





HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

When boiling fish, always water enough to cover it.

Serve apple sauce or fried apples with roast pork or pork chops.

Pies will be soggy if set on top of a hot stove after being baked.

Tooth brushes may be washed in a strong solution of salt and water.

Sprinkle salt on the bottom of the oven and your cakes will not burn.

Kerosene will remove grease from set bowls and porcelain lined sinks.

After cleansing ivory expose to the sun. This assists in bleaching it.

A reliable relief for a mosquito bite is the cut side of a raw onion.

Wine stains on table linen should be covered with salt, wet and rinsed out.

A great many blemishes may be removed from wall paper with the rubber on a lead pencil.

To prevent the umbrella jar from being broken, put a small rubber mat in the bottom.

To lull one to slumber when tired, there is nothing like the odor of lavender flowers.

Dried lemon peel sprinkled over coals will destroy and disagreeable odor about the house.

Linen stained by ink should be immediately dipped in buttermilk. Repeat this until the stain disappears.

A cupful of ripe olives added to a beef stew just before it is taken up will make an astonishing improvement.

Seeded raisins, cut into pieces, broken nut meats and a small part of celery in thin bits make up a delicious salad.

Any brickwork rinsed off with ammonia and water and then carefully dried will be wonderfully brightened by the process.

For aching feet, due to walking, change the shoes at least twice a day. This will give both feet and shoes a refreshing rest.

Bread will keep moist much longer if kept in a crock, wrapped in several thicknesses of cloth, than if kept in a tin box.

To soften the old paint brushes you used last year, put them in a can of coal oil. When soft they can be washed in warm suds.

For a refreshing dinner salad toss white cherries, bits of orange and banana in French dressing, and serve on lettuce leaves.

A few drops of alcohol rubbed on the inside of lamp chimneys will remove all trace of greasy smoke, when water alone is of no avail.

Train Plunged into Ravine.

MONTREAL, April 19.—A special from Quebec says: Despatches received here to-day show that up to the present time eight bodies have been recovered from the landslide that entombed some forty labourers and a ballasting train on the National Transcontinental Railway at Coucoucacha, about forty miles north of La Tuque yesterday.

Trestle Collapsed.

The accident occurred near Lake MacDonald. A ballasting train of six cars was passing over a trestle seventy-five feet high, which had been erected last autumn, and which collapsed as the train was passing over it.

About forty men were on the train and all were hurled to the ravine below, where they were either drowned or smothered under the soft sand that plunged down and covered the collapsed trestle.

Rescue Work Difficult.

The work of rescue was organized with great difficulty. The accident occurred at a remote point, and the work was rendered more difficult by the fact that there were fifteen feet of water at the bottom of the ravine.

As soon as the news of the accident arrived at La Tuque, a special rescue train was rushed to the scene carrying workmen and doctors.

A Pathetic Scene.

Heart-rending scenes were witnessed while the work of rescuing the wounded was being carried out.

A Pole whose name could not be ascertained, was lying on a huge pile of debris with his thigh dislocated and his groin perforated. He was operated on without being chloroformed, but never emitted a single moan, holding tightly to his heart a little cross that came from his sweetheart. Another man was buried underneath the debris, only his head being free, and for two hours his shouts and cries were heard without the rescuers being able to reach him.

Eight Bodies Recovered.

It is difficult to obtain detailed information of the accident, and it has been impossible up to now to get the names of the victims.

It is known, however, that eight bodies have been recovered and two are still under the debris, while twenty-three wounded have been rescued and are being treated at La Tuque. They may be other victims.

The section of the Transcontinental line on which the accident occurred is under the contract of Messrs. MacDonald and O'Brien. At the local office of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission, it is stated no official report has yet been received.

Coal Boring.

We have before us the report of the Department of Mines of Nova Scotia for 1909. As the interest in mining in Newfoundland is gradually increasing, the doing of our nearest neighbour in mining should not be out of place.

The total revenue for year ending September 30th, 1909, was \$629,019.11. The amounts paid to the Dominion Iron and Steel Company and to the Nova Scotia Iron and Steel Company altogether as bonus on coal consumed in the manufacture of Iron and Steel was \$49,949.48.

The coal weighed 4,615,713 tons, of which Newfoundland took 156,248 tons. Eleven thousand men were employed during the year, about sixty per cent being skilled workers. In addition over 1000 boys were employed. The work averaged for the year about 250 days each. The toll of life and limb was heavy in the coal mines. Nearly three dozen men lost their lives, mostly from falling coal or stone.

