



LOCAL MARKET.

London, Tuesday, March 17. The roads are in fair shape for wheeling a few miles from the city,

but further back the sleighing is not bad, consequently there was a goodsized crowd of farmers present; in fact, a much larger number than was expected under the circumstances mentioned

There was a good demand for nearly everything offered. Hay was about the only line in which sales were at all draggy. Prices as a rule were firm. Hay and Straw-There were thirty

loads offered and the demand was fair at \$14 to \$15 per ton for choice timothy hay; nearly all at \$15 per ton. Straw scarce at \$8 and \$8 50 per ton. Grain-lats were in good demand, and prices firm at \$1 57 and \$1 60 per cwt. Barley sold at \$1 32 per cwt. Butter and Eggs-Butter was scarce and grocers had quite a time to secure enough for their immediate requirements. Sales were made at 31c to 32c for pound rolls and 30c for easier at 20c to 22c for crate and basket lots.

Vegetables and Roots-Potatoes were scarce and prices higher, as \$1.50, No. 12, \$1.50; mold A, \$3.35; Rhubarb scarce at \$1 per dozen. Lettuce plentiful at 40c per dozen, Radishes and green onions, 40c per dozen. Parsnips, 40c to 50c per bushel.

Apples were slow and prices steady. The supply of poultry was exceedingly small. The high prices don't seem to be a sufficient inducement for the farmers to market their surplus stock of poultry.

Dressed Hogs-There was a good demand, and prices were firmer at \$7 and \$7 25 per cwt; most of them sold at the higher price.

Butchers' Meat-The supply was small, and prices steady. middling, 5.98; low middling, 5.64; good ordinary, 5.20; ordinary, 4.70.

The sales of the day were 7,000 bales, of which 500 were for speculation and export, and included 6,400 American. Receipts, 9,000 bales, including 6,300 American. Futures opened and closed steady; American middling, G. O. C., March, 5. March and April, 5.57; April and May,

SERMON ON MATRIMONY

Bishop McEvay Alludes to Mixed Marriages in St. Peter's Cathedral.

St. Peter's Cathedral was crowded Sunday night when Bishop McEvay gave the second of his series of sermons on "Matrimony."

After a brief review of his first sermon, he entered upon an explanation of the care and solicitude of the church in guarding the sacred contract. For the sanctity of the home and the welfare of society he said the church has enacted certain laws which must be obeyed, and the violation of these constitute what are known as impediments.

There are two kinds of impediments one which renders a marriage null and void, and the second which renders it illicit.

The question of marriage by error, which was common many years ago, but which very rarely occurs now, was dwelt upon

No person, his lordship said, must be compelled to marry or the marriage could be declared null under the first impediment. No person could be compelled to

marry a slave, as in so doing he would become the property of the slave-The church had done everything
