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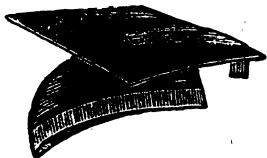
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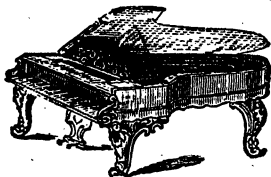

of the Government has been deemed necessary. PART I.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL AND STAFF.

*Governor General.**—His Excellency the Right Honorable John, Baron Lisgar, of Lisgar and Bailieborough, P.C., G.U.B., G.C.M.G. B. at Bombay, 31 August, 1807. Ed. at Eton, and Corpus Christi College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A., 1829. Called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn, 1834. M., 1835, Adelaide-Annabella, dau. of the late Marchioness of Headfort, by her first husband, Edward Tuite-Dalton, Esquire. Succeeded his father, the late Lieut. Col. Sir Wm. Young, as second baronet, 10 March, 1848. Created a Peer of the United Kingdom, 8 Oct., 1870, and a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of *Isabella la Catolica*, (of Spain), 1871. Is a magistrate and lord-lieutenant of the county of Cavan. Was formerly M.P. for Cavan in British House of Commons; and successively one of the junior Lords of the Treasury, from

1841 to 1844, and Joint Secy. of the Treasury from latter date to 1846, in Sir Robert Peel's Administration; Chief Secretary for Ireland, from 1852 to 1855, in Lord Aberdeen's Administration; Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands, from the latter date to 1859; and Governor of New South Wales from Jan., 1861, to Dec., 1867. Apptd. Administrator of the Government of Canada, 10 Nov., 1868, and Governor General of the Dominion, 29 Dec., same year. (Salary £10,000, *stg.*) *Bailieborough Castle, Cavan, Irel.; Rideau Hall, New Edinburgh, Ottawa; Eastern Block.*

Governor General's Secretary.—FRANCIS TURVILLE. Served as Governor's Secretary to Sir John Young in New South Wales. Apptd. to present office, 1 Dec., 1868. (Salary \$2,400.) *Rideau Hall; Eastern Block.*

Military Secretary.—Lieut.-Col. JOHN CARSTAIRS McNEILL, V.C., C.M.G., (unattached), S. of John McNeill, Esq., of Colonsay, by Hester, dau. of Duncan McNeill, Esq., of Dunmore; and nephew of the Rt. Hon. Lord Colonsay, late Lord Justice General of Scot., and of the Rt. Hon. Sir John McNeill, G.C.B., formerly envoy and minister plenipotentiary to the Court of Persia. Col. McNeill served in 107th and 48th Regts., was on the staff of Sir Edward Lugard

during the Indian mutiny (honorably mentioned in despatches), and A.D.O. to Sir Duncan Cameron in Zealand, where, in 1864, he received the Victoria Cross for very gallant conduct in saving the life of a private soldier when under heavy fire. Accompanied the expeditionary force sent to Red River under Col. (now Sir) Garnet Wolseley in 1870, and was created a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George for his services on that occasion. Was A.D.O. to Sir John Young from 1 Dec., 1868, until apptd. Military Secretary 2 July, 1869.—*Rideau Hall; Eastern Block.*

Aide-de-Camp.—Hon. WILLIAM ASHLEY W. PONSONBY, Lieut. P. O. O. Rifle Brigade. Apptd. 12 April, 1870.—*Rideau Hall; Eastern Block.*

Extra Aide-de-Camp.—Lieut. Col. HEWITT BERNARD, Major late Civil Service Rifle Volunteers. Entered Volunteer service as Lieut., Nov., 1855; apptd. Capt. 1857; Major, 1860; Deputy Judge Advocate General, 1860; Lieut. Col. (anatt.), 1865; extra Aide-de-Camp to Gov. Genl., Can., Jan., 1865; gazetted do. to Gov. Genl. of the Dominion Oct. 3, 1868; is Deputy of the Minister of Justice of the Dominion.—*Augusta St., Ottawa; Rideau Club, do; British Service Club, St. James', London, Eng.; Eastern Block.*

Extra Aide-de-Camp.—*Lieut.-Col. FREDERICK W. CUMBERLAND, C.E., M.P.*, late Colonel 10th "Royals" (Volunteers), Toronto. Apptd. Extra Aide-de-Camp to Gov. Gen., Can., Jan., 1865; gazetted do. to do. of Dominion 3 Oct., 1868.—*"Pendarvis," Toronto; Toronto Club.*

Declined the Secretaryship on his appt. as Managing Director of the Great Western of Can. in Jan., 1853. Apptd. Managing Director of the Grand Trunk Railway Sept., 1862. Apptd. an Intercolonial Railway Commissioner Dec., 1868. (*Salary \$3,000.*) Is Lt.-Col. Commandant of the Grand Trunk Railway Brigade of Militia Volunteers; Presdt. of the Quebec Rifle Association; Vice-Presdt. of the Dominion Rifle Association, and a director of the Mechanics Bank.—*Chandos House, Sherbrooke St., Montreal; St. James' Club; Stadacona Club; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.*

Chief Engineer of the Intercolonial Railway.—**SANDFORD FLEMING, C.E.** B. 1827. Was on the engineering staff of the Northern Railway of Can., from 1852 to 1863, during the greater portion of which time he was Chief Engineer of the Road. Was a delegate to Eng., 1863, as the bearer of a memorial from the people of Red River Settlement, praying for the opening up of such a line of road as would afford that settlement free access without being dependent on a foreign country. Apptd., same year, by the Govts. of Can., N.S. and N.B., and also by the

Imperial Govt., to conduct the preliminary survey for the Intercolonial Railway. Apptd. Chief Engineer for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, 1 Sept., 1868; and Engineer in Chief to carry on the Pacific Railway Surveys, 5 May, 1871. Is author of many printed reports on Railways and Public works. (*Salary \$4,800.*) *Corner of Daly and Chapel Sts., Ottawa; Pacific Railway Office, Parliament Square.*

Secretary to the Board.—RALPH JONES. Apptd. August, 1871. (*Salary \$2,600.*) *Eastern Block.*

Clerk of the Queen's Privy Council.—WILLIAM HENRY LEE. B. 26 June, 1799. Entered Govt. service as an extra clerk in Ex. Council Office, U.C., 28 May, 1821. Apptd. junior clk., 1828; senior or confidential clerk., 1831; acting clk., Ex. Council, 1839; asst. clk. Ex. Council, Can., 10 Feb., 1841; clk. of do., Nov., 1853; clk. Queen's Privy Council, 1 July, 1867; deputy-governor to sign money warrants, 1866; commissioner *didimus potestatem*, to sign warrants of commitment under 31 Vic., cap. 16, 1867; Commissioner to administer oath of allegiance

under Civil Service Act, 1868. Was clk. to Heir and Devisee Commission, U.C., from 1839 to 1853. (*Salary \$2,600.*) *Leeland Place, Gloucester St.; Eastern Block.*

Assistant Clerk of Queen's Privy Council.—**WILLIAM ALFRED HIMSWORTH.** B. 28 August, 1820. Served as clk. in Commissariat, 1838 to 1842. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1841; clk. in Legislative Assembly, Can., 1842-3; apptd. clerk in Ex. Council office, 1843; asst. clk. 1851; and sworn as asst. clk. of Queen's Privy Council, 2 July, 1867; was Secy. to the Confederate Council of Trade, which sat in Quebec, 1864. Is a deputy-governor for signing money-warrants; a commissioner to sign commitments under *Habeas Corpus* Suspension Act; and a commissioner per *didimus potestatem*. (*Salary \$2,050.*) *Daly St.; Eastern Block.*

Deputy of the Minister of Justice.—**HEWITT BERNARD.** B. 1820. A barrister-at-law. Apptd. Secy. to Attorney-Genl., U.C., 25 Feb., 1858; chief clk. Crown Law Dept., U.C., 5 March, 1859; was Secy. to Conference of Delegates on the subject of Confederation of B.N.A. Provinces, held in Quebec, 1 Oct., 1864, and also Secy. to Conference of Delegates on same subject held in London, Eng., Nov., 1866; apptd. deputy of the

Min. of Justice, 30 May, 1868. Is an extra Aide-de-Camp to the Gov.-Genl. (*Salary* \$2,600.) *Augusta St.; Eastern Block.*

Chairman of Penitentiary Directors.—TERENCE JOSEPH O'NEILL. B. 1806. Apptd. Inspector of Prisons and Asylums, Can., 1861; Director of Penitentiaries for Dominion, 1868; Chairman and Secretary of do., 1869. (*Salary* \$2,000.) *Wilbrod St.; Eastern Block.*

Penitentiary Director.—JAMES W. KING.—Sat for Hants in N.S. Assembly from 1864 until the Union: Apptd. to present office, Oct., 1869. (*Salary* \$2,000.) *Daly St.; Eastern Block.*

Penitentiary Director.—FRANCOIS XAVIER PRIEUR.—Was Warden of the Reformatory Prison of L.C. from Nov., 1860, until Dec., 1869, when apptd. to his present office. (*Salary* \$2,000.) *Daly St.; Eastern Block.*

Deputy of the Minister of Militia and Defence.
 GEORGE FUTVOYE, Q.C. B. 13 May, 1808. Was for a time Ed. of the *Morning Courier* (Montreal). Held under Lord Durham the appt. of Inspector of Schools for the cities of Quebec and Montreal. Was afterwards apptd. the first City Clerk of the City of Quebec, under the present incorporation, in which office he assisted

much in the organization of the various Municipal Institutions of L.C. Was Secy. to the Commission of Enquiry into the state of the Crown Lands Dept., 1845, and afterwards was engaged at a head of a numerous staff in the preparation of the "Doomsday Book," or Record of Lands in U.C., to carry out the requirements of 9 Vic., cap. 34, sec. 31. Called to the Bar, L.C.; 1838. Was Permt. Clerk of the Crown Law Dept. of Can. from May 2, 1851 until the Confederation; during that period he also held the office of Secy. to the Commission of Enquiry into the causes of the Fire at the Parliamentary Buildings, Quebec, 1854. Was apptd., 1862, Inspector of Registry Offices, L.C. Has been a Special Commissioner at various times, more especially to enquire into the management of different Public Offices connected with the Administration of Justice and Enregistration of Lands in L.C. Is the author of a number of useful works. Created Q.C., 1867. Apptd. to present office under the Great Seal, 30 May, 1868. Is a Major in the Militia, and a mem. *ex officio* of the Civil Service Board and of the Board of Audit. (*Salary \$2,600.*) *Sussex St., North; Eastern Block.*

Adjutant General of Militia.—Col. PATRICK ROBERTSON-ROSS. Second s. of the late Hon.

Lord Robertson, a distinguished Scotch Judge. B. 19 May, 1828. Entered the British Army as Ensign, 7 Apl., 1848. Attained the rank of Lt.-Col. by seniority, 3 Aug., 1863, and was promoted full Colonel 2 June, 1870. Apptd. Adjt. Genl. of Militia and Colonel in the Canadian Militia, 5 May, 1869. We append a copy of his official record:—"Colonel Robertson-Ross served as an Ensign in the Cape Mounted Rifles during the Kaffir war of 1850-51 (medal); was apptd. to the local rank of Capt. when in command of a corps of irregular cavalry called Armstrong's Horse, in which capacity he was engaged in many successful affairs against the enemy, including the action against Seyola's Tribe, 16 April, 1851, where he had his horse killed under him; and more particularly in the combined attack on the Amalolas, 28 June, 1851, where he commanded a detached body of cavalry; was six times thanked in General Orders, with twice special mention in the despatches of the Commander-in-Chief, Genl. Sir Harry Smith, G.C.B. Was promoted to a lieutenancy in the 4th King's Own Regt.; served throughout the Eastern campaign, 1854-55-56, with the 4th Regt., and on the Staff, including the battle of Alma, affair of Bulganac, McKenzie's Farm, capture of Balaclava, battle of Inkermann, siege

and fall of Sebastopol ; specially mentioned in the despatches of Lord Raglan for having, when in command of a detachment of the 4th Regt., in the advanced trench before Sebastopol, repulsed two attacks of the Russians on the night of the 22nd Nov., 1854 ; and again thanked in Lord Raglan's despatch for his conduct at the attack and occupation of the Cemetery, 18 June, 1855, on which occasion he was Aide-de-Camp to Lt.-Genl. Sir Wm. Eyre, K.C.B. (Medal with three clasps ; Kaffir war medal ; Brevet of Major ; Knight of the Legion of Honor of France ; Knight of the Order of Medjidie of Turkey, and Turkish war medal). Is author of *The Regulations and Orders for the Militia of the Dominion* (1870), and of *The Orders and Regulations for Brigade Camps of Exercise and Instruction for the Militia* (1870.) (Salary \$4,000.) *Glenmoidart, Inverness-shire, Scot. ; Junior United Service Club, London, Eng. ; Daly St., Ottawa ; Western Block.*

Deputy Adjutant General of Militia.—Lieut.-Col. WALKER POWELL. Sat for Norfolk in Can. Assembly, from 1857 to 1861. Has been Warden of Norfolk—Apptd. Deputy Adjt. Genl., U.C., 19 Aug., 1862 ; and Deputy Adjt. Genl. for Dominion at Headquarters, 1 Oct., 1868. (Salary \$2,840.) *Daly St. ; Western Block.*

Commissioner of Customs.—ROBERT SHORN MILNES BOUCHETTE. B: 12 March., 1805. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1826. Was for some time ed. of *The Liberal* (Que., 1837). Apptd. permanent clk. Crown Law Dept., March, 1848; Commissioner of Customs under the Great Seal of Can., March, 1851; and to same office for Dominion, May, 1868. Has been a special commissioner at various times: in 1854, with Dunbar Ross, Esq., to enquire into origin of fire at Grey Nunnery Buildings, Quebec, which had been leased for the sittings of the Provl. Parl.; in 1859 to enquire into alleged frauds in collection of revenue on Burlington Bay Canal; in 1860, on special service to visit the ports on both sides of the Frontier to enquire into and report upon the working of the Reciprocity Treaty with the U.S.; in 1861, to enquire into Emigration Office, Quebec, and the management of the Emigration dept.; in 1862, with five other deputy heads, to report upon and carry out the organization of the Civil Service, under act of 1857; in 1864, on special service, conjointly with Collector of the port of Montreal to enquire into the management of the appraising and examining dept. of the Customs at the chief ports of the U.S. and into the warehousing system; in 1866, as commissioner to Paris Exhibition, for special pur-

poses in connection with trade and commerce, weights, measures and currency; in 1868 a commissioner with others to enquire into and report upon the conduct and efficiency of the whole of the public service of the Dominion, and to re-organize it under the new act. Is *ex officio* a mem. of the Civil Service Board, of which he is Vice-Chairman by election, of the Board of Audit, and of the Board of Customs, Excise and Stamps, of which latter he is the Chairman. (Salary \$2,600.) "*Sous les Bois*," *Daly St.*; *Eastern Block*.

Asst. Commissioner of Customs.—JAMES JOHNSON. B. 1817. Was accountant of construction of the European and North American Railway of N. B. (Government road), from Augt., 1857, until its completion in Nov., 1860, when apptd. Chief Clk. of the Provincial office of Audit N.B. Became acting auditor Genl. of N.B. Jan., 1865, and apptd. Auditor Genl., 1866, which office he resigned Nov., 1867, to accept his present position. Conjointly with the Auditor Genl-ship, held the appt. of Asst. Provl. Secy., and Registrar of the Record of N.B. Was, previous to entering Govt. service, Mayor of Moncton. (Salary \$2,025.) *Daly St.*; *Eastern Block*.

Deputy Inspector-General.—WILLIAM DICKINSON. B. 1811. Entered the public service as book-

keeper in office of Inspector-Genl., Can., Apl., 1842; appd. acting Dy. Insp.-Genl., 1 Oct., 1855; Dy. Insp.-Genl., Can., 15 Augt., 1863; and to same office for Dominion, 30 May, 1868. Is a mem. of the Civil Service Board and of the Board of Audit. (Salary \$2,600.) *Wellington St.; Eastern Block.*

Auditor-General.—JOHN LANGTON, M.A. B. April, 1808. Has been Warden of Peterborough, and Vice Chancellor of the University of Toronto. Sat for Peterborough, in Can. Assembly from 1851 to 1855. Appd. Auditor of Public Accounts, Can., 27 Dec., 1855; Auditor of the Dominion, 30 May, 1868; Secretary of the Treasury Board, 31 Jan., 1868. Declined the Finance Ministership, 1862. Was a mem. of the Commission appd. in 1868 to enquire into and report upon the Civil Service. Is a mem. of the Board of Audit. (Salary \$2,600.) *Cor. Cumberland and Wilbrod Sts.; Eastern Block.*

**LEGAL QUALIFICATIONS
OF SENATORS AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF
COMMONS. WHO ARE ELECTORS.**

The Parliament of the Dominion consists of the Queen, a Senate of 77, appointed by the Crown for life, and a House of Commons of 191 members chosen by the people. The members of this Parliament are locally apportioned as follows :

The number of Senators is fixed (except that six additional Senators may be appointed by the Crown); that of Members of the House of Commons is to vary according to the population ascertained at each decennial census, Quebec retaining the same number. According to the

* The Senators of Quebec are nominated one for each of 24 territorial districts, in which their property qualification must be.

recent census, it is estimated that the House of Commons will be thus constituted after 1872 : Ontario, 88 ; Quebec, 65 ; Nova Scotia, 21 ; New Brunswick, 16 ; Manitoba, 4 ; British Columbia, 6 ; total, 200. Term of election, five years, unless the House be sooner dissolved. Sessions, annual. The property qualification is : For Senators, the possession of \$4,000 real and personal estate over and above all liabilities ; for Members of the House of Commons in Ontario and Quebec, £500 sterling of real estate ; in New Brunswick, the possession for six months previous to the issue of the writ of election, of \$1,200 of real estate ; in Nova Scotia, "a legal or equitable freehold estate in possession of the clear yearly value of eight dollars (\$8)," or the candidate must be "qualified to be an elector."

The following are electors : In Ontario, every male subject, being the owner or occupier or tenant of real property of the assessed value of \$400, if within cities, or of the assessed value of \$300 if within towns, and of \$200 if within villages or townships. In Quebec, every male subject, being the owner or occupier or tenant of real property of the assessed value of \$300, or of the yearly value of \$30, if within cities or towns, or of the assessed value of \$200, or the yearly value of \$20, if not so situate. In New

Brunswick, every male subject of the age of 21 years, not disqualified by law, assessed for the year for which the register is made up, in respect of real estate to the amount of \$100, or of personal property, or personal and real, amounting together to \$400, or \$400 annual income. In Nova Scotia, all subjects of the age of 21 years, not disqualified by law, assessed for the year for which the register is made up in respect of real estate to the value of \$150, or in respect of personal estate, or of real and personal together, to the value of \$400.

Voting in Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia, is open, on inquiry by the Returning Officers, after the person desirous of voting has by reference to the registration list established his right to vote.

In New Brunswick votes are taken by ballot.

Voting is confined to a single day in all the Provinces, but it is not compulsory that the elections be simultaneous.

PART II.

THE SENATE.

DURATION OF THE SESSIONS, &c. 1867.

THE Parliament of the Dominion of Canada met for the first time at Ottawa, on the 6th Nov., 1867. On that day the Hon. J. E. Cauchon (who was on the 5th Nov. appointed Speaker of the Senate) took and subscribed the oath prescribed by law, and was then conducted to the Chair at the foot of the Throne, where he received the Governor-General; on the 7th, His Excellency delivered the Speech from the Throne; on the 11th, the Hon. G. W. Allan moved, seconded by the Hon. J. McCully, the usual address in reply to the Viceregal speech, which was agreed to on the same day. On the 1st Dec., the Senate adjourned until the 12th March, 1868, when it re-assembled and continued to sit until the prorogation on the 22nd May.

1866.

Parliament assembled on the 15th April, when the Speech from the Throne was delivered. On the 16th, the Hon. Dr. Lacoste moved, seconded by the Hon. D. Wark, the address in reply, which was adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 22nd June.

1870.

Parliament met on the 16th Feb., when the Speech was delivered by the Governor-General. On the 17th, the Hon. J. R. Benson moved the address in reply, seconded by the Hon. R. B. Dickey, which was, as on the two previous occasions, agreed to on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 12th May.

1871.

