From Wolfville I received four work-bags, theatre bag, powder case, knitting bag, crocheted case, embroidered baby jacket, vanity bag, half dozen handkerchiefs, tatted lace handkerchief, half dozen knitted face cloths, knitted lace yoke, knitted needle shields, 2 knitted dollies, breakfast cap, sewing apron, charming dish apron, knitted baby jacket, 2 guest towels, lace doily and many other things kindly collected by Miss Marguerite deWitt.

Everything that was forwarded from N. S. and N. B. to London was beautiful and should make the Canadian stall very attractive. My grateful thanks to everyone that contributed to Mrs. A. A Change of Front.

The German Chancellor has declared the willingness of Germany to enter a world union for compelling peace. This is a complete change of front. When the German war-lords believed they could impose their wishes upon the world by force of arms, they had no use whatever for peace compelling leagues. They scorned all suggestions of disarmament. They even a halt in the armament program. They were determined to dominate the world, and peace was to be for the rest of the nations the peace of submission.

Having now discovered that they cannot dominate the world, and that they are daily getting nearer to defeat, they discover that they really do not want Belgium, and that a league of nations to compel peace is desirable.

It is to be regretted that the Chancellor has not yet reached that frame of mind which would compel him to tell the truth about the cause of the present war, but that is perhaps too much to expect. It has cost the world millions of lives to convince Germany that she should not have brought on this war, and if a league of peace is ever formed the signatories will have full knowledge of the facts that Germany respects a treaty or a pledge only so long as it may seem to be to her interest to do so.

Liquid Fire as a Weapon.

'Liquid fire as a weapon' forms the theme of an interesting article in the 'War Budget.' The diabolical contrivance is thus described:—

In the earliest models the combustible liquid was propelled by a gas-condenser out of a portable or fixed reservoir, and was ignited by some automatic device as it escaped from the nozzle of the projecting instrument.

Later a double-barrelled liquid-gun was devised, having the upper barrel much smaller than the lower, and pivoted so as to turn independently. The fluid is shot from the two barrels simultaneously, but only that from the upper one ignites automatically.

The Fur Trade.

MILLIONS WILL BE PAID TO TRAPPERS AND FOR SHIPPERS THIS WINTER. Furs are extremely fashionable and a woman's wardrobe is not complete without one or more sets of furs. Even in mild climates, there are larger quantities of fur overcoats being sold to gentlemen.

The present prices of American raw furs as compared with the prices of a few years ago, make pleasant reading for the old trapper and fur collector, but to the tenderfoot in the Fur Game it seems like an impossible story and if the 'old timers' didn't know the facts to be true, they would say 'Till it to the marines.'

Why it was only a few years ago that one could buy all the Muskrat in Eastern Canada at 6c. apiece, and they sold as low as 4c. Winters are spring collections last season brought 40c to 50c. The entire collection of Northwestern Skunk could be bought at \$1.00 to \$1.50 for a large prime Buck. Now they sell at \$3.00 to \$6.00. The best Lynx sold at C. M. Lompton & Co's sale in London, Eng. and at \$3.50. Last season \$2.00 to \$3.00 was paid for them. Marten that are now worth \$6.00 sold for \$2.00. The best dark Poser that North America ever produced could be bought for \$10.00 for last season \$50.00 was paid for the dark skins. The best collection of Red Fox was sold for \$2.00 average today the same collection of Red Fox would bring \$8.00 to \$10.00.

White Weasel we paid nothing for because there was no market for them. Today they bring 75c. to \$1.00. One could buy the best of the 6th produced at \$5.00 to \$6.00. Today we pay \$20.00 to \$30.00 inland caught skins. Would you think it possible to buy the best Silver Fox that was ever trapped for \$95.00? That was the price. It takes a small fortune to buy it now.

Mrs. Archibald's Helpers.

On November 6th, through the courtesy of the Red Cross Society, of Halifax, there were shipped to Miss Annie Strong, Matron No. 2 Canadian Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, France, twenty-two boxes containing in all 425 jars of preserved fruits, put up by Mrs. Rachel de Wolfe Archibald, of this town.

