# WAR-ELIGIBLE MALES HELD AT NIAGARA AND WINDSOR A RIGID EXAMINATION Rio Cable Declares Neutrality

Canadians Employed in Detroit Detained at Ferry as the Authorities Guard Against Attempts To Avoid Conscription-Great Confusion at Falls.

Detroit, Mich., May 25 .- Thousands of persons attempting to come to Detroit from Windsor, Ont., this forenoon, were detained at the ferry station by Canadian officials, who began a rigid enforcement of the dominion's military laws. No person of military age was allowed to board a ferry until he had convinced the officials that he was not seeking to avoid conscription.

Every person passing through the ferry gates was questioned, and great congestion resulted. Most of the Windsor residents who are employed in Detroit were detained at least an hour at the station on account of the crush.

Explosion Killed Many.

Accounts of the rescue work differs. Some say all who survived the explosion were saved, and an older account claims that owing to the lumpy sea and the dangerous position of the steamer a party of about one hundred and fifty soldiers could not be rescued. All accounts indicate that the great bulk of the casualties was due to the explosion of the torpedoes and that none of the nurses were lost. The ship sank fifty minutes after the second torpedo struck her, and the survivors were landed at a port where they were given a great reception. Captain Breuell, who jumped into the sea when the decks of the ship were awash, was picked up in an exhausted condition and died in a hospital ashore.

One of the nurses says the lifeboat in which she embarked was much overcrowded, and notwithstanding constant balling, was soon full of water owing to the rough sea. She was washed overboard, but swam back. The occupants of the boat were rescued by a destroyer after two hours at sea. None of the men swan ashore.

### **NAVY OF BRAZIL** MAY POLICE ALL SOUTH ATLANTIC

Decision Will Be Revoked.

Rio Janeiro, May 25.—According to the Jornal do Commercio, it was de-cided at a meeting of the Parliamentary and diplomatic commissions called yes-terday by the foreign minister to adopt the principle of revocation of Brazil's neutrality in the war between the Unit-ed States and Germany and to police the South Atlantic with the Brazilian fleet.

RIGID EXAMINATION.

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 25.—Local immigration officials are interpreting very strictly the order-in-council issued at Ottawa yesterday referring to passports out of Canada to males between 18 and 45. In the case of those living in Canada but working on the other side of the line, interim cards have been supplied stating age, place of business, etc. At the end of a week new cards will have to be procured bearing photographs of the holders and duplicate photographs must be deposited at each of the international bridges. Those not known by the immigration officials to have business across the river, have been turned back sharply and no pretext has availed to secure passage across the bridge.

"Get back where you belong," said an official at the steel arch bridge to one young fellow who said he was going for medicine. "You can get all the medicine you want in Canada."

To another claiming to be an American citizen desiring to register in Buffalo before June 5, he said, "You've been in Canada since New Years Day. You'll have to prove your American citizenship." The officials at the American end of the bridges are co-operating to the limit. 

### THE WAR SITUATION

A TIMELY OFFENSIVE. The Italian blow is struck at a time when political conditions in Austria-Hungary have reached an acute phase. The resignation of Count Tisza, "Iron Man" of the Dual Monarchy and staunch pillar of Pan-Germanism and Junkerdom, comes on the eve of the assembling of the Austrian parliament, a step bitter-ly fought by the bureaucrats since the outbreak of the war, and as bitterly contended for by the democratic leaders. The two events give decided color to the numerous reports that Emperor Charles has democratic leanings, and is consequently opposed to the Junker ring in Berlin. SIGNIFICANT.

A further and highly significant Indication of the Austrian emperor's position tells in the report that he has summoned Counts Apponyl and Jules Andrassy to an audience. Both men have been conspicuous for years as leaders of the Liberal element in the empire and have been consistent opponents of Count Tisza. Count Apponyl has delivered numerous lectures abroad and Count Andrassy is credited with having a warm admiration for England and English institutions. He has for many years advocated universal suffrage for Austria-Hungary, and is also the father of a scheme for a world

At the present time in the Canadian Parliament a proposal is up for consideration and may become law, whereby a retail merchant may not be refused goods by a manufacturer or jobber because he sells at a price other than the price fixed by the seller.

The assets in-clude current coin held by the bank amounting to \$1,621.742.57, and Dominion Government notes to the value of \$9,885,832. One million dollars is deposited in the central gold reserves.

The balance at credit of profit and loss account carried forward from last year was \$1,089,656.29, and the net profits for the year amounted to \$1,122.-818.67. During the year a further sub-scription of \$25,000 was made to the Canadian patriotic fund. The bank now has 128 branches in all

letter to Our Consumers' League Department. Here! here! Jane, we (meaning the editor of this department), heartily second the motion, regardless of what the city council, the public and our best friends and associates may say.

