The Woman's Charter.

LONDON, April 23 .- A "Woman's Charter," which proposes to give women the franchise and many other privileges they now lack. is before the House of Commons. It takes the form of a series of eight bills introduced by Sir Charles MacLarren. One of the main objects of the charter is to put married women in a more equitable position with regard to property, and another is to provide salaries for wives.






