Dr. T. E. Kaiser told of the fight the town had waged for twenty years to procure a federal grant for a harbor. The sum of \$50,000 had been placed in the estimates several times, but afterwards withdrawn, partly due to the war and changes of government. On his suggesting that a deputation be sent to Ottawa to interview Premier King, his proposal was adopted. It was pointed out that Oshawa approximately \$7,000,000 in customs and excise returns.

After discussion the board went on record in favor of the annexation of Cedarvale.

George McLaughlin of the General Motors Company, while approving the auditor's report, said that while there were probably irregularities, fundamentally the financial affairs of the town were sound.

WOULD END 12-HOUR DAY

Rockefeller Urges Abolition of Seven-Day Week, Too, in All Industries.

New York, Nov. 2.—Abolition of the twelve-hour day and seven-day week in industry as "unnecessary, uneconomic, and unjustifiable" is recommended by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in an article in the November number of the Survey made public today. Mr. Rockefeller's views are given in connection with another article in the same magazine in which working conditions in the Wyoming oil fields are severely criticized by R. S. Lynd.

"To the charge that the twelve-hour day and seven-day week are in effect among Standard Oil workers in the Elk Basin fields of Wyoming Mr. Rockefeller makes no denial. He intimates, however, that "as a private citizen and individual stockholder" he has not always been able to bring about reforms in working conditions which he considers desirable.

"I believe," writes Mr. Rockefeller, "that generally speaking the twelve-hour day and the seven-day week should no longer be tolerated in industry, either from the point of view of public policy or of industrial efficiency. I believe that both have been proved to be unnecessary, uneconomic, and unjustifiable.

"Even in those industries where the continuous process is an inevitable feature the routine should be so adjusted that the employees can have at least one day's rest in seven, and can obtain that share of leisure for self-development which accompanies the work day of approximately eight hours.

"While the adoption of these standards may and doubtless will at first increase cost of production, I am confident that in the long run greater efficiency and economy will result, and that from the outset public opinion will support any industry which installs them. The same sentiment will eventually bring into line the less scrupulous and less enlightened elements in every competitive industry."

Recent living conditions in the oil fields are more difficult to provide than in the coal mines, Mr. Rockefeller points out, because the wells are "not only temporary but speculative in their output." Nevertheless, there is much room for improvement in the condition of the workers, he says.
"As a private citizen and individual stockholder," writes Mr. Rockefeller, "I have never hesitated to state my position on these points with all the clearness at my command. I have not willingly lost an opportunity so far as my private stockholder may do so to reinforce my position on the general policy with action that would be more concrete and adequate."
Mr. Rockefeller concludes with a declaration that he has never had cause to regret the reforms designed to benefit the workers. He warns "the less generous directors of industry" that unless they voluntarily take a more liberal attitude towards the needs of the workers public opinion will compel them to do so.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

As a result of a quarrel between two Calais school boys, Gerald Ryan, aged sixteen, and Raymond Card, aged thirteen, Ryan is in the Calais hospital lying between life and death. During a dispute the two and one half inch blade of a knife was driven into his neck severing the internal jugular vein. Card is at liberty under \$4,000 bonds pending the outcome of Ryan's injuries.

The jury disagreed yesterday in Sydney in the case of Norman McIntosh, charged with attempting to murder Isaac Weir by shooting him on August 15 last. The judge refused to discharge the prisoner and remanded him to jail to await his trial in February.

Holand Finlay was arrested yesterday in Halifax by Chief of Detectives Horace Kennedy in connection with the shooting on Tuesday night of Leslie Corkum in his store in Spring Garden road. This action was taken as part of a dragnet policy inaugurated by the police to deal with this particular crime. Finlay was carrying a fully loaded revolver when arrested. Another suspect arrested yesterday was released.

Several friends of Rev. J. C. B. Appel, wife and family, were at the station last evening to say farewell to Rev. Mr. Appel, who left on the Boston train on his way to California. He recently resigned as pastor of the Douglas Avenue Christian church, after being here for twenty-six years.

H. T. GAGNIER IS DEAD IN TORONTO

Owner of Saturday Night Passes Away in Hospital—Sketch of His Career.

