Kingston, Jamaica, Feb. 3.—Among the witnesses examined by the royal commission on trade rolations be-tween Canada and the West Indies, were Mr. Cork, colonial secretary, and Mr. Miles, collector general, on be-half of the government, and Messrs. Farquharson and Gamble on behalf of the Merchants' Exchange. All the witnesses urged that Jamaica was un-able to give a preference to Canadian goods. The United States were the islands' best customer, taking three fourths of the total banana output, amounting to 16,000,000 bunches an-nually, admitting duty free, whereas Canada tool scarcely one half million by the States in the form of import duties on Jamaica banama, which would ruin the colony's most import-ant industy.
