would favor a big Marathon team.'"

GOVERNMENT MUST DROP THE MANITOBA ELECTION OUBRAGE

Opposition Members Threaten to Refuse to Vote Money for Supply Until Government Gives Up Idea of Forcing Obnoxious Election Bill Through.

Ottawa, May 8.—A sensation has been caused by the disappearance of the ballots case in the recent by-election in Stanstead, Que. In the house today, R. L. Borden read a telegram from Sherbrooke to the effect that the clerk of the crown in chancery had been summoned to appear before the election court at Stanstead and had reported that the box, purporting to contain the ballots of the by-election in January, contained the ballots of the election of 1904.

The prime minister said the matter was brought to his attention a week ago and it was being looked into. He added that the late clerk of the crown in chancery was an honorable and painstaking official, to which Mr. Borden agreed.

Dr. Reid called attention to the report of the rammings of the ice breaker, *Montcalm*, at Quebec.

Mr. Brodeur said he had given instructions to the wreck commissioner to hold an investigation at once.

Mr. Brodeur read the letter of Deputy Minister Goddard asking for leave of absence. Writing March 21, Col. Goudreau said: I have worried every moment since the publication of the Civil Service Commission's report containing the accusations against the officials of the department of marine and fisheries, which I feel are both unjust and untrue. I am convinced that a full and complete investigation will establish this and will clear the public mind of all the insinuations and reflections that have been made against them. As my presence in the department as deputy had might in some quarters, be considered as prejudicial to the fullest inquiry, I beg to renew for the third time my application for six months' leave of absence, preparatory to superannuation. I court the most rigid examination of all the department's transactions, so far as I am concerned, and by placing myself in your hands I hope to assist you in that regard.

Mr. Fielding returned today from New York and he took the first opportunity to deny that his visit had anything to do with the question of the change of the route of the Transcontinental Railway. The report from New York was entirely without foundation. He went there on personal affairs and had no negotiations with any financiers with respect to the bonds of the Transcontinental Railway. He added that there had been no negotiations with regard to a change of the route and no negotiations of any kind as to the matters referred to in the report.

The debate on the Aylesworth bill was continued by Mr. Scrofford, (Portage la Prairie) who asserted that there was no proper system of registration in Manitoba and declared that in his own riding the lists were stuffed with 600 or 700 Conservatives.

F. D. Monk, who followed, said the bill at first seemed innocent enough, but on closer examination it was found to be the most nefarious, most mischievous and most wicked piece of legislation that had ever come to his notice. He thus characterized the measure because it was a clandestine departure from the principles adopted by parliament for the purpose of controlling the forthcoming election.

Mr. Monk had not lost faith in the prime minister who had given the closest attention to the discussion and who had no part in the framing of the bill. Proceeding he accepted the opinion expressed by Dr. Roche that the provision in respect to the unorganized portions of Quebec was put in for a blind, claiming that

GOVERNMENT WILL BE ASKED TO HELP

Harbor Improvements Committee Will Ask for Assistance in the Courtenay Bay Scheme.

The harbor improvements committee of the new council, with the committee from the board of trade, consisting of T. H. Estabrook and H. B. Schofield, held the first meeting in City Hall last evening.

E. T. P. Shewen, engineer of the public works department, and Hurd Peters were also present. The result of the meeting was regarded as satisfactory. Four motions in the form of recommendations to the common council were passed.

With regard to obtaining borings in Courtenay Bay, it was decided to ask for authority to open negotiations with a view to the local government bearing half the expenditure. Authority will also be sought to negotiate with the C. P. R. for a release of the 1,600 feet fronting on the

Beacon bar which the city made over to the company some years ago, the object in view being the future development of that section.

The council will also be asked to empower the committee to interview the Dominion government with a view to making a survey of the flats to the south of Sand Point, with the idea of extending the dredging. The location of any new wharves will not be decided until after consultation with the transportation companies but it is the intention to have as much information as possible.

A resolution was passed recommending that the Dominion government be asked to provide the funds to extend the break-water to Partridge Island. The dredging now being done by the W. S. Fielding is being done by the W. S. Fielding with the idea of this channel being closed.

