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



We have occasionally urged the importance of thinning the young fruit on over We have occasionally urged the importance of thinning the young fruit on overcrowded trees for giving room to the growth and development of the specimens that remain. Being none too soon at the present time for this work, and many trees being overloaded after last year's rest, we mention an additional incident where on exhibition a single branch contained over 200 apples, of course greatly reduced in size by this overcrowding, but admired for its profuse bearing. Near it was a dish of the same fruit from a tree where the fruit had been widely thinned. On this tree the fruit had grown at least triple the size of the other, and the flavor was so greatly improved that no one would recognize them as of the same variety. Every owner of trees bearing large and late fruit doubtless has on the present day of the month just such overcrowded specimens, which would receive the same benefit by thinning, and if he has any doubte of the great benefit of the operation, they would be all removed by trying the experiment on the branches of a tree alongside an unthinned tree.—

Butter Fat in City Milk.

Some good people who are in a constant state of agitation on the question of butter fat in milk have contended that milkmen who dip from the top of the can, or who draw from the bottom through a faucet, do not give to each customer his proper share of the fat or cream of the milk, and that in the case of "dipping," those who receive theirs last get skim-milk. It having been dlemonstrated that where dipping is practheirs last get skim-milk. It having been demonstrated that where dipping is practiced their is practically no difference in the amount of fat contained in different samples, Prof. Dean, of the Dairy Department at the Ontario Agricultural College, determined to see whether there is any difference when the milk is drawn from the bottom, as in the case of three of the four milkmen in the city of Guelph whose milk was tested.

After a careful investigation, he issues a bulletin of which the "Conclusions" are as follows: "Although there are some variations, yet they are so slight that from these trials we may conclude that there is practically no difference in the percentage of fat In the milk as ordinarily handled and served to customers at different times from the same can, whether it be taken from the ton and jarring of the wagon are sufficient to keep the fat or cream thoroughly mingled with the milk."

Keep the Bees at Work.

The bee-keeper cannot afford to have idle bees for want of room, or because they refuse to work in the supers. Try every way to induce them to work above.

One way is to replace one or two frames of young larva below, with empty combs, and then with the zine excludes keep the queen below. By putting the brood in the center of the upper story, they can be started in the top.

Those working for comb-honey take sections that were partly built out the year before, or from hives that are already working above, and put in the hive they are trying to start.

This is where beginners are most apt to fail. They think something is the matter with the bees, when they only need coaxing to start them above. This should be done as early in the season as possible, for if

Over 70 members have joined the association, and over 300 head of cattle have already been registered. What promises to be one of the most interesting gatherings of the association yet held will take place at the Industrial Fair, Toronto.

Australian Apples.

The Canadian Horbiculturist reports the arrival in England of 140,000 cases of apples from Tasmania, by mail steamers from Hobart, in refrigerators, which mostly arrived in line order. The cases contain from 36 to 40 pounds each of fruit. They have sold for from 14 to 20 English shillings per case, by one arrival, and two-thirds as much by another. The cost of conveyance is enormous. The freight, packing, cost of case, and incidental expenses, besides the cost of the apples, are about 7 or 8 shillings a case. They will not probably spoil the market for Canadian apples in England. Australian Apples.




