

For fifteen minutes before the Speaker's entry Mr. Ross held an informal levee, the members of the House crowding around to welcome him and tender congratulations on his improved health. 
Presbytery Refuses to Sanction Separate Church at Lawrence Station.

It grew out of a strike of the garment workers employed by Montgomery, Ward & Co., a very large concern. The company's teamsters struck in sympathy, and then the union teamsters employed by the express companies refused to serve the firm. The express companies hired non-union teamsters, whereupon all their union teamsters some 3,500 in number, struck. The members of the Employers' Associaion, who have plenty of money, and are standing together, are importing carloads of strike-breakers, and announce that these will be armed with rifles which will be carried in the open. The employers are also taking the aggressive by demanding that the big transfer and teaming companies shall deliver merchandise to the boycotted firms in the association under penalty of permanently losing the business of these firms. The drivers and teamsters of many large establishments are leaving work, thus interfering with the city delivery of goods of all kinds. The area of the strike may







Park Commissioner Pearce writes The Advertiser as follows regarding the planting of spruce and other hedges on streets and boulevards: "I have to again warn the eitizens



Ontario Educationalists Ask Assistance for Higher Education Here.

Possibly the matter of the greatest interest dealt with at the meeting of the board of education yesterday afernoon was contained in a report of he Ontario Educational Association, which met in Toronto recently. The sessions were attended by Chairman Yeates and Trustee Fitzgerald, of the London board, and yesterday the latter submitted a review of the proceedings. Trustee Fitzgerald stated at the outset that the sessions were not as interesting as those of a year ago, con-sequently the benefit to be derived would not be as great. questions considered was the eye and ear test, brought forward by the representative of the Ottawa board. There were very many pupils who were at a disadvantage on account of defective sight or hearing, and the suggestion was made that pupils should he tested as to their hearing and sight, and if any defects are found, given positions in the room where they could best hear and see. Then the question of school and state was discussed by Mr. J. S. Willison, who said: "There seems to be a feeling that

there should be more assistance from the state to higher education. the only university in the Province that receives any assistance from the Province, and I believe the time has come when the Province generally should have better accommodation and more assistance in this respect. Queen's University, at Kingston, would be able to look well after the eastern portion of the Province, and I 900 students, in a city of 18,000 inhabitants; and, therefore, the conclusion seems to be that the garden of this Province, Western Ontario, should be looked after as well. There is no reason why our university in this city should not be placed on a level with the others in the Province, and should receive such assistance that will enable it to compete with others, and enable it to have professors who are capable of looking after every branch in modern education in this Province, and I would, therefore, urge that any assistance that this board can give in this respect should be given, as it will not only be a great boon to those who desire to take advantage of such education in this city and in Western Ontario, but it will also be a great advantage to the city of London to have a university capable of accommodating, say, a thousand students.
