SUFFRAGETTES IN WILD SUNDAY RIOT

Attempt to Storm Mr. Asquith's House

Sylvia Pankhurst Led the Howling Mob to Downing St.

Police Rallied in Force and After a Lively Battle Captured the Irrepressible Militant and Twenty of her Followers—Many Injured in the Scrimmage.

London, July 28.—Sylvia Pankhurst, the militant suffragette who was out on license under the "Cat and Mouse law," was the leader of a suffragette demonstration yesterday, which culminated in a previous Sunday affair of the sort.

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CHINESE REFORMER APPEALS TO POWERS

Withhold Funds, He Implores

Declares that the Recent Five-Power Loan Has Enabled Yuan Shi Kai to Take the Field in an Endeavor to Crush Rebellion Against His Infamous Government— Shanghai in a Panic.

(Canadian Press). New York, July 28.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the first provisional president of the Chinese republic, who led the revolution against Manchu rule, today cabled the following proclamation to the Associated Press:

"Shanghai, July 28.—When three months ago Yuan Shi Kai unconstitutionally concluded the loan with the bankers representing the five powers almost immediately after the discovery of documents implicating the Chinese government in the assassination of the Nationalist leader, General Sung Chiao-chen, I appealed to the governments and peoples of Europe to withhold payment of the loan temporarily, knowing that the Chinese people would denounce Yuan Shi Kai for the loan and for the murder, and that Yuan Shi Kai would suppress their protest by force of arms.

Foreign Boats Fired On

Peking, July 28.—Roger S. Greens, the American consul general at Hankow, in a telegram to the legation here, says that a Standard Oil Company boat and a British boat have been fired upon near Yochow on the Yangtze river, in the province of Hu-Nan.

Quebec, July 28.—A violent electrical storm, accompanied by torrents of rain, broke over the city this afternoon. The storm lasted fully an hour. No serious damage has yet been reported.

President Mosher Has Asked for Board of Conciliation

Threatens to Call Out 2,500 Employees if Favorable Action is Not Taken—Management Said to be Ready for a Fight to a Finish Rather Than Accede to Demands.

Halifax, July 28.—Today President A. R. Mosher of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, addressed to Mr. Gutelius, general manager of the Intercolonial railway, a letter in the nature of an ultimatum from the men as regards requests originally made months ago, for an increase of pay and a revision of rules.

Mr. Mosher, representing the dissatisfied clerks and freight handlers, was in Ottawa last week conducting negotiations. He did not get much satisfaction as the authorities thought his request unreasonable. The men are determined but so is the management of the road.

ST. JOHN, N. B., JULY 30, 1913. PROMPT ACTION NEEDED. The definite announcement that there is to be no more wharf accommodation at West St. John than there was last year, when the port lost some business as a result of inadequate facilities for handling and shipping freight, is disappointing to all citizens.

The C. P. R. has firmly refused to provide these conveyors; the city has no right to provide them. The government some time ago asked several grain conveyors to put in tenders. These tenders have been received and are now awaiting the consideration of the government.

While St. John's interests are being neglected at Ottawa, the port commissioners at Portland, Boston, New York and Philadelphia are making every effort to increase their facilities so as to make a strong bid for a large share of Canada's export business.

There has yet been no information regarding the G. T. P. terminals at Courtenay Bay, and the public is anxious to know how freight over the Transcontinental is to be handled here next year if it does come, seeing that no provision is being made for these terminals.

and by what route is the Valley road to reach this port? These are things about which there should be no longer any doubt. The public is entitled to information on all these points; and, in the meantime, every effort should be made to impress upon Mr. Borden's representative in the government, by use of the telegraph wire if necessary, the importance of having the grain conveyors to berth 5, 6, and 7 on the West Side ready by the time the winter port season begins.

MR. ASQUITH AT THE HELM. The English Unionist newspapers are busy circulating reports of an expected early retirement of Mr. Asquith from the office of Prime Minister, and possibly from political life.

The true story of this struggle between the "allied" nations may never be written; but there seems now little doubt that Bulgaria began the war, and the civilians in Sofia are throwing the whole blame of it on General Savoff. He made the fatal move on his own responsibility. Had the move been made with sufficient vigor and determination, his countrymen would find it easy to forgive him.

THE CENTRALISTS DISAPPOINTED. Conservative newspapers are saying that it does not follow that Mr. Borden is in favor of contributions as a permanent naval policy because he asked Parliament to vote \$85,000,000 for the use of the British Admiralty.

STAY HOME. It is not likely that many people will leave the Maritime Provinces this year for the harvest fields of the West. Owing to the scarcity of money, and the consequent lack of building operations and other works in Western Canada, there is already a great number of idle men in the prairie cities who are waiting for an opportunity of securing employment of any kind.

NOTE AND COMMENT. Unless determined action is taken by the Powers to prevent Turkey from renewing hostilities, the "old sick man" of Europe may yet be strong.

Although some progress has been made in the effort to protect the consumer, as the larger and riper berries, as a rule, continue to come to the top of the box.
