TOWN AND COUNTRY.

Look out for D. D. Campbell's announcement of fresh Spring arrivals at his new stand on Wallace St., in next week's issue.

Wares indebted to our esteemed member for the Commons, Andrew Month, Esq., for interesting parliamentary documents.

\$22,170 was the sum handed over to the employees of the Grand Trunk Ry. at Stratford on the last pay day. Not a small item to come from one corporation.

The German Lutherans of this place are making arrangements for having regular Sunday services in their own language by a clergyman of their denomination.

The many friends of Mrs. Andrew Little, wife of the ever obliging G. W. R. Station-master, will be sorry to learn that she is very seriously ill at the present moment.

Mr. C. H. Nash, the builder of the Stratford gas works—and the would-be builder of the Listowel distillery—has contracted to erect very extensive gas works in St. Joe, Missouri.

At the South Riding of Perth grain and seed fair, held in St. Mary's on the 25th ult., prizes to the amount of \$70 were awarded. The grain and seed on exhibition sold for \$37.87.

The Moleworth section of the gravel road is reported as being completed, and to have been done in a first-class manner. This is highly creditable to the parties who had the division in charge.

The G. W. R. have commenced active operations on the new siding to the mills. A gang of navvies are at work in the vicinity of the crossing on Main St., erecting culverts, etc., previous to grading.

At the meeting in Messrs. Freeman & Carson's store on Friday evening, it was decided to hold a Sabbath School on the 10th inst. The time was not fixed, but it will probably take place in June.

Newry Station is about to have an acquisition to its places of business. Mr. Alfred Thompson is opening out a drug store in a new building which he has erected for the purpose. Mr. T. is well known in the section, and we should like to hear of him doing a thriving trade.

A Stratford cotem in complaining of the dullness of the market in that town lately, attributes it to the "had condition of the roads which render it difficult for farmers in the northern part of the county to come to market." Perhaps it does, but we think we can safely suggest another reason, and that is, that the farmers of the "northern part of the county" know where they can find as good a market much nearer home, and consequently come to Listowel, instead of trudging away to Stratford with their produce.

New Faces in an Old Stand. Messrs. Gee & Bean have lately purchased the stock and business of G. C. Taberner, on Main street, and contemplate opening out the course of a few days with fresh importations for the spring trade. The gentlemen of the firm are new comers in this section, but where they are better known, they enjoy an exceptionally good reputation, as the following from the London Free Press of the 1st inst. testifies: "This morning Mr. J. S. Gee, who has been for several years chief salesman for R. A. Girdle's, agent's furniture, of this city, leaves for Listowel, where, in company with Mr. W. S. Bean, also of this city, he intends opening out an extensive dry goods and grocery establishment. We wish them success; they are young and energetic, and will doubtless do well."

Almost a Fire. Listowel had a narrow escape from what might have been a very serious fire last Friday morning. The young man who took for Mr. J. Welch's shoe store on Main street had started a "roaring" fire in the stove and proceeded to other duties, when they were shortly apprised of the fact that all was not right, and upon hastening up-stairs it was found that the floor and partitions of the building had ignited from the stove-pipes, and that there was every prospect of serious consequences. An alarm was sounded, and the fire engine was almost immediately on hand. Its services, however, were fortunately not required, as a neighbor's presence of mind in instantly supplying a few buckets of water had extinguished the flames before they had effected much headway. Had it not been for this timely action, there is no telling what might have been the result, as the building itself is a good specimen of a "tinder-box;" besides adjoining the Bonner block and other highly combustible structures. Mr. Welch's stock did not suffer much damage, as he takes the wise precaution to have it always ready for removal on shortest notice.

On Friday, 1st inst., a child about eleven years of age, daughter of Mr. Robert McCallum, who resides on the Wallace boundary near Moleworth, while going on an errand to a neighbor's, fell on the ice and broke her collar bone. Dr. Philip of Listowel, was sent for, and she is now doing as well as possible under the circumstances.

A New Enterprise.

A couple of young men have located in town during the past week, and opened out an attractive fruit store on Main Street, opposite the Commercial Hotel. Miller & Barnes is the name of the new firm. They come from Ingersoll, and appear to possess pushing business qualities. Their display of luscious fruits is likely to find ready customers.

Longevity.

