THE STORAGE OF ICE FOR SUMMER USE. [Farm and Ranch Review.]

The storage of a few blocks of ice for summer use is a very simple matter where the ice is readily available. Any unoccupied corner of a shed will feet square and eight feet high will hold enough ice to provide 50 pounds per day for 130 days, after allowing for a reasonable amount of wastage. The smaller the quantity stored the larger is the pro-

portion of waste. The bottom of the inclosure should be covered there is a few inches of gravel under the sawdust. from one side and replaced after the ice is in position. A space of one foot should be left between the ice and the boards to be filled with sawdust, and the ice should be covered with about the same thickness. It is the sawdust which keeps the ice from melting. The drier the sawdust is the better the ice will keep, and it is a good plan, as the ice is removed during the summer, to throw out from time to time the driest of the sawdust where t will be under cover and continue to dry out and thus be in better condition to be used again the following year. The ice should be cut in blocks of uniform size and packed as closely together as

If it is necessary to erect a special icehouse, the roughest kind of a shed that will keep out the weather is all that is necessary. Poles may driven into the ground and lined up on the inside with rough lumber or slabs, leaving a space of about one-half inch between each board, and the whole covered with a roof to keep out the rain. Of course, the icehouse may be built with a regular frame, lined inside with rough lumber, and, if a finished appearance is desired. It can be covered on the outside with clap-boards or other siding. There should be plenty of ventilation above the ice. The same procedure should be followed in storing the ice and covering it with sawdust as advised in the preceding paragraph.

If sawdust cannot be obtained, planing mill shavings may be used for packing the ice, or in cases where neither is available. hay may be used as a packing or covering material. Marsh or "slough" hav or any fine wild hay which grows in low places give the best results. If

NEW YORK'S INCOME TAX. [Cleveland Plaindealer.]

New York is one of the states recently to adopt personal income taxation, and statements are now being filed to cover incomes for 1919, for which year it first became effective. The amount of revenue to be collected is not known, but it is hoped that returns may total approximately \$20,000,000 to offset the loss of liquor license payments and make up for greater governmental expenses.

This tax must be paid by individuals, estates and trusts. In most respects the provisions and general theory are in accord with the federal income tax law, although rates are much lower and no surtaxes are imposed. Incomes which are exempt from this taxation include interest upon obligations of the United States or its possessions, farm loan securities, bonds issued by the war finance corporation, and obligations of the State of New York or of any municipal or political subdivision of that state Exemptions also are allowed individuals for \$1.000 if unmarried \$2.000 if married and living with hus band or wife, and \$200 for each dependent who under 18 years of age. or who is incapacitated be cause of physical or mental condition to provide for his own support. But this latter exemption is not permissible unless the taxpayers are residents of

Non-residents must pay a tax on entire net incomes received from sources within the state. The rates are 1 per cent on the first \$10,000 of taxable net income. 2 per cent on the next \$40,000 up to and including \$50,000, ond 3 per cent on all sums in excess of \$50,000.

Dividends are taxable for the year in which they are made payable, and taxes must be paid on Liberty bonds and stock dividends, based on the market prices of such securities at the times they are made payable.

A few drops of some neutral or bland oil should be used on the face after shaving, and before shaving to remder the beard softer, and preserve the razior's edge. Any oil will do—cocoa butter, oilve oil, sweet almond oil (sweet oil), liquid petrolatum or soft petrolatum (vaseline), or freshly made cold





He had to be assisted off the ice and Gorbeau was given by Referee Marsh a fifteenminute penalty and a fine of \$15."

"Corbeau's victims in the Ottawa camp are now numerous. He gave Jack Darragh a wicked blow in the play-off last year and put Frank Nighbor out of the game which Ottawa played at Montreal on the first half of the schedule. Frank Nighbor and others of the Ottawa party said that Corbeau, for his cowardly attack on Broadbent ought to be expelled from the National Hockey League.

LLOYD GEORGE'S OPINION.



M. P. FOR EAST ELGIN, **DIES IN VANCOUVER POINT OF CONTINUITY**

Frost King Has Reigned Ten Was For Many Years Presi-Comparatively Little Response

NO LACK OF VARIETY

All Kinds of Winter Weather Provided Except the Rainy Kind.

With a return yesterday to zero temperature and blizzard conditions, which. after the comparative warmth of the past few days made citizens think that at the zero mark, many people were heard to remark that the bear was wise when, scared by his own shadow, he decided on February 2 to return to his winter quarters. For practically ten weeks, according

official figures of the weather ureau, the temperature in London has not gone above the freezing point more than two or three degrees, but has most of the time hovered around zero. Winter set in in earnest during the first week in December, with a slight easing of temperature during the sec-ond week. In the third week, how-ever, king Frost took absolute con-trol of weather congitions, and during the nine weeks ending yesterday the cutizens of London have experienced amost every known form of winter weather. During that period no less than 64% inches of snow has taken, according to official records; 22½ inches in December, 30½ inches in January, and 11½ inches in rebruary up to 8 p.m. Sunday night.

The lowest temperature recorded by the official thermometer during the same period was 16 below on January ary 25.

while the low temperature figure shown is not a record for London, the long, steady spell of winter without a perceptible break and without a perceptible break and without a rainial is said to be a record so far as authoritative reports are available. To the farmers the heavy fall of snow and its long-continued stay is a portent of big crops during the coming summer. Especially hopeful is the outlook for fall wheat, which got a spienoid growing start in the fall of 1919, and which has been kept in splendid condition during the sevelity of winter by the white blanket of snow.

To the city dweller the long-lasting spell of winter is not quite so welcome, and at least the older portion of the population would see it pass into the discard. Together with this desire goes the dread that any sudden or rapid return to a temperature above 32 degrees and the quick melting of the gleat mass of snow and ice will result in flood conditions, especially in West London.

In the 36 hours from 8 a.m. Saturday to 8 p.m. Sunday the temperature dropped 33 degrees. The official figures were: Saturday, 33 high, 20 low; Sunday, 21 high, zero low.
