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



For this reason the Three Years Whisky Bill provides that in future all spirits are to he kept in bond in a warehouse for three years; that is to say, it will in future be unlawful to sell spirits until they are three years old ... The new law will not become fully operative until retailers have sold out their

existing stocks, but when these have been disposed of, every gallon spirit sold in the country will be a least three years old. In this way it is hoped to minimize very considerably the evils of drunkenness, for of the 25,000,000 gallons of apirits consumed annually about 9,000,000 of this total have been sold absolutely