Parliament met on the 15th Feb. On the 17th Hon. Alexander Macfarlane moved the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, seconded by Hon. J. F. Armand, which was duly adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 14th April.

of Inchbreck in the Mearns, who was lineally and legitimately descended from Walter Stuart of Morphy in the Mearns, whose grandfather, Murdock, Duke of Albany, was grandson of Robert the second by Elizabeth Mure of Rowallan. (See Burke's *Landed Gentry*.) B. at Kair, Kincardine, 4 Sep., 1786. Ed. at the Grammar School, Aberdeen, and afterwards at Marischal College and University of Aberdeen. Co., and of the Western Canada Permanent Building and Savings' Society. Was Arbitrator for the Province of Ontario under the B.N.A. Act, "for the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities and properties of Upper Canada and Lower Canada," 1868. MCDONALD, Hon. DONALD.

Father came from Scot. in early part of present century, and settled in the state of New York; afterwards removed to Western Can. B. in Scot, 1814. Ed. in Can. Called to the Bar, N.S., Dec., 1844. Is a Surrogate of the Vice Admiralty and Prize Jurisdiction Court, Presdt. of the Board of Agriculture, N.S., and a dir. of the N.S. Electric Telegraph Co. Was a mem. of the Ex-Council, N.S., from 1863, until the Union, and holds rank and precedence

as such by permission of the Queen. Sat for Cumberland in N.S. Assembly from 1856 until the Union. Called to the Senate, 10 Oct., 1870. A Conservative.—*Wallace, N.S.; Halifax Club.*

McLELAN, Hon. ARCHIBALD WOODBURY.

Ancestors came from the North of Irel. Only s. of the late G. W. McLelan, Esq., who sat in the N.S. Legislature for a lengthened period. B. at Londonderry, N.S., Dec., 1824. Ed. there and at Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. M., 1854, Miss Caroline Metzler, of Halifax. Is a dir. of the Cobequid Marine Insurance Co. Sat for Colchester in N.S. Assembly from 1858 until 1863, for Northern Colchester from latter date until the Union, and for Colchester in House of Commons, from the Union until called to the Senate, June, 1869. S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Hon. F. X. Malhiot, M.P.P. and M.L.C. in the L.C. Legislature, *Seigneur* of Vercheres, by Julie de Laperriere. B. at Vercheres, 1808. Ed. at Montreal Seminary. M. Julie Eliza, dau. of the late N. Montour, Esq., a mem. of L.C. Legislature, and one of the earliest partners in the North-west Company. Is a *Seigneur* of Quebec. Represented Shawenegan division in L.C., Can., from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal.—*Pointe du Lac, Que.*

MATHESON, Lieut.-Col. Hon. RODERICK.

The only surviving s. of John Matheson, by Flora Macrae, his wife. Descended from an ancient Scottish family. His great grandfather,

Dugald Matheson, of Balmacara, Lochalsh, Ross-shire, Scot., Chief of the Clan (killed in the action of Glen Shiel, Glenelg, on 10 June 1719), m. the dau. of Mackenzie, of Dachmalnack; their eldest s., Roderick, m. the dau. of Kenneth Mackenzie and Mary, dau. of Mackenzie of Applecross; Roderick's eldest s. John, m. Flora, dau. of Donald Macrae, of Strath Conan; the Hon. Roderick is the only surviving s. of John; so in direct line of descent from his great grandfather, who was Chief of the Clan, he, Roderick, is Chief of the Clan. B. in Ross-shire, Scot. Ed. at Inverness and in Canada. M., 1st., Mary, dau. of Captain Robertson, of Inverness, Scot. (she d. 1825); 2ndly, 1830, Anna, dau. of Rev. James Russell, Minister of Gairloch, Ross-shire, Scot. Has been an Alderman of Hamilton. Sat in L.C. Can., as a life mem. from Jan., 1849, until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—"*West Lawn,*" *Hamilton.*

MITCHELL, Hon. PETER.

P.O.

Parents came from Scot. to N.B., and settled at Miramichi, N.B., 1818. B. in Newcastle, Miramichi, 1824. Ed. at the Grammar School there. M., 1853, Mrs. Gough, of St. John. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1848. Has been an extensive shipbuilder. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1858 to March, 1865, when his party was defeated on an appeal to the people on the scheme for the Confederation of B.N.A. In April, 1866, after the resignation of the Smith Government, was called upon to form a government, in conjunction with the Hon. R. D. Wilmot, which he did, holding the office of President of the Ex. Council from that date until the Union. Council of the Dominion Board of Trade. Has been a mem. of the Corporation of the City of Ottawa, and Presdt. of the Board of Trade, and of the St. George's Society of that city. Unsuccessfully contested Carleton for Local House, at g. e. 1867. Represented Rideau division in the L.C., Can., from 1862 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. STEEVES, *Hon.* WILLIAM HENRY.

Of German descent. Grands. of Rev. Henry Steeves, who came to N.B., from Pennsylvania, 1765. B. at Hillsborough, N.B., 20 May, 1814, Ed. at District School. A mem. of firm of Steeves, Bros., merchants. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from Oct., 1854, to May, 1856, and from June, 1857, until March, 1866. Was Surveyor Genl. from Oct., 1854, to March, 1855; Commissioner of Public Works from latter date to May, 1856, an office which he held a second time from June, 1857, to Sept., 1863. Was a delegate to Quebec to arrange with the Can. Govt. for the construction of an Intercolonial Railway, 1862; a mem. of the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; and of the Quebec Conference, which succeeded it, in the same year. TESSIER, Hon. ULRIC JOSEPH, LL.D., Q.C.

S. of Michel Tessier, Esq., merchant of Quebec, The family is of French descent, having come from La Rochelle, France, as early as 1700. B. in Quebec, 1817. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M., 1847, Adèle Drapeau Kelly, grand-dau. of Joseph Drapeau, Esq., *Seigneur* of Rimouski and Orleans. Called to the Bar, L.C.; 1839. Created Q.C., 1863. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, Commissioner of Public Works, and Govt. leader in the L.C., Can., from May, 1862, to May, 1863; and Speaker of the L.C., from August 1863, until the Union. Was Presdt. of the *Institut Canadien*, Quebec, 1852; Mayor of Quebec, 1853; Degree of LL.D. conferred upon him by the Laval University, 1855; and appd. Prof. of Law Procedure in same institution, 1858. Is a mem. of the Council of Laval University; of the Council of Agriculture for L.C.; Vice. Presdt. of the Quebec and Gulf Ports Steamship Co.; a Harbor Commissioner for Quebec; a dir. of *La Banque National*, of which he was the first Presdt.; and of the International Gold Mining Co.; and Captain 2nd Batt. Quebec Militia. Author of *Essai sur le Commerce et l'Industrie du bas Canada* (Que. 1854). Sat for Portneuf in Can. Assembly from 1851 to 1854.

Represented Gulf Division in L.O., Can., from 1858 until the Union. Called to the Senate, by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. Has been a strenuous advocate for an Intercolonial Railway; carried a measure through Parlt. for the more equitable distribution of property of partners and partnerships; and an act for the incorporation of *La Banque National*; prepared and presented a report of a Com. of Leg. Council on the practicability of navigating the lower St. Lawrence during the winter season. A Liberal. —42 St. Louis St., Quebec; Rideau Club.

WARK, Hon. DAVID.

Descended by both parents from Scotch families that settled in Ulster in the 17th century. B. near Londonderry, Irel., 1804. Came to N.B., 1825. M. Annie Elizabeth, dau. of Isaac Burpee, Esq., of Sunbury, N.B. A merchant. Is a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of New Brunswick. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1858 to 1862, and Receiver General for a few months, 1867. Sat for Kent in N.B. Assembly from 1842 until 1851, when appointed to the L.C., of that Province, where he remained until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Liberal. — Water St., Richibucto, N.B.

WILMOT, *Hon.* ROBERT DUNCAN.

S. of John M. Wilmot, Esq., who sat for St. John (county) in N.B. Assembly for many years, by Miss Street, sister of the late Hon. Saml. Street of Niagara; and grands. of Capt. Lemuel Wilmot, formerly of the Loyal American Regt., who settled in N.B. at the close of the Am. revolution. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists*.) B. in Fredericton, N.B., 16 Oct., 1809. Ed. in St. John. M. 1833, Miss Mowatt, of St. Andrews. A dir. of the Quebec and N.B. Railway Co. Is a cousin of the Lieut. Governor of N.B. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, N.B., from 1851 to 1854; from 1856 to 1857; and again, in his own govt., from 1866 until the Union; held office of Surveyor General from 1851 to 1854; and that of Prov. Secy., from 1856 to 1857. Was Mayor of St. John, 1849; a delegate to Confederate Council of Trade, Quebec, 1865; and to the Colonial Conference for the Union of the B.A. Colonies, London, 1866-7. WILSON, Hon. CHARLES.

Sixth s. of the late Alexander Wilson, Esq., Collector of Customs at Coteau du Lac, Q., by the dau. of Captain Monteth d'Aillebout, a gentleman who held a commission in the French army, but who after the capitulation of Quebec in 1759, entered the Eng. service. B. at Coteau du Lac, April, 1808. M., 1835, the sister of the late Dr. Tracey, of Montreal. Is head of a firm extensively engaged in the hardware business, which he commenced in 1834; and a dir. of the Scottish Provincial Assurance Co. Was elected Mayor of Montreal by acclamation in 1851, in 1852, and again in 1853. Created in 1854 a *Chevalier Commandeur* of the Roman Order of St. Gregory the Great. Sat as a life mem. of the L.C. PART III.

EXPLANATION

ADJOURNMENT.—See interruption of the Sit-
tings of Parliament.

AMENDMENT.—See Order.

AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.—When a motion has been made upon which the House is unwilling to come to a vote, there are certain formal modes of avoiding a decision, amongst which are “passing of the other orders of the day,” or “moving the previous question.” The former means that the House should—casting aside and taking no notice of the matter then before it—proceed to the other business appointed for that

day; the latter, that a vote be previously taken as to the expediency of coming to any decision on the question raised. If "the previous question" be negatived as a matter of expediency, the motion to which it referred is only gotten rid of for the time, whereas a direct negative to the motion itself would be a proscription of it for the remainder of the Session, as well as a denial of its principle. With respect to a Bill, moving that it "be read this day six months," or "this day three months," is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

BILLS (PRIVATE).—Private Bills are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk, and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit; but there are other private bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, &c., &c. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief; and certain deposits, varying in amount, must be made before the measure can be taken up by the Private Bill Committee. All these Bills have to be

read a second time, and then, if all the rules of the House have been complied with, they go to the Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

BILLS (PUBLIC).—A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by any individual Senator without the previous permission of the House ; but in the Commons, no bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, a Committee is appointed to prepare the bill. It is then brought in and read a first time, without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for a second reading, previous to which it is printed and a copy furnished to each member. The bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered, as its principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favor of its principles, unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee, the bill is debated clause

by clause, the blanks left for names, dates, nature and amount of penalties, &c., are filled up, and sometimes the bill is entirely new-modelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to alter them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the bill has undergone, which he does by presenting a copy of it to the Speaker in its altered form. The report of the Committee is agreed to without discussion, the bill is ordered to be printed, and it is then read a third time, when any further amendments can be made. If a new clause be added, it is called a rider. The last question but one is, that the "bill do pass;" after this nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each statute. During the progress of a bill the House *may* divide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed; 3rd, that the report of the Committee be received; 4th, or that the bill be re-committed; 5th, that it be read a third time; 6th, that it do pass; 7th, the title of the bill. These are quite exclu-

sive of any division in Committee, or any amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a bill until after its principle has been disposed of on the second reading. Immediately after the passing of a bill, it is taken by a member to the bar of the Senate desiring their concurrence, where it passes through the same forms as in the Commons. If the bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agree with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, a conference usually follows between members deputed from each House, who generally succeed in adjusting the difference; but if both Houses remain inflexible, the bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted *mutatis mutandis* when the bill originates in the Upper House. The bill having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a bill of supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a bill into an Act of Parliament. (See "Royal Assent.")

BOBERT (rux).—The Minister of Finance

makes one general statement every year to the House of Commons, the object of which is to present a comprehensive view of the financial condition of the Dominion. Sometimes there are preliminary, or supplemental, or occasional speeches; but the great general statement of the year has, for a long time past, been quaintly called "*the Budget*," from the French *hougette*, by a common figure of speech, putting the name of that which incloses, to signify the thing contained. The annual speech known by that appellation embraces a review of the income and expenditure of the past year, as compared with those of preceding years; remarks upon the financial prospects of the country; an exposition of the intended repeal, modifications, or imposition of taxes during the session; and a detail of the public expenditure during the current period, with its grounds of justification.

CABINET.—The Government of a state or community is understood to signify the exercise of supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative, and the judicial powers; but in popular acceptation it means only the first of these, the higher and more immediate functions of which are exercised by the Cabinet, a select body through whom, for the time being, the principal functions of royalty are discharged.

It is only since the adoption of the system of Responsible Government that any of the U.N.A. Provinces has had a Cabinet of Ministers. Before this took place, those who advised the Executive or Her Majesty's Representative were called, as they were in fact, Members of the Executive Council. They are here dignified by the same name as that by which they are acknowledged in the Parent State—they are called the Government, when the fact is that this word only applies to the three Estates which constitute the Government; but we have come into the use of the term usually employed in England, and as such it will be the best to use it. When speaking of the Supreme Government of the Dominion the people understand the Members of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada. The Queen's Privy Council for Canada is at present composed of twenty members, but seven of these are not of the Cabinet. It usually includes all those who are bound to retire when a change of Ministry takes place. The Privy Council being more immediately responsible for the conduct of public affairs, their deliberations are always considered confidential, and are kept secret. The head of the Cabinet, who has been entrusted with its formation, is called "The Premier," but more properly "the head

of Her Majesty's Canadian Government." The Cabinet, as it stands at present, comprises the following officers:—"The Minister of Justice and Attorney-General;" "The Minister of Militia and Defence;" "The Minister of Customs;" "The Minister of Finance;" "The Minister of Public Works;" "The Minister of Inland Revenue;" "The Secretary of State for the Provinces;" "The Minister of Marine and Fisheries;" "The President of the Queen's Privy Council;" "The Postmaster-General;" "The Secretary of State for Canada;" "The Minister of Agriculture;" and "The Receiver-General." They usually resign when they have lost the confidence of the House of Commons, or they may be dismissed by Her Majesty's Representative, and either House can, by address to the Governor-General, ask for the dismissal of his Cabinet or advisers. The members of the Cabinet, or Administration, are supposed to agree upon principles of policy and legislation, and are expected to co-operate in Parliament, upon all matters and questions not specifically agreed upon as "open questions." The office of Premier may be held in conjunction with either of the principal departments of State, though heretofore, (before Confederation), it has been usually associated with the office of Attorney General.

CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY.—The Clerk of the Crown in Chancery is by right an officer of both Houses of Parliament. His duties are to take charge of all the Poll Books and Election documents; to issue Writs of Election, &c., attend with those at the table when so ordered by the House; and at the closing of each session of Parliament to read aloud the title of each several Bill before it receives the Royal assent by Her Majesty's Representative. We reproduce from *Margueron's Appellate Jurisdiction of the House of Lords* that portion which refers to the duties of this officer in England:—“The duties of the Clerk of the Crown do not now, as heretofore, require his constant attendance in the House of Lords. He assists when the Royal assent is given to Bills; but has no concern with the business of the Appellate Jurisdiction. In an ancient manuscript, preserved in the office of the Clerk of the Crown, the following particulars are given, respecting this ancient officer:—The Clerk of the Crown, sitteth in the Upper House of Parliament, by the Clerk of that Court, upon the Woolstack, attending there all the Parliament, and is sometimes sent on messengers to the Lower House; and on the last day of the Parliament he readeth the Acts, and the Clerk of the Parliament giveth

the King's answer; where it is to be noted that all the time of Parliament he sitteth on the right hand of the Clerk of Parliament, and when he readeth the Acts, he standeth on his left hand, which is the higher place, being on the King's right hand."

CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.—"The Clerk of the Commons House of Parliament" holds an office of great trust and importance. He, with one assistant, sits at the upper end of the table. The Crown appoints him by commission. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments held in the House, but of the decisions at which it arrives— in other words, to record its votes, resolutions, addresses, orders, reports, divisions, and all other proceedings in which it may be engaged; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read; to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner that a chairman would do.

COMMITTEES.—In common with courts of law and equity, the Houses of Parliament can punish all contempt of their authority or disobe-

dience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges ; but in the case of the Commons the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament ; committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

COMMITTEES.—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails ; or the House resolves itself into such Committee, to consider the details of a bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages ; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means" (which see). Secondly, There are Select Committees chosen by ballot or otherwise, for some specific purpose—the number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members except by permission of the House. Thirdly, Election Committees, which are judicial tribunals, appointed to try the merits of controverted elections. They are appointed by a General Committee on

elections, who, after having selected a certain number from the members to constitute the chairman's panel, divide the remainder into panels, and report the same to the House, marked 1, 2, and 3. The Clerk, in the presence of the House, places the whole three in a hat and draws them forth, marking each in rotation A, B, C. The General Committee then selects four members for the Committee for the first controverted election referred to them, and at the same time the chairman's panel assembles and ballots for a chairman for the particular Committee chosen. Fourthly, Committees on Private Bills (which see). When the Whole House is in Committee, the Speaker vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some other member is called on to preside, who sits in the seat of the Senior Clerk.

CONFERENCE.—This is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. If the conference be upon the subject of a bill depending between the two Houses, it must be demanded by that House which is in possession of the bill, at the time of asking the

conference. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which House it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken, are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, a "free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of argument, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject.

CROWN.—In speaking of the Crown, the reader must remember that the attributes and powers are exercised in Canada by a Representative—viz.: the Governor-General. Its attributes are:—

To give or refuse to bills "*The Royal Assent*," to cause the laws to be duly administered and executed; to act in behalf of the whole community in its intercourse with other countries, but the Representative of the Crown can neither

declare a war nor conclude a peace ; this power cannot be delegated) ; to direct the Naval and Military forces within the limit of his Administration ; to administer the Public Revenue ; to prorogue or dissolve Parliament. The Queen's Representative, in appearing for the Crown, represents the source of justice and mercy, confers office, honors, and emoluments ; but in the same manner as the Monarch acts by Ministers who are amenable to the Imperial Parliament, so the Representative in Canada acts by Ministers who are responsible to Parliament, and the choice of those Ministers is the only prerogative which can be constitutionally exercised without responsible advisers ; but even in this, Parliament, or rather the People's Representatives, exercise the controlling power ; for the appointment of such Ministers by the Crown's Representative can have no practical effect, unless it rests upon men whose characters and measure prove generally acceptable to the House.

ESTATE OF PARLIAMENT.—Parliament fully assembled, consists of the Monarch, or his Representative, the Upper House and the Lower House. They are more frequently spoken of as the three branches of the Legislature. Neither House deliberates in the presence of the Queen's Representative, nor will either of them permit

any allusion in debate, to the opinions or sentiments entertained by him. The three branches taken together exercise none but legislative functions, and they must all consent, or no law can be passed. But they have separate functions as well. The Monarch, or Representative, holds the whole Executive authority, and while the Lower House alone can originate Money or Tax Bills, the Upper House is deprived of this power. Nor does the Upper House possess the great function of trying impeachments, which is held by the Lords in Great Britain, from the simple fact, we presume, that there is no power invested with the right to impeach. But we will speak of each one separately :

HOUSE OF COMMONS.—The Speaker takes the Chair at 3 P.M. daily. If there be a quorum the business is proceeded with ; if not, the House is adjourned to the next day, at 3 P.M. Early meetings take place shortly before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close ; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members including the Speaker constitute a quorum.

THE SENATE.—The time for the ordinary meeting of this House is at 3 P.M. unless some other time shall have previously been ordered. If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members including the Speaker constitute a quorum. The Speaker of the Senate is an officer appointed by the Crown.

EXECUTIVE.—See Cabinet.

FINANCE.—See Budget.

INTERRUPTION OF THE SITTINGS OF PARLIAMENT.

—The proceedings of the Legislature may be interrupted or suspended either by adjournment, prorogation, or dissolution.

Adjournment, as the term itself implies, is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House, from one time to another specified for the re-assemblage. When the sittings of both Houses are interrupted by Royal authority, it is called prorogation. Dissolution puts an end to the representative character of the individuals who, at the time, compose the House of Commons, and Parliament cannot therefore assemble until after a new election, except in cases hereinafter mentioned. The power of adjournment is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restraints to this power.

