## Four Tappers in the War.

Lieut. Charles Tapper, son of Sir Charles Hilbert Tapper, is at Rockcliffe Ranges attending the school for musketry prior to going to the front with his regiment, a British Columbia battalion.

All four sons of Sir Charles Hilbert Tapper are in service. Reginald Tapper was wounded at St. Julien. He stuck to his machine gun until twice wounded. He is convalescing in England. Gordon Tapper, an officer of the Second Contingent, is reported to have joined one of the regiments in Flanders. He has been kept out of action for some time through an attack of pneumonia. James is an inspector in the Northwest Mounted Police, and has been refused permission to go to the front, as officers in the Mounted Police are required in the West. Charles Tapper, the youngest of the family, has now joined the colors.

Lieut. Merritt, a son-in-law, died at St. Julien while leading his men in an attack on the German trenches.

## New Brunswick to Take Action

SURVEY OF CROWN LANDS TO BE PROCEEDED WITH.

The Government of New Brunswick has announced that in the near future it will appoint a provincial forester and proceed with the survey of Crown timber lands, as provided for in the Act of 1912. The Crown lands comprise an area of over ten thousand square miles, or approximately one-third the total area of the province. The proposed action is entirely logical, in view of the fact that the province derives an annual revenue of over half a million dollars from these lands. A careful stock-taking, together with a thorough investigation of the questions of reproduction and rate of growth, will be required to determine the means necessary for the perpetuation of the forest and of the revenues resulting from its exploitation.

## Potato Inspection.

Inspection of the Truro and Cornwall districts Garnet Chili potato fields is being done this week by Mr. E. J. Wortley, Director of Agriculture for Bermuda. Prof. W. H. Brittain, representing the Provincial Government, and Messrs. S. J. Moore, Dominion Seed Inspector, and Paul A. Murphy, Dominion Plant Pathologist, representing the Federal Government. According to Mr. Wortley, the inspection so far reveals the fact that the N. S. potato growers have earned a lesson from past experiences, and that by the use of rigidly selected seed and regular spraying they can save their potato crops from being condemned. The N. S. growers have not yet fully realized the importance of spraying, and what losses they may have this year will be due to a lack of thoroughness in this matter. But it must be said that the growers have been much more thorough this year than in any previous year.

## RED ROSE TEA "is good tea"

Editorial Brevities.

The open season for moose hunting began yesterday and ends November 30th. A new clause in the game law provides that no meat shall be sold except between Sept. 16th and November 1st. The close season for cow moose extends to Sept. 15th, 1915.

The Talk of Peace.

What Sir Edward Grey said last March concerning peace terms remains true to day. He said—

"In due time the terms of peace will be put forward by our allies in common with us in accordance with the alliances that now exist between us and are public to the world. But one essential condition must be the restoration of Belgium to her independent national life and the free possession of her territory, and reparation to her, as far as reparation is possible, for the cruel wrong done to her."

Sir Edward Grey said, further, that the wish of the Allies was that the nations of Europe be free to live their independent lives, working out their own national development, whether they be great states or small states, in perfect liberty. And further, he said:— "We and the other nations of Europe must be free to live, not menaced by talk of supreme war lords and shining armor and the sword continually rattled in the scabbard, and Heaven continually invoked as an accomplice to German arms, and not having our policy dictated and our national destinies and activities controlled by the military caste of Prussia."

The Allies did not seek this war, but they will dictate such terms of peace as will ensure the result outlined by Sir Edward Grey. Upon Germany must rest the burden of guilt and of restitution. For, as the Toronto World well says:—

"Germany alone desired war. When the czar proposed his peace measures years ago, it was Germany who blocked the movement. When Great Britain offered to curtail her naval expenditure Germany refused to meet her overtures. When Serbia offered any reparation possible short of national suicide, Germany interfered and secured the rejection of her own good will. It has been shown that Germany refused to consider Sir Edward Grey's proposal for a conference on July 27th, on the ground that Russia was mobilizing her troops, although Russian mobilization was not ordered till four days later. It was Germany and Germany alone, after the preparation of a generation, who desired war and insisted on it."

