AN EXCURSION party from Amherst

visited Cape Tormentine yesterday.

consisted of eight cars nearly all of

which were filled.

The HEAVY RAINS of Sunday,

Monday and Tuesday were

beneficial to the crops. Almost

without exception, the crops in this

vicinity are progressing well and

promise a splendid yield.

N. B. &amp; P. E. Ry. Co. advertise to

bonds. It is understood that about

three quarters of the bonds have

been subscribed for at par. Consider-

ing the relative character of the

security to the small amount of the law,

these bonds will no doubt soon be at

a premium.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The community

was quite shocked to hear, on Sun-

day morning, that Mrs. Jas. R. Ayer

had died suddenly the previous

evening. On Saturday the

lady had been apparently enjoying her usual

health, but towards evening, took

ill, and died at midnight of mem-

brorhage of the lungs. A great deal

of sympathy is felt for her family

in their severe affliction.

STOCK SALES.—Mr. Charles Fav-

ett sold last Saturday a large stock

last week at prices aggregating

\$2,000. Mr. Oswald Smith, of King-

ston, Kent Co. was the purchaser of

seven head, five of which were

throughbred Durhams and Polled

Augusta and the others a very

grade Polled Angus cow and calf.

The remainder of the herd sold were

beef cattle and were bought by Mr.

John McDonald, of St. John, who

also made several purchases of

smaller lots in Sackville.

THE HERBERT.—The Portwar-

den of St. John has held a survey

on the right Herbert now on

Quinn's blocks. They found brass

cap broken and end of the wheel

spindle bent, after companion doors

and rudder casing broken, brass

tell-tale bunnet damaged, and one

opposite yard broken. In cabin

three dead lights broken and

five damaged; bulkheads broken

and started; five drawers, oil cloth,

cushion and four doors damaged and

destroyed. On deck, both sides

waterways, main and pin rails, bulk-

head of poop started and strained;

butts open and oakum gone; keel,

shear, dead-wood, lead of stem, gar-

brel streak broken and gone. On port

side, several floors, five futtocks and

streets of planks fore and aft from

bilge to keel badly chafed, broken

and gone; also metal torn off; rudder,

one pair rudder braces broken

and lower rudder brace bent.

On starboard side metal torn off,

several streaks of plank and several

timbers fore and aft badly chafed,

broken and gone; oakum and tre-

nails on both sides badly started.

Capt. Towse reports a considerable

quantity of rigging, etc., destroyed.

It was recommended that the vessel

be laid on hopped blocks, metal

stripped and held cleared for further

examination.

### GENERAL NEWS.

—A New Glasgow rough has been

molested \$12 for disturbing the Salvation

Army.

—The Nova Scotia sugar refinery has

declared half yearly dividend of three

per cent.

—An enormous yield of wheat, barley,

oats and hay is expected in Manitoba this

season.

—It is said that 100,000 bushels of oats

could be bought to-day in Queen's county,

P. E. Island, but buyers are scarce at any

price.

—Edward Mattatt, of Colchester, N. S.,

one of the sub-contractors of the Central

railway was taken ill a few days ago and

died in 48 hours.

—August McGillivray fell between two

cars on the Pictou branch Thursday and

while passing over his shoulders.

He was instantly killed.

—Archibald &amp; Co. of North Sydney,

are suing the North Sydney Herald for

\$50,000, for alleged libel. The Herald

promised to carry the war into Africa.

—The Kent election for the local House

will take place on the 10th, nomination

3rd. Messrs. Phinney, LeBlanc, John-

son and Sykes are already in the field.

—Over 600 immigrants, mostly Iceland-

ers, have arrived at Quebec, and are on

their way to Manitoba. About 1,300 Ice-

landers have thus far arrived this sea-

son.

—The Canada Sugar Refining Co. has

made a further advance in the sale of

sugar since the St. Lawrence refinery

was destroyed. The price to consumers

is now 10 cents per pound and is incom-

parably 7 1/2 cents.