The House of Commons can interrupt or postpone any debate, defer the consideration of any measure, or altogether adjourn its sitting, but the practice is always to adjourn to some stated time ; and we think there can be no doubt that, by the previous permission of the House, the Speaker can leave the Chair for a certain number of hours ; but this does not amount to an adjournment, and could not be noted as such by the Clerk. But it must be remarked that the adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by proclamation either House, or both, and may direct either, or both Houses, to adjourn to any particular day. But while this power exists, and although in former times it has been frequently exercised in the Imperial Legislature, it has grown into desuetude there, as well as in the Provinces enjoying the privileges of their own local Legislatures.

An individual member may for a time interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction: no second motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate.

Adjournment does not close the session ; nor does prorogation terminate Parliament. The former is an act which either House can perform ; the latter is a power vested in the Crown, the duration of which may be subsequently shortened or extended as the Crown pleases. All unfinished business terminates and dies with a prorogation, but during an adjournment they remain *status quo*, to be revised on the re-assembling of Parliament. A member who moves the adjournment of a debate, or who is in possession of the floor at the time of the adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House, with the right to re-open the debate which has been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when Committees of the Whole House adjourn. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation and continue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament at any time by giving fourteen days notice. Dissolution is the simple death of Parliament, and may be brought about in two ways, either by the pleasure of the Crown, or by lapse of time for which it was called into existence. There was a time when the existence of a Parliament terminated by the

demise of the Crown, but a special law removed this provision of the Constitution. But there is no power in the Constitution by which a Parliament in Canada can be extended beyond five years. If Parliament, at the time of the Sovereign's death, be separated by adjournment or prorogation, it must assemble immediately, or within a reasonable period. If no Parliament be then in existence, the members of the last must again meet, and may serve as a Parliament for six months, unless sooner prorogued.

LAW CLERK.—It is necessary to mention this officer in particular, because the Rules of the House assign to him and the translators under him certain duties which must be performed, to ensure correct legislation. He is appointed by the Crown. It is laid down as the duty of the Law Clerk to revise all public bills after their first reading, and to certify thereon that the same are correct; and in every subsequent stage of such bills, the Law Clerk shall be responsible for the correctness of said bills, should they be amended. The responsibility is increased by the fact of all bills having to be printed in both languages, English and French, before they can be disposed of.

MINISTER (PRIME).—See Cabinet.

MINISTRY.—See Cabinet ; also Executive.

MONEY BILL.—See Supply: also Ways and Means.

ORDER.—By this word is meant an obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that necessary decorum so essential in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the business of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds; one class the House possesses in common with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules, the Speaker's or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due deference is at all times paid. The Speaker, while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted; to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question upon which the votes of members are

taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to declare the business of the House closed, and to see that the affairs of the House are correctly and properly recorded. After routine he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. All motions must be seconded, or they fall to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it—having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. It must not be forgotten that unless a speech is made objecting to a motion neither mover or seconder can speak a second time except in explanation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which an opposition is given to the mover of a motion, he has the right of reply; but it must be understood that this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are

permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favor to say "Yea," and those of a contrary opinion to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising and their names being taken down; the "Nays" following; the numbers are counted from the record, and declared. When an amendment has been moved, the vote is simply taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place, and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of the orders then being committed. In the debate it is contrary to order to mention any member by name; the same rule prevails in Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman.

ORIGINATING BILLS.—All Bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons, and be introduced by the Government. (*See Bills.*)

PARLIAMENTARY AGENTS.—In England all the business transacted for private Corporations and individuals is attended to by what they call Parliamentary Agents, who are parties generally well up in the practice of Parliament, and who take off a great deal of the drudgery from Members. Parliamentary Agents are now employed in Canada, and are a very useful class of men. Being up in their business, they do not annoy the Members, nor neglect the interests they have in charge.

PETITIONS.—There are several regulations which govern the presentation of Petitions to Parliament, which should be attended to by those who are interested. Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed to "*The Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled.*" The petition must be respectful, the statement of grievance or cause of complaint must there be set forth, and the

whole must conclude with a specific prayer. Without a prayer to the petition, it would not be listened to, as the mere complaining for the sake of complaining will never be countenanced by Parliament, and the correct form is, after having alleged your complaint, to finish by connecting it with the prayer, beginning, "*Wherefore your humble petitioner, &c., prays, &c.*", setting forth the redress and relief that is sought. Signatures to petitions must be original; no agent should sign a petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a corporation is received as the petition of the whole body. All petitions must be in respectful and temperate language; they should not animadvert upon the conduct of Parliament, the Courts of Justice, or constituted authorities. It is not proper to make reference to any motion or subject under debate, or to a motion in the course of preparation. After presentation, all petitions undergo a close inspection in the Clerk's Department, and when the time comes for receiving them, the Speaker offers such remarks as their nature calls for. In England there is a Committee on Public Petitions, which takes this duty from the Speaker, and it appears to work well, for they frequently find it their duty to

report the substance, and frequently the exact words of a petition to the House, and not unfrequently recommend such action to be taken as the case suggests.

PREVIOUS QUESTION.—See AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.

PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.—There are three kinds. 1st, The privileges which appertain to members individually. 2nd, Those which belong to the House in its collective capacity. 3rd, Those which belong to the two Houses jointly.

It is unnecessary that we should here discuss the points of privilege which appertain to the two Imperial Houses conjointly on the subject of assuming the supreme power of the realm. Amongst the privileges which the Commons claim are :—

The power of committing individuals to prison—the power of publishing matters which if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a Court of Law—the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws, or affecting the privi-

leges of Parliament—and finally of doing anything not directly contravening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of its constitutional functions. Questions of privilege take precedence of all other proceedings, and are always in order. The privileges claimed by individual members are—freedom of speech and person, including freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity. This does not extend to indictable offences or to actual contempts of the Courts of Justice. Members of Parliament are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere with their prompt attendance to their Parliamentary calls. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolution.

PROROGATION.—See Interruption of the Sittings of Parliament.

QUESTION.—See Order.

ROYAL ASSENT.—The Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill is called the Royal Assent ; this

assent is usually given at the end of a Session, unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-General, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Upper House, and there, in the presence of both Houses, gives his assent. When this is done, either at the close of the Session or on a special occasion, the Governor-General being seated on the throne, the House of Commons is summoned to the bar of the Upper House; being there, the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery reads the title of the Bill, and hands it to the Chief Clerk, who says in both English and French: "In the name of Her Majesty the Queen, His Excellency the Governor-General sanctions this Bill." His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal assent is not given, are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the "*Official Gazette*" as having been reserved for Her Majesty's consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal assent is given, the Act becomes a Law, and can be proceeded on before any competent Court. In England, sometimes the Royal assent is given by commission, but in a Colony such an event has never

taken place, although there can be no doubt that the Governor-General has power to appoint a Commission to give this Royal assent.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed for any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the Clerks, are under his orders. He has a seat at the Bar of the House, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the approaches thereto, and in the galleries. He is of course in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom he takes all orders connected with his duties.

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SESSION.—The Session is the term occupied by Parliament from its commencement to its prorogation. An adjournment does not close a Session. Parliament is annually assembled for the despatch of business. There are certain important Acts which are renewed every year, and without which the Government could not be carried on, which compels the Government to meet the Representatives of the people, and

render an account of the past year's transactions, once a year at least. Unless this be done, there will be no supplies. By an understanding, Parliament meets in the month of February, although circumstances sometimes arise to postpone the time. While the Crown has a right to summon Parliament where it pleases, it is generally understood that it assembles at the Seat of Government. The House being assembled, the Governor-General commands the attendance of the members of the Lower House at the Bar of the Upper House, and delivers a Speech from the Throne. This Speech is the first subject taken into consideration ; no other business is commenced until the answer to it is given. As is stated elsewhere, the mere fact of one or both Houses adjourning, does not terminate the Session ; it can only terminate by being prorogued by the Crown. All bills and other measures left unfinished, when the prorogation takes place, are dead, and parties who wish to revive them, must recommence their labors at the next Session, as if nothing had been done in the premises. The mere assembling of members does not constitute a Session,—one Bill, at least, must pass both Houses, and receive the Royal Assent, before it can be called a Session.

SPEAKER.—Beyond all doubt this officer was designated Speaker, from the fact of his being the spokesman of the Commons, in their intercourse with the Crown. He is the presiding officer of the body. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor-General by the Whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for particular note and remark. Through him, all witnesses and prisoners at the Bar of the House are examined, and he directs all arrangements, when the House is to be addressed by Counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal, or release for breach of privilege, to communicate with any parties, when so instructed by the House. It is his duty to closely examine the provisions of private Bills so as to protect the public against any surprise, or undue encroachment or injury; to control and regulate the conduct of subordinate officers of the House; to enforce the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the whole House. As the presiding

officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Parliament, subject to the approbation of the representative of the Crown, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," as the term applies, a course uniformly followed by the censure of the House. In extreme cases, the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House be signified. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, but he never otherwise votes.

SUPPLY.—All proceedings which relate to the public income or expenditure must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the Session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the

House, where they are again reconsidered and adopted, or rejected, as the case may be. Upon these, a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes the authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Upper House may reject this or any other money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill ; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the Lower House. Before any Bill can be introduced, authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

THREE MONTHS (This Day)—See Avoidance of a Decision.

WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excise and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on this subject are reduced to resolutions, submitted, considered and decided on, and such as are

agreed to are reported to the House. Those which may be adopted are embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in Supply, the Upper House may reject these Bills, but cannot amend them; nor can the Upper House insert a pecuniary penalty in any Bill.

DURATION OF THE SESSIONS, &c.

[The reader is referred to the paragraph with the
 above heading at the opening of PART II. for data
 which it is unnecessary here to repeat.]

1867.

The Parliament of the Dominion of Canada
 met for the first time in Ottawa on the 6th Nov.,
 1867. Immediately after the return of the Com-
 mons from the Senate Chamber, the Clerk being
 in the Chair, the Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald,
 K.C.B. (*Kingston*), moved, seconded by the Hon.
 G. E. Cartier (*Montreal East*), that the Hon. James
 Cockburn (*West Northumberland, Ont.*), do take
 the Chair of that House as Speaker, which was
 carried unanimously. Mr. Speaker was then
 conducted to the Chair, where he returned his
 humble acknowledgments for the great honor
 conferred upon him. On the 8th Nov. the Hon.
 C. Fisher (*Fort, N.B.*), moved the address in

reply to the Speech, seconded by Dr. L. L. L. Desaulniers (*St. Maurice*), which was agreed to on the 15th. On the 21st Dec., the House adjourned until the 12th March.

1869.

On the 16th Apl., Mr. W. M. Simpson (*Algoma*), moved the usual address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Mr. J. Bolton (*Charlotte*), which was adopted the same day.

1870.

On the 17th Feb., Mr. A. W. Savary (*Digby*), moved the address, seconded by Mr. J. Scriver (*Hantsdon*), which was adopted on the 22nd.

1871.

On the 16th Feb. Dr. Lacerte (*St. Maurice*), moved the address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Mr. G. A. Kirkpatrick (*Frontenac*), which was carried on the same day.

ABBOTT, Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN JOSEPH CALDWELL,

Canada; by Harriet, dau. of the Rev. Richard Bradford, first Rector of Chatham, same county. B. at St. Andrew's, 12 March, 1821. Ed. there, and at the University of McGill College, Montreal. M., 1849, Mary, dau. of the Very Rev. J. Bethune, D.D., Dean of Montreal. Called to the Bar, L.C., Oct., 1847. Created Q.C., 1862. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law and Prof. of Commercial Law in Univ. of McGill College; Lieut.-Col. of the 11th Batt. or "Argenteuil Rangers," raised by him during the "Trent" difficulty; Presdt. of the Canada Central Railway and of the Fraser Institute, or Free Public Library of Montreal; Vice-Presdt. of the North Shore Railway; a dir. of the Northern Colonization Railway and of the Intercolonial Coal Mining Co., and author of *The Insolvent Act of 1864; with notes, &c.* (Que., 1864); a measure which he introduced and carried through the Can. Parlt. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Solicitor-General, L.C., from 24 May, 1862, to 14 May, 1863. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assembly, at g. e., 1857, but not returned, and only seated after an arduous contest; continued to represent the county in that House until the Union. Returned to Commons at g. e., 1867. Was instrumental in obtaining the closing of Canals from traffic on Sundays; and his legislation

ANGLIN, *Hon.* TIMOTHY WARREN. [*Gloucester.*]

B. in Irel. Ed. there. M. Miss McTavish, of St. John, N.B. Came to St. John, 1848, where he founded the *Morning Freeman* newspaper, of which he is editor and proprietor. Sat for St. John (county) in N.B. Assembly from 1861 to g. e., 1866, when defeated on Confederation question, to which he was opposed. Was a member of Ex. Council, N.B., for a few months in 1866. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative; opposed to present Government. Accepts Confederation, and is willing to give the new Constitution a fair trial.—*Waterloo St., St. John, N.B.*

ARCHAMBEAULT, *Hon.* LOUIS, *N.P.* [*L'Assomption.*]

A Notary Public. Has been Registrar for L'Assomption. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1857, until g. e., 1861, when defeated; and again from g. e., 1863, until

the Union. Elected Presdt. of the Board of Notaries for the Province of Quebec, 1870. Apptd. a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works for the Province of Quebec, July, 1867. Represents Repentigny in L.C., Quebec. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*L'Assomption, Que.; Quebec.*

AULT, SAMUEL, J.P. [*Stormont.*]

Of German descent. S. of a U.E. Loyalist. B. in Osnabruck, Co. Stormont, Ont., 1814. Ed. there. M. Miss Catherine Valentine Loucks, the dau. of a U.E. Loyalist. Is Lieut. 2nd Batt. Stormont Militia. Was fourteen years a member of the Municipal Council, during which time he was successively Deputy Reeve, Reeve, and finally Warden of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal; supports present Administration.—*Aultville, Ont.*

BAKER, GEORGE B., M.A. [*Missisquoi.*] 2nd MEN.

Third s. of the late William Baker, Esq., who represented Missisquoi in the L.C. Assembly, from 1834 until the suspension of the constitution of that Province in 1837; and nephew of

Stevens Baker, Esq., who represented the county in the same body from 1830 to 1834; the grandfather was a U.E. Loyalist. B. at Dunham, Que., 26 Jan., 1834. Ed. at the Univ. of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, where he graduated, 1855. M., 1860, Jane Percival, eld. dau. of Peter Cowan, Esq., of Cowansville, Sheriff of the District of Bedford. Called to the bar, L.C., same year. Is a Trustee of the Univ. of Bishop's College. First returned to Parlt. for present seat June, 1870, on resignation of sitting mem. A Liberal Conservative, and a supporter of British connexion and the present Administration.—*Cowansville, Que.*

BARTHE, GEORGES ISIDORE. [*Richelieu.*] 2ND MEM.

S. of the late Capt. Barthe, originally a merchant at Carleton, District of Gaspé, who afterwards, for many years, commanded his own vessels between the St. Lawrence and the Antilles. B. at Restigouche, *Baie des Chaleurs*, 16 Nov., 1834. Ed. at Three Rivers. M., 1861, Josephine Charlotte, third dau. of J. B. Meilleur, Esq., M.D., LL.D., late Supt. of Education for L.C. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1855. A mem. of the law firm of Barthe & Brassard. Is Official Assignee for Richelieu; and has been Mayor of Sorel since 1864. Has been long engaged as a writer

on the French Can. newspaper press. Ed. *L'Ere Nouvelle* (Three Rivers,) 1852-3. Founded *Le Bas Canada*, in the same city, 1855, and in 1857 removed to Sorel, where he founded *La Gazette*, of which he continues editor and proprietor. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, Nov., 1870, on death of sitting mem. A Liberal Conservative, but is thoroughly independent of party.—*King St., Sorel, Que.*

BEATY, JAMES. [*Toronto East.*]

Youngest s. of the late Mr. Robert Beaty, Land Surveyor, of Kileshandra, Cavan, Irel. B. there, 1800. Came to Can. 1817. M., 1822, Miss Sarah Armstrong, of the family of that name near Belturbet, Cavan. (she d. 1839). Was for many years in business as a Leather Merchant at York (now Toronto), and during his residence there has held many important public positions. Was a dir. of the first Mutual Insurance Co., established in the Home District; President of the first Building Society; Commissioner of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum; Trustee of the General Hospital, and as such superintended, with the other Trustees, the construction of the new Hospital; a dir. of the People's Bank; and an Alderman and a Councillor for the City. Was also, for nine years, a dir. of the Grand Trunk Railway. Is proprietor

of the *Toronto Daily and Weekly Leader*, and of the *Patriot*, newspapers. Was an unsuccessful candidate for the Saugeen division, L.C. Can., 1856. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—69 *Jarvis St., Toronto*.

BEAUBIEN, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOSEPH OCTAVE, M.D.*

[*Montmagny.*]

Descended from Julien Trottier, who came to Can: from the parish of d'Ige ou d'Igne, Province du Perche, France, about 1650; from this gentleman subsequently sprang the three Can. families of Beaubien, Pombert, and la Bissonnière. Called to the Bar U.C. in Michaelmas Term, 1856; created Q.C. 1863. Senior partner in the extensive law firm of Blake, Kerr & Bethune, Toronto. Is a mem. of the Senate of the University of Toronto; and a dir. of the Isolated Risk Fire Insurance Co. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont., 1871. Returned for South Bruce in Local House at g. e., 1867, and was leader of the Opposition in that body from 1868 until Dec., 1871 when called upon to form a Govt. for Ontario, which he succeeded in doing, accepting for himself

Sat for Montreal Centre in Quebec Assembly from g. e., 1867, to g. e., 1871, when defeated. Returned to Commons for present seat, Nov., 1871. CARTIER, *Hon. Sir* GEORGE ETIENNE, *Bart., Q.C.*
[*Montreal East.*] P.C.

