To Owners and Masters of **British Ships**

The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75.-(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the

proper national colors-(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships, including any vessel under the command of an officer of H:

Majesty's navy or full pay, and (b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and (c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of

leaving any British Port. (2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to

a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist he colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and rups away, it is liable to be fired upon. H. W. LeMESSURIER,