Since August 21st, when her shipment of 312 jars went overseas to the same hospital, Mrs. Archibald has been receiving small gifts of fruit and money to defray the expense of equipment for shipping etc., from friends interested in her work.

She has also received from the Wolfville Red Cross Society, 100 pounds of sugar and one gross of jars; from the Red Cross Society of Acadia Ladies' Seminary, one barrel of sugar; and from the Provincial branch in Halifax, two barrels of sugar, four gross of jars and funds to defray incidental expenses.

Many of the mothers of the boys who have gratefully acknowledged receipt of preserves—the first that they have tasted, to quote from their letters—have sent in encouraging letters and small contributions.

Recently Miss Strong wrote to Mrs. Archibald in anticipation of the fruit: "We have so many Canadians and they love it so."

Mrs. Archibald acknowledges with gratitude the help and encouragement she has received in the work she is doing. She is now putting up grape juice which was last year so welcome in the Penmonia wards, and quince and apple jelly. She expects to send another shipment soon and to continue the work during the winter months. Contributions, therefore, towards this work will be gladly received and put to the best possible use.

Mrs. Archibald wishes that she could, in this way, reach more of our wounded Canadian boys who are longing for a taste of things such as mother used to make. The hundreds of heartfelt letters she received from the recipients of her gift of 600 jars last year are her inspiration to go on with this work. And those who read the excerpts from these letters published last year in THE ACADIAN, will understand.

A glimmer of light in the overhanging darkness, is the stand taken by our loyal, patriotic, and consecrated women of the W. C. T. U. sisterhood, who because of their mother-love for the soldier boys who have gone out from their own and other homes, have risen to protest against the injury inflicted upon them by the wholesale administration of tobacco poison—a great and grave wrong by whomsoever perpetrated.

Our Canadian citizenship ought to know something of the damaging effects of tobacco fit its various forms upon the human heart, nerve and brain. Surely the women at least know, if they would stop to consider, that whether in Canada or "Some-where in France," the beneficial results of its use are the same.

According to reports that come to us, it is smoke, smoke, always and everywhere, wherever the soldiers are, in the trenches, in the tents, and worst of all, in the hospitals. Pity the soldier!

A returned soldier, speaking in Toronto, is reported to have said, "Ninety-eight per cent. of the men in the trenches smoke, the other two per cent. will."

Presumably they have to do it in self-defence, as the abominable stuff begets them on every hand. Will it be possible for any mother's son to escape its contamination, no matter what his up-bringing may have been? We have to face the appalling fact, however unwilling we may be to do so, that the poor fellows have not much chance, with gas poison hurled upon them from the enemy's side and tobacco poison thrust upon them from the side of their mistakes friends—

fusillades of poison, both alike deadly in their effects.

Among the much to be dreaded aftermath of this heart-breaking war, we may be morally sure, that not the least, will be the mental and physical wreckage that will come back in the place of the pure, strong, virile, intelligent young men who went out from us. And we may be just as sure that one large factor in it will be this stupendous folly that seems to have taken possession of our people.

Temperance.

A TERTOTAL LORD MAYOR.

For the first time in its 700 years' history the City Corporation of the British metropolis is to have a teetotal Lord Mayor next year. "Yes there never was another," said Sir Vezezy Strong, the gentleman who will break the ancient record, when, in due course, he succeeds to the Lord Mayorial dignity. Speaking prior to the voting, the distinguished candidate said: "It's a bold departure—if it should happen. For you must not forget that I am merely a candidate for the office. There are probably five or six other candidates, and the choice rests absolutely with the Livery of the City—which numbers no fewer than 8,000 voters—to say which of the candidates shall be elected to this ancient office."

"The Corporation's views on Sir Vezezy's temperance opinions remained," he said, "to be seen. I have always felt in the City of London that the greatest toleration is shown in these matters," remarked Sir Vezezy, "and I have confidence in believing that the practice I have pursued for so many years, and intend to pursue for the rest of my life, will make no difference whatever to their undoubted right of selection for the post of Lord Mayor."