Descended from a brother of the celebrated navigator and discoverer, Jacques Cartier, of

St. Malo, France. S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Jacques Cartier, of St. Antoine, River Chambly, by Marguerite, dau. of Joseph Paradis, Esq. B. at St. Antoine, 6 Sept., 1815. Ed. at the College of St. Sulpice, Montreal. M., 1846, Hortense, dau. of M. Edouard Raymond Fabre, of that city. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov., 1835. Created Q.C., 1854. Was made an honorary mem. of the Bar of U.C. by the Law Society, Hilary Term, 1866. A dir. of the Montreal Mining Co., and of the Life Association of Scot. Is author of the French national song: *O Canada, Mon Pays, Mes Amours!* and of other songs, which have been set to music. Has been Presdt. of the Montreal *St. Jean Baptiste Société*. Declined Solicitor-Generalship, L.C., 1851, and the Commissionership of Public Works, 1853. Declined the Companionship of the Bath (Civil), 1867. Was a Govt. director of the Grand Trunk Railway from Nov., 1852, to May, 1853, and has been Solicitor to the Co. for many years. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Speakership, Leg. Assembly, Can., 1854. Entered Parlt. as a supporter of Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin, became afterwards the principal supporter of Messrs. Hincks and Morin, and succeeded to the leadership of the French Canadian Conservative party on the retirement of Sir L. H. Lafontaine

and M. Morin. Sat for Verchères, (formerly Surrey and represented by his grandfather in the first Canadian Parlt.), in Can. Assembly from 1848 until g. e., 1861, when returned for present seat, which he represented until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Montreal at g. e., 1857. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, Can., from 27 Jan., 1855, to 29 July, 1858, from 6 Augt. of latter year to 23 May, 1862, and from 30 March, 1864, to the Union, and during these several periods was Provincial-Secy., from Jan., 1855 to May, 1856, and Attorney-General, L.C., from latter date to 1st Augt., 1858, when he resigned office with the other members of the Cabinet. Apptd. Inspector-General, 6 Augt. of that year. Was entrusted with the formation of a Govt., in which he held office of Attorney-General, L. C., from 7 Augt., 1868, until 21 May, 1862, when he and his Cabinet resigned, being defeated on the Militia Bill. Was a second time called upon to form a Govt. in March, 1864, but declined in favor of the late Sir Etienne Taché, in whose Administration he again held the office of Attorney-General, L.C., a position which he retained until the Union of the B.N.A. Provinces, July, 1867. Prominent features in the policy of the Cartier-Macdonald Administration of 1858, were: The Confederation of the B.N.A. Provinces (for

the first time adopted as a part of the policy of a Canadian Govt.); the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, and the maintenance of the Queen's decision in favor of Ottawa as the permanent seat of Govt. of Can. Proceeded as a delegate to Eng., 1858, to bring the two first named schemes under the attention of the Imperial authorities, as a means of settlement of the vexed Constitutional difficulties, which then existed in the Province of Can., and also the question of the acquisition by Can. of the Hudson's Bay Territory. The suggestions contained in the letter addressed at that time to the then Secy. of State for the Colonies (now Lord Lytton) by the delegates, constituted the basis of the policy of the Can. Coalition Govt. of 1864, formed for the purpose of securing the Confederation of B.N.A. Was chairman of Railway Committee of Can. Assembly from 1852, with the exception of one session, until the Union, a position which he also holds in the House of Commons. Returned to Commons last g. e. Represented Montreal East in Local Assembly from the Union until g. e., 1871, when returned for Beauharnois. M., Aug., 1859, Frances, eld. dau. of Col. Alex. Lawe, late H.E.I.C.S. A dir. of the Canada Life Assurance Co. Was Presdt. of the late Commercial Bank of Canada. Author of a pamphlet on the Militia question. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons for present seat at last g. e. An Independent Conservative.—*King St., Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

CAYLEY, MICHAEL. [*Beauharnois.*]

B. in Kilkenny, Irel., 15 May, 1842. Ed. at the College of St. Hyacinthe. M. Miss Azilda Giroux, of Montreal. Called to the Bar, L. C., Jan., 1864. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Beauharnois, Que.*

CHAUVEAU, *Hon.* PIERRE JOSEPH OLIVIER, *LL.D., Q.C.* [*County of Quebec.*]

Ancestors were early settlers at Charlesbourg, near Quebec. B. in Quebec, 30 May, 1820. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary. M., 1840, Miss Masse,

of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., Aug., 1841. Created Q.C., 1853. A well known French Canadian *littérateur*; author of *Charles Guérin*; *roman de mœurs Canadiennes*, &c. Is a corresponding mem. of the Academy of Natural Sciences (New Orleans), Presdt. of the *St. Jean Baptiste Société*, Quebec, a mem. of the Council of Public Instruction, and of the Board of Agriculture, Quebec. Has been Presdt. of the *Institut Canadien Français*, Mont.; and of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec. Was Solicitor-General for L.C., from Nov., 1851, to Aug., 1853; and Provincial-Secy., Can., from latter date to Jan., 1855, when he retired from office, and in same year was apptd. Superintendent of Education, L.C., an office which he held from that time until the Union. Called upon to form the first local Govt. under the "British North America Act, 1867," for the Province of Quebec, July, 1867; and was apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council of that Province with the offices of Provincial-Secretary and Registrar, and Minister of Education. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1844 to July, 1855, when he retired from Parl. Returned to Commons and Local House by acclamation at g. e., 1867. Re-elected to Local House at g. e., 1871. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Cor. CHEVAL, GUILLAUME. [*Rouville.*]

B. at Belœil, Que., 17 April, 1828. Ed. at St. Denis. M. there, Oct., 1852, Miss Hermelimbe Richer. A merchant. Has been Mayor of St. Hilaire for four years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal.—*St. Hilaire, Que.*

CHIPMAN, *Lieut.-Col.* LEVERETT DE VEBER.
[*Kings, N.S.*] 2ND MEM.

Family originally came from Eng. during the old times of persecution, and settled in the old New Eng. States; at the termination of the Am. revolution, Ward Chipman, formerly of Mass., a graduate of Harvard University, and who held the office of Deputy Muster-Master-General of the Loyalist forces in the revolted Colonies, settled in N.B., and founded a branch of the family there; he subsequently became Chief-Justice and President of that Province. (See *Sabine.*) Another branch was founded in N.S. by Handey Chipman, who proceeded there before the close of the revolution. S. of the late W. H. Is Lieut.-Col. of the 68th "Kings" Batt. of Volunteer Infantry, a mem. of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association, and agent at Kentville for the Bank of Nova Scotia. First returned to Parl. for present seat May, 1870, on the death of his father. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*Kentville, N.S.*

CIMON, SIMON XAVIER. [*Charlevoix.*]

COCKBURN, Hon. JAMES, Q.C. [*West Northumberland, Ontario.*]

S. of James Cockburn, merchant, by Sarah Turnbull, both of Berwick-on-Tweed, Eng. B. near Berwick, 13 Feb., 1819. Ed. at Berwick

Grammar School and Upper Canada College. M. Isabel, dau. of the late Lieut.-Col. Patterson, formerly of the 89th Regt. (she d. 1862.) Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1846. Created Q.C., 1863. Is *ex officio* a Bencher of the Law Society of Ontario, and is one of the Vice-Presidents of the Dominion Rifle Association. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., and Solicitor-General for U.C., from March, 1864, until the Union. Acted as Attorney-General, U.C., for some months in 1866, during the absence of that Minister in England. Was a mem. of the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Elected first Speaker of the House of Commons under the New Constitution, 6 Nov., 1867. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly, from 1861 until the Union. Elected to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John Macdonald.—*King St., Cobourg, Ont.; Speaker's Chambers, House of Commons, Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

COFFIN, THOMAS. [*Shelburne.*]

Ancestors came from Eng. and settled at Nantucket; thence removed to N.S. after the Am. revolution. S. of the late Thomas Coffin, Esq., by Margaret, dau. of the late Joseph Homer, Esq., a U.E. Loyalist, and for many years Collector of Customs at Barrington. B. at Bar-

ington, 1817. Ed. there. M., 1841, Miss Sarah Evans, (she d. Aug., 1870). An extensive merchant, ship builder and owner. Has made many successful voyages to different parts of the world in command of his own vessels. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly, from 1851 to 1855, and, again, from 1859 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. for present seat by acclamation. A Liberal.—*Harrington, N.S.*

COLBY, CHARLES CARROLL. [*Stanstead.*]

Paternal ancestors emigrated from Chester, Eng., to New Hampshire, before the Am. revolutionary war. S. of the late Dr. M. F. Colby, a well known medical practitioner, who came to Stanstead, 1832, and represented that county in the L.C. Assembly from 1834 until the suspension of the constitution, 1837. COUNNELL, Hon. CHARLES. [*Carleton, N.B.*]

S. of Charles Connell, Esq., a native of Conn., U.S. who removed at an early age to N.B., and settled on the site of Northampton, Co. Carleton. B. and ed there. M., 1835, Ann, dau. of Peter Fisher, Esq. Is a Justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, Co. Carleton, N.B., and a dir. of the Quebec and N.B. Railway Co. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., and Postmaster-Genl. from 1859 to 1860. Surveyor-Genl. from 1860 to 1867, and also a mem. of the Board of Works for some years. Sat in the L.C. of N.B. from 1849 to 1861, when he resigned. Represented Carleton in N. B. Assembly from 1846 to 1849, and again from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation. CRAWFORD, *Lieut.-Col.* JAMES. [*Brockville.*]

Eld. s. of the late Hon. Geo. Crawford, Senator by his first wife, Miss Brown. B. in Co. Cavan, Irel., 1816. Ed. by private tuition. M. the dau. of the late Rev. Michael Harris, and niece of the late Lady Castlemaine, of Moydrum Castle, Westmeath, Irel. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding 41st "Brockville" Batt. of Volunteer Rifles. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John Macdonald.—*Brockville, Ont.*

CRAWFORD, *Lieut.-Col.* JOHN, *Q.C.* [*South Leeds.*]

Second s. of the late Hon. Geo. Crawford, Senator, by his first wife, Miss Brown. B. in Co. Cavan, Irel. Ed. in Toronto. M. the dau. of the late Judge Sherwood, of that city. Called to the bar, U.C., in Trinity Term, 1839. Created Q.C., 1867. Is head of the law firm of Crawford & Crombie; Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Bank, and of the Imperial Building, Savings and

Investment Society, a Bencher of the Law Society of Ontario (elected 1871), and Lieut.-Col. 5th Batt. Toronto Militia. Has been Presdt. of the Toronto and Nipissing Railway Co. Sat for Toronto East in Can. Assembly from 1861 to g. e., 1863, when defeated. Returned to Commons at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John Macdonald. —*Cor. CURRIER, JOSEPH MERRILL. [*City of Ottawa.*]

Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Montreal, and the College of St. Hyacinthe. M., 1855, Marie Julie Arma, dau. of R. A. DORION, *Hon. ANTOINE AIME, Q.C.* [*Hochelaga.*]

S. of the late P. A. Dorion, Esq., who represented Champlain in the L. C. Assembly from 1830 to 1838; and grands. of the late P. Bureau, Esq., mem. for St. Maurice in the same body from 1820 to 1834; his brother, Jean Baptiste

Eric Dorion, (who d. Nov., 1866), sat for a considerable period in the Can. Assembly. B. at St Anne de la Pérade, 17 Jan., 1818. E.L. at Nicolet College. M., 1848, the dau. of the late Dr. Trestler, of Montreal (she d.) Called to the Bar, L.C., Jan., 1842. Created Q.C., 1863. Is Leader of the *Rouge* or French Canadian Liberal party of Quebec, a position which he has held since his first entrance into Parliament. Occupies a distinguished position at the Montreal Bar; and is Professor of Civil Law, Victoria College, Cobourg. Was *Barrister* of the Montreal Bar for some years. Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1857. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, Can., from 2 to 6 Augt., 1858, when the Govt., of which he was co-leader, resigned, not possessing the confidence of Parlt.; Provincial Secretary from May, 1862, to Jan., 1863, when he resigned his office and seat in the Cabinet on the Intercolonial Railway question; Attorney-General, L.C., and co-leader of the Govt. (with Hon. J. S. Macdonald as premier), from May, 1863, to March, 1864, when the Govt. retired from office. Sat in Can. Assembly as a mem. for Montreal from 1854 until g. e., 1861, when defeated, and for presents at from 1862 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. An unsuccessful candidate for Hoche-

FERGUSON, Major THOMAS ROBERTS, J.P.
[*Cardwell.*]

Descended from the ancient Scottish family of the same name distinguished in the history of North Britain. Eldest s. of the late Andrew Ferguson, Esq., of Drumcor, Co. Cavan, Irel. B. at Drumcor, Dec., 1818. Ed. there. Came to Can., 1842. M., 13 June, 1856, Frances Jane, second dau. of Wm. R. Gowan, Esq., formerly mem. for Leeds and Greville in the Can. Assembly. Is Reeve of Innisfil, Major 35th Batt. ("Simcoe Foresters") Volunteer Infantry, a dir. of the

Northern Railway, and a provisional dir. of the Huron and Ontario Ship Canal Co. Has been Warden of Simcoe, and an officer in the B.N.A. Orange Association. Sat for South Simcoe, in Can. Assembly, from g. e., 1857, until the Union. Represents that constituency in Local Legislature, to which he was elected by acclamation at g. e., 1867. Returned to Commons for present seat at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Cookstown, Ont.*

FERRIS, JOHN. [*Queens, N.B.*]

settled in Island of St. Kitts, establishing a branch of the family there. S. of — Forbes, Esq., a native of St. Kitts, and an officer in the 64th Regt., who after retiring from the army was apptd. Collector of Customs at Yarmouth, N.S. B. at Gibraltar, 1820. Graduated at University College, N.Y. M. Sarah Jane, only dau. of W. S. Jacobs, Esq., of Liverpool, N.S. A physician. Is surgeon to 1st Batt. Queens Co. Militia. Has been Coroner for the Co. for over 20 years, and Health officer for Liverpool and the Co. for a longer period. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal.—*Liverpool, N.S.*

FORTIER, MOISE, J.P. [*Yamaska.*]

S. of M. Chas. Fortier, *Cultivateur*, of St. Léon, Que. B. 11 Nov., 1815. M., Oct., 1836, Mdle. Mathilde Paradis, of Rivière du Loup *en haut*. Has been Mayor of the Parish of St. David, for the past 22 years. Is Vice-Presdt. of the Richelieu, Drummond and Arthabaska Railway. Sat for present seat in Can Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Govt.—*St. David, Que.*

FORTIN, PIERRE, M.D. [*Gaspé.*]

B. at Verchères, Que., Dec., 1823. Received his classical education at Montreal Seminary;

studied medicine at McGill College, where he took his degree, 1845. Unmarried. Served as surgeon at Quarantine, Grosse Isle, during 1847 (fever year) and 1848. Aided in 1849 in forming a special mounted constabulary force for quelling disturbances of the peace in Montreal and adjoining districts, a troop of which was placed under his command. Was stipendiary magistrate for the protection of the fisheries in the lower River and Gulf of St. Lawrence from 1852 until the Union, when he resigned, and as such, commanded first, the armed steamer *Doris*, and afterwards the armed schooner *La Canadienne*, built specially for the service, from which latter vessel he was wrecked in Nov., 1861, during a violent storm on the North Coast. First returned to Parl. at last g. e. for present seat in both Houses, by acclamation. Re-elected to Local House at last g. e. by acclamation. GALT, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. Sir ALEXANDER TILLOCH*
K.C.M.G., D.C.L. [Sherbrooke.] P.C.

Youngest s. of the late John Galt, Esq, the author of many well known works of fiction in English literature, who was some years a Commissioner of the Canada Land Co. B. at Chelsea, Eng., 6 Sept., 1817. Ed. in England. M., 1st., Elliot, dau. of the late John Torrance, Esq., of Montreal (she d.); 2ndly, Amy, sister of the above: A member of the Council of Public Instruction L.C.; Lieut.-Col. Sherbrooke Reserve Militia; chairman of the Massawippi Railroad Co.; 1st Vice-Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal; a dir. of the Boston Mining and Smelting Co., and of the Standard Life Assurance Co. Was for many years in the service of the British American Land Co., and held the office of Chief Commissioner of the Co. for a considerable period previous to his retirement

from it. Was Presdt. of the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad in 1852-3, and carried out the amalgamation of that line with the Quebec and Richmond, Atlantic and St. Lawrence, Toronto and Guelph, and Montreal and Toronto, forming the railway system now known as the Grand Trunk Railway, of which line he was a Govt. director, 1857-8. Proposed resolutions in Parliament in favor of a Federal Union of B.N.A. Colonies, 1858, which became the basis of the policy of the Government, which he joined that year under Sir G. E. Cartier, and, together with that gentleman and the Hon. John Ross, proceeded as a delegate to England to urge before the Imperial Govt. the Confederation of B.N.A., and the construction of the Intercolonial Railway. Called upon to form an Administration, 1858, but declined. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Minister Finance, Can., from 7 Augt., 1858, to 21 May, 1862, when the ministry was defeated on the Militia Bill. Held the same office a second time from March, 1864, to Aug., 1866, when in his capacity of leader and representative of the British population of L.C., he resigned his office and seat in the Cabinet on the educational policy of the administration. Appointed Minister of Finance of the Dominion, 1 July, 1867, on which occasion he was sworn of the Queen's

Privy Council of Can., and continued to hold office until 4 Nov. of that year; when he resigned his seat in the Cabinet for private reasons. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864, to that at Quebec, same year; a mem. of Confederate Council of Trade, Quebec, 1865; delegate to Washington respecting the renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty, 1866; and to the London Colonial Conference, 1866-7. Declined the C.B., (Civil), 1867; the mission to Eng. with Hon. Dr. Tupper, on the Nova Scotia question, March, 1868; and the Finance ministership, on resignation of Sir John Rose, 1869. Author of *Canada from 1849 to 1859*, and other pamphlets of public interest. Created a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 1869. The consolidation of the public debt with provision for its redemption; the encouragement of direct foreign trade; the abolition of the Canal and Lake St. Peter tolls; and the issuing of Provincial Notes as currency, are among the most noticeable features of Sir A. T. Galt's financial administration. Sat for Sherbrooke (county) in Can. Assembly from 1849 to 1850, when he resigned his seat; and for Sherbrooke (town) from 1853 until the Union. Elected to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative; opposed to the present Government.

Assembly from 1864 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Ste. Geneviève, Que.*

GAUDET, JOSEPH, *J.P.* [*Nicolet.*]

A mem. of the Council of Agriculture for Quebec. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1857, until the Union. Returned to

Commons at last g. e. Represented same seat in the Local House from g. e., 1867, until g. e., 1871. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Gentilly, Que.*

GAOFFRION, FÉLIX, N.P. [*Verchères.*]

S. of M. Félix Gaoffrion, of St. Simon, Co. Bagot, by the late Catherine Brodeur. B. at Verchères, Q., 4 Oct., 1832. M., Oct., 1856, Almaïde, the youngest dau. of Joseph Danzereau, Esq., of Verchères. A Notary Public. Was Registrar for Verchères from 1854 to 1863. Has been Secy.-Treasurer of County Schools. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal, and opposed to present Government.—*Verchères, Que.*

GENDRON, PIERRE SAMUEL, N.P. [*Bagot.*]

S. of M. Simon Gendron, *Cultivateur*, of Ste. Rosalie. B. there, 31 Augt., 1828. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe College. M., 1850, Louise, dau. of M. Marcel Fournier, of St. Simon. A Notary Public. Is Presdt. of the Bagot Colonization Society. Has been Secy.-Treasurer of the Municipal Council of Bagot for the past 14 years. First returned to Parlt., at g. e., 1867, to Commons and Local House. Re-elected to Local House at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Ste. Rosalie, Que.*

GIBBS, THOMAS NICHOLSON, J.P. [*South Ontario.*]

Of Norman descent. S. of Mr. Thos. Gibbs, who came to Canada from Kingsbridge, Devonshire, Eng., in 1819, settled at Terrebonne, Q., and in 1832 removed to Oshawa, Ont.; and cousin of F. W. Gibbs, Esq., C.B., formerly tutor to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. B. at Terrebonne, 11 March, 1821. Ed. in Eng. M., Augt., 1843, Almira, youngest dau. of the late Joseph Ash, Esq., of Cobourg, Ont. Head of the firm of Gibbs & Brother, produce dealers and proprietors of the Oshawa Mills. Is Vice-Presdt. of Ontario Bank, and a dir. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co., and of the Dominion Telegraph Co. Was the first Reeve elected for Oshawa, 1850; and the first Warden elected for the Co., 1854. Contested North Ontario unsuccessfully at g. e., 1854. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from Jan., 1865, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Oshawa, Ont.*

GODIN, FRANCOIS-BENJAMIN. [*Joliette.*]

S. of M. Joseph Godin, formerly a clerk in the late North West Fur Co., by Sophie Connaissance. B. at St. Constant, Q., 28 March, 1828. Ed. in Montreal. M., 1850, Alice, dau. of M. Chas. Bernard, of Berthier. Called to the Bar,

L.C., 1849. First returned to Parl. at last g. e. An unsuccessful candidate for Joliette in Local House, g. e., 1871. A Liberal, and opposed to present Government.—*Joliette, Que.*

GRANT, JAMES ALEXANDER, M.D., F.G.S., F.R.C.S.
(Edin.) [*Russell.*]

S. of the late Dr. James Grant, a well known physician in Co. Glengarry, Ont.; and grands. of James Grant, Esq., of Corrimony, Scot., author of *Essays on the Origin of Society, Thoughts on the Origin and Descent of the Gael*, who was an advocate in Edinburgh, and at the time of his death (1835) the father of the Scottish Bar. (See Anderson's *Scottish Nation*.) B. in Inverness-shire, Scot., Augt., 1829. Came to Can. with his parents, 1830. Ed. at the University of Queen's College, Kingston, in arts, and at McGill College, Montreal, in medicine. Took the degree of M.D. at latter institution, 1854. M., 1855, Maria, second dau. of the late Ed. Malloch, Esq., who sat for Carleton in the L.A. of U.O. before, and in the L.A. Can., after the Union of 1840. A Fellow of the Geological Society, Eng. and of the Royal College of Surgeons, (Edin.); mem. of the Royal College of Surgeons, (Lon.), and of the Royal College of Physicians (Lon.) and a corresponding mem. of the Academy of Natural Sciences, Phil-

adelphia. Has been President of the Medical Council of U.C., of the Mechanics' Institute and Athenæum, Ottawa, and of the St. Andrew's Society of same city, and Vice Presdt. of the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway Co. Is Vice-Presdt. (for Ontario) of the Canadian Medical Association. Author of various papers on medical and surgical science in English and Canadian medical journals. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Rideau St., Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

GRAY, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN HAMILTON, D.C.L.,*
Q. C. [St. John, City and County, N.B.]