Town Taxes.

Wolfville, Sept. 14th, 1915.

Mr. Editor—Will you kindly kindly give me space in your paper for a few remarks in reference to unpaid town taxes. At the beginning of each year estimates are made up as near as possible to our actual requirements, and the rate is fixed on these estimates and the bills sent out. If these taxes are not received by the treasurer fast enough for him to meet the bills presented to him for payment there soon begins to be trouble. The town cannot be run without paying the bills promptly when presented. When coupons for interest on our debentures are presented they

must be paid immediately or our credit is impaired. Our town officials and teachers' salaries have to be met promptly, as well as other running expenses. Just now our county clerk is asking that our portion of the tax be paid. This amounts to about \$100.00, including \$75.00 for the patriotic fund, and we have not the money on hand to pay it. We have the privilege of an overdraft at the bank up to a certain limit, but we have about reached that limit. We have plenty of taxes due to meet these bills, but they are withheld as the disadvantage of the town, for we are having to pay interest on a large overdraft. Some of those who have paid their taxes think we ought to see those who do not pay; but there

is not a man in your council who wants to do that. However, we will be forced to do it if there is not a response very soon. We hope that those who still owe the taxes will see to it that our good natured and obliging town clerk is not put to this disagreeable trouble in collecting the taxes, some of them long overdue. We are nearing the last quarter of the year and action will have to be taken very soon if our showing at the end of the year is going to be satisfactory. We are sorry to have to call your attention to this matter, but it seemed only fair to put the matter before you, before action is taken. We hope that there will be a prompt and good response. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for your trouble, faithfully,

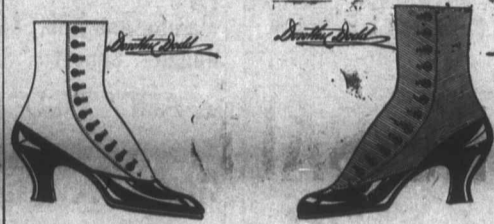

**San Jose Scale.**

Truro, Sept.—Only 6 cases of the dreaded San Jose Scale in Nova Scotia orchards have been located this year by the provincial inspectors, according to Prof. W. H. Brittain of the College of Agriculture and Provincial Entomologist. This shows the value of the work being accomplished by the Entomological Department in keeping the N. S. fruit farms practically free from the presence and ravages of this pest. It is a noticeable fact that the six cases were found on stock imported previous to the inauguration of the government inspection over nursery importations in 1912. Not a single case of the San Jose Scale has been found on stock imported subsequent to that date. The comparative figures are very striking. In 1912 there were discovered 750 cases; in 1913, 64 cases; in 1914 only 4 cases, and in 1915, so far, only 6 cases, and all on stock imported prior to 1912.

**Sir William Van Horn Dead.**

Sir William Van Horn, formerly President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, died in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, Saturday afternoon. He was operated on for abdominal abscess on Aug. 23rd and was supposed to be on the way to recovery until three days before his death, when an unfavorable change in his condition suddenly took place. He is survived by his widow, a son R. B. Van Horn, and a daughter, Miss A. Van Horn.

## Not a Natural Product.

One pet claim of liquor sympathizers is that alcohol is a natural product, and a result of natural conditions, and may not properly be condemned for this reason. This was answered clearly and tersely by the Rev. Dr. G. W. Eichelberger, in an address before a teachers' association in Mississippi. Among other things, he said:

There is not one drop of alcohol in nature. Alcohol is produced by decomposition of sugar, by leaven and ferment. And note that the word 'leaven' in the Bible means evil influence. There is no good leaven. So alcohol is itself a decomposition. That is why it will not let anything else decompose which it saturates. It hardens. It is a substance which seems to exist on the border line between the animal and vegetable. I can power to appropriate organic vegetable substances of a different character. In this change heat is produced, carbonic acid gas is given off, and the result is alcohol—the excretion of the process of vegetable change. The poison extracted from this vegetable fermentation is alcohol, and is as poisonous as arsenic.