The Department continues boring for coal; 14 holes were made for coal, and \$6,000 spent in drilling them. In two of the fourteen holes coal was come across. In one hole 4 feet of coal and shale mixed and 14 feet of coal were found at a total depth of 191 feet. In another hole which they bored 851 feet, they found 13 feet of coal at a depth of 427 feet.

Newfoundland should not feel disheartened because results have been small with boring, for few holes have been drilled here. We noticed that at Little Harbor, the Government drilled a hole of 739 feet without coming across any coal. If such results occur in a country where they are mining millions of tons of coal annually, there is no need to feel down-hearted about coal-boring in Newfoundland.

CAPE BRETON STRIKE CALLED OFF.

Special to Evening Telegram.

GLACE BAY, N.S., April 28.

It is only one week less than ten months since the miners of the Dominion Coal Co. numbering about 5,000 men, went out on strike. It is the longest strike in the history of mining in this country, and there is great rejoicing to-day that the miners have decided to call it off. The men who are idle will soon be at work again. The strike meant the garrisoning of the colliery districts for 6 months and the loss of probably a million and a half of dollars each by the company and the men. The decision to call the strike off was reached at a meeting of the men held at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the offices of the mine workers, at which, it is understood, representatives from all the locals were present, besides the officials of the U.M.W., who are still here. The U.M.W. leader says that the men are returning to work on the company's assurance that there will be no discrimination against them and that when they resume work the management will be prepared to receive committees who may wish to lay grievances before them. It was stated on the street that the company had received a committee of the men and had agreed to strike out the objectionable feature of a proposition under which the U. M. W. claimed a preference was shown the members of the P. W. A. and that hereafter the Company agreed not to discriminate against any of the men. But there was nothing in this story. The report is that the men are going to work unconditionally, except as already stated, and that no further propositions have been made by the Company to any of the men.

W. of the Azores, he took the six members of the crew of the Allston from their vessel which had become disabled by the loss of her rudder on April 24th, when off Cape Race. The seamen were transferred to a British fishing schooner bound for St. Lawrence, Nfld. The G. R. Allston was bound from Cadiz for St. John's, Nfld., with a cargo of salt and wine. She was registered 99 tons and was built at Lachaven in 1902, she was formerly owned in Lunenburg, N. S.

Increased Wages.

The Postal Telegraph Cable Co. announced to-day that on June 1st, it will make substantial increases in the wages of its Telegraph operators in all important offices of its system. The increase will be selective and will run from 25 per cent depending on the merits of the employees. The Western Union recently announced a similar plan of increase.

Kitchener's Command.

LONDON, April 28.

The King fielded Lord Kitchener the baton of Field Marshal at an audience at Buckingham Palace to-day. The Government seems to have decided definitely that Lord Kitchener shall take up the Mediterranean appointment in spite of the popular clamor in favor of placing him at the head of the Home forces. In the House of Commons this afternoon, Mr. Haldane, Secretary of State for War, stated that it was proposed that Kitchener should shortly commence his duties as Commander in Chief of the Mediterranean with headquarters at Malta.

The Council should immediately stop this disgusting practice.

The Woman's Charter.

LONDON, April 23.—A "Woman's Charter," which proposes to give women the franchise and many other privileges they now lack, is before the House of Commons. It takes the form of a series of eight bills introduced by Sir Charles MacLaren.

One of the main objects of the charter is to put married women in a more equitable position with regard to property, and another is to provide salaries for wives.

It is proposed that a wife who devotes her time to housekeeping and the care of children shall have a claim on her husband during his life, and on his estate after death, for a sum calculated on a scale not exceeding the wages of a housekeeper in her station of life, provided she has not received any other personal allowance.

Where the wife is a wage-earner she shall not be legally liable for the support of her husband or of his children unless her earnings or the income of her property exceed the minimum necessary for her support.

Wives who work jointly in the same business as their husbands shall be regarded as partners.

Fathers and mothers shall be joint guardians of their children.

All universities or institutes deriving revenue from the state shall be open to women.

Finally, brutal husbands are to be liable to heavier punishment than under the present law.

Fire To-Day.

Mount Cashel Boys Good Work.