Descended from an old Eng. family. S. of the late Wm. Gray, Esq., for many years H. M.'s Consul in Virginia, U.S.; and grands. of Joseph Gray, a U.E. loyalist, formerly of Boston, Mass., who settled in Halifax at the termination of the Am. revolution. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists*.) B. at St. Georges, Bermuda, 1814. Ed. at King's College, Windsor, N.S. where he graduated A.B., 1833. M., at Dublin, 1845, the eld. dau. of Lieut.-Col. Ormond, of H. M.'s 30th Regt. of Foot. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1837. Created Q.C., 1853. Received degree of D.C.L. from University of New Brunswick, 1866. Holds a distinguished position as a mem. of the Bar and *Nisi Prius*

Counsel. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the Queen's New Brunswick Rangers and Vice-Presdt. Dominion Rifle Assocn. Was for many years Presdt. of the St. George's Society of St. John. Was a mem. of Executive Council, N.B., from 1851 to 1854, and from May, 1856 to June, 1857; Attorney-General, 1856-7, and Speaker of the House of Assembly, from 1866 until the Union. Holds a special patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex-Councillor, 1855. Was Chairman of commission, composed of himself, Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Dr. Dawson, and Hon. Messrs. Saunders and Brown, of N.B., for inquiring into the affairs of and popularizing King's College, Fredericton, 1854. (Report and Bill thereon adopted by the Legislature, 1859); Umpire between Great Britain and the U.S. under the Treaty of Washington, 1857-8, and received therefor the approval and thanks of H. M.'s Govt. through Lord John Russell, then Secy. of Foreign Affairs; (See *Awards of Hon. J. H. Gray as Umpire; St. John*, 1858); H. M.'s Commissioner, under the Great Seal, to settle, in conjunction with Hon. Messrs. Howe and Bitchie, the tenant right question in P.E.I., 1860; a delegate to Portland Railway Convention, 1850; to Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; and to that at Quebec, same year; Chairman of Committee

of Supply, House of Commons, 1837-8. Author of *The Practical Application of Passing Bills to the Improvement of our own Country*; a lecture (St. John, 1833); *the Isthmus of Panama*, a sketch (do. 1837); *An Oration at the Entrance of the University of New Brunswick* (do. 1838), and of numerous other published lectures and addresses. Appointed Arbitrator for the Dominion under the 142nd section of the R. N. America Act, 1837-38. Sat for present seat in N.B. Assembly from 1850 until 1852, when defeated at g. e. Returned again on the death of Mr. Jordan, the sitting mem., in March, 1853. Sat from 1853 until 1855, when on dissolution on the Union question, was defeated at the g. e. with Messrs. Tilley, Fisher, and other supporters of the Union. Returned again at g. e., in 1855, on the Union question being again submitted, and sat until the Union in July, 1857. Returned to Commons at that g. e. by acclamation. Among the measures introduced by him and carried through the N.B. Parl., may be mentioned: the consolidation and amendment of the laws regulating letters patent; an act giving committees of the legislature judicial powers on investigations in relation to public offices and public works; an act authorizing magisterial investigation in cases of fire without preliminary com-

plaint on oath; an act enabling parties sustaining damage by the negligence or default of the commissioners of Govt. railways to maintain an action against the Govt.; has been a steady advocate of the construction of railways and of Govt. aid thereto; and of the International Railway and Union of the Provinces since he entered public life in 1860. He introduced a measure for enabling parties having claims against Govt., either on contract or otherwise, to prosecute the same in the courts of law, which principle, however, was not sustained by the legislature. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*St. John, N.B.; Daily Star, Ottawa; Rideau (Yud).*

First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Norwood, Ont.*

HARRISON, ROBERT ALEXANDER, D.C.L., Q.C.
[New Toronto.]

S. of the late Richard Harrison, Esq., formerly of Skeggaray, Co. Monaghan, Irel. B. in Montreal, 3 Aug., 1833. Ed. at Upper Canada College, and at the University of Trinity College, Toronto, at which latter institution he graduated, 1855, receiving degree of B.C.L., and afterwards that of D.C.L. M., June, 1858, Anna, dau. of the late J. M. Muckle, Esq., formerly a merchant in Quebec, (she d. 1865); andly, 1862, Kennethina Johanna Mackay, only dau. of the late Hugh Scobie, Esq., editor and proprietor of the *British Colonist*, Toronto. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1858. Created Q.C., 1867. Elected a Benchet of the Law Society of Ont., 1871. Head of the extensive law firm of Harrison, Guler & Moss, Toronto. Was Chief Clerk of the Crown Law Dept., U.C., from 1854 to 1858. Has been joint editor of the *Upper Canada Law Journal* since 1867. Founded the *Local Courts' Gazette*, of which he is one of the editors. Author of the following and other law works: *Robinson and Harrison's Digest of Can*

decided in the Queen's Bench and Practice Courts from 1823 to 1861, (Toronto, 1862); The Statutes of Practical Utility, (do., 1867); The Common Law Procedure Act, &c., with notes of decided cases, (do., 1868, new ed. 1870); The Municipal Manual for Upper Canada, (do., 1869; new ed. 1887); A Digest of all cases decided in the several Courts of Error and Appeal, Queen's Bench, &c., (do., 1868). Youngest s. of Alex. and Elizabeth Holmes. B. in Newtownforbes, Longford, Irel., 1828. Ed. there. M. Eliza, dau. of Mr. A. Graham, Ottawa. A Provincial Land Surveyor. Came to Can. with his parents, 1846, and settled in Huntley. Is Capt. 43rd Batt. V. M. Was Reeve of Huntley for 7 years, and Warden of Carleton for 5 years. First returned to Parl. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Huntley, Ont.*

HOLTON, Hon. LUTHER HAMILTON, *J.P.* [*Chateauguay*.]

B. in South Leeds, Ont., 1817. Removed to

Montreal, 1826, where he entered mercantile life, and was for many years a mem. of the firm of Hooker & Holton, forwarders. M. Miss Forbes. Is Presdt. of the Montreal City and District Savings Bank, and a Major (retired list) in the Militia. Was a contractor for a portion of the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railway. Has been Presdt. of the Board of Trade (repeatedly), a Vice-Presdt. of the Free Trade Association, a Harbor Commissioner, a dir. of the City Bank, and a mem. of the Corporation of Montreal. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 2 to 6 Aug., 1858, and from May, 1863, to March, 1864; and held the office of Commissioner of Public Works, Can., from 2 to 6 Aug., 1858; and that of Minister of Finance from May, 1863, to March, 1864, when the Govt. resigned. Was a Govt. Director of the Grand Trunk Railway from Nov., 1852 to July, 1857. Sat for Montreal in Can. Assembly from 1854 till 1857, when defeated. Was mem. for Victoria Division in L.C., Can., from Sept., 1862, to May, 1863, when he resigned, (on being appointed Minister of Finance,) and was returned for present seat, which he represented until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. Represented Montreal Centre in the Local House (where he leads the English Opposition), for which he was

returned at g. e., 1871. Entered Parl. as an advanced Liberal, and has always been in accord with the Liberal party, except on question of Confederation, which temporarily divided that party. Opposed to the present Administration.—1043 *Sherbrooke St., Montreal; St. James Club; Rideau Club.*

HOUGHTON, PHILIP. [*Yale-Kootenay.*]

HINCKS, Hon. Sir FRANCIS, K.C.M.G., C.B.
[*North Kenfrew.*] 2ND MEM. P.C.

Youngest s. of the late Rev. Dr. Hincks Professor of Oriental Languages in the Royal Belfast Institution; and bro. of the late Rev. Edward Hincks, D.D., formerly Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin, and afterwards Rector of Killyleagh, who was well known by his writings on subjects connected with Egyptian, Persian and Assyrian Archæology. The Irish family is a branch of one long settled in Chester, England. B. in the City of Cork, 14 Dec., 1807. Ed. at the Royal Belfast Institution. M., 1832, Martha Anne, dau. of Alexander Stewart,

Esq., of Ligoniel, near Belfast. Founded, in 1839, the Toronto *Examiner*, a Reform journal, which he edited for several years; and, in 1844, the Montreal *Pilot*, also devoted to the interests of the Reform party, of which he was for many years chief political writer. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Inspector-Genl. of Can. from June, 1842, to Nov., 1843, when he retired from the Govt. with his political chiefs, Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin; held the same office again: 1st, from March, 1848, to Oct., 1851, in the Cabinet of Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin, and, 2ndly, from latter date to Sept., 1854, in the Hincks-Morin Administration, of which he was the leader. Visited Washington on several occasions to confer with the British Minister there on the subject of commercial intercourse between Can. and the U.S., and was selected by the Earl of Elgin to accompany him as representative of Can. when he negotiated the Reciprocity Treaty in 1854; was a delegate to the Maritime Provinces in 1852 on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway, and in the same year a delegate to the Imperial Govt. to urge the repeal of the Clergy Reserve Act, and the grant of a guarantee for the Intercolonial Railroad, during which visit he made the preliminary arrangements with Messrs. Peto, Brassey, Betts & Jackson, which

resulted in the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway by English capitalists. Was Governor-in-Chief of Barbadoes and the Windward Islands from 1855 to 1862; and Governor of British Guiana from latter date until 1869. Created a Companion of the Order of the Bath (Civil), 1862; and a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 1869. Sworn of the Privy Council of Can., and appointed Minister of Finance for the Dominion, 9 Oct., 1869. Is Presdt. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co. of Canada; and a member of Council of Royal Colonial Institute, London, Eng. Author of various pamphlets on public affairs. First returned to Parlt. at g. e., 1841, for Oxford, in Can. Assembly, which he represented until g. e., 1844, when defeated. Returned for same County at g. e., 1847, again at g. e., 1851, and also for Niagara, but elected to sit for Oxford. Returned for South Oxford and for Renfrew at g. e., 1854; elected to sit for latter seat, which he did until he temporarily retired from Canadian public life, 1855, on accepting an appointment from the Imperial Govt. On again accepting office in Can., returned for North Renfrew in the Commons, Oct., 1869. A Liberal.—*Vittoria St., Ottawa; Reform Club, London; Rideau Club.*

HOWE, Hon. JOSEPH. [*Hants.*]

P.O.

Family originally came from the southern counties of Eng. during the old times of persecution, and settled in the New Eng. States. S. of the late John Howe, a loyalist, formerly of Boston, Mass., where, at the revolutionary era, he conducted the *Massachusetts Gazette and Boston News Letter*, and latterly of Halifax, where he held the office of King's Printer and Postmaster-General for a lengthened period; and bro. of the late Asst. Com. Gen. Howe. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists*.) B. on the North West Arm, Halifax, N.S., 1804. Ed. by his father. M., 2 Feb., 1828, Catherine Susan Ann, only dau. of Capt. John MacNab, Nova Scotia Fencibles. A Governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax, and of King's College, Windsor; a Vice-Presdt. of the N.S. Historical Society, and Presdt. of the Mechanics' Institute, Halifax. Was for many years a prominent journalist in N.S.; editor and proprietor of *The Acadian* (Halifax) from 1827 to 1828, and of the *Nova Scotian*, from the latter year until 1841, when he retired from the press for a brief period, but returned in 1844, and edited the *Nova Scotian* and the *Morning Chronicle*, from that time until 1856. Was Speaker of the Leg. Assembly, N.S., 1840-1; Indian Commissioner, (without

salary or commissions,) 1841-42; Collector of Customs, Halifax, 1842-43; a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.S., from 1841 to 1843; from 1848 to 1854, and again from 1860 to 1863; Provincial-Secretary from 1848 to 1854, and from 1860 to 1863; Chairman of Govt. Privy Council of the Island of Jamaica. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Hilary Term, 1836. Created Q.C., 1846. A Bencher *ex-officio* of the Law Society of Ontario. Is the grand representative in Can.

of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Eng., and holds the rank of a Past Grand Senior Warden of the Freemasons of Can. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 11 May, 1847, to 10 March, 1848, from 11 Sept., 1854, to 29 July, 1858, from 6 Aug., same year, to 23 May, 1862, and from 30 March, 1864, until the Union; and was during these several periods, Receiver-Genl. from 21 May to 7 Dec., 1847; Commissioner of Crown Lands from latter date to 10 March, 1848; Attorney-General for U.C. from 11 Sept., 1854, to 29 July, 1858, when as Prime Minister he and his Cabinet resigned on being defeated on the Seat of Govt. question. Returned to office on 6 Aug., same year, as Postmaster-Genl., a position which he resigned on following day, on his re-appointment as Attorney-Genl., U.C., which he continued to hold until the defeat of the Administration on the Militia Bill, in May, 1862, when he and his colleagues again retired from office. Sir George E. Cartier and he led the Opposition in the Assembly, and so continued until the formation of the Taché-Macdonald Govt., 30 March, 1864, when he returned to his old office of Attorney-Genl., and led in the Assembly from that time until the Union of the B.A. Provinces, 1867. Created a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of *Isabella la Católica* (of Spain), Jan., 1872. Sat for Kingston in L.A., Can., from Nov., 1844, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e., Sir John A. Macdonald's legislation includes the following measures: The secularization of the clergy reserves; the improvement of the militia laws; amendments to the law relating to the jurisdiction and procedure of the surrogate courts; abolishment of imprisonment for debt in certain cases; prevention of preferential assignments to creditors; amendment of the jury law; amendment of the election law; improvement of municipal institutions in U.C.; punishment of frauds by bankers, trustees, &c.; defining election franchise; amendments to controverted elections act; consolidation of the statutes for Canada and U.C. respectively; utilization of convict labor in the penitentiary; respecting courts of supe-

N. A. Provinces ; prevention of contagious diseases at naval and military stations in Can-

ada; Amendments to the acts respecting the militia and volunteer militia force; respecting the hearing of causes in Court of Chancery; prevention of unlawful training of persons to the use of arms, &c.; lawless aggressions act; suspension of *habeas corpus*; interpretation act; members' indemnity; construction of Intercolonial railway; continuing Parliament in case of the demise of the Crown; respecting the publication of parliamentary papers; securing the Independence of Parliament; indemnification of certain members; providing for the internal economy of the House of Commons; respecting commissions, and oaths of allegiance and of office; respecting the security to be given by officers of Canada; respecting inquiries concerning public matters; respecting the manufacture or importation of copper coins or tokens; respecting aliens and naturalization; providing for the better security of the Crown and of the Government; respecting forgery, perjury, and intimidation in connection with the Provincial Legislatures; respecting accessories to and abettors of indictable offences; respecting police of Canada; respecting persons in custody charged with high treason or felony; respecting penitentiaries and the directors thereof; and for providing for taking evidence in Canada in relation

MACDONALD, *Lieut.-Col., Hon. JOHN SANDFIELD, Q.C. [Cornwall.]*

Descended from an ancient Highland family that settled in Glengarry in 1786. B. at St. Raphael, Ont., 20 Dec., 1812. Ed. under the late Dr. Urquhart at Cornwall. M. the dau. of the late Hon. George A. Waggaman, for some years Secy. of State and a Senator of Louisiana. Called to the Bar of U.C., Trinity Term, 1840. Created Q.C., 1849. Is a Bencher *ex-officio* of the Law Society of Ontario, Lieut.-Col. commanding Cornwall Reserve Militia, and Vice-Presdt. of the Ontario Rifle Association. Was Solicitor-General of U.C., from Dec., 1849, to Nov., 1851; Speaker of Legislative Assembly, Can., from August, 1852, to June, 1854; a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., and Attorney-General for Upper Canada from 2 to 4 Aug., 1858; and again, (in his own administration), holding during the same time the office of Minister of Militia Affairs from May, 1862, to March, 1864, when he, with his colleagues, resigned office. Was Attorney-General and Prime Minister of Ontario, from July, 1867, until Dec., 1871, when the ministry being defeated he retired from office.

Was the "*Doyen*" of the Can. Assembly at the Union. Sat for Glengarry in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1841, to g. e., 1857, when he was returned for present seat, which he continued to represent until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Stormont at g. e., 1861. Returned to Commons at last g. e. Represents Cornwall in Local House. A Liberal; supports the present Administration. "*Ivy Hall*," *Cornwall*; *Toronto Club*; *Rideau Club*.

MACFARLANE, ROBERT. [*South Perth.*]

Youngest s. of William MacFarlane, Esq., formerly of Mondone, Perthshire, Scot., and latterly of Williamstown, Glengarry, Ont., by Isabella, dau. of Wm. Dickson, Esq., of Dalkeith, Scot. B. at Pakenham, Co. Lanark, Ont., 23 March, 1835. Ed. at Perth and Toronto. M., Nov., 1870, Mary Elizabeth, only dau. of James Wood, Esq., of Woodside, Ont. Called to the Bar, U.C., Michaelmas Term, 1857. Sat for Perth, in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1863, until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat, 1862. Returned to Commons at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Administration.—*Stratford, Ont.*

MACKENZIE, Hon. ALEXANDER. [*Lambton.*]

B. at Dunkeld, Perthshire, Scot. Edited for some years the *Lambton Shield*, a Reform jour-

nal. Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1865. Has been Leader of the Ontario Opposition in the House of Commons since the Union. Is Major 27th "Lambton" Batt. of Volunteer Infantry; Presdt. of the Isolated Risk Fire Insurance Co., and Chairman of the Canadian Baptist Edifice Society. Apptd. a mem. of the Ex. Council and Treasurer of Ontario, Dec., 1871. Several important public measures owe their existence to Mr. M., viz.: the Act amending the Assessment Act of U.C. (1863); that consolidating and amending the acts relating to the Assessment of Property, U.C. (1866); and the highly useful measure for providing means of egress from Public Buildings (1866). As Chairman of the Committee on Municipal and Assessment Laws (1866). Mr. M. wrote and framed the greater part of the General Act on Municipal Corporations, &c. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. Represents West Middlesex in Local House, for which he was elected at g. e., 1871. In favor of British connection and the extension of the Dominion. A Liberal; thoroughly opposed to the present Administration.—*Toronto; Sarnia, Ont.*

MAGILL, Lieut.-Col. CHARLES. [*Hamilton.*]

Family come to Can. from Irel., 1832. S. of

the late Mr. Robert Magill, a merchant of Westport, Co. Mayo, Irel., who had previously served in the British Army, by Catherine Benner. B. in Westport, 1 March, 1816. Ed. there. M., Sep., 1848, Miss Ann Eliza Wright, of Hamilton. A Dry Goods merchant. Served as a Volunteer Officer at the frontier, 1837. Was Mayor of Hamilton, 1854-5, and in 1865-6; and was Chairman of the Board of Water Commissioners during the construction of the magnificent water works of that city. Is Lieut.-Col. Hamilton Reserve Militia, and a dir. of the Gore District Mutual Insurance Co. Sat in Can. Assembly for present seat from 1865 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Liberal; opposed to the present Administration.—*Hamilton.*

MASSON, *Lieut.-Col.* LOUIS FRANCOIS RODERIQUE.
[*Terrebonne.*]

Fourth s. of the late Hon. Joseph Masson; and bro. of Hon. Edouard Masson, late M.L.C., Can. B. at Terrebonne, Q., 7 Nov., 1833. Ed. at the Jesuit College, Georgetown, Worcester, U.S., and completed his classical studies at the College of St. Hyacinthe, Q. M., 1856, Louisa Rachel, eld. dau. of the late Lt.-Col. Alexander McKenzie, and grand-d. of the late Hon. Roderick McKenzie, a partner in the North-West Fur Co.

