European Intelligence.

FROM PAPERS BY THE GREAT WESTERN.

The arrival in England of Louis Philippe and his minister, M. Guizot, on a visit to Queen Victoria, is the primary attraction of the week. The reception which the English monarch experienced at landing was hearty and sincere, and from the time of his setting foot on British soil until he found himself in the royal apartments of Windsor Castle, his progress resembled an ovation. This is gratifying—creditable to our countrymen, from the strong contrast in which it places the national antipathies of Louis Philippe's subjects towards the people whom they have now so warmly welcomed. The man whom he is now welcoming, and personally complimentary to the character of the subjects which will engage the attention of the British politicians, who are now enjoying the Queen's hospitality in her favourite residence; but probably nothing beyond speculation will transpire. If a more cordial and friendly feeling is likely to spring up on the part of the French towards the English people, the visit will not have been in vain. Every event, however, in a free country, is made to bear a political import, and there is reason to apprehend that the stability of M. Guizot's cabinet will not be increased by his accompanying the King. His tenure of power has already been weakened by his supposed partiality for the English alliance, and his visit will confirm the prejudices which his sensitive and irascible countrymen entertain on the subject. It is deeply to be regretted that two great nations whose proximity and resemblance place them in the view of civilization should regard each other with jealousy, if not hatred. But such, unfortunately, is the feeling on the part of a large portion of the French towards the English people; and there are not wanting back politicians who find their account in fanning the virulence. Nevertheless, these personal interchanges of the amenities of life between the two sovereigns have in them something pleasing as well as gracious. They are gratifying to the parties themselves, and they narrow the distance which separates the sovereign from the citizen. Whether the visit will add to the popularity of Louis Philippe amongst his own subjects is questionable; but no doubt exists that it will increase the number of his adherents on this side of the Channel.

Reading the visit of the "Citizen King" to the Royal Palace of England, news has arrived from Paris of some additional information which the French had put upon an English officer. Had this intelligence come to hand two months ago, when the affairs of that remote island were settling England and France by the ears, it would have wounded the national pride and inflamed the national pride and inflamed the national rage, beyond the power, probably, of suppression. As it is, the affairs of Tahiti are reduced to their relative importance; they have not ceased to excite regret, but they do not awaken any fears of a warlike character.

The bulk of our commercial readers, in the Western World, are no doubt aware, that a scheme for the erection of docks, on the Cheshire side of the Mersey, was first brought forward some months ago—that the project applied to Parliament for the necessary powers, which were given, after a strong opposition on the part of the Liverpool Corporation—and that a company has been formed, with a large capital, for carrying the project into immediate operation. The first stone of the new docks will be laid on the 3rd, under circumstances of great local rejoicing, in which the poor will be enabled to participate, by the roasting, on a large scale, of bullocks, and sheep. Every American merchant who has sent a ship to Liverpool, every captain who has navigated one hither, will be gratified to learn, that the extent and accommodations of the embryo docks will prevent the vexatious delay caused hitherto by the want of dock room, and that with the increased facilities, the dock and other expenses will be lessened.

One of the most remarkable features of the day is the speculation which is now going forward in new railway projects, and of the number and extent of these projects, the crowded columns of the London and country papers afford daily evidence. It has been stated by persons practically acquainted with the subject, that the railway acts obtained from the Legislature during the last session of Parliament will require for the completion of the undertakings within a trifle of twelve millions sterling—sixty millions of dollars; but if all the parties who propose going to Parliament in the next session, succeed, at least six times that amount of money will be subtracted from the ordinary channels of trade.

The accounts from the manufacturing districts present nothing striking. Business is certainly not worse. In Manchester, rather more activity prevailed on the last market day, and prices were looking up. Not the least cheering feature is the revenue return for the quarter ending on Thursday, which, it will be seen, is of the most gratifying character.

The vessels now sailing for America take but few goods. Shipments being few, freights are consequently low.

The wheat markets of London and Liverpool are inactive. By the average returns of the kingdom, made up to Thursday, the duties remain unaltered. Previous rates have been reluctantly paid.

IRELAND.

The Liberator has fixed Wednesday, the 20th of November, for a grand banquet in Limerick, on his way from Derryane.

DEATH OF THE MARQUESS OF DUNGAL.—The noble marquis expired on Saturday last, at Ormeau, near Belfast, after a protracted illness. His lordship, George Augustus Chichester, Marquis of Dungall, Viscount of Chichester, and Baron Belfast, (Viscount of Chichester, in England), lieutenant of the county of Down, Knight of St. Patrick, &c., was born in 1769, and was consequently in the seventy-sixth year of his age.

Death of Lady Heytesbury.—Lady Heytesbury, the Lady of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, died on the 6th inst. In immediate attendance on her last moments were, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, his brother the Hon. E. H. A. Courcy, M. P. for Tamworth, Captain in the Navy; her son, the Hon. W. H. Asher, A. C. O. Holmes, M. P. for the late of Wight, the Hon. Miss A. Courcy daughter, and Mrs. Pennant, sister of the late baroness. The late baroness was second daughter of the late Lord William Henry Cavendish, and grand daughter to the Earl of Radnor; she was born in 1783. Her disease was gastric fever. It was arranged that the Irish court would have been upheld upon the most suitable scale of splendour had her Excellency been spared to carry out her intentions.

FRANCE.—The *Moniteur* contains a very long ordinance relative to the acquisition of property in Algeria, the guarantees to purchasers, and the various points connected with colonization. The object of this ordinance is to remove the difficulties which, owing to an imperfect legislation, have hitherto prevented the due development of colonial enterprise.