At 11.15 to-day the chimney in the outhouse in the rear of Judge Prowse's cottage, Torbay Road, took fire and a spark from it alighting on the roof of the structure set the shingles blazing. James Quinn, the caretaker, sent a messenger to Mount Cashel and Bro. Ennis telephoned the fire department, when Chief Dunn and a couple of men proceeded there immediately, followed quickly by Supt. Grimes, Chief Winsor, Head Sparrow, Sgt. Byrne and Const. Fitzgerald. Supt. Dunn was first on the scene and getting there mounted the roof. About 40 boys from Mt. Cashel Orphanage were on the scene and getting water from a brook near formed a bucket brigade, the head of which mounted a ladder and passed

up water to Mr. Dunn and the other men on the roof, so that in less than 20 minutes the blaze was extinguished. When the police arrived the boys were working like little heroes and deserve great praise. Chief Dunn also worked with a will, and but for the promptness of all concerned both the outhouse and cottage, towards which a high wind blew, would have been destroyed. A hole was burned in the roof near the chimney and the saddle was badly burned.

Annual Report of St. John's Rifle Club

The committee of the St. John's Rifle Club beg to report as follows on the work of the Club for the past year:

The season was a very successful one, especially as regards the shooting, which shows a higher average than any previous year. A general improvement being made all along the line. Many of our younger shots advanced ten points over the previous year's shooting. This is matter for congratulation, and the splendid shooting of Mr. J. F. Murphy is worthy of special mention. It sets a high standard and has created increased interest in rifle shooting in Newfoundland, and will spur on many promising younger shots to emulate Mr. Murphy's fine scoring.

The season opened on May 22nd, with the Empire Day shoot, and closed on September 1st, with an all-day shoot. Owing to lack of practice, the scoring on Empire Day was not up to our usual standard, but as the season advanced the shooting gradually improved, and culminated at Mr. Murphy's 99 at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards, and 102 at 200, 500 and 1,000 yards.

On July 3rd a match against a team from H.M.S. Brilliant took place, resulting in a win for the home team by 13 points. It is worthy of mention that in this match three of our junior members took part. The marking during the season was most satisfactory, as was also the maintenance of the targets. Our marker, Mr. A. Rice, gave general satisfaction, and added to the enjoyment of the season's shooting.

The number of subscribers for the past year was 50, and it is a matter for general regret that we have not a much larger membership. With the present limited number of members it is very difficult to make ends meet, and it is sincerely hoped that this season will witness a large influx of new members. Your committee are hopeful in this regard, as the new range will be much more attractive and more easily reached than the old one at Nagle's Hill.

As regards the new range, your committee are pleased to report that there is every prospect of having it ready early in May. Work on the range was continued on March 19th, and rapid progress is being made. The mantlet or target pit is almost completed, and three sets of Jeffries "Wimbledon" frames and targets have been ordered and will arrive at an early date. These targets will accommodate squads of nine men, and it is anticipated that matches will not take half the time necessary at our old range. Thus we will have room for a much larger number of riflemen than heretofore. The expenditure to date is about \$400.00.

The annual dinner was held on November 25th, at Smithville, and was most enjoyable. His Excellency the Governor was present and promised the Club his hearty support.

A letter has recently been received from Mr. T. S. Poole, of Grand Falls, stating that a rifle club is being formed at that place. Your committee suggested to Mr. Poole that the Grand Falls Rifle Club affiliate with the St. John's Rifle Club, and that in this much to be desired event, a Newfoundland Rifle Association be

formed with headquarters at St. John's, and the formation of other Rifle Clubs throughout the Island be encouraged. To render this scheme practicable, Government help is necessary, and your committee recommend that the committee for the ensuing season petition the Government for maintenance and equipment grants for Rifle Clubs throughout the Island on lines similar to those adopted in other British colonies.

It is with sincere regret that we have to record the death of our late Captain, Mr. T. A. Lawrence, which sad event occurred in November last. We cannot forget the debt this Club owes to our late Captain, who did so much for its advancement, and it is proposed that a resolution of condolence be passed by this meeting and forwarded to his relatives.

CARIBOU SHOOTING In Newfoundland.

BY F. H. WHITE.