Called to the Bar, L.O., Nov., 1859. Has held a commission in the Can. Volunteer Militia force since Oct., 1862, and was appointed Brigade Major 8th Military District, L.O., 21 Aug., 1863, which he resigned, Jan., 1868. Served on the frontier during the first Fenian raid, March, 1866, and was on active service during the second raid, in the same year; promoted to present rank, 1867. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. by acclamation. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Terrebonne.*

MASSON, Lieut.-Col. LUC HYACINTHE, M.D.
[*Soulanges.*]

M., 1st., 1839, his cousin, Miss Célinie Masson (she d.); 2ndly, 1850, Eleodie, dau. of J. Watier, Esq., of Coteau du Lac. Is Lieut.-Col, 4th Regt. of Huntingdon Militia; and Presdt. of the Soulanges Agricultural Society. Was collector of Customs at Dundee, Q., for some years. Has been Mayor of Coteau Landing, and Warden of Soulanges. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1854, to g. e., 1857. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g. e., 1861. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative,

and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Coteau Landing, Que.*

McCALLUM, LAURLIN. [*Monck.*]

A shipbuilder and owner. Captain of the Dunnville Naval Co., which he commanded at Fort Erie during the Fenian raid, June, 1866. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Haldimand in Can. Assembly at g. e., 1868. First returned to Parliament at last g. e. for present seat. Elected for Monck in Local House, g. e., 1871. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Stromness, Ont.*

McCONKEY, THOMAS DAVID, J.P. [*North Simcoe.*]

Descended from a Scottish family that migrated to the North of Irel. some centuries ago. S. of the late Mr. Thomas McConkey, of Innisfil. Co. Simcoe. B. in the Co. of Tyrone, Irel., 29 July, 1815. Ed. in Can. M. Mary, dau. of Benjamin Ross, Esq., of Innisfil. Has been Reeve of Barrie and Warden of the Co. Simcoe. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g. e., 1861. Returned by acclamation to House of Commons at last g. e. A. Liberal.—*Barrie, Ont.*

MCDONALD, EDMUND MORTIMER. [*Lunenburg.*]

Of Scottish descent. Grandparents emigra-

ted to N.S. from the Highlands of Scot. B. at West River, Pictou, N.S., 29 Sept., 1825. Was editor of the *Halifax Citizen* for some years up to 1871. Held the office of Registrar of Deeds, Co. Pictou, for a short period; and was Queen's Printer, N.S., from Feb., 1860 to June, 1863; and from Nov., 1867, to Feb., 1869, when he resigned the office. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal. Was previously opposed to Confederation, but is now satisfied with the financial concessions made to N.S., and is willing to work out the Union.—7 *Kent St., Halifax, N.S.*

McDONALD, HUGH. [*Antigonish.*]

Descended from the family of McDonald of the Keppeck, in the Highlands of Scot. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 1826. Ed. there. M., 1856, Sarah, dau. of Capt. Smith. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1855. Declined the Solicitor-Generalship, N.S., 1862. An anti-union delegate from N.S. to Eng., with Messrs. Howe and Annand, 1866. Sat for Inverness in N.S. Assembly, from 1859 to 1862. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat at a previous election. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Antigonish, N.S.*

McDOUGALL, JOHN LOBN. [*South Renfrew.*] 2ND MEM.

S. of the late J. L. MacDougall, Esq., who sat for Renfrew in Can. Assembly for a short period in 1858, when he resigned. B. at Renfrew. Ed. at High School, Montreal, and at University College, Toronto, where he took gold medal in Mathematics, and graduated B.A., 1859. M., Sept., 1870, Miss Marion E. Morris of Ottawa. A mill owner. Is Presdt. of the South Renfrew Agricultural Society. Has been Warden of Renfrew. First returned to Parl. at g. e., 1867 for present seat in Local House. Returned to Commons, in Sept., 1869, on resignation of sitting member. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Administration.—*Renfrew, Ont.*

McDOUGALL, Hon. WILLIAM, C.B., [*North Lanark.*] P.C.

S. of the late Daniel McDougall, Esq., of St. Mary's, Ont., a native of Toronto (then York; U.C.) where he was born in 1796; and grands. of the late John McDougall, Esq., a native of Scot., and a U.E. Loyalist, who served in the British Commissariat service during the Am. Revolution, settled in Nova Scotia at the termination of hostilities, and subsequently removed to U.C.B. in Toronto, 25 Jan., 1822. Ed. there and at Victoria College, Cobourg. M., 1845, Amelia

Caroline, dau. of Joseph Easton, Esq., of Millbank, (she d. Jan., 1869). Admitted as an Attorney, U.C., many years since. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1862. Founded (1848) the *Canada Farmer*, an agricultural journal, subsequently merged in the *Canadian Agriculturist*, which he published and edited until 1858. Founded (1850) the *North American*, a Reform newspaper, of which he was chief editor, until it was merged in the *Toronto Daily Globe*, in 1857. Was the leading political writer on the *Daily Globe*, from 1857 to 1860. Represented Canada at the New York Exhibition, 1853. Was secretary of the Constitutional Reform Association of U.C., 1859; a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, Can., from May, 1862, to March, 1864, when the Govt., of which he was a mem., resigned; Provincial-Secretary, in the Union Administration, from June, 1864, and acting Minister of Marine (with charge of Provincial gunboats on the lakes), from July, 1866, until the Union of Provinces, 1867. Sworn of the Queen's Privy Council and was Minister of Public Works for the Dominion, from 1 July, 1867, until commissioned Lieut.-Governor of Rupert's Land and the North West Territories, Oct., 1869. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty the Queen, 1867. Was Chair-

man of the Commission apptd. to open trade relations with the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil, 1865-6. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; to that in Quebec, in the same year; and to the Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Colonies, 1866-7. Delegate to Eng., with Sir G. E. Cartier, to confer with Imperial authorities on the defences of the Dominion and for the acquisition of the North West Territory, 1868. Apptd: Govt. Trustee of Canada Southern Railway Municipal Bonds, 1870; and Commissioner for Ontario to settle North Western Boundary of the Province, 1871. Is senior partner in the law firm of McDougall, English & McDougall; Presdt. of the Rent Guarantee, Loan, Aid and Investment Co.; and a dir. of the Mutual Life Association of Canada. Mr. McDougall's legislation includes: The public lands' amendment act; the Bureau of Agriculture and Agricultural Societies act; the act providing for the disposal of property of lunatics; the corrupt practices at elections act; the grammar school act, 1866; the act providing for granting charters of incorporation to companies; the Public Works act, 1867; and the Patents of Inventions act. for North Ontario from g. e., 1863, until July, 1864; and for present seat from Nov., 1864, until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. MCDougall, WILLIAM. [*Three Rivers.*] 2ND MEM.

Second s. of the late John McDougall, Esq., merchant, who sat for Drummond in the Can. Assembly from 1851 to 1854. B. in Scot., 1831. Accompanied his parents to Can. when very young. M. the dau. of the late John Wilson Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., Jan., 1851. Is a dir. of the North Shore Railway Co. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g. e., 1863. First returned to Parl. Oct., 1868, on resignation of sitting mem., by acclamation. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Alexander St., Three Rivers, Que.*

McGreevy, Hon. THOMAS. [*Quebec West.*]

B. in Irel. M., 1st, Miss Nolan, of Quebec (she d.); 2ndly, the dau. of the late J. B. Woolsey, Esq., of same city. A contractor and capitalist.

Built the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, the Quebec Custom House, and other important public edifices. Is Presdt. of the St. Lawrence Tow Boat Co., Vice-Presdt. of the Union Bank of Lower Canada, and of the North Shore Railway Co., and a dir. of the English and Canadian Mining Co. Was for some years a mem. of the City Council, Quebec. Apptd. mem. for Stadacona in L.C., Quebec, Nov., 1867. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—19½ *D'Auteuil st., Quebec; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

MCKEAGNEY, Lieut.-Col. Hon. JAMES CHARLES, Q.C. [*Cape Breton.*]

Descended from an ancient Scottish family. Ancestors removed to North of Irel. after battle of Culloden. B. in Co. Tyrone, Irel., 1815. Came to N.S., 1822. Ed. at High School, Baddeck, and afterwards at McQueen's Academy, Halifax, M., 1st., 1842, Miss Henry, sister of the Hon. W. A. Henry, Q.C., late Attorney-Genl., N.S., (she d.); 2ndly, in 1851, Eliza, dau. of Mr. Peter A. Hearne, of Sidney, and relict of Capt. Crockwell. Called to the Bar, 1837. Is a Lieut.-Col. of 2nd Regt. of Cape Breton Militia, and Surrogate of the Court of Vice Admiralty. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.S., during the Govt. of Sir

John Harvey ; and for 20 years up to the Union held the office of Judge of Probate for Cape Breton, which he resigned. Returned for Richmond in N.S. Assembly, in 1840, but unseated; sat for Inverness from 1843 to 1848 ; and for Sidney (township) from the latter year until 1859, when he resigned to accept the office of Chief Inspector of Mines and Minerals. Elected to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Conservative ; supports the present Govt.—*Sydney, C. B.*

McMILLAN, Lieut.-Col. DONALD, J.P. [*Vaudreuil.*]

Of Scottish parentage. B. in Co. Glengarry, Ont., 1807. Ed. there. M. Olympe, dau. of J. B. Mongenais, Esq., formerly M.P.P. for Vaudreuil. Has been a Commissioner of Small Causes. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat, by acclamation. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. B. Cartier.—*Rigaud, Que.*

McMORIS, JAMES, J.P. [*North Westworth.*]

Has been Reeve of East Flamboro'. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1865 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal ; opposed to the present Govt.—*Waterdown, Ont.*

MERRITT, THOMAS RODMAN. [*Lincoln.*] 2ND MEX.

Youngest s. of the late Hon. W. H. Merritt,

the projector of the Welland Canal, who sat in the L. A., Can., for many years, was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and at the time of his death represented Niagara division in Leg. Council, Can.; and grands-on of Thos. Merritt, a U. E. Loyalist, who served as a cornet in the "Queen's Rangers" during the Am. rev. war, and was afterwards Sheriff of the District of Niagara. (See Sabine.) B. 1824. Ed. at the Grantham Academy and Upper Canada College. M., 1863, Mary, eld. dau. of the late Thos. Benson, Esq. Was until recently largely engaged in milling and shipping. Is Managing Director of the Welland Railway, Vice-Presdt. of the Niagara District Bank, and a dir. of the Niagara Falls Suspension Bridge Co. Was Chairman of the Canada Board of the Welland Railway for many years. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, 1868, on resignation of sitting mem. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*St. Catharines, Ont.*

METCALFE, JAMES. [*East York, Ont.*]

Is Vice Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Bank. Formerly a contractor in Toronto. Resided some years in Australia. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Toronto.*

MILLS, David, LL.B. [*Bothwell.*]

Family, which came from near Plymouth, Eng., proceeded to Holland in the time of Charles I., thence to New Eng. with the Puritans, and the descendants removed to N.S. at the time of the Am. revolution. S. of Nathaniel Mills, who removed from N.S. to Can., 1817. B. in the Tp. of Orford, Kent, Ont., 18 March, 1831. Graduated at Michigan University. M., Dec., 1860, Miss M. J. Brown. Was Supdt. of Schools for Co. Kent from April, 1856, to April, 1865. Is author of a pamphlet on *The Present and Future Political Aspects of Canada* (1869) and another on *The Blunders of the Dominion Government in connection with the North West Territory* (1871). First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt.—*Clearville, Ont.*

MOFFATT, GEORGE, J.P. [*Restigouche.*] 3rd MEM.

A lumber merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Commons, March, 1868. First returned Nov., 1870, on death of sitting mem. A Liberal.—*Dalhousie, N.B.*

MORISON, JOHN. [*North Victoria, Ont.*]

S. of Malcolm Morison, a native of Islay, Scot. B. in Greenock, Scot., 9 Sept., 1818. Ed. there.

M., in Montreal, Miss Agnes Seath. A merchant. Was Reeve of Eldon, and held Postmastership of Woodville for 16 years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt.—Woodville, Ont.

MORRIS, Hon. ALEXANDER, D.C.L. [*South Lanark.*] 2ND MEM. P.O.

Eldest s. of the late Hon. William Morris, who sat in the Provincial Parlt., Can., for a considerable period, and held office as Receiver-General and afterwards as President of the Ex. Council. B. at Perth, Ont., 17 March, 1826. Ed. at the Universities of Glasgow, Scot., and McGill College, Montreal. M., Noyember, 1851, Margaret, dau. of William Cline, Esq., of Cornwall Ont. Called to the Bar of U.C. in Hilary Term, 1851, and afterwards in July, same year, to Lower Canadian Bar. Is Presdt. of the Young Men's Christian Association, Perth; a Governor of the University of McGill College; a Trustee of the University of Queen's College, Kingston; and a dir. of the Life Association of Scot. Was Presdt. of St. Andrew's Society, Montreal, for two years. Author of *Canada and her Resources*, a prize essay; *Nova Britannia*, a lecture on the extent, resources and future of B. N. A., published, 1858, at the request of the Mercantile Library Association, Montreal, in which he

advocated the incorporation of the B. N. A. Provinces under one Confederation; and of *The Hudson's Bay and Pacific Territories*, a lecture in which he also urged the incorporation of the North West and British Columbia under one Confederation with the older Provinces of Canada and Acadia and the construction of the Intercolonial and Pacific Railways. Occupied the position of Chairman of the Committee on "Miscellaneous and Private Bills" in the former Parl. of Can. for several years, and was elected to the same office in the first Parl. of the Dominion. In 1864 was one of the active parties in the negotiations, which resulted in the Coalition of that year, and the adoption of the Confederation policy which he had long previously advocated. He obtained the appointment of a Committee to devise a better system of registering births, marriages and deaths in U.C., and reported that the municipal system should be employed to obtain such statistics, a course which has been adopted; he introduced, on two occasions, a bill to provide for the carrying into effect of executions within the precincts of jails—a reform which has lately been adopted both in Eng. and Can.; he also suggested, in 1868, the formation of a public stock, to afford facilities for investments by executors, trustees and

others. Sworn of the Privy Council, and appointed Minister of Inland Revenue, 10 Nov., 1879. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1861, until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e., and again on his appointment to office. A Conservative.—*Wellington St., Ottawa; Perth, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

MORRISON, AUGUS. [*Niagara.*]

S. of the late Mr. Hugh Morrison, a native of Sutherlandshire, Scot.; and bro. of Hon. Mr. Justice Morrison, of the Court of Queen's Bench, Ont. B. in Edinburgh, Scot., 1822. Came to Can. 1834. M., at Three Rivers, Q., the eldest daughter of the late Robert Gilmor, Esq., Commissary-General in Can. during the War of 1812. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1846, and has been a Bencher of the Law Society. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Express Co., and of the Toronto Rowing Club; Vice-Presdt. of the Ontario and Erie Ship Canal Co., a dir. of the Northern Railway of Can., and of the Provincial Insurance Co. Was Secretary of the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto for eleven years, and Presdt. of same body for two years. Sat for North Simcoe in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1854, to g. e., 1863, when defeated, and for present seat from 1864 until

the Union. Returned to Commons at g. e., 1867. Unsuccessfully contested North Simcoe for Local House at g. e., 1867. A Baldwin Reformer; and has been a faithful supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald since he entered Parliament.—*Windsor Place, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rowing Club; Rideau Club.*

MUNROE, JOHN H. [*West Elgin.*]

B. in Tp. of Williamsburg, Co. Dundas, Ont. Ed. there. Unmarried. Has been a mem. of the Co. Council, and Warden of Middlesex. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Wardsville, Ont.*

NATHAN, HENRY, Jun. [*Victoria, B.C.*]

Eld. s. of Henry Nathan, Esq., of Maiden Vale, London, Eng. B. in London, 3 Sept., 1842. Ed. at London University School. Unmarried. Is a mem. of the firm of Henry Nathan, Jun., & Co., wholesale merchants, Victoria. Represented Victoria City in B.C. Legislature from Nov., 1870, until the dissolution of that body, 1871. Returned to Commons for Victoria District by acclamation, Nov., 1871, on B.C. being admitted into the Can. Union. A Liberal, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Victoria, B.C.*

NELSON, HUGH. [*New Westminster.*]

S. of Robert Nelson, Esq., of Shore Cottage, Magheramorne, Antrim, Irel., by Frances Quinn. B. at Larne, North of Irel., 25 May, 1830. Ed. there. Unmarried. A mem. of the firm of Moody, Diets & Nelson, mill owners and lumber manufacturers, Burrard Inlet. Represented New Westminster in B.C. Legislature from Nov., 1870, until its dissolution, 1871. Returned to Commons, for present seat, Nov., 1871, on the admission of B.C. into the Dominion. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Burrard Inlet, B.C.*

O'CONNOR, JOHN. [*Essex.*]

Descended from two distinct families of the O'Connors, of Kerry, Irel.; father and mother were both O'Connors, though not related within known degrees of kindred; they emigrated to Am. in 1823, and settled at Boston, Mass. B. at Boston, Jan., 1824. Came to Essex with his parents, 1828. Ed. there. M., April, 1849, Mary, eld. dau of Richard Barret, Esq., late of Killarney, Irel. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1854. Is a mem. of the Michigan (U.S.) Bar. Has been Reeve of the town of Windsor. Was Warden of Essex for three years, being twice elected by a unanimous vote of the County Council; and for 12 years fulfilled the

duties of Chairman of the Board of Education of the town of Windsor. Author of *Letters addressed to the Governor-General, on the subject of Fenianism* (1870). Was a unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Can. Assembly at g. e., 1861, but succeeded in 1863 in unseating the sitting mem. (Mr. Arthur Rankin), and obtaining a new election, when he was returned, and sat until the dissolution of Parliament in May of that year; again contested same seat at g. e., 1863, when a Special Return was made to the House by the returning Officer; both candidates petitioned to be seated, and Mr. O'Connor's petition being thrown out by the Speaker upon preliminary objections, Mr. Rankin was seated. Dame Marie F. Robillard, both of the Parish of St. Cuthbert, Que. B. at St. Cuthbert, 27 Sept., 1830. Ed. at the College of L'Assomption. M., at L'Assomption, Sept., 1854, Delle. Marie Alphonsine Henrietta Gariépy. Is a Licentiate of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of L.C. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for L.C. division of De Lanaudière, 1863. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal; opposed to present Govt.—*St. Cuthbert, Que.*

PEARSON, FREDERICK M., J.P. [*Colchester.*] 3RD MEM.

A merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat, Sept., 1869. First returned to Commons, Nov., 1870, on resignation of sitting mem. A Liberal; was previously opposed to Confederation, but now accepts the situation, and will labor earnestly to promote the best interests of the Dominion.—*Truro, N.S.*

PELLETIER, CHARLES ALPHONSE PANTALEON. [*Kamouraska.*]

Descended from two of the oldest French families in Can. S. of M. J. M. Pelletier, a merchant, by Julie Painchaud, sister of the late Rev. C. F. Painchaud, founder of the College of

A lumber merchant. Is a director of the N.B. Railway Co., and Vice-Presdt. of the York Agricultural Society. Sat for York in N.B. Assembly from 1867 until Oct., 1868, when he resigned, and was returned by acclamation to present House upon the resignation of the sitting mem. A Liberal; "was previously opposed

to Confederation, but it having been accepted by the people, he will do his best to render it successful. Occupies an independent position, and will support or oppose the Govt. according to its acts."—*Regent St., Fredericton, N.B.*

PINSONNEAULT, *Lieut.-Col.* ALFRED, *J.P.* [*La-prairie.*]

Is *Lieut.-Col.* 7th Batt. Huntingdon Militia. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Montreal.*

POPE, *Hon.* JOHN HENRY. [*Compton.*] P. C.

