HARBIN AND IRKUTSK-SACKED AND FIRED; STREETS OF RIGARUNNING WITH BLOOD

Manchurian Mutineers Seize Vast Stores, Bombard Cities With Great Slaughter, and Defeat Loyal Troops-Anarchy Rampant in All Parts of the Empire.

New York, Dec. 11.-According to the American this morning the London Daily Telegraph's advice from Moji, Japan, telling of the bombardment of Harbin by Russian military mutineers, says also that Irkutsk was burned and sacked. The city is in ruins. In Harbin the rebels created

General Madriloff, commanding the loyal troops, engaged the rebels. DREADFUL SLAUGHTER AT HARBIN.

Refugees from Eastern Siberia say the mutineers journeyed to Vladivostock on a captured express train and seized vast military stores there, consisting of Maxim rifles, and cartridges, with several field pieces. Then they returned to Harbin and began the bombardment. The rebels included some of the best marksmen in the army. Their shots all told. Bullets taked the main thoroughfare. Even the hospitals were riddled by the rapid fire balls. Patients were killed in their cots.

IRKUTSK SACKED AND FIRED.

Irkutsk was sacked from end to end and fired in a dozen places. Rebels marched through the streets singing. The refugees fled to the mountains and villages.

MUTINEERS HAD ABLE LEADER.

The arrival of General Madriloff was greeted with cries of rage by the mutineers, who fought with even greater intensity. They had a leader who was handling them with skill. His name is not known. Many innocent Russian and Chinese residents of Harbin were killed.

A late dispatch from Moji stated that Madriloff was retreating before the rebels and Harbin would share the fate of Irkutsk.

RAN DOWN BRITISH SHIP.

A dispatch from Tokio to London says a Russian destroyer at Vladivostock deliberately ran down a British steamship which had to ground to avoid foundering. The Japanese residents of Vladivostock are safe from the mutineers, who, however, treasure an intense hatred of the British.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 10.-Morning, via Eydtkuhnen, Dec. 11.-There is every indication today that the Government's challenge will be accepted and that within 48 hours a general strike throughout Russia will be ordered. A terrible storm has been raised by the arrest of M. Krustaleff, president of the executive committee of the Workmen's Council, which was followed during the night by the imprisonment of the members of the Workmen's Council, and a number of Socialistic leaders. "The reaction has come," were the words on every lip, and in the Liberal extremist camp there was only one opinion, namely, that it must be resisted to the bitter end. At all the meetings last night, some of which lasted until morning, the opinion was unanimous that the Government had forced the hands of the proletariat, and the supreme weapon, a general strike, must be invoked.

EDITORS DEFY THE GOVERNMENT.

The newspaper editors at yesterday evening's meeting decided that the temporary press law forbidding the discussion of vital questions affecting the welfare of the nation violated the principles of freedom of speech and of the press guaranteed by the imperial manifesto, and that it must be defied. The result was that the editions of the Russ and half a dozen more radical papers were confiscated. The employes of the Riga-Orel Railroad have declared a strike on account of the declaration of martial law in Livonia, and have sent an appeal to the other roads to to join. Last night the railroad men of the Baltic lines decided to follow the example of the Riga-Orel men. The situation in Livonia is frightful.

Chicago, Dec. 11.-The conditions which are rapidly driving large manufacturing interests from the United States to Canada are to be considered within a few days by the Illinois Manufacturing Association. Reports just gathered show that 132 of the leading concerns of the country have been obliged, chiefly on account of tariff restriction, to establish branch plants in Canada. The remedy most in favor locally and throughout the country provides for reciprocity legislation which will permit of the freer exchange of American and Canadian manufactured products. 



JOHN COLIN FORBES R. C. A.

Canada's Great Portrait Painter

The artist who was commissioned by the Canadian Government to paint the portraits of King Edward and Queen Alexandra for the Dominion House of Parliament, and who was honored with sittings by their Majesties in the early part of this year, is John Colin Forbes who has a long trail of successes in his

Born in Toronto of Scotch-English parents, he was educated at Upper Canada College in his native city, and at an early age showed the first faint dawnings of his artistic genius. He was entirely self-taught, following with the sure instinct of true power along the lines of natural development, and silently working out his own destiny until he produced his first real work, a portrait of his father. This revealed so commanding an exhibit of his ability that he was sent to study at the South Kensington Museum and later at the Royal Academy in London. One of his first paintings, a marine view called "Toronto Bay," took a first prize at the Provincial Exhibition in 1866 and he later painted a number of portraits that added greatly to his fame, notably those of Lord Dufferin, Sir John Macdonald, Alexander MacKenzie, Edward Blake, Sir Charles Tupper and Lady Helen Blackwood.

