At other times, it is brought on by suffering the horse to over- load the stomach and bowels ; by standing in the stable without exercise, and eating immoderately of hay. Want of appetite may depend on a natural delicacy of the stomach, or on the bad quality of the food. But hay is often eaten with little or no appetite, especially when it has been mus- ty. When the appetite fails though the food is good, and the horse has only moder ate work, the diet should be changed; a small quantity of straw, cut up with what is called cut feed, would be servicesle; but if the horse had been worked hard, rest, probably, is the only remedy necessary




