Maritime Province Deleates Delibe rate And Pass Mgny Inportant Resolutions.

FAVOR ALL RFD LINE.

Want Government to Take Over Branch Railways. - Against Exporting Pulp Wood

The annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade opened in St. John on Wednesday morning. The Newcastle delegates were John Morrissy, M. P. P., and G. F. Mc-

Chatham was represented by W. S. Loggie, M. P., W. B. Snowball and J. L. Stewart.

President W. S. Fisher's address was optimistic and instructive. In summing up, he declared that pro gress and prosperity should come to the Atlantic provinces:

First, through the development of our rich natural resources; viz: agriculture in all its branches; mir ing; lumbering; fishing.

Second, through the development of our manufacturing industries. Third, through being on the high way of all-the-world-round traffic and by holding the key to the pasition as providing the only access from the interior to the Atlantic on Canadian territory for six

months in the year. Among the resolutions passed were the following:

From the Halifax board-"This convention of the Maritime Board of Trade, believing that fast high elass mail, passenger and express freight services between the British possessions would be of the immense material and political advantage to Canada and all part of the Empire, hereby heartily en-dorse the "All Red Line" project, proposed by the people of Canada and unanimously adopted by the recent Imperial Conference held in London, and urges the Canadian Government to take all possible steps to hasten the inauguration of the scheme.'

"Resolved, that any steamer sub sidized by the Federal Government to carry on a direct service between parts in P. E. I., C. B. and Newfoundland, be required to furnish cold storage."

"Whereas, the Federal Govern-ment has expended large amounts to promote agriculture and to boom the Western country and to encourage emigration from the motherland and foreign countries;

"Whereas, we have within the bounds of our Eastern Canada as a natural product, spruce pulp wood, capable of providing employment for a large number of our present people and for many who may come to find homes here at profitable wages, instead of going west, and thus people our Eastern Provinces; and

"Whereas, this wood is being rossed in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Quebec, and shipped in that state to the United States to keep their pulp mills running; therefore

"Resolved, that this Maritime Board of Trade is of the opinion that the exportation of pulp wood should be prohibited by the Feder al Government."

Dr. Andrews of Mt. Allison pro duced a sample of black silk which he said was made from pulp wood. "Through our pulp wood it may be possible that Canada will be independent of the cotton belt and the Japanese silk weavers," he

James Ecveridge of the pulp mill at Chatham then went into a somewhat minute explanation of how silk is made from pulp wood. Mr. Beveridge said he had been called an out and out free trader but he thought it was necessary to take some steps to conserve the raw material of our forests for our

"Resolved, that in the opinion of this Maritime Board of Trade, it would be grately in the public interest and to the advantage of the I. C. R. if the Federal Government were to acquire by purchase or lease the railways of Nova Scotia and also the branch lines connecting with the I. C. R. in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and to operate them as part of the I. C. R. system, and that the government be urged to take the necessary steps to acquire such rail ways, provided the same can be purchased or leased at reasonable terms, based not merely on the general cost, but also on the coming power of the lines."-Passed unanimously.





Provincial Government Borrow £300,000 For One Year On Easy Terms

LESS THAN 5 Per Cent

Will Be Applied to Retire Debentures and also on Capital Account.

Premier Robinson, last week made an important announcement concerning the financial affairs of the province. Briefly, the government has been able to arrange a loan from the Bank of Montreal for £300,000, at a rate of interest which figures out a little less than five per:cent.

"This," said the premier, "is es pecially gratifying, as it shows the excellent eredit of the Province of New Brunswick.

"While some of the best securities in America today are going begging, and cities like Halifax, Montreal, Winnipeg and New York are finding it almost impossible to bonds at a reasonable price, the Province of New Brunswick has been able to sell its treasury bills at a rate which is a slight improvement on what they have been paying for the past year or

"This will enable them to meet debentures falling due during the year and provide for all necessary expenditures upon capital account at a rate of interest almost as low as many issues of long time

"The best financial experts are of the opinion that the present tight condition of the money market cannot continue and the Province of New Brunswick will be in a position to take advantage of the improvement which is expected in the near future.

"Notwithstanding the statement to the contrary, the province has not been offering any of its longterm bonds on the market, although several financial institutions have made overtures for their purchase."

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
