J. Pendray.—Col. W. P. Anderson, Chief Engineer of the Department of Marine, Ottawa, has recently been on the west coast of the Island selecting sites for several proposed lighthouses.

MONCTON, N. B.—D. Surveys are now being made for a bridge over the St. John river at Hawkshaw and plans

are being prepared for a steel bridge at the Grave Yard in Albert County.

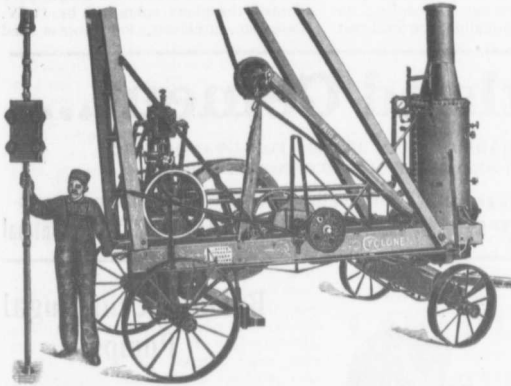

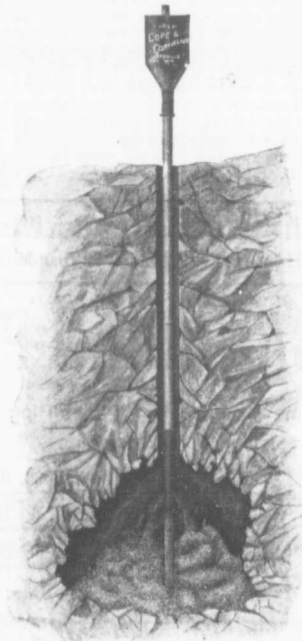

basement and first storey will be built this year.

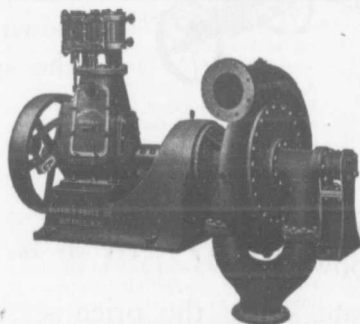

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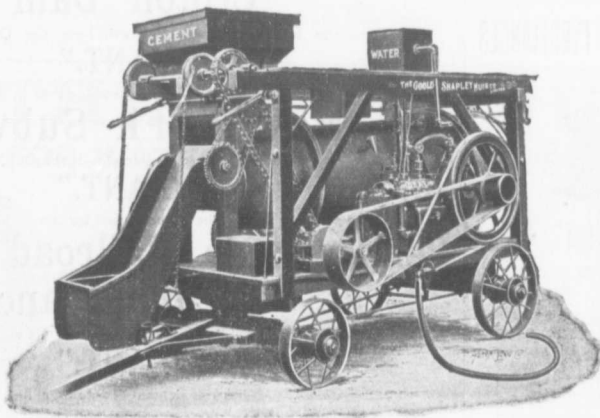
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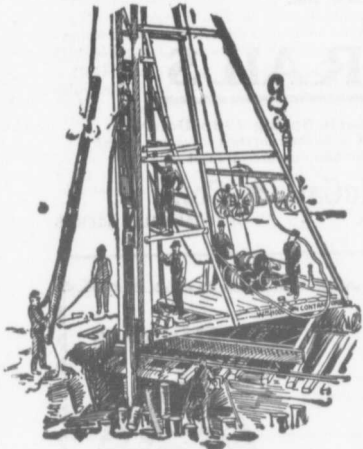
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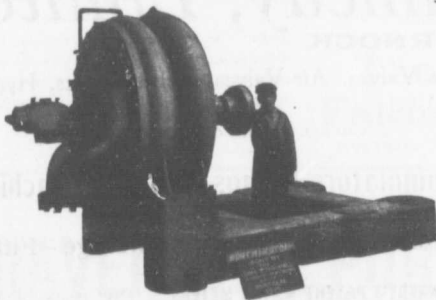
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BUILDING OPERATIONS IN MONTREAL.