(Toronto Globe)

H. T. Gagnier, president and manager of H. Gagnier, Ltd., and publisher of Saturday Night, died on Sunday afternoon in Wellstar Hospital. Mr. Gagnier had been ill for some nine months.

Mr. Gagnier's wife and his daughter, Mrs. Brewster, with her two children, are in California and immediately were notified.

Mr. Gagnier, who was of French Huguenot stock, was born in Toronto about 40 years ago. His grandparents had lived in Louisiana, and his father, Edward Gagnier, was actively engaged in the tobacco business.

In his early days Mr. Gagnier was himself interested in the tobacco industry, and it was that fact, indirectly, which was the foundation for his success in the sphere in which he made his name and fortune, for a little paper called The Cigar and Tobacco Journal was his first venture in the publishing business. He was considered in those days an expert on all phases of the tobacco market, was secretary of the Cigar and Tobacco Association, and had a good deal to do with the legis-

lation which was passed at that time. He was a frequent visitor to Ottawa in connection with the troubles of the tobacco men, and a very notable incident in his life was his settlement of a strike in Montreal. The manufacturers could not agree among themselves and it was a high tribute to their faith in the judgment and fairness of Mr. Gagnier that, although suspicious of one another, they placed themselves unreservedly in his hands and in the course of a month he had straightened out the entire situation and settled the dispute. It was considered a remarkable piece of work for a young man.

It was 20 years ago that Mr. Gagnier laid the foundation of his remarkable career in the publishing world by the inauguration of The Cigar and Tobacco Journal. It was a success from the start, and shortly afterward he started The Wine and Spirit Journal, which continued to thrive until Prohibition rendered its further publication useless.

Early in 1908 Mr. Gagnier purchased Saturday Night from E. E. Sheppard. This was the actual beginning of his success as a publisher. Although Saturday Night at the time it changed hands had a considerable clientele in the city its influence was small compared with that which it exercised from the time Mr. Gagnier took over control. He at once enlarged the publication and introduced new features, securing for the purpose the best of literary talent available.

Other publications which he subsequently either bought or founded were: The Trader, The Motor Magazine (purchased from W. J. Taylor of Woodstock), The Clothier and Haberdasher, The Canadian Motor Cycle (now defunct), The Dental Journal, Construction, The Architectural Journal, The Motor Trade, Women's Wear, and The Canadian Optometrist. The Canadian Farmer was another recent acquisition by Mr. Gagnier.

He founded the Consolidated Advertising Agency, and a job printing business which he established about five years ago in a small way has rapidly grown into a concern of considerable magnitude.

Mr. Gagnier's business was originally conducted in the old Saturday Night Building on Adelaide street, but in 1912 he erected the present Graphic Arts Building on Richmond street, where all branches of the business are conducted. In 1920 he acquired a large building at the rear to meet the growing demands of the firm.

Of a retiring disposition, Mr. Gagnier, though in the publishing business, disliked any publicity in regard to himself. Although he had a large number of warm friends in private life, he never put himself forward in any way, and avoided meetings of a public character. He was greatly beloved by his employees. He was generous in his private benevolence and was a director of and took a warm interest in the Queen Mary Hospital for Consumptive Children, Weston.

He was a keen motorist, was the owner and drove one of the first cars ever seen on the streets of Toronto, and was a director of the Ontario

FATHER VAUGHAN RETURNED TO HIS 'NURSERY' TO DIE

Wanted to Finish Where He Began, at Jesuit College, Rochampton

Died Very Quickly — Said He Had Not Been Sleeping Very Well, Went to Room and Lost Consciousness.

