# BRODEUR SPEAKS

New Minister Outlines Government's Fiscal Policy.

#### SOME CHANGES WILL BE MADE

Montreal, Feb. 1. - In his speech at Marieville Saturday, touching upon the fiscal question. Mr. Brodeur made some important declarations. He blamed the Conservatives for drawing the tariff into politics, and congratulated the Association of Canadian Manufacturers for taking it out and making it a purely business question, to be dealt with, not from a party standpoint or bias, but from a broad view and honest consideration of the needs and interests of all clases and of the Canadian people. As to those who are repeating that our national industries of the stolen goods. are in danger under the present Government, the only answer to make was that never before in the history of this country had our manufacturers been CHICAGO SUED more prosperous and more numerous. Never before had they done such a large and increasing business. Our rade figures were nothing less than marvelous. Following the revolution, the friends of British connection in the United States left their homes, and, upheld by the spirit of self-sacrificing patriotism, came to the wilds of Canada, where the old flag waved over the territory newly-captured from France. The Bourbons of English officialdom thought to continue with the new colony the foolish policy which had alienated forever the older provinces. But wiser counsels prevailed; and a measure of responsible government was granted.

Even this was far from complete: and with the growth of Canada there was a continual enlargement of her powers of government. But it was not until after confederation, and largely through the efforts of the Hon. Edward Blake, that the last relic of dependency in local matters disappeared, and the Governor-General was instructed no longer to consider himself as the special guardian of British interests, responsible to the crown alone. but rather to take in Canada the place the sovereign filled in England, and to act solely on the advice of his own

In questions of a more imperial character, however, it has appeared very difficult for the authorities at home to recognize the importance of colonial interests either to the colony or to the empire. In making treaties with foreign nations, the first consideration with the Imperial Government has been the peaceful settlement of any disputes; and if the matter in question affected only the colony a policy of surrender was always the easiest way out of the difficulty. The British voter was not called on to make any appreciable sacrifice; and the British Gov ernment lost no prestige at home. Every treaty with the United States would serve to illustrate this fact.

It is true that after confederation, some deference was nominally shown to Canadian sentiment, as in the negotiations leading to the treaty of Washington, when the Government at Ottawa was consulted, and Sir John Macdonald appointed one of the British commissioners. But one has only to read Mr. Pope's biography of Sir John to see how the Canadian representative on the commission was not only hampered but ignored; how indifferent his colleagues were to Canadian interests; and how ready to sacrifice those interests at the demand of the United





Lewis, 90 St. George street, Toronto,' and wrote at the bottom, "This is my address." As he was placing this envelope in his pocket the deadly effect of the poison which he had swallowed in the whisky, and which is supposed to have been either strychnine or cyanide of potassium, began to show itself. His body stretched out rigidly and his face became deathly pale. As the body convulsed as he slipped from the chair, low murmurs of "Oh, oh,"

Medical aid was at once summoned. but the deadly power had done its work. Within fifteen minutes death relieved him of his sufferings. Coroner Dr. Kellam took charge of his remains, and does not deem it necessary to hold an inquest, as every evidence shows deliberately planned suicide. It is said Mr. Lewis of late has had fits of melancholy which unbalanced his mind, causing him to end his life so tragically.

Toronto, Feb. 1. — The sudden death under conditions indicating suicide, of George W. Lewis at a Niagara Falls hotel, is the sequel of the mysterious disappearance of the well-known gentleman reported to the Toronto detecives on Thursday. The police believe

that his reading of the suicide of Whitaker Wright gave him an idea of how to take his life rapidly. At the Lewis residence the only cause that could be assigned for the tragic occurrence was religious matter. It is said that for some time past Mr. Lewis has shown indications of having become deeply absorbed in devotional exercises to a too great degree. He was an Anglican, but was not a church member, attending St. James Cathedral and other Episcopalian churches in