—Eight hundred and nine Icelanders

are on their way to Canada. Iceland con-

sists of 200 islands, and it is prob-

able all will find their way to Canada with-

in a few years, being driven out by en-

croachments of glaciers.

—Another horrible story is reported

from Montreal. A local desperado named

Eddy has been found guilty of assaulting

a half-witted young girl, but defying the

law, he refuses to serve the term of

none of the local officers dare attempt his

capture.

—A P. E. Islander named Lacey, who

came from Boston in the International

steamer State of Maine on Thursday, was

robbed of \$900 while asleep on board the

ship. The robbery was committed by three

years' toll as a blacksmith in San Francisco.

—A session has been caused in Sum-

mer county, N. S., by the dispute over

the property of the late John W. J. J.

Newcomb, of Cornwallis, to do business

as a farmer. Her certificate was regis-

tered in the county clerk's office on Jan-

uary 10th last. The married woman's act

confers the privilege of doing business in her

own name, but she is not to be a partner

in any business.

—Miss Genevieve, of Dallas, and

Manie Bostick, of Gainesville, Texas,

were lately attacked by an unknown man

who came upon them in a dark place, and

latterly wounded with a hatchet. Miss

Watkins is dead and Miss Bostick cannot

live. The young ladies belonged to good

families, and the cause is known for the

crime. The assassin escaped. Prob-

abounds are on his track.

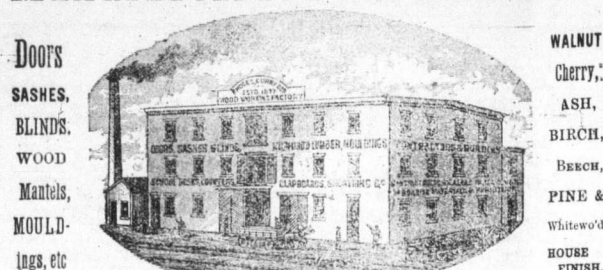

## EMILY OF JOPPA.

Joppa was not a great place to

look at. It was only a fishing vil-

lage on the New Jersey coast. The

world would have wandered on in

place of ignorance of its existence

had not a big watering place

grown up right beside it. Then

Joppa became one of the sights of

the place, and the fishermen began

to wax fat and well to do. They

were keen fellows, the fishermen,

and, like all Jerseymen, had an eye

single to their own worldly profit.

They did not undertake to make

radical improvements in their little

village. Nothing but rebuilding

could have done that, and then it

would no longer have possessed

charm for the summer visitor and

his dollars. The fishermen, while

increasing their own comforts, pre-

served Joppa in its pristine state

of picturesque aqualor, and the sum-

mer visitors went there to gaze upon

the natives and their queer homes,

and to purchase bladders, all alive,

at eight cents a pound.

Joppa was picturesque.

It squatted upon the sand, which rose

to a slight ridge between the hamlet

and the beach, and there it stood,

the place some protection from the

bitter blasts of the winter gales.

The streets of the town were as

narrow as those of an army encamp-

ment, and every step through them

lifted one's shoes a goodly portion

of the unnumbered sands of the

ocean. The houses were built of all

kinds of old timbers. The bones of

many a coasting schooner and trim

barge formed the joists and beams,

while most of the buildings were

covered very roughly with variegated

assortments of boards, the involun-

tary tribute to Joppa of wind and

tide. Chimneys of ragged out-

line and wavering disposition were

made of old bricks, picked up here

and there, the chimneys were pur-

chased after periods of greater

economy than usual, from a sash-

maker in a neighboring town. Here

and there was a store at which the

inhabitants purchased tallow candles

and an abandoned set of coffee,

as it said before, Joppa was not

a great place to look at. It did not

cover more than three acres of

ground and possessed a population

about 150 persons.

The loathsome added to the un-

common appearance of the place.

They were dug deep in the ground,

heavily lined with logs, and sur-

mounted with conical roofs, which

looked like a collection of wooden

wigwags. They stood at the south-
