Dissolution Rumors.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—A rumor is current, and is credited, that Lord Salisbury, deeming the time opportune while the Parnell seandal is fresh in the minds of the people, has decided to dissolve Parliament in the spring. Advices urging Conservative associations throughout the country to improve their local organizations immediately have been issued from the central office of the Conservative party. Lord Salisbury attended a council meeting at Windsor, when the Queen signed the speech from the throne, which is to be read on the opening of Parliament.

Unloss Parnell Abdicates.

London, Nov. 24.—The Rev. Hugh Price Hughes discussed the Parnell case in his sermon at St. James' Hall yesterday. He sleelared that the non-conformists would never support a party that was led by Parnell, and unless the leader of the Trish party abdicated the Liberals would certainly be defeated at the next general election. He said that he had high authority for the statement that Mr. Parnell would accept Mr. Gladstone's decision in the matter. After Parnell had expiated his offense, said Mr. Hughes, he might return to Parliament and resume the leadership of the Nationalist party. Unless Parnell Abdicates.

LONDON, NOV. 24.—The Earl of Derby has subscribed £1,000 for Gen. Booth's scheme of social regeneration. The Mar-quis of Queensberry sends £100 to the Saldonation for the cause. He asks an inter-view with Gen. Booth, saying that he be-

In 1886 the Gladstone Government was defeated through defection in the English con-stituencies arising from the home rule legislation brought forward by Gladstone. objection of the English people was not against the concession of the right to the Irish people to a full measure of local self-government. It was founded on the Land Bill which, unadvisedly, was tacked on to

the home rule scheme. The English taxpayers rightly objected to the credit being pledged to the Irish land-lords, many of whom had rackrented their tenants to such an extent as to have long since obtained more than a fair price for their land. They voted the bill down, and Gladstone was defeated. But the Conservative leaders, after having aided in defeating Gladstone by raising objections of this sort to his land measure, now come forward with a bill on the same lines. They wish to have the Irish landlords bought out, and the State is made finally responsible for the price at which the land is sold to the tenants. It remains to be seen whether the scheme will secure public indersation.
