on Monday Evening, May 27, 1844. The Rev. W. M.
HARVARD in the Chair.*

After the reading of the Report by the Rev. R. COONEY, it was :

Moved by the Rev. MALCOLM McDONALD ; seconded by the Rev. JOHN TOMKINS :

1. That the Report now read be adopted and printed ; and that this Meeting gratefully rejoices in the success with which it has pleased Almighty God to crown the efforts of the Missionaries of this and other kindred Societies during the past year.

Moved by the Rev. JOHN BORLAND ; seconded by the Rev. JAMES BROCK :

2. That this Meeting, recognizing that great principle of the Christian Religion, that, unaided by the Holy Ghost, man's best efforts are powerless in extending the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ in the world, is resolved to be more frequent and fervent in its supplications for the promised outpouring of the Spirit on Missionaries themselves, and on the fields of labour occupied by them.

Moved by the Rev. EDMUND BOTTERELL ; seconded by the Rev. WILLIAM SQUIRE ; supported by the Rev. B. SLIGHT :

That this Meeting, conscious that however much may have already been done towards the conversion of the world, much more yet remains to be done ere "the uttermost parts of the earth can be given to the Son of God for his possession" ; and encouraged by the numerous and pathetic calls for additional assistance which are continually arising from various parts of the Heathen world, solemnly pledges itself to more liberal contributions, and to renewed endeavours to promote its evangelization.

Moved by the Rev. HUGH MONTGOMERY ; seconded by the Rev. ROBERT GRAHAM :

4. That the cordial thanks of this Meeting be presented to all the Collectors of the various Branch Societies in connection with this Auxiliary, for their self-denying and zealous efforts to promote, during the past year, the interests of the Parent Society.

REPORT.

THERE is not, we think, any way in which we can more appropriately introduce this Report, than by a brief allusion to the important and commanding position which the Parent Society now occupies ; the state and prospects of an Institution, that has for its exclusive object the conversion and salvation of man—and that has been eminently owned of God ;—such a Society presents circumstances entitled to frequent recurrence and devout consideration. To form such an Institution, is at once an arduous and laudable undertaking. In collecting materials for a foundation, many and perplexing difficulties are experienced ; and as the project ripens, and bears down with increasing pressure upon the views and inclinations of its opposers, the originators and friends thereof have to endure unmerited obloquy and to encounter an opposition, which seeks to accomplish its end by calumny and misrepresentation.

In the present case, "*the truth as it is in Jesus*" has prevailed. The Missionary cause has acquired strength from every conflict ; every new victory has inspired an ambition for greater conquests ; and every battle that has been fought has diminished its adversaries, multiplied its allies, and enlarged the dominions of "*the Prince of Peace.*" Indeed the moral and spiritual advantages, which our revered Parent Society has, under God, conferred upon the world, have been regularly accumulating, in the same ratio as the Society itself has increased in the number of its members, and in the amount of its income. Yes, and it rejoices your Committee to say, that these advantages involve a variety and a profusion of good, from the first awakenings of the conscience to the full triumphs of faith,—from the admission of members into "the visible Church of Christ," to the translation of saints into "Abraham's bosom ;" and further, that these advantages have been experienced by families, communities, and nations, from the Equator to the Pole, and from the centre of Continental India to the Western confines of the Hudson's Bay Territories.

We shall now lay before you a summary, containing an account of the number of Agents this Society employs, the various Stations that it occupies, and the Schools and other establishments under its direction.

EUROPEAN MISSIONS.

IRELAND.—In this part of “the Missionary field,” an incalculable amount of good would long ago have been effected, were it not for the extreme vigilance of a bigoted and anti-scriptural priesthood. This body watches with jealousy, every movement, undertaken for the purpose of enlightening and disenthraling the millions of souls that they lead captive in the chains of ecclesiastical usurpation and dominion. The Lord of the vineyard, however, has not permitted his faithful servants to labour in vain, or spend their strength for nought. He has given them seals to their ministry, and souls for their hire; and often has the pleasure of the Lord prospered in their hand.

MISSIONS ON THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE, AND IN THE MEDITERRANEAN.

GERMANY.—God continues to favour the Mission established at Winnenden; and, although difficulties and hindrances still exist, it pleases Him so to bless the Society’s Agent in this place, that from thence evangelical Christianity is going forth throughout the whole kingdom of Wirtemberg.

FRANCE.—The work in this kingdom presents an encouraging aspect; for in every part of it which our Missionaries have visited, a disposition to receive the Gospel formed a very prominent characteristic of the people. In many places, the Roman Catholics evince as strong a desire as do the Protestant population, to obtain a saving interest in Christ. Two other considerations deserve special notice, as affording ground of hope for the future. For the most part, those connected by church fellowship with the Mission, manifest deep piety, and a growing acquaintance with the principles of the religion they profess. And the number of devoted and well qualified young men, who are rising up at the several stations, is an intimation that “*the Lord the Spirit*” is providing for the extension of the work by means of a native ministry.

