ROME, Sept. 3.

The Countess de Merode has asked the Holy Father for a special benediction on her son, the Prince de Merode, on the occasion of his marriage with the Princess Crois, sister of the Archduke Frederick of Austria.

The Correspondence of the Vatican says that Cardinal Howard has had a conversation with Prince Bismarck at Kissingen. The officious journal adds that in this interview the religious questions have been touched, but that Cardinal Howard has not been entrusted with any mission.

The Monitor of Rome relates, through its Mayence correspondent, that it is said that the considerations of the Prussian Bishops relative to the circular of Herr Gossler, and drawn up unanimously, have been sent to the Vatican. It is positively asserted that the Vatican is making every possible effort to find a method which, while assuring the Prussian Catholics at least the minimum of essential liberties, may satisfy the Government.

The regulations for the working of the Judicial Commission instituted over a year ago by the Pope, *Motu proprio*, have been distributed to the prelates who form part of that commission. These regulations were drawn up immediately after the publication of the *Motu proprio* in October last. The commission will act as a court of justice to settle all difficulties which may arise between the persons living within the Vatican, which is allowed, by the Italian Law of Guarantees, the privilege of extra-territoriality, and, consequently, Italian law has no force within the walls of the Vatican.

The condition of Cardinal de Luca is such as to inspire considerable uneasiness. He took ill at Palestrina, the episcopal city of the suburban diocese which is entitled to him. On Sunday last he received the Viaticum with the sentiments of faith and piety for which he has ever been distinguished. The Chapter of San Lorenzo in Damaso—of which Cardinal de Luca is commendatory—began on the 24th August, a triduum of prayers for his recovery, and another triduum has been begun in the Church of the Archconfraternity of the *Gratulatione*, at Santa Lucia, of which he is the protector.

A rather important audience was granted on Thursday, the 30th August, by His Holiness to the members of the Parish of the Penance collection at Rome—parish-priests and others—besides nearly a thousand of the laity. When the Holy Father had entered the Clementine Hall, where the audience was held, Prince Altieri, as president of the work, expressed in the name of all present, sentiments of filial attachment to the Sovereign Pontiff, detailed the history of the library, in which were valuable manuscripts and several rare books. The library was bought by Signors Yennarilli and Giacomini and others, and these sold it to Colloff, who sent the greater part of the volumes and manuscripts to Naples. The Minister of Public Instruction, to the interests of literature, it is supposed, induced the Minister of Grace and Justice to interfere and sequester the books and manuscripts at Naples. Then two experts were called in to examine the case was a contravention of the Pappa edict of 1819. [This edict, which takes its name from Cardinal Pappa, Secretary of State to Pius VII., enacted that no works of art or antiquity should be removed from the country without the permission of the Government.] Proceedings were taken against Prince Massimo and those associated with him in the sale of the library, and it was known that it would not enter into 'commerce,' and that the volumes and manuscripts would be sent abroad.

A Penitent Murderer.

Frederick Mann, the murderer of the Cooke family, at Little Rideau, P. Q., now under sentence, has become very penitent, and says he would give nine lives to atone for his awful crime. He alleges his act was unpremeditated, having arisen out of some hot words from the father, whom he killed first. He thinks he would have murdered the whole family while the anger was upon him but for the daughter's overpowering him and taking away the axe. The prisoner alleges that he did not realize the enormity of his bloody deed for four or five days after it was committed. He denies that he or any member of his family had ever been affected with insanity.

PRINCE COUNTY EXHIBITION.

GRAND SUCCESS.

EVERYONE that could possibly attend the Exhibition of the Prince County seems to have been present on Thursday last. The crowds collected at Summerside were simply immense, and people kept pouring in all the forenoon by every avenue leading to the grounds. The splendor of the weather contributed a good deal to this success; and there is no doubt, judging from the large numbers of young people present, that many visited the Exhibition to enjoy themselves. Lieut-Governor arrived by special train at 11.30, the Band played the national anthem and His Honor opened the Exhibition in due form. He made a speech in which he congratulated the farmers and the Province upon the fine harvest, especially as regards the wheat crop, which would prevent the want of flour and the sending of money from the Island. He thought, judging from appearances, that Prince County took the lead in business. He gave special praise to the manner of raising stock, the exportation of which would materially to the revenue of the people.

The show of horses was the most attractive of any at the Exhibition; it was really very fine. The cattle were not so good.