"And how do you drink the King's health?" was asked by a press representative. The coming Lord Mayor replied: "In such innocent liquids as happen to be at hand. King Edward expressly authorized, through an official communication, the drinking of his health in any non-intoxicating liquid; and King George V., very early in his reign, gave his permission to follow the practice."

It will be a source of satisfaction to temperance workers in Great Britain and elsewhere that Sir Vezezy duly secured the majority at the election. When inaugurated in office he will be a distinguished and steadfast advocate of the teetotal principle.

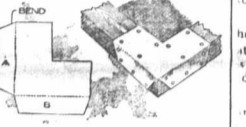

THE OLDEST FLAG

If the question was asked which country's national flag has been long set in time, the answer would be either the dragon banner of China or the chrysanthemum flag of Japan. The former has been used from a very early period, and the latter is as old as the present dynasty in Japan, which is the most ancient in the world. Amongst European national flags that of Denmark, a white St. George's cross on a red ground, is the most ancient, having been in use since 1219. No other flag has existed without change for anything like the same period as a national emblem although there are Royal Standard flags that are older. The Spanish color date only from 1785, and the British flag, in its present form, was first flown after the union with Ireland in 1801. The Stars and Stripes of the United States is older than Britain's for it was first planned and ordered by Washington of an upholsterer in Philadelphia, and formally adopted on June 14th, 1777.

Repairing Window Screens



An old broken fly-screen frame was made quite rigid with the use of metal braces, cut as shown and fastened with nails to each corner. The brace was cut from sheet metal, and the edges a and b were cut and bent at right angles to the main part, with their extreme edges bent over the frame. These were sufficient to make the frame as rigid as a new one.—From Popular Mechanics.

THRIFT MEANS DETAILS

Canada Needs New Quality, if She Becomes Great

A writer in the Canadian Tatler says: "What is thrift? To my mind, thrift to Canada today is the same as thrift to the Americans at the present moment. It is an essential factor in our national life. The Government has recognized this principle, by carrying on an extensive campaign with the idea of educating Canadians. Good as the educational campaign along this line has been it has lacked the first essentials that make for success. Thrift begins with the little things in the daily routine of our living."

The late Sir William Van Horn, that great Canadian with the same ideas of life, who told an interviewer that "success in life means spending one dollar, if you only earn two dollars." With this as the fundamental idea must we begin to instill thrift into Canadians as a people. Canada may be likened to the young man who has down his suit and coat and a young nation Canada has "had its fling." It is just about time we Canadians decided to settle down if we are to become great in a world sense. With a same plane of living established for our plain people, the foundation of the Dominion may be considered to have been constructed with strength.

Lost Liners Many

It seems incredible that a ship could utterly vanish, but that such an occurrence is possible is shown by the long list of liners that have been lost with all hands in the wide Atlantic. There was the President, with 136 souls on board, which utterly vanished in 1841; 480 passengers and crew, which disappeared without trace in 1842; and two years later the Pacific, which sailed from Liverpool with 240 aboard and was never more heard of. The Tempest, another big liner, vanished in 1859; the City of Boston, in 1870; the Haronian, in 1892; the Warwick in 1910, and of the fate that befell them the world has never yet gained tidings and probably never will.

Aviators as Fire Rangers

In Wisconsin the forest service established an aeroplane patrol. The State expert reports: "The efficiency of an aeroplane in spotting forest fires is without doubt as practicable as any use to which it could be put. I myself was very much surprised with that ease a fire could be spotted and located, and there is no question in my mind but what the aeroplanes will practically do away with some observation towers. The use of the aeroplane in the European war in the way of spotting and locating gun fire, armies of men, supply trains, etc., is well known, all of which objects show up comparatively small in comparison with forest fires."

"Judicially amongst Lancashire farmers against the national movement for employment of women on the land has almost entirely disappeared, says a correspondent."

10. That efficiency in manufacturing and other industries is impaired by alcohol, as is the power to compete with the makers of the world.—"Vanguard."