(Special Cable to the New York Times and Montreal Gazette) London, Oct. 31.—Father Bernard Vaughan died this morning at the Jesuit College, Rochampton. His last words were: "I am not very well, but I am in His hands as I have always been."
Father Vaughan had been suffering for some time from diabetes and heart trouble. He had a slight stroke while visiting Lord Fitzalan at Berwent Hall, and was so ill that he received the last Sacrament. Rallying for a time he was taken to Rochampton, the scene of his first pastorate.
"I want to finish where I began," he said. "I have come back to the nursery."
He was lodged near the chapel whence it was easy to wheel him into the garden. The young Jesuit novices paid the great preacher every attention, but he refused to see any of his many old friends from the society who called.
"It is better now," he explained, "that I should be only with my own friends in the priest's home."
Insomnia had been one of his chief troubles, as he refused to take drugs for it.
Early today Father Vaughan told the college chaplain that he had not been sleeping very well. At 6:15 a. m. he partook of Holy Communion, then he went back to his room. Almost immediately he became unconscious and passed away. He will be buried in the

When Father Vaughan, who was known as the friend of King Edward and the "source of society," sailed for the straitest in 1910 it was announced by cablegram that his mission was "to help Americans find God." On the voyage across the Atlantic he became the storm centre of a suffrage meeting, at which he was accused of asserting that Protestantism was "women marching to the polls when they ought to be at home minding their babies."
As soon as he landed in New York city he caused a stir in church circles by asserting that Protestantism in America was dying and that Catholicism was the only hope of the American Republic. The Presbyterians' Ministers' Association lost no time in taking cognizance of his utterances and adopted resolutions which they said the "reverend Vaughan's pronouncements need no refutation."
"When I spoke of Protestantism," he said, "I was speaking of Protestantism as a spiritual power, as a power capable of building up a spiritually minded people. It is not a matter of erecting a temple to the human soul."
"But the ministers say to me, 'have you seen our great and glorious republic? Have you seen our sky-scrapers? Our railroads? Our bridges? Our tubes? Our halls of commerce? Of course, I have.' I was down Wall Street in the morning, and I put my money on the right horse, too. I reply, 'What proof is there in all these material things that Protestantism is a living, spiritual power? Why the deader it is as a spiritual power, the more likely are all these material things to be accomplished.'"
The views entertained by Father Vaughan were as striking as his speech was bold. He held that it was bad enough for a "woman to go wrong," but that it was "worse for a man to go wrong." "A careless home and a careless church," he declared, "are the two greatest evils of the day. He who is strong in his denunciation of 'woman's craze for undress,' and he made war relentlessly upon socialism and "race suicide" in England.
His work among the poor was continued in Westminster and the East End of London, whither he went in 1901 to take charge of the Jesuit Church in Farm street. He became the companion and friend of the children of the streets, and for their benefit he organized clubs, concerts, lectures and other entertainments. But he lost no opportunity to attack the evils of the time.

KNOW SENDER OF POISONED CAKE

Authorities of Pennsylvania Think Jealousy Inspired Deed That Killed Sterrett.

Philadelphia, Nov. 2.—The authorities believe they know who sent the poisoned cake that caused the death of Walter W. Sterrett of Devon and the serious illness of his wife.
That statement was made by an official closely connected with the investigation of the mystery. The identity of the suspect was not revealed, but it is believed, was the motive for sending the poisoned cake—"devil's food"—which Mrs. Sterrett received in a small box, tied with a red ribbon and bearing a typewritten label, at the Devon post office last Thursday afternoon.
After a conference with Mrs. Sterrett at her bedside in the Bryn Mawr Hospital, A. M. Simpson, postal inspector, said that of the several theories advanced regarding a motive for the poisoning, jealousy stood out most prominently.
With Inspector Simpson at the questioning of Mrs. Sterrett were Major W. Butler Windle, district attorney of Chester county, State Police men and Chester County Detective Mullin.
The attitude of the investigators after leaving the hospital suggested that Mrs. Sterrett had informed them of the identity of a person who she believed sent the cake, which was mailed at 11:20 a. m. Thursday, special delivery, from "Mrs. Squire Slaton, in the city."
A thorough search of the Sterrett home at Devon was made by the authorities. Harold W. McCowan, assistant district attorney of Chester county, said a great mass of correspondence was found which could not be thoroughly examined in less than two weeks. He said that apparently Mrs. Sterrett had kept every letter she had ever received.
No typewriter was found in the house, and the detectives noted this fact in connection with the typewritten label on the package addressed to Mrs. Sterrett.


GIANTIC OYSTER SHELLS

Some Declared to be 400,000 Years Old Found in Texas.