IN SWITZERLAND a considerable amount of preparatory work has been done ; and although the prospect, at present, is not very animating, there is sufficient ground to hope that the "*handful of corn*" sown upon "*the tops of the mountains*" will yet issue in an abundant harvest, and that "*the fruit thereof shall shake like Lebanon.*"

SPAIN.—The prospects of the Mission at Gibraltar are hopeful. The English congregation continues to increase, and the beneficial effects resulting from the preaching of the Gospel, have been recently witnessed in a special manner. In the Spanish department, the schools occupy a prominent position, and are productive of a large amount of spiritual good.

MALTA.—In this place, the labours of the Society's Missionary are confined to the English and Scotch residents, and to the military. In consequence of the frequent changes which take place among the latter, the congregations are of a very fluctuating character. To the native Maltese, little or no access can be gained, for they are taught to look upon all Protestant Ministers as persons that should be carefully avoided.

MISSIONS IN CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.

Your Committee shall now direct your attention to the vast and populous regions of the East, which, by the Providence of God, now form part of the British Empire. Although these countries are morally and spiritually under the government of abominable idolatries, they are not shut up against Missionary operations. Here no political barriers are raised against the Missionary of the Cross,—here is a door, and an effectual one, into which all the Messengers of the Churches may enter. The Island of CEYLON and the Continent of INDIA, present a field, in which the whole Church will find ample scope for the exercise of its faith and zeal. We cannot advert to this interesting section of "the Missionary field," without rendering our sincere thanks to Almighty God for the large measure of success with which he has favoured the efforts of "The Committee" and other kindred Associations, to induce the Government to withdraw their official patronage of idolatry in this part of Her Majesty's dominions. It rejoices all who are endeavouring to turn sinners

from darkness to light, to know that all participation on the part of the British Government, in the produce of the Pilgrim Tax, has ceased—an event which has removed a great obstacle out of the way of Missionary operations, and encourages us to hope that the succour which is still afforded to “the infamous Juggernaut,” will also be discontinued.

AUSTRALIAN AND POLYNESIAN MISSIONS.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—The Committee are grateful to Almighty God for enabling them to say that this important Mission is in a highly prosperous state. A gracious influence has lately accompanied the ministrations of the sanctuary, and the number of Church members has been greatly augmented. The want of additional labourers, in this rapidly extending field of usefulness, is severely felt, and pressing applications have been received by the Committee, for four new Missionaries, accompanied by pledges, that four single men would be provided for, without any expense to the Society. Of the work of God in Paramatta, Windsor, Bathurst, and other places, it may be said, “*the parched ground has become a pool,*” and “*the thirsty land springs of water.*”

VAN DIEMEN'S LAND.—The state of the Society's Mission in this Colony, has not undergone any striking change, a circumstance, which precludes the necessity of making copious observations. The Missionaries continue to labour with undiminished fidelity and zeal, and their perseverance is acceptable to the Lord. The Schools are in a very prosperous state, particularly those in Hobart Town and Launceston. The Mission commenced some years ago among the aborigines of Australia, is proceeding under favourable circumstances: even here, among this degraded and deeply fallen people, has God raised up a people for himself. Of a truth, the light is penetrating through the dark places of the earth, and “*the kingdom of God*” is advancing among men. **HALLELUJAH!**

NEW ZEALAND.—Here, through the mercy of our God, the Day-spring from on high has indeed visited us. The people that aforetime sat in darkness now see a great light. Thousands of “the poor New-Zealanders,” so long afar off from God, have

been brought nigh by the blood of Christ. In this once stronghold of Satan, has "*the blessed and only Potentate*" set up his spiritual kingdom. Here has his holy arm been made bare; and here has he shown himself to be "*glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders.*" The number of Church Members at the date of the last official communications, amounted to "THREE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND THIRTY-NINE."

The New Testament, in the native language, is extensively circulated among the people; and in every case is the inestimable boon received with gratitude and delight. The estimation in which the Sacred Volume is held, may be judged of from the fact, that a remittance of twenty-four pounds has been forwarded to "the British and Foreign Bible Society," as an expression of gratitude for their late munificent grant. The accounts from HOKINAGA, AUCKLAND, and several other stations, are of the most pleasing description, and present a most powerful motive for renewed and increased exertions, on the part of all who long to behold "*the desert rejoice and blossom as the rose.*"

THE FRIENDLY ISLANDS.—There are some circumstances connected with the present state of these Missions, upon which we could expatiate with pleasure. *Tongatabu*, so long disturbed by war, is now enjoying peace, so that every man can sit down under his own vine and fig tree, none daring to make him afraid. The long abandoned post of *Hihifo* has been resumed under very favourable auspices; and during the past year, upwards of four hundred new members have been added to the Church in the TONGA group. Great good is expected to result from an Institution lately established for the training of Native Teachers, and the appointment of the Rev. Mr. Cargill promises to secure uniform and satisfactory translations of the Holy Scriptures, whereby the people will be able to read in their own language an account of the wonderful works of God. In these Islands, the Society's Missionaries have under their pastoral care about eight thousand full and accredited Church Members, and above six thousand Scholars, regularly attending the Sabbath Schools.

