BOOTS, PENNY A PAIR.

BOOTS, PENNY A PAIR. (London Mail.) More than 500,000 pairs of army boots were offered for sale by the disposal board at the White City yesterday. They included army boots in every stage of wear—Canadian, Australian, German, and Russian boots, thigh boots, gym-nasium shoes, and hospital slippers. Five shillings, given for a pair of col-onial boots, was a quite high price. Grade 5 boots—the lowest grade—were sold in lots of 100 at 1d. per pair, and Grade 4 boots fetched 4d. a pair for a lot of 20, 000. German boots made 6d. for Grade 4 and 2d. for Grade 5. For three pairs of German half-wellington boots with wooden soles 1s. was paid. Even Grade 4 boots, it is said, can be made into serviceable footwear. Come to citizens' mass meeting. In-

where the air is not so dry as to make them shrivel. It pays, when digging the dahlia and gladioli, to label them with their names, so that they can be planted out again without producing an incongruous mix-ture of shades and varities. It is par-ticularly important to keep the Primu-linus hybirds from gladioli of the more common varities. These Primulinus gladioli are growing rapidly in favor. They come earlier than the others and are more delicate in flower, as well as lighter in their general habit. Moreover, a single bulb will produce two or more flowering stems. This is a variety which reached United States by way of Eng-land, into which country they were in-troduced from Africa. Except in the coldest sections of the country, the little montbretias, which re-semble miniature gladioli, although flow-ering much more profusely, are hardy enough to go through the winter with a little protection. THE PROHIBITION BILLS

Senate Adopts Them on Division -Cross Benches May Demand Salary For Leader in The Next Parliament

(Special to Times.) Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 11-The last day of school always allows a little extra

of school always allows a little extra license to the pupils, and it is so on the last day of parliament. When the House assembled, yesterday, it had really nothing to do but wait the delib-eration of the Senate, which was con-sidering the prohibition bills passed on to it for judgment. Mr. Campbell of Le Pas, who has been trying to gather some information about the white ele-phant which runs through his constitu-ency, the Hudson Bay Railroad, made one more last desperate attempt but got nothing but a round-about intimation that there would not likely be anything doing at present. Supplies for nearly \$63,000,000 were passed. The leader of the Opposition inquired solicitiously about the health of the leader of the government. Soon after the House ad-journed until 4.30 in the afternoon to await the return of its bills from the Senate.

Meanwhile the Senate was dealing with the matter of prohibition once again, and examining the bills to see what the "joker" was this time. When-ever a bill dealing with the liquor ques-tion goes from the House to the Senate it is received with a cynical smile, the upper chamber fully believing that it is being made the receiving end of "the buck." There was a disposition on the part of some of the senators to amend the bill so that it would be sent back; and if this had been done, it would probably have again died for the ses-sion. RAIDS ON HIGH SPOTS IN BERLIN



Notorious Night-Life Cafes and Cabarets Visited and Hundreds of Arrests Made

Berlin, Oct. 2-(By The Associated Press)-Fifty-one of the more notorious of Berlin's night-life cafes and cabarets, where all closing regulations were ignor ed, electric lights were burned until morning and scenes of drunkenness were enacted, were raided last night by the

enacted, were raided last night by the new safety police and squads of the old force. Numerous arrests were made, the proprietors of sixty other cafes were notified that their turn was coming. There were so many that all could not be raided in one evening. The bands were playing, and all was joyous, when one lone police officer in plain clothes entered each of the fifty-one resorts. At first he was greeted with laughter, but when the exits were closed most of the patrons and many of the managers dived for the cellars, where they were easily rounded up. As fast as they could be herded together they were placed on motor trucks guarded by pol-ice and soldiers and taken to the police stations.

stations. The scenes were exciting, as women became hysterical and men offered huge sums of money for their release. With the raids the authorities have, incidentally, accomplished a lessening of the illicit trade in food, for the cabarets and cafes, and gambling clubs, were the prime offenders, and boldly offered either free meals or meals at ridiculously low prices to prospective customers.
