

SPAIN RENT TO-DAY BETWEEN THE TWAIN

City of Barcelona in State of Complete Anarchy-Machine Guns Used.

Madrid, July 29 .- Spain to-night is rent hy two fears, the fate of the army in Morocco and the situation in the Mediterranean provinces of Catalonia. At the outskirts of Melilla the Spanish arms have suffered a serious check. Three thousand soldiers have either been slain or wounded, and the Moorish hordes are fighting at the very walls of the city itself.

News from Barcelona, the centre of the revolutionary outbreak, is exceedingly meagre and unsatisfactory. From Listor comes the report that the revolutionists are using bombs and that 100 person were killed and 200 wounded during the earlier stages of the conflict.

Premier Maura's announcement that the situation in Barcelona showed a little improvement, and word from Melilla that the Moors were retreating from Mount Curuga, only slightly appeased the general disquiet. The Moorish forces, however, have been strengthened by the arrival of 5,000 additional tribesmen, and the n, and the official judgment that 75,000 Spanish troops are needed to overcome the tribesmen would indicate that the Melilla army of Spain is in sore straits.



WHILE A HAVEN NO PORT OF CALL

IMPORTANT DECISION IN A DIVORCE SUIT

Mr. Justice Clement on Necessity of Enforcing Permanent Residence.

Vancouver, Aug. 2. - "This province may be a haven of refuge; it should not be a port of call," states Mr. Justice Clement, in the course of a long judgment dismissing the petition in the divorce suit of Adams vs. Adams, on the ground that he was not properly domiciled in the province. His lordship strikes a warning that people may come specially to reside in this province because British Columbia alone of the provinces west of New Brunswick was competent to grant divorce and in that event there should be the clearest evidence that the provision requiring permanent residence in the province was complied with. The petitioner is a clerk in the city, who lived here since last autumn. He had resided with his wife in Alberta, and parted from her there after eight years residence in that province. He had, however, previously resided in British Columbia, coming here from the east. The judge refers to the point that the would not swear that it was his fixed intention, to remain in the

After referring to judgments in the English courts, his lordship says: "I don't lose sight of the argument, which may be very properly advanced, that as between the various provinces of Canada (if we accept Quebec), the marked likeness in our laws, the court may well be more ready to draw the inference of intent to settle in one province upon removal from another than in the removal from Scotland to England, with their different laws and legal system. But on the other hand the court cannot shut its eyes to the fact that in this province alone of all the provinces west of New Brunswick can wronged spouse find a court comp tent to dissolve marriage and the incentive to come to the province strong. I don't wish, however, to be understood as holding that because man's motive in coming to this pro ince may be to procure the dissolution of an intelerable marriage tie that the court must necessarily find a want of fixed intention to make this his permaent home, his community. Babbage has been employed gatherng mail from the city boxes and at other times acted as sorter in the office. On Saturday evening he was so engaged when E. F. Sheppard, a fellow employee, was attracted to the movements of Babbage, which were out of the usual. Mr. Sheppard's suspicions were aroused, and he gave more than passing attention to what was transpiring. He believed Babbage was handling letters which he had no business to be touching at that time. So close a scrutiny did he keep on his 45.00 man that before the latter was ready to leave he was able to charge Babbage with theft and seized him. Calling on J. H. Lowry the accused employee was securely held by Mr. Lowry while Mr. Sheppard rang up by tele-
