

DEATH MAY END PRINCE'S TRIAL

at Death's Door.

Man Against—Postponement of Hearing.

BERLIN, July 21.—Prince Zu Eulenburg, whose trial was adjourned sine die on Friday on account of his ill health, is believed to be dying in the Charity Hospital, where he has been under police surveillance since his arrest in May last for perjury at the trial of Maximilian Harden.

The Prince has been suffering from multiple neuritis and anaemia for several months. For several days past his condition has been such that the sessions of the court have been held in the consultation room of the hospital, the examination of the Prince being conducted at his hedside.

A moving scene followed the announcement of the quashing of the proceedings. The Prince was very angry and passionately and tearfully reaffirmed his innocence. He made a passionate appeal to his nurses and physicians, asking that the trial be pushed at once to a finish in spite of his condition. His plea, however, was without effect.

LONDON, July 22.—Coincident with the dawning triumph of aerial navigation comes the unearthing of a grand adventure of the world's first great navigator and explorer. 