In 1881 he was elected to the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts and five years later painted for the Canadian Pacific R.R. a series of pictures which reproduced some of the masterpieces of Nature's painting and sculpture in the wild, romantic Canadian Rockies, where Titanic mountains, deep gorges, great expanses of scenery are shown in a color scheme of Nature at her best. These gave him some of the masterpieces of Nature's painting and sculpture in the wild, romantic themes that filled his artistic soul with joy. Those who are familiar with his paintings "The Cañon in the Royal Gerge," "The Mount of the Holy Cross," Mount Stephen," and the "Glacier of the Selkirks," must ever carry with them the memory of their majestic beauty and power. In 1891 members of the Canadian Liberal party sent him to England to paint a full-length portrait of Gladstone for the National Liberal Club of London. For the past few years much of his work has been done in the United States where he has made portraits of many

of the leading men of the country. Fire and water have been merciless in their pursuit of Mr. Forbes. When the steamer "Hibernia" went down in mid-ocean in 1868 it carried with it some of his best paintings and he barely escaped with his life, and his famous painting of the wreck was destroyed by fire in 1879. In three later fires the work of years fed the flames, and yet this Phœnix painter of Canada, undismayed and un-



While there is no room for doubt that R. Ruby Fitzsimmons doesn't find training as much like recreation as it was ten years ago, and while there is no doubt whatever that his hands and feet are less reliable than at that same time, it would appear that just at present the speckled gladiator is garnishing his work with a few trimmings culled from the dramatic stage that he has recently graced. Reports from 'Frisco right along have been that Fitz is not working in the gym as has been his wont. But now comes a story to the effect that the Cornishman, while on the road a day or two ago, exhausted, was forced to pause and rest. According to this report, the fighter leaned against a building, his legs quivering and his knees knocking, while great beads of perspiration burst out on his noble brow. He stood thus for a moment or two, until, noting that he was observed, he decided to move on, doing so slowly, and with labored breathing. All of this happened in front of a court house, in a very public place, and was observed by a number of spectators. Wherefore there is every reason to believe that Fitz was doing a little acting, either for the benefit of the betting, or to induce O'Brien to prepare for an easy mark. The old boy is not the one to advertise his condition, were it as bad as the reports make it appear. On the face of this latest story, it looks as if Fitz finds his work about as hard as had been expected prior to the beginning of training, and is trying to impress O'Brien with the idea that it is not only difficult, but impossible.

The time honored headline, "Prize Fighter is Killed," has been dragged out again, and for the usual sort of fatality. Two laborers in California, having a little difference of opinion, agreed on Wednesday to settle the matter by a ten round fight. Roberts, one of the men, in the ninth round swung a blow to the back of McDonald's-his opponent's-head, and Mc-Donald went down and out. He did not regain consciousness, and in a few hours died from hemorrhage of the brain. Roberts is held for murder, and the affair, no doubt, will become campaign material for onslaughts on boxing. Neither man was a pugilist, neither was in training, and in no sense, excepting that the men fought rounds and charged admission to the meeting, was it a pugilistic contest, in the accepted meaning of those words. These are the affairs usually that have fatal terminations, and that hurt legitimate sport. It is about as fair to cite them in opposing boxing as it is to use a list of deaths of grammar school boys as arguments against continuance of football in colleges whose men pass an examination before playing the game, and are always under the watchful eye of a high-priced

President Roosevelt's message, although mentioning nearly everything under the sun, had not a word to say about football. Abolish the shoulder to shoulder feature of the lineup and make the men stand five yards apart.

Drop the Rugby game and substitute Association football.

Allow the forward pass and thereby transform the game into outdoor

The intention is clearly to make the play more open. In the close formations and mass plays as at present, there are many opportunities for slugging, and short-arm work. There will be considerable opposition to the adoption of these reforms, as it is asserted, and they have statistics to back them up in their assertion, that most of the injuries sustained in football, some even assert that 90 per cent of them are sustained in this style