An Ingersoll firm of undertakers has during the past ten years, disposed of the remains of no less than 64 former residents of the county of Oxford who had attained the age of 80 years and upwards at the time of death. Four had exceeded 100 years, one—Charles McCue of Dereham—having taken his departure at the great age of 114 years.

The Bulgarian Monk.

His peculiar habits attracted considerable notice, but do not seem to have impressed many with a desire to learn more of his history, if the slim turn out to his lecture in the evening can be taken as an indication. A Creditable Return.

In the report of the town Council proceedings which we publish this week, it will be noticed that the assessment roll of the municipality for the past year has been received. The total amount levied was \$10,507.77. This sum has all been returned to the credit of the town in an exceptionally satisfactory manner. We question whether another town can be found with as clean a balance sheet at the time of making return. Ratepayers of Listowel make it a point to pay their taxes promptly, knowing that the fair fame of the community is enhanced thereby.

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Changing Tenor.

Listowel is never to be found at a standstill. Changes are continually going on; some of them in location of business; others in proprietorship; and others again in establishing new industries. The spirit of progress is abroad, and the town is making rapid advancement in consequence. Within the past ten days several new enterprises have started up, some four or five old establishments have passed into new hands, and about as many more have changed their business base. Among the more important of the latter we may mention that D. D. Campbell's dry goods and general store has been removed to his block on Wallace street, next door to Scott's bank and immediately below the STANDARD office. Donald Brown intends transferring his grocery store to the premises vacated by D. D. Campbell.

Listowel Cattle Fair.

The March cattle fair held here on Friday last, was in some respects ahead of either January or February. The attendance of people was large, giving the town quite an animated appearance during the day. There were about one hundred head of fat cattle brought forward. Some of these were in good order for beef, while a large number were in very poor condition. The low state of the cattle trade seemed to make buyers scarce, and consequently sales were not effected very rapidly. Robert Jones, Esq., was the chief buyer present. He made some sixteen purchases, including a hog of 140 lbs. from Jeremiah Belden of Howick. Mr. Belden's animals were in very fair condition, their weight being 3,180 lbs. 31 cents per lb. was the figure obtained for them. Most of the transactions which took place were at these figures or a little below them. There was some demand for dairy cows, but few on hand, and those an inferior looking class. The purchase of a few fattened beasts was made for the stalls of our town butchers. Outside of the above we did not hear of many transactions taking place. The influx of the farming community no doubt made business brisk for a time, with the store-keepers and tradesmen.

Attempted Burglary.

Sometime during Friday night last the Great Western Station house was broken into by burglars. An entrance was effected through the door of the general waiting room, which bears evidence of having been forced by a powerful lever until the strong lock fastenings gave way. Admission was then gained, and by force, into the private office, when the cash and other drawers were subjected to a ransacking, but without financial success, as all cash and valuable articles had been carefully taken care of. The would-be robber or robbers must have been actuated by strong fears of alarm, as the safe which stands in the office was not tampered with, and they decamped without carrying off anything whatever. The manner of entrance furnishes convincing proof of its having been done by parties with considerable skill at the business, otherwise it might have been set down as the work of novices. On the night following (Saturday) the Harriston Station was also broken into, and there about sixty dollars were abstracted. Circumstances pointed to a connection between the two occurrences. Suspicious looking parties had been seen in this neighborhood on the evening previous, and were known to have left for Harriston the following day. The Company soon had a sharp detective on their track, and we learn that one party at least—a female of bad repute—has been arrested and lodged in jail. We have not heard of any further apprehensions as yet, but the right parties are most sure to be found out when railway detectives take their case in hand.

Interesting Postal Statistics.