Is *Presdt.* of the St. Francis and Megantic International Railway, and of the Compton Colonization Society; one of the Trustees of St. Francis College, Richmond, Que., and a dir. of the Eastern Townships Bank. Commanded the Cookshire Volunteer Cavalry for many years, and holds the rank of Major in the Militia. Sworn of the Privy Council, and apptd. Minister of Agriculture, 25 Oct., 1871. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1857 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g. e., 1854. RAY, *Lieut.-Col.* WILLIAM HALLETT. [*Annapolis.*]

REDFORD, JAMES, *J.P.* [*North Perth.*]

S. of the late Jas. Redford, Esq., formerly of Lilliesleaf, Roxburghshire, Scot., who emigrated to U.C., 1842. B. at Lilliesleaf, 18 Sept., 1821. Ed. there, and studied law for some years at Hawick, in same county. M., 1851, Elizabeth, eld. dau. of Alex. Gouray, Esq., of Ellice, Co. Perth. Has been Registrar and Supdt. of Schools for Perth, a mem. of the Stratford Town Council, and township clerk of Downie. Is a local dir. of the Royal Canadian Bank, and

Captain in the Militia. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Govt.—*Stratford, Ont.*

RENAUD, AUGUSTE. [*Kent, N.B.*]

First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*Buc-touche, N.B.*

ROBITAILLE, THÉODORE, M.D. [*Bonaventure.*]

Sat for North Wellington in Can. Assembly from 1859 to g. e., 1861. Returned to Commons by acclamation, Jan., 1869, for present seat on death of sitting mem. A Liberal, and opposed to present Govt.—*Cumnock, Ont.*

ROSS, Hon. JOHN JONES, M.D. [*Champlain.*]

S. of G. McIntosh Ross, Esq., of St. Ames, formerly a West Indian merchant, by Marie Louise Gouin. B. at St. Ames. A physician and surgeon. Is a governor of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, L.C., Surgeon 1st Battalion Champlain Militia; Presdt. of the Champlain

Agricultural Society, and a mem. of the Agricultural Council of Quebec. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1861, until the Union, when returned to Commons and L.A., Quebec. Resigned his seat in the latter on his appointment to L.C. Quebec, 1867. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*St. Anne de la Pêrade, Que.*

ROSS, JOHN SYLVESTER. [*Dundas.*]

SAVARY, ALFRED WILLIAM, M.A. [*Digby.*]

A lineal descendant of Thomas Savary, variously spelt by different branches of the family, Savery and Savory, who came to the "*Old Colony,*" of Plymouth, Mass., from Eng., in 1634, about 13 years after the arrival of the "*Pilgrim Fathers,*" among the passengers of the "*John and Mary,*" the founders of Ipswich and other towns of note, and who settled at Plymton, now North Carver, Mass. Grandf. removed to N.S. S. of Sabine Savary, Esq., of Plym-

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ton, N.S. B. there, 1831. Ed. at King's College, Windsor, where he took degree of M.A., 1857. Unmarried. Called to the Bar of N.B., 1857; to the Bar of N.S., 1861. Has been Inspector of Schools for the County of Digby, and is a Master in the Supreme Court, N.S. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Digby in N.S. Assembly, 1863. First returned to Parlt. for present seat in Commons at last g. e. A moderate Conservative on questions of general public policy. B at Amherstburg, 1 Jan., 1840. Ed. in arts at Oberlin College, Ohio; and in medicine at Queen's University, Kingston, and Victoria University, Cobourg. Graduated as M.D., 1860. M., at Winnipeg, 1868, Miss Agnes Campbell Farquharson, of Georgetown, British Guinea. Went to Red River, 1860, where he has since resided, practising his profession, and being also largely engaged in mercantile pursuits. SÉNÉCAL, LOUIS ADELARD. [*Drummond and Arthabaska.*]

A railway contractor. First returned to Parl. for the present seat at last g. e. Represented Yamaska in Local House, from g. e., 1867, until g. e., 1871, when he retired. A Liberal.—*Pierre-ville, Que.*

SHANLY, WALTER, C.E. [*South Grenville.*]

Third s. (living) of the late James Shanly, Esq.,

same office in his own Administration, 1866. Was a delegate to England with the Hon. J. C. Allan, on public business, 1865, and to Washington, with Messrs. Galt, Howland and Henry, on the subject of reciprocal trade, Jan., 1866. Sat in the N.B. Assembly from 1852 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal; was previously opposed to Confederation, but now accepts the situation. Opposed to the present Govt.—*Dorchester, N.B.; Rideau Club.*

SMITH, Hon. DONALD A. [*Selkirk.*]

B. and ed. in Scot. Has been for many years an officer in the Hudson's Bay Company's service, and is now Governor of the Company in Can. Was employed as a Commissioner by the Can. Govt. during the recent Rebellion at Red River. Apptd. a Commissioner for administering oaths to persons appointed to office in the North West Territories, Nov., 1870, and a mem. of the Ex. Council for the North West Territories, 1871. Represents Winnipeg and St. John in the Manitoba Assembly. dir. of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway; Treasurer for the Co. Bruce; agent at Walkerton for the Merchants' Bank, and Lieut.-Col. of the 32nd Batt. "Bruce" Volunteer Infantry. First returned to Parit. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative; and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Southampton, Ont.*

STEPHENSON, RUFUS. [*Kent, Ont.*]

Family originally came from Lancashire, Eng. One of his ancestors, Samuel Chapin, emigrated to Am. as early as 1641. Youngest s. of Eli Stephenson, Esq., formerly of St. Catharines, Ont., and nephew of the late Col. E. W. Stephenson, of the same place. B. at Springfield Mass., U.S., 14 Jan., 1835. Ed. at the Grantham Academy, St. Catharines. M., Oct., 1854, Georgina Emma, eld. dau. of Thos. Andrew, Esq., barrister, formerly of London, Eng., and grand-dau. of Joseph Sparkes, Esq., of the Co. Kent, Eng., once a dir. of the East India Co. Is editor and proprietor of the Chatham *Planet* newspaper. Has been a mem. of the Town Council of Chatham for some years, and was Mayor of that town from 1865 to 1869. Is also a mem. of the Municipal Council of the Co. Kent, mem. of the Co. Board of Grammar School Trustees, and Capt. No. 2 Co. 24th Batt. Volunteer Infantry. First returned to Parit. at last

STREET, Lieut.-Col. THOMAS CLARKE, J.P. [*Welland.*]

Only s. of the late Hon. Samuel Street, of Niagara Falls. B. there. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Easter Term, 1838. Is Presdt. of the Suspension Bridge Co.; a Trustee of the University of Trinity College, Toronto; a dir. of the British America Assurance Co., and of the Canadian Bank of Commerce; and Lieut.-Col. commanding 1st Batt. Welland Militia. Was Presdt. of the Gore Bank, and of the Agricultural Association of U.C., and a dir. of the late Bank of Upper Canada. Sat for Welland in Can. Assembly, from g. e., 1851,

until g. e., 1854, when defeated ; and again from g. e., 1861, until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—“*Clarke Hill,*” *Chippawa, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

SYLVAIN, GEORGE VOXAL, J.P. [*Rimouski.*]

S. of M. Michael Voxal Sylvain. B. at St. Valier, Q., 28 Aug., 1819. Ed. there. M., 1st, Miss Fournier, of St. Thomas, Q., (she d.); 2ndly, Miss Mercier, of Bic. A merchant. Is Vice-Consul at Bic for Norway and Sweden. Has been Mayor of the municipality, and a mem. of the county and local councils. Was postmaster of Bic for several years. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly, from g e., 1861, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Bic, Que.*

THOMPSON, DAVID, J.P. [*Haldimand.*]

Grandfather came from Scot. S. of the late D. Thompson, Esq., who sat for Haldimand in Can. Assembly, from 1841 to 1851. B. in Tp. of Wainfleet, Co. Welland, Ont., 7 Dec., 1836. Ed. at Hamilton Grammar School, and Upper Canada College. M., Sept., 1858, Elizabeth, fourth dau. of Ebenezer Stinson, Esq., of Hamil-

ton. A grain and flour merchant. Is Presdt. of the Co. Haldimand Agricultural Society, a dir. of the Canada West Farmers' Mutual and Stock Insurance Co., and a Municipal Councillor. Was Major of the 37th Batt. Haldimand Rifles for some years. Sat for Haldimand in Can. Assembly, from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. THOMPSON, *Lieut.-Col.* JOHN HALL. [*North Ontario.*]

S. of Major Joseph Thompson, late of H. M. 40th Regt. of Infantry. B. in Salisbury, Eng., 1810. Ed. at Berwick-on-Tweed. M., 1847, Margaret, dau. of Matthew Cowan, Esq. Was Warden of the Co. Ontario in 1856, 1857, 1860, and again in 1863 and 1865. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Liberal; opposed to present Govt.—*Cannington, Ont.*

THOMPSON, JOHN SPENCER. [*Cariboo.*]

B. in Irel. Is ed. and prop. of the *Cariboo Sentinel* newspaper. First returned to Parlt. for present seat on the admission of B.C. into the Dominion, Dec., 1871. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Cariboo.*

TILLEY, Hon. SAMUEL LEONARD, C.B. [*St. John City, N.B.*] P.O.

S. of Thomas M. Tilley, Esq., of Queen's Co., N.B.; and great grands. of Samuel Tilley, Esq., formerly of Brooklyn, N.Y., a U.E. Loyalist, who came to N.B. at the termination of the Am. revolution, and became a grantee of the city of St. John. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists*.) B. at Gagetown, Queen's Co., N.B., 8 May, 1818. Ed. at the County Grammar School. M., 1st, Julia Anna, dau. of James T. Hanford, Esq., of St. John (dead); 2ndly, 1867, Alice, eld. dau. of Z. Chipman, Esq., of St. Stephen, N.B. Is a commissioner to assist Mr. Speaker in the internal economy of the House of Commons; a Presdt. of the Diocesan Church Society, N.B.; Vice-Presdt. of the Auxiliary Bible Society, Ottawa; and a local dir. of the Canada Life Assurance Company. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from Nov., 1854, to May, 1856, from July, 1857, to March, 1865, and again from April, 1866, until the Union, during which several periods he held the office of Provl.-Secretary of that Province; and from March, 1861, to March, 1865, was leader of the Government. Has been leader of the Liberal party in N.B. for a lengthened period. Has been a delegate to Eng. on several occasions to confer with the Imperial Govt. on important

public business, notably regarding the Union of the B.A. Colonies and the construction of an Intercolonial Railway; has also repeatedly served on like missions to the sister Province. Was a delegate to the Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; to that in Quebec, same year; and to the London Colonial Conference, to complete terms of Union of the B.N.A. Provinces, 1866-7. Holds a patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Councillor, N.B. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty, 1867. Sworn of the Privy Council, and appointed Minister of Customs for the Dominion, 1 July, 1867. Was Acting Minister of Public Works from Nov., 1868, to April, 1869. Sat for city of St. John in N.B. Assembly from June, 1854, to June, 1856, when defeated on the Prohibitory Liquor Law question and the Govt. resigned; from June, 1857, to March, 1865 when defeated on the Union policy of his Govt and again from 1866 until the Union, when he resigned to accept a seat in the Commons, and represent New Brunswick in the Dominion Cabinet. The Prohibitory Liquor Law of N.B. was the work of Mr. T. as a private mem.; amongst other measures of importance introduced and carried by the Govt. of which he was a mem., may be mentioned the following: Vote by ballot, and extension of the franchise; an Act autho-

rising the construction of the European and North American Railway as a govt. work; an Act authorizing the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, N.B., agreeing to pay three-and-a-half twelfths of the cost; an Act granting facility for the construction of certain Railways under which 175 miles are now being built in N.B. TOURANGEAU, *Lieut.-Col.* ADOLPHE dit GUILLET, N.P. — [*Quebec East.*] 2ND MEM.

S. of the late Jean Tourangeau, Esq., N.P.; and granda. of Jean Tourangeau, Esq., in his lifetime a merchant of Quebec, whose father emigrated from Tours, France, and held the "Monument Farm," upon which the celebrated battles of Quebec were fought, 1759-60. B. in Quebec, 15 Jan., 1831. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary, and the High School, of the same city. M., 1861, Victoria Adeline, dau. of the late Augustus Jourdain, Esq., Librarian to the Leg. Council of L.O. A Notary Public, and a Lieut.-Col. of the Quebec East Militia. Was for a considerable period a mem. of the Québec City Corporation, and upon four occasions elected Mayor of that city. An unsuccessful candidate for Montmorenci in Can. Assembly, g. e., 1863. First

returned to Parlt. for present seat, July, 1870, on resignation of sitting mem. Is in favor of the Confederation of all the B. N. A. possessions, and the construction of a Pacific Railway, the improvement of Canals and other means of communication with the West—reciprocal trade with the United States—and generally of a liberal emigration and railway policy.—*Little River, near Quebec; 42 St. Joseph St., St. Rochs, Que.*

TREMBLAY, PIERRE ALEXIS, P.L.S., J.P. [*Chicoutimi and Saguenay.*]

B. 27 Dec., 1827. Ed. at the Seminary of Quebec. M., Sept., 1870, Mary Ellen, eld. dau. of Michael Connolly, Esq., of Quebec. A Provincial Land Surveyor. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from Jan., 1865, until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at g. e., 1857. Returned to Commons and Local House by acclamation last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Chicoutimi, Que.*

TUPPER, Hon. CHARLES, C.B., M.D., L.R.C.S. (Edin). [*Cumberland.*] 2ND MEM.

Family, originally from Hesse Cassel, went to Guernsey, thence came to Virginia, and subsequently, at the termination of the Am. revolution, removed to N.S. with other loyalists; it

is connected with the family of the late Sir Isaac Brock, K.B., the hero of Queenston. S. of the Rev. Charles Tupper, D.D., of Aylesford, N.S. B. at Amherst, N.S., 2 July, 1821. Ed. at Horton in same province. Took degree of M.D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College Surgeons, same city, 1843. M., Oct., 1846, Miss Frances Morse, of Amherst. A physician. Is a governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax, (appointed by Act of Parlt., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Canadian Medical Association, from its formation in 1867 until 1870, when he declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Provl.-Secy., N.S., from 1857 to 1860, and from 1863 to 30 June, 1867; and Prime Minister of that province from 1864 until he retired from office with his Govt., on the Union Act coming into force, 1 July, 1867. Was a delegate to Eng. from N.S. Govt., 1858 and 1865; from the Dominion Govt., March, 1868; leader of the delegation from N.S. to the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1864, to that in Quebec in same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Holds patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex. Councillor, N.S. Created C.B. (Civil) by Her Majesty, 1867. Author of *A Letter to the Rt. Hon. the Earl*

of Carnarvon on the Union Question, (Lon., 1866). Declined seat in Can. Cabinet, 1867; and Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Presdt. of that body, June, 1870. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly from 1855 until Union. Returned to Commons at last g.e., and again, by acclamation, on his accepting office. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the legislature of N.S. by the hon. member: The Jury Law; Education Act providing free schools and assessment; Equity Judge Act; Windsor and Annapolis Railway Act; bill providing for a quarantine station and hospital; representation bill; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act; he also moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Colonies, 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlottetown in that year; and the resolution authorizing delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N.S. and N.B. with Can., 1866. Second s. of Robert Wallace, by Margaret Stewart, both of the City of Glasgow, Scot. B. in Glasgow, 8 Dec., 1820. Ed. there. M. at Boston, U.S., 1843, Jean, dau. of James Cameron, Esq., of Perthshire, Scot. A commission merchant. Was Presdt. of the Convention of Delegates of the "Confederation League," held at Yale, Sept., 1868, for the purpose of accelerating the admission of British Columbia into the Dominion. Sat in the Victoria City Council, in 1863-4. Returned to Commons for present seat, as one of the first members elected from B. Columbia, Dec., 1871. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*Victoria, B.C.*

WALSH, AQUILA, J.P. [*North Norfolk.*]

The family is of Irish descent, having formerly owned and occupied Castle Hoyle, in Kilkenny; a branch of the family subsequently resided near Dungannon, in Tyrone, and emi-

grated to Am. about 1740; they took part in the war between France and Eng., and subsequently, on the loyal side, between the latter and the revolted Colonies; removed to N.B. and afterwards to U.C. S. of F. L. Walsh, Esq., Registrar for the County of Norfolk, and formerly a mem. of the U.C. Legislature. B. at Charlotteville, Ont., 15 May, 1823. Ed. at the London District Grammar Sch. M., 21 Nov., 1850, Jane Adams, dau. of the late William Wilson, Esq., who sat for Norfolk in the U.C. Assembly. Was Deputy Registrar for Norfolk, from 1846 to 1861. Is a dir. of the International Bridge Co. Apptd. a commissioner for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, and elected chairman of the Board, Dec., 1868. (Salary, \$4000.) Sat for Norfolk in Can. Assembly, from g. e., 1861, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. WEBB, WILLIAM HOSTE, Q.C. [*Richmond and Wolfe.*]

Eldest s. of the late Commander Edward Webb, R.N., who migrated to Can., 1836. Ed. at the Royal Naval School, London, Eng. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1850. Created Q.C., 1867. Is Presdt. of the Richmond Agricultural

Society, and a Trustee of St. Francis College, Richmond, Q. Was the first Warden elected for that county. Has been Mayor of the Municipality. Sat for Richmond and Wolfe in Can. Assembly, from 1858 until g. e., 1861, when defeated; and again from g. e., 1863, until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for L.C. division of Wellington, 1856. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir George Cartier.—*Melbourne, Que.*

WELLS, JAMES PEARSON. [*North York, Ont.*]

Of English descent. B. in Can. Ed. at a Common Sch. M. Miss Lydia Norman, of Somerset, Eng. Has been Reeve of the Township of King for the past seven years. Contested the Wardenship of York and Peel unsuccessfully, 1862. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly, from g. e., 1863, until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e. A Liberal, and opposed to present Govt.—*King, Ont.*

WHITE, JOHN, J.P. [*Halton.*]

B. near Omagh, Co. Tyrone, Irel., 8 June, 1811. Ed. in Toronto. M. Miss Louisa Knight, of Hamilton, Ont. Was a mem. of the District Council of the Gore District for nine years in succession, and subsequently a mem. of the

County Council of Halton. Is Captain 3rd Batt. Halton Militia. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly, from g. e., 1851, to g. e., 1854, when defeated; and from g. e., 1857, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Liberal, and opposed to present Govt.—*Milton, Ont.*

WHITE, JOHN. [*East Hastings*]. 2ND MEM.

Is Reeve of Roslin. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, by acclamation, March, 1871, on resignation of sitting mem. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Roslin, Ont.*

WHITEHEAD, JOSEPH. [*North Huron*].

A railway contractor. Has been Mayor of Clinton for several years. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal.—*Clinton, Ont.*

WILLSON, CROWELL. [*East Middlesex*].

S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Benjamin Willson, J.P., of the Co. Elgin, Ont. B. near St. Thomas, Ont., March, 1815. Ed. at the Hamilton District School. M., May, 1843, Miss Maria Jackson. Is Presdt. of the Agricultural Mutual Assurance Association of Can., and Major 2nd Batt. Middlesex Militia. Sat for Middlesex in Can. Assembly, (then comprising the present counties of Elgin and Middlesex,) from 1851 to 1854, and for

East Middlesex, from g. e., 1863, until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Arva, Ont.*

WOOD, Hon. EDMUND BURKE. [*South Brant.*]

S. of Mr. Samuel Wood, of Co. Halton, Ont., who came to Can. from the U. S. during the war of 1812. B. near Chippawa, Ont., 14 Feb., 1817. Ed. at Oberlin College, Ohio, U. S., where he graduated in 1848. M., April, 1855, Jane Augusta, second dau. of Dr. Peter Marter, of Brantford. Called to the Bar, U.C., Trinity Term, 1854. Was first Clerk of the County Court and Clerk of the Crown when the Co. Brant was erected into a new county, 1853. Was a member of the Ex. Council, and Treasurer for Ontario from July, 1867, to Dec., 1871, when he resigned. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g. e., 1863, until the Union. Returned to Commons and Local House at last g. e., 1867. Re-elected to latter body at g. e., 1871. A Liberal.—*Dumfries St., Brantford, Ont.*

WORKMAN, THOMAS, J.P. [*Montreal Centre.*]

Family, which was originally English, settled in Irel. during the time of Cromwell. S. of the late Joseph Workman, Esq., who resided in Montreal for many years, and bro. of Dr.

Workman, Medical Supdt. Toronto Lunatic Asylum, and of William Workman, Esq., Presdt. of the City Bank, Montreal. B. near Lisburn, Co. Antrim, Irel., 17 June, 1813. Ed. in Montreal. M., 1845, Annie, eldest dau. of the late John Eadie, Esq., of Glasgow, Scot. Is senior partner in the firm of Frothingham & Workman, Montreal, the largest and most extensive wholesale iron and hardware merchants and manufacturers in the Dominion; Presdt. of the Sun Mutual Life Insurance Co.; and a dir. of Molsons Bank, and of the Can. Shipping Co. Has been Presdt. of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society. Was a mem. of the original Doric Club, formed in 1836, for the preservation of British Constitution rights in L.C. Served as a Volunteer Officer during the rebellion of 1837-38, and was present at the affair at St. Eustache. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at last g. e. by acclamation.—*Prince of Wales Terrace, Sherbrooke St., Montreal; St. James Club; Rideau Club.*

WRIGHT, *Licut.-Col.* ALONZO. [*Ottawa County.*]

S. of the late Lt.-Col. Tiberius Wright; and grands. of the late Philemon Wright, formerly of Woburn, Mass., who came to Can., 1797, founded the village of Hull, on the Ottawa, and became the first representative of the Co.

Ottawa, in the L.O. Assembly. B. at Hull, Q., 28 Feb., 1825. Ed. at Potsdam, N.Y. M., Mary, eld. dau. of the late Nicholas Sparks, Esq., of Ottawa City. 'Is Lieut.-Col. of the Ottawa Reserve Militia. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly, from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—“*Ironsides*,” *Hull, Que.*; *Rideau Club*.

WRIGHT, AMOS, J.P. [*West York, Ont.*] 2ND MEM.

