

School District No. 7, Newcastle. The semi-annual examination of the schools in this District commenced on Monday last with the Primary department presided over by Miss Parker. The little ones, generally speaking, made a very fair exhibit in the various branches taught. A few pieces were very nicely printed by some of the scholars. We were not, however, very favorably impressed with the order kept, in which there is great room for improvement.

The department taught by Miss Sinclair was examined in the afternoon. The exercises in mental and date arithmetic were very good. The reading of the senior grade was fair, the simultaneous reading very good. In spelling the mistakes were few, and very trifling. The pupils in this grade showed a very intimate acquaintance with the geography of New Brunswick, its products, population, &c. In mental and date arithmetic a display was made alike creditable to pupils and teacher. At the close of the examination the children sang a parting song, and were then dismissed.

The Public Square. The gentlemen who have the New-England Public Square in charge have taken the first steps in the way of improvement. On Monday, Mr. Kitchen, railway contractor, with a keen eye for business, which is expected to be completed to day, when the work of making a plank walk around the square enclosing the Square will be commenced. A handsome flag pole, surrounded by a glazed vase and ball, will shortly be erected in the center of the square, which will be 90 feet high.

General Intelligence. New York, July 6.—On the 25th June a severe hail storm, with S. S. winds, and 2,000 Indians took place in Montana Territory. The attack was made by Gen. Custer, the whole Cavalry, and the Indians poured in a murderous fire from all directions. Gen. Custer, his two brothers, and several other officers were all killed, and not one of his detachment escaped. Two hundred and thirty men were killed, and the Indians got all the arms of the killed soldiers. Seventeen commissioned officers were killed.