The Postmaster-General's Blue Book for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1877, contains the following information concerning post office matters in the county of Perth. The total amount of revenue derived from the county was \$16,786.25; salaries paid to postmasters, \$5,477.00. The gross revenue of Listowel P. O. was \$2,414.91; postmaster's salary, \$608.00; allowances, \$120; allowance for rent, fuel, and light, \$60. Money orders were issued at the Listowel P. O. to the amount of \$13,299.21; the amount of orders paid here was \$9,299.02. The revenue from Stratford P. O. during the same period was \$6,410.83; salaries, \$1,483; money orders issued, \$21,799.86; money orders paid, \$17,374.04. St. Mary's—revenue, \$3,517.17; salaries, \$856. Mitchell (five quarters)—revenue, \$2,543.66; salaries, \$634. Millbank—revenue, \$370.72; salaries, \$84. Milverton—revenue, \$329.99; salaries, \$88. Milverton—revenue, \$87.70; salaries, \$34. Donnell—revenue, \$124.44; salaries, \$28. Gowansdown—revenue, \$35.25; salaries, \$28. Hammond—revenue, \$41.86; salaries, \$14. Monckton—revenue, \$189; salaries, \$100. Newry—revenue, \$213.11; salaries, \$82. Shipley—revenue, \$23.83; salaries, \$22. Treacate—revenue, \$49.38; salaries, \$30. Trowbridge—revenue, \$101.62; salaries, \$36. Wallace, revenue, \$37.96; salaries, \$14. For conveying the mail between Listowel and Mitchell, six times per week, Mr. J. T. Hicks received \$275. Mr. S. Loughheed received \$210 for performing a like service between Listowel and Moleworth. Messrs. Hay & Kidd were allowed \$62.20 for carrying mail between Listowel P. O. and the Great Western depot. The mail route between Gowansdown and Shipley, three trips per week, cost, \$61.25; E. Bristow, contractor; between Gowansdown and Wallace, \$60; J. Taggart, contractor; Donegal and Newry routes, three trips per week, \$80; C. Mason, contractor. Donegal and Hammond, two trips per week, \$50; J. Hammond, contractor.

Town Council Proceedings.

The regular monthly meeting of the town Council took place on Monday evening, 4th inst. The following members were present: J. W. Scott, Mayor; T. E. Hay, Devereux, and Commissioners Nicholas, Deavitt, Binning, Freeman, Hopper, Dillabough, Towner and Hacking. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. On motion of Dr. Nichol, seconded by A. S. Deavitt, the Collector's Report for the past year was received. The following is an abstract of the roll, as laid before the Council: Total amount of rates on roll, \$10,507.77. Am't collected by Treas., \$10,507.77. Remitted by Council, \$5.31. Non-resident tax, \$19,937.77. The Mayor expressed himself highly pleased at the very satisfactory manner in which the taxes had been collected, enabling a most complete return. The Treasurer's report for the past month was laid before the meeting, showing a balance from last audit of \$4,105.88; receipts for the month, \$292.30—total \$4,398.18. The disbursements during the month have amounted to \$2,575.68.

Leaving a balance on hand of \$1,822.50.

Moved by Thos. E. Hay, seconded by Geo. Towner, that the following accounts be paid: Geo. Sutherland, \$7.75; W. G. Hay, \$23.20; John Osborne, \$7.75; from hall, \$25. Report read from committee appointed in assertion of cost of proposed street lamp posts. The following is the substance of this report: Twelve or sixteen lamps will be required for the different parts of the town; the cost of erecting the same, if iron posts with lamp would be \$34 each with cedar posts, turned and polished, per year would be about \$4. Moved by Dr. Nichol, seconded by Dr. Dillabough, that the road and bridge committee be authorized to purchase sixteen lamps and posts, and have them placed at the corners of the streets as directed by the Council.—Lost on division: Yeas—Nichol, Hopper, Dillabough and Binning; nays—Deavitt, Towner, Freeman, T. E. Hay, Hacking and Austin. Mr. L. Bolton, P. L. S., was heard respecting a new lithograph map of the town. The matter was laid over for further consideration. Moved by T. E. Hay, seconded by J. H. Hopper, that J. M. Clinie's tender for hemlock plank at \$5.94 per m; pine plank at \$9 per m, and oak elm at \$8 per m; Thos. Page's tender for Clinie's tender for cedar plank at three cents per foot, be accepted.—Carried. A petition from a number of the citizens of the town in reference to making a proper crossing over the G.W. R. track on Lukerman St., the road and bridge committee to report on at next regular meeting. Moved by J. A. Hacking, seconded by A. Austin, that Dr. D. Hay and J. W. Scott be a deputation to wait on the City Council; Dr. Dillabough, D. D. Campbell and D. D. Hay, Moleworth Council; T. E. Hay and John Binning, Wallace Council; D. D. Hay and J. W. Scott, Elma Council, for the purpose of soliciting further grants for town line gravel road.—Carried. Council then adjourned.