The alliance which King Louis Philippe proposed to offer to Queen Victoria, in compensation of her visit to the Chateau d'Eu, is finished, and his Majesty presents it to Queen Victoria at Windsor. It is of unusually large size being 32 inches by 24, and proportionally thick. It contains 32 drawings by the first French artists, representing the different apartments of the Chateau d'Eu and scenes and events connected with the British Majesty's late visit. To prevent friction, the drawings are let in, and, as it were, framed by thick sheets of Bristol paper. It is splendidly bound in scarlet morocco, by Guerin, bearing the arms of England within a rich border of the most delicate tooling. The case or box, in which it is enclosed, is covered with rich purple velvet, on which is also impressed the Queen's arms.

The King's visit to England is distinguished by an act of Royal clemency—an ordinance, which gives grace and pardon to 50 political state prisoners. All whose terms of imprisonment expire before 1847, and a few of those condemned for a longer time will receive the benefit of this arrangement.

The *Moniteur* contains a long list of promotions and decorations, arising out of events in Morocco, and of honours bestowed on the officers recommended by the Duke de Nemours, for the intelligence displayed in the late campaign at Metz.

SPAIN.—The Queen Mother and the Deputies of Bayas and Guipuzcoa had recently an interview, the language of which, on either side is described to have been very conciliatory, and this interview is pointed to by the supporters of the government, as the best proof of the good understanding which exists with the Basque provinces.

The Minister of Finance is in treaty with the Bank of San Fernando, for a financial operation.

The Prince de Joinville sailed on the 22d ultimo, for Cadix, in the French war steamer, *le Paillon*.

The Augsburg Gazette mentions the probability of a matrimonial alliance between Prince George of Cambridge and the Grand Duchess Olga of Russia—one of the results of the late journey to England of the Russian Czar. The young prince is heir presumptive to the crown of Hanover.

The interminable squabble between the French and the natives at Tahiti, involving, as it does, the English at that island, and embroiling the governments of both countries, has become still further complicated by the intelligence which has come to hand this week. It appears that the Hazard arrived off the reef at Papeete, the 7th inst., when a boat was ordered on shore with four hands, Dr. Veech, and Lieut. Rose in command, and in charge of the despatches. This officer had landed at Papeete, and delivered the despatches to Lieut. Hunt of the *Basilisk*, who had assumed the official duties of British consul, and after remaining on shore a quarter of an hour, and when about 100 yards from the pier, on returning to the Hazard, cruising off and on, outside the reef, the boat was hailed from an armed barge belonging to the French frigate *la Charte*, and was ordered by the officer to the "Maison" (the house of the admiral), or to the frigate, to either of which he pointed; but Lieut. Rose turned his boat round, and proceeded for the pier, in order to get an explanation from Lieut. Hunt, as to what was required. On arriving alongside the wharf, Lieut. Rose said he would neither proceed to the "Maison" nor to the frigate, or anywhere else at the bidding of French authority. He was then ordered to get out of his boat into the barge, which he did, at the same moment he directed the British man-of-war to anchor and prudent to be backed down, and unhooking his sword he delivered it to the officer; the barge then proceeded towards the French frigate *la Charte*, towing the *la Hazard*. On getting alongside, Lieut. Rose was directed to go on board; his crew remaining in his boat. A long consultation ensued, and after having on board the frigate two hours and a half, the sword was delivered up to Lieut. Rose, and he was told that he might go on board his own vessel. He demanded an explanation and an apology, but was replied to that there was "no apology." "No communication was allowed with the shore," Lieut. Rose has been despatched home by his superior to make a representation of the circumstances to the British Government, and has now arrived. Queen Pouri and her husband were on board the *Basilisk*. Upwards of a hundred Europeans, and it is stated, enlisted under the Tahitian banner, and amongst them some gallant fighters.

STATE OF THE REVENUE.—The return of the Revenue for the quarter ending 10th October, has just been published, and, among matter for congratulation, which it affords, is an increase in the Customs, compared with the corresponding period of 1843, of the year of £1,733,165, and the quarter of £473,347. This is the true pivot of our national prosperity, and is the more gratifying when the bold reductions are considered, which the Minister was encouraged to make when supported by so grand a reserve as the property-tax.

A trifling decrease in the Excise on the quarter is to be ascribed rather to growing habits of temperance in the lower orders than to any diminution of means. It will bear, in fact, no other construction, for activity reigns in almost all the departments of trade, and the wages of labour in the manufacturing districts have probably doubled in amount within the past year.

It is consolatory also, and another good omen, to find that the Post office, the great accumulation of pennies, has advanced £82,000 on the year and no less than £19,000 on the quarter.

The property tax, which shows an increase of £203,413 on the year, and a decrease of £20,193 on the quarter, may be said to have found its level, and to provoke no remark, except to hope, that, under circumstances of such promising augury, we may soon get rid of it. In the present account is to be seen, moreover, the effect of the judicious application of the surplus revenue in paying off deficiency bills; only about £2,500,000 will be wanted to meet the charge on the Consolidated Fund for the quarter just ended.

The total increase of the revenue for the year is £1,335,349, and on the quarter £529,941.

The gentleman to whom Mrs. Nisbett, the actress is about to be united, is Sir William Bantley, Bart., Receiver General of H. M. Customs.

The Papal Government has rejected the proposition of an English company to construct a railway between Civita Vecchia and Rome.

The Albert, of 129 guns, exceeding by 700 tons the *Tratfalgar*, at present the largest in the British navy, will be launched about the end of the year.

On the 31st inst., Dr. Symonds, who was opposed by the Presbyterians, was elected Vice-Chancellor of Oxford University by a majority of 882 to 183.

Dr. Arnold has invented an air-pump, with which it is proposed to supply a draught to furnaces, superceding the necessity of funnels in steamboats and costly chimneys in engine houses.
