The lumbermen of Maine and New Brunswick are looking forward with confidence to a radical change in, if not the complete removal, of the import duties on lumber shipped to the United States from this country. They expect the change to come soon.

The Rustler disastor, at Miramichi, is only the direct result of carlessness, not only on the part of the offcials of the vessel, but on the part of the dominion goverment. Perhaps the latter is the most culpable. From the evidence adduced at the inquest, it is plain that the vessel was not in a fit state to carry passengers. If she had been inspected, it must have been most carelessly done, or she could not been in the condition described by her officers. At present, it is no great assurance of safety to see hanging up in the cabins or the engine room, a certificate from a dominion official to the effect that this vessel is thoroughly seaworthy and fitted to carry passengers. UNEARTHED A BURIED CITY.

City of the Stone Age Brought to Light with its Painted Idols.

A buried city has just been discovered n Guatemala upon the estate of Don Manuel J. Alvarado, at the foot of Volcan de Agua, about a mile and a half to the eastward of the present village of San tiago de los Caballeros. On several occasions the proprietor had noticed articles having a strong resemplance to the domestic utensils of the
