BAKED MACARONI. Break one half pound of macaroni into pieces. Pour over it, boiling water, and add a little sait. Boil hard for 20 minutes; drain and put in a pudding dish and pour over a mixture made as follows: Two ta-blespoonfuls flour, two teasponfuls of dry mustard, one half pound of grated cheese, and one pint of new milk. In making the inevitable comparison tween Dickens and Thackeray, the s er said that the difference in their sophy was that the former was an ist and the latter more of a realist. had three things in common. They dealt with London, Dickens picturin and both were stronger in their character-ization than as makers of plots. While Dickens was a moral reformer and worked as such, he never became so preoccupied with his message as to greatly injure his work as an artist.

Doctor O'Hagan agreed with those who though that Dickens was greater in his humor than in his pathos, but he opposed the opinion of those critics who described his pathos as maudlin. Andrew Lang had said that no child ever existed like Paul Dombey, but Doctor O'Hagan contended that the quality of Dickens' pathos in deal-ing with this child was indicated by the number of times that readers had paid it the tribute of tears. Above all, Dickens was supreme in his purity, and was not turning all the time to sex problems like many modern writers. That was one rea-son /why he should be especially beloved by/Canadians, who showed a healthy lack of interest in the microbes of affinities. "I say that," declared the speaker, "be-cause after extensive traveling, I believe that the sweetest and most whol@ome home life in the whole world is found in this country."