BALLOTS FADED AWAY INTO AIR

Sensation in a Quebec Court Over Stanstead Election Case.

Sherbrooke, Que., May 8.—An extraordinary disclosure was made here today when the election petition against Mr. Lovell, M. P., for Stanstead, came up for hearing, nothing less than that all the ballots in connection with the election had disappeared from the office of the clerk of the crown in chancery at Ottawa.

The election was caused by the death of the late member, and was held in January of the present year. Immediately afterwards it was contested on the ground of corruption, and the conservative lawyer, T. Chase Casgrain, served notice on the clerk of the crown in chancery for the production of all the election papers.

When the case opened this morning, Mr. Foley, the clerk of the crown in chancery, was called, and said he wished to make a statement. He said that the late holder of that office had died on April 8 last, and he had been appointed on April 28, and had received the de-

mand for the papers in the Stanstead election, but on looking for the papers he was unable to find them. He found the envelope, which had contained these papers, endorsed in Mr. Lamouche's writing. In this envelope were the papers of the previous Stanstead elections, but the only thing left concerning the election, now being contested, was a rubber stamp, and further search proved equally fruitless.

This remarkable statement caused a sensation, and will undoubtedly lead to a thorough investigation.

STAMPS AND PAPERS WERE VERY COSTLY

Each Member of Old House Must Have Written 86 Letters a Day to Dispose of All the Stamps Given Him.

Fredericton, May 9.—The expenditure of the old government under the heading of contingencies will further enlighten the reader as to the haphazard and indifferent way in which the people's money has been handled. In what is called the legislative Assembly contingencies are items running up to \$2,000 payments made to Dr. James Hannay, for reporting the proceedings of the house last session. This is for eight and a half weeks work at the rate of \$300 a week and \$100 thrown away. But Dr. Hannay was the presiding genius of the late government's press bureau, and was otherwise useful to members of the government; and the \$300 a week with the \$100 thrown in was not all. The contingencies account also paid his stenographer for the session, provided stationery sufficient to keep him going for six months at least, and made him an allowance in dollars for postage for a year. For the reading of the proofs of the laws passed last session, preparation of the index and the chapter headings, payments were made aggregating \$749.80, or more than two-thirds the whole cost of the printing, including the paper. The stationery used by the officials during the session is set out as costing \$467.27, which at ten cent a pound would be nearly two and a half tons of foolscap, letter and note paper and envelopes for an eight and a half weeks session. In addition to this there is a charge "stationery during session," which must mean members' stationery; another \$400, or nearly another two and a half tons, incredible as it may appear. But this is not all; there was a further sum of \$900 paid out for what is called "interim stationery" and telegrams, which may mean that the members who supported the old government could divide \$300 among themselves, charging up to telegraphing and sending up three tons of paper and envelopes and take it home with them. The \$400 charge for postage for members during the session would buy 23,000 two cent stamps, or 800 for each member, to use which he would need in the eight and a half weeks of the session, at the rate of the equivalent of 86 letters a day. Including \$45 for ice for the session, and \$9.75 for the water filter, the other items added to charges above mentioned run the legislative assembly contingencies of last year up to \$7,991.22. It is to be expected that some supervision must be exercised under the new regime in controlling even the contingencies of the assembly.

STOLE MONEY AND WATCH

A Guest at Ottawa Hotel the Victim of a Sneak Thief.

A sneak thief entered the room of C. A. Phillips, of Bristol station, in the Ottawa Hotel, last Wednesday evening and stole his gold watch valued at \$100. On May 1st Mr. Phillips came to St. John accompanied by his daughter and put up at the Ottawa. Mr. Phillips had been ill and came here to consult a physician. He spent most of the time in his room, but on Wednesday night had occasion to go to the stairs for a short time. He left his watch on the table and his door unlocked. On his return the watch and \$100 in cash were missing. A thorough search failed to reveal its whereabouts.

The matter was placed in the hands of the police and the thief evidently frightened at this action returned the watch without revealing his identity.
