## CANADIAN SALT.

### An Attractive Display at the Cincinnati Exposition.

A Splendid Advertisement for the County of Huron—Every Maker, However, Does not Exhibit—A Valuable Pamphlet.

The descriptive catalogue of the mineral exhibit of the province of Ontario at the Centennial Exposition of the Ohio Valley and Central States is before us. It is a model of typography, and makes a handsome book of 64 pages. It is more than a catalogue; it is a handbook on matters connected with mining and mining products in Ontario.

The introduction calls attention to the claims of the province as a producer of grain, fruit, live stock and general farm produce, and also shows that as a manufacturing country the Dominion (more particularly our own province) is full of promise. The fact is cited that at the Philadelphia centennial 170 prizes were awarded Canadian manufactures and machinery, besides hundreds of prizes for live stock and farm and dairy products.

An interesting chapter on "Ontario's Mineral Resources" follows, the geological formation is briefly but clearly sketched, and valuable statistics are given as to the value of the mineral product of our mines and the worth of the exports of minerals. The former is placed at \$3,385,000 for Ontario (about one-third of the mineral product of the whole Dominion) the latter at \$166,094 per annum.

The catalogue proper is then given, from which we learn that 413 different exhibits have been made at Cincinnati by Ontario in the line of minerals, etc., comprising over two thousand specimens, the aggregate weight of which is about ten tons.

The appendix is not the least valuable portion of this interesting little book. In this part is given a definition of "mining lands," and applicants for letters patents, etc., are instructed how to proceed. The act respecting mining follows, and then comes a list of the minerals, and their locations. A general index ends the book. The whole reflects much credit upon the able and accurate author, Mr. A. B. Deane, Deputy Minister of Agriculture of Ontario.

Then follows this description of the salt region: "The salt district of Ontario occupies an area of about 1,200 square miles, extending over portions of the counties of Bruce and Lambton, and almost the whole of Huron. The outer limits of the deposit may be indicated by a line drawn from the town of Kincardine, on Lake Huron, through Wingham, Brussels, Dublin, Parkhill and Bothwell, to Courtwright, on the St. Clair river. Near the lake coast there are no fewer than six successive beds of

salt, separated from one another by thin layers of rock, and having an aggregate thickness of over 120 feet. A diamond drill boring made at Goderich, in 1876, to a depth of 1,317 feet, showed the existence of six beds—the first at 1,028 feet, and the sixth at 1,385 feet—with an aggregate thickness of 126 feet. The harbours of Goderich and Kincardine, on Lake Huron, afford excellent shipping facilities by water, and all the wells have convenient railway accommodation."

Several of our salt manufacturers, we regret to say, are not represented at Cincinnati. All were invited—even strongly pressed—to exhibit. The Ontario Government assumed all expense of the matter, and there is little excuse for neglect. Those of our manufacturers who have sent their manufactures to the Exposition have a double satisfaction. They have done a patriotic act, and they have also done a wise one from a commercial standpoint. They are getting the benefit of a splendid advertisement at the thronged capital of Ohio, and they are also being extensively advertised in the neat and valuable pamphlet got up by Mr. Blue.

We have no doubt that when there is reciprocity in salt (as there shortly will be), those who have shown samples at the Exposition will be able to get orders from a region now closed to them, and where up to the present time they were almost unknown.

### Death of Mr John Ogilvie.

Montreal, July 23.—Very general regret was caused in commercial circles to-day when it became known that Mr John Ogilvie, of the great milling firm Ogilvie Bros, and second brother of the Senator Ogilvie, had died suddenly this morning at his residence in this city. The deceased gentleman's death was terrible in its suddenness. He had not been in very good health for some time, and during the winter made a tour of Southern California, New Mexico, and British Columbia, which seemed to do him some good. Last week he was at the office as usual, and Saturday and yesterday appeared to be in good health. He spent Sunday evening with his family, and seemed to be in the best of spirits. At an early hour he retired, and slept well during the night. About five o'clock this morning he awoke and remarked to his wife that he had had a most refreshing night's sleep. He fell asleep again, and in a short time Mrs Ogilvie, on proceeding to awaken him, found to her horror that he was dead. Deceased was 53 years of age. He was born in Montreal, educated in the High School, and subsequently joined his brothers, Senator Alexander and William Ogilvie, in the milling business. Senator Ogilvie retired from business some years ago, and the firm consisted of William and John Ogilvie. Deceased was particularly well known throughout Ontario, having spent a great part of his time in that Province. When he entered the business the firm's only mill was the small "Glenora," which stood on part of the lot occupied by the "Royal" mill on Canal street. Their business kept growing, and during the following years the Goderich and Seaford mills in Ontario, besides one in Winnipeg, have been added to the "Glenora" and "Royal" of this city. A number of elevators have also been constructed along the railway line. Deceased had charge of the work of construction, and during the past few years he had spent almost half his time superintending building in Ontario and the Northwest. He leaves a widow and seven children, four sons and three daughters. The eldest son, Alexander, has been associated with his father in the business for some time.