If you told some people that you were going to Newfoundland shooting, you would hear them exclaim: "What, you're not going to Newfoundland, for there is nothing to see there but fog? Besides, the climate from a sportsman's view, is very unsatisfactory." Such are some of the impressions that the majority of people have of Newfoundland, and they run away with the idea that we have no such thing as "fresh, breezy air," but all that exists is "fog" night and day. This idea is altogether erroneous, and is as far from the truth as the North Pole is from the South Pole. It always happens that these very people are ones who have never been to Newfoundland, and have no particular interest in "Ye Ancient Colony," and who believe every story that is told them, which is not much to their credit. Regarding the shooting and climate of Newfoundland I think a few extracts from the writings of such men as J. G. Millais, F. C. Selous, and a Newfoundland guide book, would not be out of place. Regarding Newfoundland caribou J. G. Millais says:

"For its size Newfoundland to-day contains more caribou than any other part of the world, and, owing to the nutritive qualities of its super-excellent mosses and lichens, the deer grow to great excellence."

F. C. Selous says regarding his visit:

"Personally, I never enjoyed any short hunting trip in my life as much as I did my last visit to Newfoundland. I found caribou plentiful and secured two really fine heads."

Regarding the climate the guide book says:

"After a few weeks near the coast,

inhaling the salt sea breezes and exposed to the life-giving sun's rays, the invalid who has come with shattered nerves and fluttering pulse returns with a new supply of iron in his blood and a sense of well-being that makes it a luxury to live and breathe the pure air of Terra Nova; to climb its rocky heights, to wander over its plains and barrens, bright with wild flowers; to ply the angler's rod or bend the oar in the clear waters of its countless lakes; or to explore one of the great flocks which stretch their arms inland, amid the wildest and grandest scenery. All this is like passing into a newer and better state of existence and enjoying for a time a purer and better life."

I think that the above extracts corroborate what I have tried to set forth. My own opinion regarding the shooting and climate which exist in Newfoundland is that, if equaled, it cannot be surpassed. The fresh, breezy air of the Newfoundland moors (locally barrens) would be of more value to a "run-down" system than many a doctor's prescription. I have just returned from a shooting trip to the interior of Newfoundland and had a most enjoyable time, securing two caribou—a stag with a fine set of antlers and a doe. I had the best of sport, the best of companions, the best of weather, and everything else accordingly. I can honestly say that the fortnight my tent was pitched three miles west of Gaff Topsails was the most enjoyable I ever experienced, and in this I am sure I am voicing the sentiments of my companions, and jolly good fellows they were, too.

I may say for the information of my readers that the closed season for caribou shooting in Newfoundland is

from the first day of February to the thirty-first day of July in any year, both days inclusive; and from the first day of October to the twentieth day of October in any year, both days inclusive. There is a moderate charge of \$50 for each non-resident's license.

"Yes, I shall be delighted to go with you for a fortnight's shooting at Gaff Topsails." Such was my reply to a query put forward by my friend Charlie about the middle of October last, and we started forthwith to make arrangements for a good time.

We left St. John's on October 19, arriving at our destination next day, and, like the Israelites of old, we "pitched our tent in the wilderness." After everything was in readiness we started forth in the direction of Mount Seymour, to intercept the denizens of the north who make their annual migration south about the middle of October (but the time varies according to the climatic conditions).—We were about four miles from camp, having just crossed a string of marshes, and decided to alter our course, when, coming to a rock from which one could obtain a good lookout, I jumped up and viewed the surrounding country with my field glass. After scouring every shady nook, I was about to descend, when I became transfixed to the spot, for nearly a mile and a half from us, at the head of a lake, was a bunch of eight deer going south across the track. I am sure I would be wasting precious time as well as taking up too much valuable space in describing our chase, but in passing I may tell you that we lost no time and were soon heading due west in order to hold an interview with the deer. When we had gone a little over a mile we heard the whistle of the "Bruce" express, and, as we anticipated, our friends turned and came back in the same "lead." We quickly sought shelter and waited, and they slowly came towards us totally unaware of what awaited them.

There is a time in everyone's life when he should stop and consider, and look over the way which he has come and scout along the path that lies before him. Our friends had arrived at that time to within about 60 yards of us, but two of them didn't have time to consider, although their stay was for a lengthy period. We were soon standing by the side of our fallen prize. A stag and a doe was the result of our encounter, the stag having a fine set of antlers. We started them to "pounce" them, after which we "packed" to camp, being in the best of spirits. The Bay Steamers Sail.