FEEJEE.—The arduous work of bringing souls to Christ, is here prosecuted with great zeal and fidelity; and, according to the promise which never fails, this heartiness in the cause of

God, has been rewarded by an encouraging measure of success. A great improvement has taken place during the year at LA-KEMBA; and that improvement, we are happy to add, has exercised a very gracious influence upon the other stations. There are in FEEJEE eight hundred and thirty-seven full and accredited Church Members; the number attending the Schools is eleven hundred adults and children; and both the Translating and Printing Departments are in full and vigorous operation. TO GOD BE ALL THE GLORY.

SOUTHERN AND WESTERN AFRICA.

The space allowed for the whole of this Report, is scarcely sufficient for such a notice of these vast countries as their peculiar circumstances require. Here, indeed, "*the fields are white unto the harvest*;" and the want painfully felt by all who desire to see that harvest gathered in, is the inability to send labourers. Changing the figure, the spiritual and intellectual darkness, which oppression and injustice brought upon the descendants of Ham, is rolling away, and the Sun of Righteousness is rising upon them. That God, who is no respecter of persons, and who, of one blood, made all nations of men, is enlightening the minds and lifting up the heads of this persecuted race, and to hundreds and thousands of them has Jesus Christ become "*wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption*."

WEST INDIES.

The history of these Missions is destined to be eventful. To whatever period the completion of the narrative may reach, it will be found, that every page thereof, from the preface to the conclusion, will be replete with interest, and fraught with events and occurrences of the greatest importance. The progress of the Gospel in these Islands has been often and variously obstructed by distressing casualties, and by various modes and kinds of opposition. These, however, while they chequered its path, were so overruled by the Almighty, that they worked together for its furtherance, and for the good of those that embraced it.

In this department of their pious solicitude, the operations of the Society has been seriously interrupted by the heavy calamity with which several of the Islands have been visited. In HAYTI, one of the Mission stations has been blotted out of existence ; and hence in the District Report the allusion to the circumstance is expressed in this affecting manner : "*Cape Haytien destroyed by an Earthquake.*" *Antigua, Dominica, Montseret, Nevis, and St. Eustatius*, have suffered from the same dreadful phenomenon. In the midst of these trials and losses, the Head of the Church continues to own the labour of his servants, and a continual augmentation of regular hearers and consistent Church Members furnishes evidence that the Word is not preached in vain.

THE BRITISH DOMINIONS IN NORTH AMERICA.

In this extensive field of the Society's operations, the Missionaries, and other Agents thereof, are prosecuting their laborious and self-denying work, under circumstances of an encouraging description. He who promised to be with his servants even unto the end, continues to vouchsafe to them in this country, the manifest tokens of his presence and favour. In this portion of the British Empire, the Society employs nearly one hundred Missionaries, and these are so judiciously distributed, that they form a chain of regular and consecutive Missions, extending from the Labrador Coast to the Far West, or Hudson's Bay Territory. Each link in this chain consists of a regular Mission Establishment, comprising Schools and all the usual appurtenances ; and these are continually emitting flashes of that pure and permanent light, which is the knowledge and the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The central or principal Stations, called Circuits, now occupied by the Society, in various parts of the world, and enumerated in the preceding Report, are about two hundred and seventy-eight. Many of these are very large ; they include in their orb every diversity of climate and of soil, of language and of race ; and throughout the whole length and breadth of them, three hundred and eighty-seven Missionaries are proclaiming

"the Gospel of the grace of God." These Missionaries are assisted by three hundred and twenty-seven salaried Agents of various kinds. Besides these, there are about four thousand six hundred and sixty Sabbath School Teachers, Catechists, &c., by whom valuable gratuitous aid is cheerfully afforded. The full and accredited Church Members exceed one hundred thousand, exclusive of nearly four thousand still on trial. More than sixty thousand children and adults attend the Day and Sabbath Schools. Seven Printing Establishments are carried on in a manner that renders them very efficient; and the total number of attendants at public worship, including Church Members, comprise more than HALF A MILLION OF SOULS.

Such is the beautiful scene which the Society's Missions spread out before us; and while we contemplate it with feelings peculiarly delightful and solemn, our souls are constrained to cry out:

"When he first the work begun,
Small and feeble was his day;
Now the word doth swiftly run,
Now it wins its widening way;
More and more it spreads and grows,
Ever mighty to prevail;
Sin's stronghold it now o'erthrows,
Shakes the trembling gates of hell."

Another motive for increased and vigorous exertion in this blessed cause, arises from the possibility that this may be to some of us *our last opportunity* of coming up to the help of the Lord. We shall soon be required to give an account of our stewardship. Souls are perishing for lack of knowledge—thousands are crying out, “**HELP—MEN OF ISRAEL, HELP !**”—thousands are falling into hell ; and as they sink into the ocean of unquenchable fire, their looks seem to reproach us, while, through the weeping, and wailing, and gnashing of teeth, these upbraiding words are distinctly heard, “**NO MAN CARED FOR MY SOUL ! NO MAN CARED FOR MY SOUL !**”