The news of the death of Mr Ogilvie was received with deepest regret in Goderich, not only by the employees of the mill, with whom he was a general favorite, but also by the many friends and acquaintances of the deceased amongst our residents. On Monday Mr and Mrs Hutchinson (sister of Mr Ogilvie) and Mr F Jordan left to attend the funeral, which took place at Montreal on Wednesday. The Harbor Mill "shut down" on the day of the funeral, and the flag flying at half mast from the top of the elevator testified that a heavy loss had been sustained by the firm and employees, in the death of Mr John Ogilvie, whose energy and ability had contributed so largely to the success of the great milling interest.

## FROM THE CAPITAL.

### Latest Political and General News from Ottawa.

#### New Ministers at the Capital—The Journalist—Selling Liquor to Indians—The Election—Group of all kinds—From the Capital.

Ottawa, July 24.  
John Carling and Mackenzie, Bowell, have for weeks been the only Ministers at the Capital. They are both steady young departmental men. In the Dept. of Justice not only is the Minister absent but the Deputy Minister as well, and Mr Power is at the head of affairs. It seems he was not empowered to act on the telegram from the Penitentiary surgeon at Kingston stating that a convict named Roberts, of Stratford, was dying and recommending his release. His father begs that his son may be allowed to die at home but as yet no action has been taken.

For Tappan, the Hon C. H., has arrived to reinforce "houses of Juggins" and "Machowell," and assume the direction of the Dept. of Marine and Fisheries. He is the youngest Cabinet Minister that Ottawa has ever seen. Mr Bowell having laid down the law to Mr Robertson of

**THE JOUGINS RAFT.**  
That gentleman has returned east, and today is set for the launch of his great timber ship at Juggins N. S. for New York via the Atlantic ocean. The first big raft broke up at sea and had to be abandoned to the extreme danger of navigation. This second attempt is a more stupendous one. The ship contains 21,000 pieces of timber averaging 38 feet in length, value \$100,000. The Boston Marine Insur. Co have agreed to insure it, provided it is towed by the B. W. Morse the most powerful steam tug afloat, the tug owners to receive no compensation if they lose the raft. There are to be excursion crowds at Juggins to-day and the wide awake Methodists there will hold a tea meeting where the hungry multitude may be fed.

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The contest in Colchester N. S., will come to a head August 25, when Mr Morrison, Liberal, will oppose Sir Adams Archibald, Conservative. Mr Adams Archibald is in place of Hon A. W. McLellan appointed Lieut. Governor. Sir Adams is a veteran of seventy-five and if elected will be the oldest member of the House of Commons. It is a curious fact that in 1867, when Sir Adams was the Conservative candidate in Colchester the Liberal opponent was A. W. McLellan who has just left Sir John's Cabinet. Sir Adams was twice defeated for the county and was appointed Lieut. Governor of Manitoba. Colchester was Liberal up to 1874, since when it has been Conservative by large majorities.

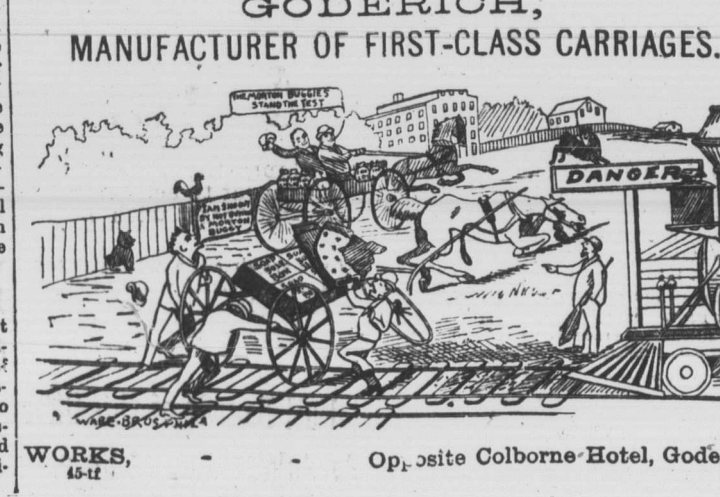

We expect more triumphs for him yet. Private Fulton, of Middlesex, won the Queen's prize with a score of 280.

A Fine Exhibit from the Province of Ontario.

From the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette. The Centennial Commissioners extended an invitation to the Government of the Province of Ontario to take part in our Exposition. The invitation was accepted, and the result is now to be seen in the park building, where are shown over ten tons of the various minerals of Ontario, representing over four hundred distinct entries and over two thousand specimens. The exhibit is interesting and instructive. An idea is given of the mineral wealth of a country that Americans have not considered particularly rich in that respect, and because the minerals and ores are exhibited in their natural condition.