Giant fossil oyster shells, said by scientists to be more than 400,000 years old, and some of them measuring more than three feet in length, have been discovered in a clay bank in Starr County, Texas, near a petrified forest. The fossils were found in a clay and shell bank about 1,000 feet above sea level. Some of the specimens have been sent to the Smithsonian Institution and others to the Public Health Service. Scientists declare that huge reptiles swam in the waters which covered the lower Rio Grande Valley in the paleozoic age, and that the large oysters lodged in the gravel banks along the seashore in what is now Starr and Zapata counties.
Near the fossil bank are hundreds of petrified trees, some of them four feet in diameter. In this forest is a variety of oak now extinct in this part of the country.

CHANGES IN THE AIR FORCE STAFF




FIRST CLINIC AT HEALTH CENTRE

FIGHTS THIEF WITH STILETTO

Crowd Watches New York Police Veteran in Duel

Uses Nightstick Against Man Armed with Knife Sharpened to Razor-like Keeness, and Clubs Man Into Submission.

New York, Nov. 2.—With a crowd of more than 1,000 persons milling excitedly about him, Patrolman Frank Hagen of Clinton street station, a veteran of eighteen years' service on the force, fought a duel with his nightstick against a robber armed with a stiletto sharpened to a razorlike keeness, and clubbed him into submission, at Essex and Rivington streets.

Hagen, the crowd indignant at another attempted hold-up, closed in and tried to take him away. The policeman clung to his man, but could not save him from numerous buffetings from the list of men who darted at him, swung and leaped back into the crowd. Detective Josse Joseph of the Clinton street station, arrived while the crowd was serging about patrolman and captive, and just when it looked like Hagen might lose his man to mob vengeance, Joseph drew his pistol and went to the policeman's aid. The crowd fell back then and detective and patrolman dragged the man away.

The duel was the climax to a daring attempt made by three men to hold up the jewelry store of Sidney Glassman at 136 Essex street. Near closing time three men, wearing masks, with their caps drawn down over their faces, entered Glassman's store, which is on the second floor. The three were armed with revolvers, one of them also carrying a long stiletto, sharpened on both edges. Glassman was in the front room near an open safe containing \$15,000 worth of unset diamonds.

The robbers pointed their revolvers at Glassman and commanded him to "throw up your hands and don't make a noise." Evidently the robbers had expected Glassman to be alone in the shop. They did not know that six dealers, to whom the proprietor had been showing diamonds, were in the rear showroom waiting for him to return. They ran to the front office where they were met by the command to throw up their hands.

A movement by one of the dealers moved, caused one of the robbers to so, another dealer grasped the revolver and pushed the man against another robber, thus preventing either from shooting. Five dealers and Glassman then set upon the two robbers, while the sixth dealer, Jacob Kalin, groppled with the third man who held the stiletto.

Across the hall from Glassman's jewelry office is the office of Moe Kuska, an attorney, who knows Kalin, and on hearing his cry for help, telephoned the police headquarters. The nearest patrolman were sent to the scene and Captain James J. Mackenzie, commanding the Clinton street station, and Lieut. Cornelius Willemse, in charge of the detective district, with Detectives Joseph, Burns, and Brennan were there in an automobile.

Patrolman Hagen answered the call at his signal box. "He reached Essex street in time to see the three robbers running away, pursued by a crowd of men, women, and boys. The fight put up by the diamond dealers and the shouting and noise of the battle had frightened the robbers who fled from the building. The fugitives fired two shots at their pursuers, and a man who attempted to stop the robber with a stiletto narrowly missed being struck. The man leaped to one side and as the robber dashed past him he thrust out his foot and tripped the robber. Hagen reached the scene as the robber got up, and, dodging a thrust with the stiletto, the policeman used his nightstick on the man, tearing to shoot for fear of a bullet striking some one in the crowd. For several seconds the two faced warily, the policeman's club crashing again and again against the stiletto as the robber swung and lunged at Hagen. Finally Hagen's club crashed down on the robber's head. As the man fell Hagen dropped on top of him and the two struggled on the sidewalk. With fists and night-stick Hagen beat the robber into submission just as the automobile with the detectives arrived. The other two robbers escaped.