Two of the bay steamers, the s.s. Clyde for Green Bay and the s.s. Dundee for Bonavista Bay, sailed this morning to take up the summer's work. A reporter of the Telegram accompanied Mr. H. D. Reid, the Vice-President of the Company, and Mr. J. W. N. Johnstone, the General Passenger Agent, on board these ships and the s.s. Ethie and s.s. Invermore last evening. During the past month workmen, painters and carpenters have been employed on the boats putting them in order, so that they are now in first class condition. No expense has been spared to put the ships in excellent condition. In fact it is difficult to realize that the ships are not quite new and built last season. The engines and boilers have been completely overhauled under the direction of Mr. Peter Steward, who deserves to be complimented on having everything in the pink of condition. The cabins have been cleaned and painted with scrupulous care, and the air of the place is suggestive of cleanliness and comfort. We visited also the steerage or cabin for second class passengers. No pains have been spared, it is quite evident, to make this department in all the ships clean, light and wholesome. The linen and mattresses which are supplied in the women's division are as clean looking as what is in the first class quarters. The bay steamers are all alike and the same care has evidently been exercised in making them ready for the service. They are no doubt in superb condition below and above decks, and looked like new ships lying at the Reid pier last evening. Capt. D. Blandford of the Dundee, Capt. Kneeb of the Clyde, and Capt. Goobie of the Ethie, who were on board the ships when we visited them, take great pride in their steamers and are well pleased with the way in which they are fitted up for the summer service. Ethie will sail tomorrow. We also visited the s.s. Invermore, the Labrador steamer, which is now being fitted up for the summer. Several improvements are being made for the greater comfort and convenience of passengers. An intermediate suite of rooms, including a mess room, is being built on deck to accommodate planters and their families going to and from the Labrador. No expense is being spared by Capt. Delaney, acting under Mr. Reid's instructions, to have the Invermore as well as the other boats in first class condition. The bilge guard that runs around the ship's side will be removed as it was found an inconvenience on Labrador when boats would come alongside to take in freight. In a swell boats lying alongside were liable to be capsized by this projection. The Invermore will not sail till after the middle of June, and we hear will make Emily Harbor the connecting point with the Stelle Maris. The officers on all the bay boats are in most cases the same as were employed last year. Snapshots Around the World.

Last year 193,320 tons of fish passed through Billingsgate market.

Reports of five hundred violations of the excise law was recently made in New York.

Mayor Gaynor's excise plan for a "dry" Sunday in New York proved to be a flat failure.

During last year the earnings of persons confined in English prisons showed an increase of \$100,000.

An international conference for the suppression of the white slave traffic was opened in Paris on the 18th inst.

Washington will lead in the movement for a safe and sane 4th of July by having a celebration in charge of the authorities.

Waldorf Astor has offered a sum of money practically without limit to the National Association for the prevention of consumption.

The Young Men's Christian Association of Youngstown, Ohio, decided to raise \$150,000 for a new building, and in four days had collected \$125,922.60. The ladies can get the cash even if they can't secure votes.

A huge electric magnet is being used to draw 13,000 kegs of nails to the surface from the bottom of the

Mississippi River, near New Orleans. So far 1,600 kegs have been recovered.

The United States Treasury Department has made public a decision to refund all money as duty paid on mechanically ground pulp made from pulpwood cut on private lands in the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario.

Prof. Chaut in a lecture in Toronto says no person has yet seen Halley's comet with the naked eye. No danger is to be feared as the spectrum of the comet contains no cyanogen, and the tail will be so rarified that at no time will its existence be felt.

Jack Johnson is now seriously considering the selection of a referee for his big fight with Jeffries on July 4th. He is in favour of Jack Welch, of California, and says if Welch is accepted one of the most serious problems will be overcome.

The Montreal Street Railway Company has voluntarily raised the wages of its employees. There are 3,000 affected by the order, which means an additional expenditure of \$100,000. This is the second time the company has voluntarily made an increase.

The California Methodist Preachers' Association has adopted a resolution against prize fighting. The resolution asks all ministerial associations in the State to help in wiping out "this form of sport which is at once a disgrace and degradation."

The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. has started a campaign for the purpose of inducing farmers to grow more flax. Experiments have been made and it has been clearly demonstrated that straw fibre can be converted into rope, tapestries or any textile fabrics. It is said there is no

country in the world so well adapted for the cultivation as Canada.

It has come to light that a Philadelphia physician has been using orphan children as material for tubercula experiments, and a public appeal is to be made for a rigid investigation of the matter, with the object of asking the Legislature to pass a law prohibiting the use of orphan children for such purposes. The experiments, however, were said to be successful.