We have seen daylight saving work out, and work out successfully. entirely agree that it is a "wicked waste" if we don't have daylight saving, considering not only all the gardening that could be done in the saved daylight

hours, but many other things as well.

The reason alleged for daylight saving being abandoned in London after brief trial last year was the difficulty experienced in neighborly relations with surrounding towns, owing to the difference in time, because the latter stood by the sun and their hefty principles, and refused to join in the march of progress. In view of the fact that Jane has so recently raised the question, it is interesting to note that one of the resolutions to be submitted to the meeting of the National Council of Women in Winnipeg the beginning of June is as follows: Resolved, That this meeting approves of daylight saving and desires that it

be adopted throughout Canada."

It is even more interesting to take into consideration that this radical measure is advocated, not by a harum-scarum, scatter-brained wild west organization, but by the sedate, conservative women of the Dominion capital, and no less, the

Local Council of Women of Ottawa.

Nation-wide daylight saving would do away with the awkwardness about catching a train an hour too early, or the difficulty of arriving in the house of a friend in a neighboring town for dinner a good half hour before starting. There is no question, daylight saving is along the lines of the modern thrift novement. What finer than to conserve as far as possible the benefits of the light of day and blessed sunshine?

Think of the saving in household and city illumination! Niagara wouldn't so small-minded as to stop falling even if distributing companies did do a bit of objecting. Private electrical companies would soon make up for any loss through the growing vogue of electric cooking, and the same is equally true of sas companies.

No person could expect the sun to object to a couple of extra hours daily of tribute from his subjects. The success of daylight saving would depend upon the extent of its adoption in a thickly-populated section of the country such as Western Ontario, and the readiness of the population to adjust itself gracefully to the change.

The trouble with a lot of people a year ago was that they didn't understand it, wouldn't make an effort to learn to understand it, refused to recognize its merits, and insisted upon regarding themselves as personally grieved and dislocated. For one thing, they never got enough sleep. They couldn't bring them-selves to go to bed so soon after the fall of the dark. They kept one clock in the house going at the old time in order to remind them how injured they were when they had to get up an hour earlier in the morning than had been their custom. They refused to find the day fresher, dewier and sweeter, also younger than they had been in the habit of knowing it. One strange case was that the woman who got her vitality telescoped. She knew it was a scientific fact that her vitality should be at lowest ebb at a certain hour during the night. Her vitality worked according to schedule and sun time, and the hands of the clock moved an hour ahead of the ordained movement of the earth on its axis. What could be expected but dire confusion?

There were other people who lived in perpetual gloom, notwithstanding the lengthened daylight hours. Indeed, that was the very cause of their dark forebodings. They regarded daylight saving as flying in the face of Providence. They expected the sun to break out in spots. It gave them immense satisfaction to say, "I told you so," in the midst of the inferno heat which succeeded London's little high dive into daylight saving.

Again, we second Jane's motion for daylight saving! We trust the Ottawa Local Council of Women will get a good hearing and big backing at the National Council for daylight saving. We trust that the powers that be will sit up and take notice of their fellow provincial voters, and make daylight saving province wide, if not Dominion-wide. The writer isn't afraid to gamble that such a meas ure would carry like magic in some other provinces, no names mention

So far as getting oneself accustomed to it would be concerned, a tendence to resent change, even for the better, is generally regarded as an indication of advancing age. Age and "sottness in one's ways" may be purely mental. In any case nobody likes to be accused of getting old, whether it is the truth or not. Nation-wide daylight saving would simply mean setting the clock on an hour before going to bed some night—then proceeding to forget all about it. #### THE TECHNIC OF FEEDING A FAMILY.

Never in all their lives before have so many Western Ontario people given thought and attention to food values and the science of feeding. True, they took it into serious consideration where live stock was concerned. They rationed their horses and their cows, and sometimes the chickens. Of recent years has ever been exercised along this line in regard to supplying the needs of the baby. "Balancing meals" was left largely to domestic science lecturers and health faddists. Now, it has become a downright economic necessity to take a practical interest in comparative food values. Supply and demand, so far as the average housekeeper is concerned, make it imperative that the best food value be obtained for the money available to spend. Otherwise, some bodies

are going to go under-nourished. All kinds of popular superstitions in regard to what constitutes good nourishment have been exploded for many housewives in the past year or so in the new light on the subject, which has come to them through research in bulletins, through lectures and articles from experts appearing in magazines and the press. The success with which "rationing the army" has met, so far as the health of the men is concerned, has proved in itself a valuable object lesson.

