# AT COMPANY'S SUGGESTION

Manager King Wanted the City to Agree to Fix the Population at 50,000 in Order to Get 1,200 Feet of Additional Track---City Fathers Said No and Then the Company Proposed Sending Matter to the Commission.

That decision was arrived at today at noon, when a conference between No. 1 committee and the London Street Railway Company was held. There was not much debate on the question, especially when the company, through their manager, stated what they wanted for the extension.

Mr. King declared that this extension was to apply until the city reached a population of 50,000. To convey what this means it will be necessary to explain that when the

The North End extension will be adjudicated upon by the Ontario

agreement between the city and company was made, the population was fixed at 39,000, and for every 2,000 population thereafter the city was entitled to a mile of track. When the Ridout street line was built, the population was named at 43,000. Thus, if the population of the city was fixed at 50,000, by a census, the people would be entitled to three miles more of track.

Religious Matters. Washington, D. C., June 13.-That 'complete church emulation" is a good thing, and that there should be in this country "no invidious distinctions in elections because of religious beliefs," were the keynotes of the address made last night by President Taft before the Congress of Roman Catholic Missionaries, now in session in this city.

After being introduced by Father Doyle, who referred to the President. quoting another, as the "great harmonizer," Mr. Taft was greeted with an outburst of applause.

He spoke principally of the work of settling in the Philippines the difficulties caused by the close relationship there of church and government. He expressed the opinion that in the end the church would be strengthened by the change there, "as freedom and toleration and the complete separation of church and state have strengthened the church in this coun-

He said that there is now no question to be settled in the Philippines concerning the relation of church and government. He said further, "It is a good thing for the Roman Catholic Church that there are other denominations in the Philippines, and that complete church emulation, competition if I may use that term, is a good thing in religion, as well as in other things in life."

Value of Milk Pasteurization Shown in Official British Report.

London, June 12 .- Convincing testimony as to the value of milk pasteurization, as advocated by Nathan Straus, is contained in a Blue Book issued yesterday.

The death rate for children under has been reduced from 67.8 per 1,000 in 1857 to 40.9 per 1,000 in 1907. This decline is attributed to the administration measures and the greater attention given to the supply of milk In ten towns depots have been opened for the supply of pasteurized milk for infants. Of all European countries only Holland has a lower rate of infant mortality than Britain.

This Blue Book has been prepared under the instructions of John Burns. president of the local government board, as a response to the charges formulated in a report of the poor law commission of inquiry issued last February, and is designed to show the general improvement in the health and social conditions of the British people






