of cold water. Never let meat stand in water, cold or otherwise, as the

in water, cold or otherwise, as the water draws out the juices and much nourishment is lost. A roast should always be put into a hot oven to quickly cook the surface and prevent the escape of juices. At the end of 18 minutes the meat should be seared all over. Then reduce the heat and allow 15 minutes for each pound if wanted "rare" and 20 to 25 if wanted "well done." A roast of beef can be cooked de-liciously in a common, ordinary

Through the operation of the gasoline tax the officials of the revenue branch have been supplied with reports on the gasoline sale for the months of April May and June, which show that the guantity of gasoline used by motor cars can be estimated for the whole year at about 17,500,000 gallons. Only ten per cent, of that large quantity is supplied for the operation of trucks used on other cases for which exemption has been provided by the law.
