

At the upper end of the lake on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, easily accessible from all points of both Canada and the United States, is situated the Town of Kenora. Here, if anywhere, is the motor-linear enthusiasts' paradise. Here one finds comfortable hotels, cottages, boat and bathing houses, which help to make pleasant the life of the summer visitor.

that run between Kenora and Fort Frances, a round trip of over 400 miles.




REGATTA DAY

sindy beaches, where the owners, great and small, eau swim and splash to their heart's content.






The charm of the Lake of the Woods is that it affords all the pleasures of the great solitudes and also offers the comforts of modern life. It is an ideal




summering place for every member of the family. You can rough it in the woods, twenty minutes from your comfortable hotel, or have a cottage of your

IDEAL SPOTS FOR PICNICING


