

He contended that prolongation of the war could be justified only by a reason-able expectation that through its coninuance the Allies should be in a po-sition to dictate such terms as to secure future European peace. He thought that few men who took an inelligent and dispassionate view of the situation, and the lessons it had aught, would say that there was any reasonable ground for hope of a de-cisive and crushing military victory or either of the contending parties. f Britain was determined to continue expectation of crushing Germany he declared, her people ought to be con-vinced that it was the best method

or establishing the international reations of the European Powers. He nowever, believed that the continued attempt to crush Germany would be the worst basis for the establishment of a just and lasting settlement. The speaker declared that all nations, especially Germany, were being driven to accept the evidence of this war, of the futility of militarism, and that the time was ripe for making a movement in the direction of peace. In particular, Snowden maintained that German Socialists were solidly in favor of peace, now that it had been proven that Germany was invulnerable from external attack. The Premier said he would not like it to go forth to the world that Snowden and Trevelyan were spokesmen for any substantial body of public opinion. He even