Ancestors emigrated from Eng. to the British Colonies, and at the breaking out of the Am. Revolution came to Canada. B. in the Tp. of Young, Johnstown District, 24 Nov., 1809. Ed. there. Simon Fraser, s. of the celebrated Simon Lord Lovat :—he fought and was severely wounded at the taking of Quebec, on 13th Sept., 1759, and also at the disastrous battle of 28th April, 1760 :—he remained in the Province of Quebec, and became Seigneur of several seigniories, and got a grant of the seignior of Mount Murray, several lots in the City of Quebec, and extensive tracts of land in the townships, as a reward for his distinguished and valuable services, both as a Judge and Captain and Paymaster of the 84th, or "Royal Highland Emigrant Regiment," during and after the invasion of the Americans in 1774 ; he d. 14th June, 1815. B. at St. Martins, Q., on 25 Nov., 1816. Ed. at Terrebonne and Montreal. M., at Quebec, 24 Oct., 1842, his cousin, Elizabeth Fraser de Berry. A Notary Public. 1st Major of the Reserved Militia of the Regimental Division of Verchères, Justice of the Peace, President of Commissioners of Small Causes, Seigneur of *Cournoyer*

and *Contrecoeur*, Patron of the Parish of St. John of Thurso, Presdt. of the National French Society of "*St. Jean Baptiste*," author of the "*Fraserian Almanac*," Chief of the "*New Clan Fraser*" of the Province of Quebec, &c., &c., &c. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Electoral division of Montarville, in L.C., Can., 1858. Called to the L.C., 1867, when he assumed the ancient French name of his family, of "*de Berry*," on taking his seat in the French Canadian Province of Quebec. Only s. of the late Hon. John Saunders, late Chief Justice of N.B., and formerly a Captain of Cavalry in the Queen's Rangers (of which Col. Simcoe was Colonel), by Ariana Margareta Jerkyl. This gentleman was a noted loyalist during the Am. revolution; he was descended from an English family that adhered to the King in the civil war between Charles and the Roundheads; his grandfather had emigrated to Virgi-

nia, and acquired large landed estates there, which were afterwards confiscated on account of the loyalist tendencies of Capt. Saunders. As before stated, he was a Capt. of cavalry in the Queen's Rangers, his troop of horse having been raised at his own expense; in 1780 he commanded at Georgetown, South Carolina, and was twice wounded in partizan strifes. At the peace he went to Eng., became a mem. of the Middle Temple, and practised law; in 1790 he was apptd. Judge of the Supreme Court, N.B., and in 1822 became Chief Justice of that Province. He d. in 1834 at the age of eighty. (See Sabine's *American Loyalists*.) B. in N.B. Ed. at Oxford, Eng. M. Elizabeth Sophia, dau. of the Rev. George Stone, Rector of Stow Maries, Essex, and West End Lodge, Thames Ditton, Surrey, Eng. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1819. Is Presdt. of the Leg. Council; a President of the Diocesan Church Society; a mem. of the Senate of the University of N.B., and Senior Justice of the Courts of Common Pleas for the Counties of York and Sunbury. Author of *The Law of Pleading and Evidence in Civil Actions* (Lon.) Has been Surveyor-General, Provincial-Secy., N.B., (which office he held for nearly nine years); Clerk of the Circuits and Olerk of the Crown on the Circuits. A Liberal Conservative.—*Fredericton.*

SEELY, *Hon.* ALEXANDER McLEOD.

S. of the late Mr. Seth Seely, of St. John, N.B., and grands. of the late Seth Seely, of Stamford, Conn., a U.E. loyalist. A merchant and banker; a mem. of the Senate of the University of N.B., and Presdt. of the Commercial Board of N.B., and of the St. John Religious Tract Society. Called to the L.C., 1854. 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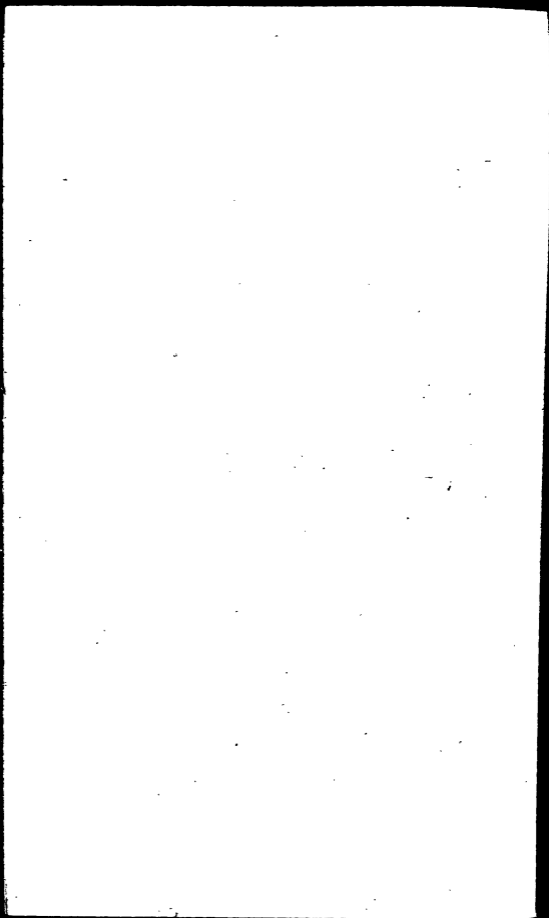

Circular No. 84 refers to the Sick Mariners Fund and Harbour Police dues, and states that *Circular 57* was intended to exempt all vessels engaged in the Coasting Trade, whether between one Province of the Dominion and another, or between several ports in one Province, and to make the taxes in question applicable only to vessels arriving from any port or place, without the limits of the Dominion. Vessels having Coasting licenses are not liable to the said charges.

Circular No. 85 transmits the Sick and Distressed Mariners' Act and recalls *Circular 84*, which erroneously exempts Inter-Provincial Coasting vessels.

Circular 86 transmits forms of declaration and certificate for importers of Machinery, en-

titled to exemption of duty, under the Act 34 Victoria, cap. 10. Said forms are as follows :

Circular No. 87 applies to Province of Ontario only. It exempts vessels in Ontario from duty for the Sick and Distressed Mariners' Fund.

Circular No. 88 is as follows :

SIR,—A different mode of weighing Cigars for duty appearing to exist at the several Ports of Entry in the Dominion, it has been considered advisable

that, with a view to uniformity, the weights of Cigars should be ascertained by the selection of two lots of ten (10) boxes each of every brand - a practice which is now followed at the Port of Montreal, and which is found to give satisfaction to importers. You will therefore conform to this Rule.

Section 22, in regard to Fees to be collected for *Coasting Licenses and reporting of Vessels Inwards and Outwards*; and as it appears that some Ports have not accounted for such collections, by designating in their accounts the amounts so collected under their respective heads. I have to request that you will be good enough to prepare a statement, shewing the number of Licenses issued, and number of entrances and clearances made at your Port, upon which the fees were collected, the amounts so collected, and in what manner it has been accounted for. SIR.—His Excellency the Governor General, in Council, having had under consideration certain communications regarding the admission of "Corn Flour," and other kinds of Starch imported into this

Dominion, under disguised names to evade the Specific Duty, I have it in command to acquaint you that His Excellency has been pleased to order and direct that duty be levied on all such articles as on Starch, and you will, therefore, govern yourself accordingly, and collect the Specific Duty thereon. Circular No. 92 transmits copy of a letter addressed to the Collector of Montreal, which is as follows:

CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT, Ottawa, 8th Nov., 1871.

SIR.—The Department having carefully examined the correspondence and papers regarding a cargo of "Sugar-House Molasses," imported by Messrs. Tiffin Brothers, does not hesitate coming to the conclusion that the article in question is legally subject to the duty of 25 per cent. ad valorem, and $\frac{1}{4}$ ths of a cent. per lb. The certificate of the President of the "Long Island Sugar Refinery" appears conclusive upon this point, since it establishes in express words that the article is made (or manufactured) from "Molasses." It matters not whether from "Raw Porto Rico," or "Raw Cuba Molasses."

The admission that it is wholly made "from Molasses," leads to the natural inference that the product is not simply "Molasses," which by the terms of the tariff would alone entitle the article to the lower duty. I am, Sir, your obedient servant, R. S. M. BOUCHETTE, Commissioner of Customs.

CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT.

**Regulations governing Travellers' Carriages,
&c., Crossing the Frontier.**

To ensure uniformity at the frontier ports in dealing with "carriages of travellers and carriages laden with merchandise," and to afford the utmost facility to parties visiting the Dominion for transient purposes, consistent with the protection of the Revenue, the *Minister of Customs* has approved of the following "Regulations and Restrictions :"

1st. Regular stages and hacks, when the owners or the drivers are known to the officers, may be allowed to cross the frontier and return, within two days, without being required to make an entry at the Custom House, subject only to the ordinary examination, search and inspection.

2nd. Travellers intending to remain within the Dominion for a longer period than two days, are required in all cases to report and enter their horses, carriages, and travelling equipage ; and in cases where they do not intend to leave at the same point at which they enter, or are uncertain on that point, they must deposit with the Collector the full amount of duty on such horses, carriages and other dutiable articles, to be returned only on their furnishing satisfactory evidence that the same articles have been re-

turned unchanged to the United States. Travellers intending to leave at the Port of Entry may be allowed to enter as above, and, in lieu of cash, to give a bond, with an approved resident surety, covering the amount of duty and with the additional condition that such bond shall be enforced if the time specified therein be exceeded.

3rd. The time to be allowed travellers in either case shall not exceed one calendar month; and if that time be exceeded, the entries shall be considered *bona fide* entries for duty, and be included in the accounts of the port.

4th. All moneys received by Collectors on deposit, under the above Regulations, shall be, if possible, deposited *ad interim* in a bank, in the Collector's name; and if there is no bank available, then in some other place of security under the Collector's credit, and a separate account of the receipt and disposal of such deposits should be sent quarterly to the Department.

5th. The entries in such case should contain such a description of the horses, carriages, &c., as would enable the Collector or other officer to identify them on their leaving the Dominion; and a copy shall be furnished the owner or other person making such entry, which shall be his permit for travelling in the country.

ALL APPLICATIONS FOR PRIVATE BILLS properly within the range of the powers of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, according to the provisions of the Act of British North America, 1867, whether for the construction of a Bridge, a Railway, a Turnpike road or Telegraph line, Canal, Lock, Dam or Slide, or other like works; the granting of a right of ferry; the construction of works for supplying gas or water; the incorporation of any particular profession or trade, or of any Joint Stock Company; the incorporation of a city, town, village or other municipality; the levying of any local assessment; the division of any County for purposes other than that of representation in Parliament or of any township; the removal of the site of any County town, or of any local offices; the regulation of any Common; the Survey of any township line or concession, or otherwise for granting to any individual or individuals any peculiar rights or privileges whatever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or properties of other parties, or relate to any particu-

lar class of the community; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act, —shall require a notice clearly and distinctly specifying the nature and object of the application, to be published as follows, viz. :—

A notice inserted in the *Official Gazette* in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one in the French language, in the district affected, or in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the *Official Gazette*, and in a paper published in an adjoining district.

Such notice shall be continued in each case, for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding session and the consideration of the petition.

Before any petition praying for leave to bring in a private bill for the erection of a toll-bridge is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such bill, shall upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding rule, also, at the same time and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts or vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.

PUBLIC NOTICE relating to FISHERIES and FISHING in the respective Provinces forming the Dominion of Canada.

The undersigned is directed by the Minister to call the attention of all persons concerned and the public generally to the following provisions of the fishery laws and regulations:—

NET FISHING for SALMON is prohibited:—

In Québec and Ontario, from 31st July to 1st May;

In New Brunswick, from 15th August to 1st March;

In Nova Scotia, from 31st July to 1st March.

ANGLING for SALMON is prohibited:—

In Quebec and Ontario, from 1st September to 1st May;

In New Brunswick, from 15th September to 1st March ;

In Nova Scotia, from 1st September to 1st May.

FISHING for SPECKLED (or *Brook*) TROUT WITH NETS or other apparatus is forbidden at all times. ANGLING for the same with hook and line, extends from 1st January to 1st October in Quebec, and from 1st May to 30th September in Ontario.

Fishing for WHITEFISH, with nets or other apparatus is forbidden between the 19th November and 1st December in Ontario and Quebec, nor is it lawful to catch this fish with SEINES between the 30th May and 1st August in Ontario, and 31st July and 1st December in Quebec.

Fishing for BASS, PICKEREL, (Dore) and MASKINONGE is forbidden between the 1st and 24th of May in Quebec, and from 15th April to 1st May in Ontario.

Fishing by means of nets or other apparatus (except in the tidal deep sea fisheries) without Leases or Licenses from the Department of Marine and Fisheries is prohibited in the waters of Quebec and Ontario.

All applications for leases or licenses, or any other communications relating to Fisheries, should be addressed to the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

RULES RESPECTING THE
LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT.

A proper Catalogue of the Books belonging to the Library shall be kept by the Librarian in whom the custody and responsibility thereof shall be vested; and who shall be required to report to the House through Mr. Speaker, at the opening of each Session, the actual state of the Library.

No person shall be entitled to resort to the Library during a session of Parliament except the Governor General, the members of the Privy Council, and of the Senate and House of Commons, and the Officers of both Houses, and such other persons as may receive a written order of admission from the Speaker of either House. Members may personally introduce Strangers to the Library during the daytime, but not after the hour of seven o'clock, P.M.

During a Session of Parliament, no Books belonging to the Library shall be taken out of the Building, except by the authority of the Speaker or upon receipts given by a Member of either House.

During the recess of Parliament, the Library and Reading Room shall be open every day in each week, Sundays and Holidays excepted, from the hour of ten in the morning until three in the afternoon; and access to the Library shall be permitted to persons introduced by a Member of the Legislature, or admitted at the discretion of the Clerk or Librarian; subject to

such regulations as may be deemed necessary for the security and preservation of the collection; but no one shall be allowed to take any Book out of the Library except Members of the Legislature, and such others as may be authorized by the Speaker of either House.

The Clerk of this House is authorized to subscribe for the Newspapers published in the Dominion, and for such other papers, British and Foreign as may from time to time be directed by the Speaker; and to import annually the continuation of Periodical Works in the Library.

During the recess of Parliament, no Member of either House not residing at the seat of Government, shall be at liberty to borrow or have in his possession at any one time more than three works from the Library, or to retain the same for a longer period than one month.

No other person who may be privileged by card from the Speaker of either House to borrow Books from the Library shall be allowed to have in their possession more than two Books at any one time, or to retain the same longer than three weeks, and all such persons shall return the Books so taken when required by the Librarian.

No Books of reference, or Books of special cost and value, may be removed from the seat of Government under any circumstances.

At the first meeting of the Joint Library Committee at every Session of Parliament, the Librarian shall report a list of the Books absent at the commencement of the Session, specifying the names of any persons who have retained the same in contravention of either of the foregoing Rules.

PATENTS OF INVENTION.

On this Continent, where circumstances are novel and labor scarce, the multiplicity of inventions is great, and a wonderful amount of ingenuity is always at work to contrive something of value to the various classes of society. Patent laws, both in Canada and in the States, protect from uncompensated use the inventions put on record as original, and for the advantage of Canadian inventors who may wish to know the routine in which such record is made, we subjoin the Rules and Forms issued by the Canada Patent Office on the 2nd July, 1869, referring to the New Patent Act, of which an abstract will be found in our article on Legislation. These rules also cover registration under the Copyright Act of 1868, and the Trade Mark and Design Act of 1868, of which a synopsis is given in our last Year Book (1869.)

GENERAL RULES.

1. There is no necessity for any personal appearance at the Patent Office, unless specially called for by order of the Commissioner or the Deputy Commissioner, every transaction being carried on by writing.
2. In every case the applicant or depositor of any paper is responsible for the merits of his allegations and of the validity of the instruments furnished by him or his agent.
3. The correspondence is carried on with the applicant, or with the agent who has remitted or transmitted the papers to the office, but with one person only.
4. All papers are to be clearly and neatly written on foolscap paper, and every word of them is to be distinctly legible, in order that no difficulty should be met with in the taking cognizance of, and in registering and copying them.
5. All communications are to be addressed in the following words:—"To the Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa."

6. As regards proceedings not specially provided for in the following forms, any form being conformable to the letter and spirit of the laws will be accepted, and, if not so conformable, will be returned for correction.

COPYRIGHTS.

7. An application for the Registration of a Copyright shall be made after the following form, when the applicant is a resident of Canada:

PROVIDED ALWAYS, that the validity of this present Patent rests on the truthfulness of the allegations, description and specification of the said Patentee.

The present Patent, however, shall cease and determine, and be null and void, at the end of three years from the date thereof, unless the Patentee shall, within that period, have commenced, and after such commencement, carry on in Canada the construction or manufacture of the said invention, and shall cease and determine, and be null and void, at the end of eighteen months from the granting thereof, if the Patentee or his legal representatives import or cause to be imported into Canada the invention for which this Patent is granted.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF the present Patent has been signed, according to the said Act, sealed with the seal of the Patent Office, and countersigned in the Department of Agriculture on the (*date, month and year written in full, and prominently.*)

The specification will be attached to the Patent to form an essential part thereof, and the first folio of the said specification will be sealed at one corner with the seal of the Patent Office.

The present form, otherwise remaining the same, will be altered in some particulars to meet the circumstances of the case, when the Patent is given to joint inventors, to an assignee or assignees, to legal representatives, or when it is a Patent extending a former Patent to the whole of the Dominion, or is a re-issue, or in any other special case.

17. The models required by law must be neat and substantial working models, the dimensions of which are not to exceed, in any case, eighteen inches in their longest side, unless otherwise allowed by special permission previously obtained; such models must

be so constructed as to show exactly every part of the invention and its mode of working. In cases where samples of ingredients and samples of the composition made of such ingredients, (neither of which being dangerous or explosive substances) are required by law, they must be contained in glass bottles properly arranged. Both models and bottles must bear the name of the inventor, the title of the invention and the date of the application; and they must be furnished to the Patent Office free of every charge and delivered in good order.

18. All fees required by law shall be transmitted with the application to which they appertain in values not subject to any discount, and are better made, whenever practicable, in Post Office money orders, inclosed in registered letters.

19. All applications must be proceeded with and perfected within two years after the lodging of the Petition, in default of which it will be regarded as abandoned, and all previous proceedings and payment of fees will be held at the expiration of that period as of no avail.

20. Two or more separate inventions cannot be claimed in one application, nor patented in one Patent, unless they are so dependent of and connected with each other as to be necessarily taken together to obtain the end sought for by the inventor; and in this latter case the Commissioner of Patents is the judge as to whether or not the pretensions of the applicant are founded in fact and reason.

21. The filing of a protest against the issuing of a Patent shall not be taken in itself as a sufficient reason to withhold the granting of such Patent to an applicant.

22. In cases of doubt, and in accordance with the letter and meaning of the law, Patents may be issued for an invention already patented, a trial before a judicial tribunal being in such cases the only means of discovering who is the real or first inventor.

23. A *Caveat* must be composed of a specification, (and drawings) and as long as it remains uninterfered with, and that the filer is not called upon to lodge his application, in due form, on account of an interfering application, the said proprietor thereof

can lodge with it additional papers, provided these papers are relevant exclusively to the perfecting of the same invention in progress of completion.

24. All cases connected with the intricate and multifarious proceedings, issuing from the working of a law of Patents of Invention, which are not specially defined and provided for in these Rules, shall be decided, in accordance with the merits of each case, by authority of the Commissioner of Patents, and the decision shall be communicated to the interested parties, through the Departmental correspondent of the Patent Office.

The correspondence with the Department is carried, through the Canadian mail, free of postage.

The forwarding of any paper should always be accompanied by a letter, and a separate letter should be written in relation to each distinct subject.

It is particularly recommended that reference should be made to the law before writing on any subject to the Department in order to avoid unnecessary explanations and useless loss of time and labor; and it is also recommended, in every case, to have the papers and drawings prepared by a competent person, for the interest both of the applicant and of the public service.

A sufficient margin should be left on every paper, and especially on specifications and assignments, for the insertion of references or certificates, and for the affixing of the seal thereto.

Although it is optional for the applicant to annex drawings to the specification of a *Caveat*, or not, still it is important, in the interest of the party, always to attach drawings to the said specification.

It must be remembered that the better papers are executed, the sooner the work is despatched at the office, and the surer the regularity of the proceedings is guaranteed.

It must be remembered, when drawing the petition for a Patent of Invention, that, if a change in the residence mentioned has taken place during the year next to the date of the petition, the change or changes should be mentioned, in accordance with the 12th section of the Patent Act of 1869.