Excepting as a war emergency, rationing as an every-day custom has fea-

tures which do not entirely commend it to polite human society. In the first place, it makes eating too much a mere business. It robs of the pleasant surprise element, and is not conducive to social atmosphere at meal times. Too obvious attention to the balance of diet, and the amount of food value represented in a meal is by no means stimulating to the appetite. (Which is possibly a reason for trotting it out when all commodities are so high in price.) The house-keeper's knowledge of food values and practical demonstration of the principles of good feeding should be like the musician's technic, a framework for an artistic achievement, not something to rattle its bones like the skeleton at the feast. Nobody is going to enjoy a delectable-looking, smelling, and tasting, piping hot dish any the better for being conscientiously and virtuously told as soon as the lid is off, "Now, I hope you are going to like this. No, it isn't scalloped potatoes. I just had two potatoes and a little bit of macaroni and cheese left from last night, so I mixed them up with the bread crumbs that I have been collecting from the bread board, and I poured skim milk over it, put in just a pinch of butter and thickened it with a little flour and water. Cream? I should say not. This is war-time. Tommy, if I hadn't told you about the macaroni and cheese you would never have noticed, and would have liked it just as well as scalloped

tatoes. You can eat it perfectly well. It is good for you."

The Tired Munitions Maker is proud of the genius of her sister for contriving delectable dishes out of mere trifles, but it doesn't add to her appetite when she sits down at the close of the day to an edifying dinner to be assured. "That meat pie is made of scraps. It is wonderful the things you can think up to do with left-overs when once you get started trying to be thrifty. A year ago I would probably have put practically everything that meat pie contains in the garbage can. Now, I can make it serve for a whole meal for four grown-up people." Big sister means well, but she isn't tactful. ### THOSE SUBSTITUTES.

Substitutes are enjoying an unprecedented popularity at the present time It formerly was the case that the most urgent thing an advertiser could say of his particular brand of goods was "Don't use substitutes." This still largely applies in many lines. There are others in which the subtitute is hailed with delight, because it is more easy to obtain, nearer within the bounds of the delight, because it is more easy to cotain, nearer within the bounds of the family purse-strings, and affords much greater value for money expended.

Who among conservative London housekeepers in years gone by used rice as a substitute for potatoes? Considering that a food expert of the Ontario Government gives the comparative food value of rice and potatoes as 62.8 for the former to 36.2 for the latter to every dollar expended, it is reasonable to be-lieve that the families which have substituted rice for potatoes have benefitted. Rice is higher in protein, fat, carbo-hydrate and fuel value than potatoes. worthy of note that the festive banana has a close relationship to the

potato, that once upon a time was indispensible to a satisfactory dinner. The composition of the banana and potato show much similarity, both as regards total carbohydrate and the amounts of the different mineral constituents. Yet not many people would voluntarily elect the banana a substitute for the potato. Nevertheless, in view of the fact that the banana fits in with present thrift practices, so far as price is concerned, and at the same time has a higher caloric value than any of our other common fruits, according to Dr. Victor C. Myers and Dr. Anton R. Rose, in an article appearing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, it is entitled to special attention.

While other foods have doubled and trebled in price in the past three years,

the banana has advanced about 25 per cent only, according to both local wholesale and retail fruit merchants. As prices go at the present time, bananas are inexpensive; they are nutri-

tious, and for the time being can successfully substitute in the dietary for certain scarce and high-priced articles of food, so far as their actual value is

### ITALIANS PLUNGE THROUGH AUSTRIANS: TAKE 9,000 CAPTIVE

Break Through Line to Head of Triest Gulf.

SURPRISE FOR THE ENEMY

British Guns Aid in Tremendous Sudden Blow on the Carso Plateau.

London, May 24.-Italian force pesterday broke through the Austro-Hungarian lines from Castagnavizza to

the sea, taking more than 9,000 prisoners, says the official statement issued today by the Italian war office.

From the statement it is noted that on a front of nearly ten miles on the Carso pleateau the Italian trace here. Carso pleateau the Italian troops have smashed the Austrian line hard and taken various positions from the town of Castagnavizza to the head of the Gulf of Triest. In their renewal of their offensive Gen. Cadorna's forces received valuable aid from some of the nine British batteries which have hauled their big guns down to the Isonzo front to help in the efforts aimed at the conquest of Triest, Austria's big seaport on the Adriatic.

9,000 Prisoners; 300 Officers. Not alone were the Italians success ful in capturing numerous points of vantage, but more than 9.000 Austrian prisoners, including officers in excess of 300 were taken.

The Austrians are declared to have been taken completely by surprise by the sudden onslaught of the Italians, who, to divert attention from the southern end of the Isonzo line, had struck a hard blow to the north. When however, the Austrians recovered from their surprise, they launched heavy counter-attacks, but the Italians ten-aciously held the ground they had won.

Appreciably Nearer Triest. The new advance of the Italians brings them appreciably nearer Triest, which from the lower part of the line, is less than ten miles away. The ground traversed and yet to be passed over is difficult for military operations, and even with other successful advances such as the last one the objective of the Italians will not be attained except by fighting of a most ferocious






